Congratulations Lt. Bruce Ivey who was awarded the Military Veteran Firefighter of the Year by the VFW Post 6364 (pictured with Post Commander Mike Dunham).

Lt. Ivey was active duty USAF from December 1988 to April 1994, followed by USAF Reserves from April 1994 to September 11, 2009. While on active duty, he was assigned to fire protection, which included deployment for Operation Desert Storm from September 1990 to March 1991. While in the reserves, he was also assigned to fire protection and served the 512th Air Wing at Dover AFB in Dover, DE. His deployments included Kuwait, the United Arab Emirates (UAE), and Puerto Rico.

Ivey retired as a Master Sergeant and has been with Henrico Division of Fire since 1994. He has served with the Dive/Water Rescue Team and the Technical Rescue Team, has been assigned to the FEMA VA Task Force Team 2 since 2013, and serves as an instructor in various disciplines.

Ivey earned his Eagle Scout in 1988 and has served as Scout Master for 10 years for Troop 1891 at the Bon Air United Methodist Church.

Henrico Fire Receives EMS Award

The Henrico County Division of Fire has been recently awarded the **2016 Mission: Lifeline® EMS Gold Level Recognition Award** by the American Heart Association. The award is granted for implementing quality improvement measures for the treatment of patients who experience severe heart attacks.


Every year, more than 250,000 people experience an “ST elevation myocardial infarction” (STEMI), the most deadly type of heart attack caused by a blockage of blood flow to the heart that requires timely treatment. To prevent death, it’s critical to restore blood flow as quickly as possible, either by mechanically opening the blocked vessel or by providing clot-busting medication.

Unfortunately, a significant number of STEMI patients don't receive this prompt reperfusion therapy, which is critical in restoring blood flow. Mission: Lifeline seeks to save lives by closing the gaps that separate these patients from timely access to appropriate treatments. Mission: Lifeline’s EMS recognition program recognizes emergency medical services for their efforts in improving systems of care and improving the quality of life for these patients.

The American Heart Association recognizes this EMS provider for attaining 75% or higher performance on each applicable Mission: Lifeline® EMS Achievement Measure for consecutive 24-month interval to improve the quality of care for STEMI patients.

James Jollis, M.D., Chair of the Mission: Lifeline Advisory Working Group. “Since they often are the first medical point of contact, they can shave precious minutes of life-saving treatment time by activating the emergency response system that alerts hospitals. We applaud Henrico Fire for achieving this award that shows it meets evidence-based guidelines in the treatment of people who have severe heart attacks.”

Agencies that receive the Mission: Lifeline Gold award have demonstrated at least 75 percent compliance for each required achievement measure for two years. “EMTs and paramedics play a vital part in the system of care for those who have heart attacks,” said

House Fire on Church Rd.



On April 5th, fire units responded to the 12000 block of Church Rd for the report of a structure fire. First arriving units arrived to smoke and flames coming from the home.

Firefighters were met with high heat conditions as they made entry to search for victims and to bring the fire under control. No victims were found and the fire was quickly extinguished.

The resident and two pets were not home but were displaced due to the fire.

Apartment Fire on Demeree Court

On April 26th, fire units responded to the report of an apartment fire on the 4600 block of Demeree Court in the County's East End. Units arrived to heavy fire showing from the multi-story townhouse apartment.

Crews immediately made entry and began to search for occupants and to attack the fire. No occupants or pets were in the apartment and the fire was quickly extinguished.

The fire spread to adjacent apartments and through the roof, causing damage to a total of five separate apartments. All occupants were accounted for and are were displaced for a period of time.

Henrico Fire reminds everyone to have a fire escape plan for their family and to practice the escape plan regularly. Have a central place outside the home for all family members to meet, and once out of a fire, do not go back in, not even to rescue pets.



House Fire on Lampworth Court



On April 18th, fire units responded to the 7700 block of Lampworth Court, in the Varina district of the County, to the report of a house fire. Units arrived to find heavy smoke and fire coming from the attic and roof of a two-story home.

Crews began with an interior attack, but had to withdraw from the home for a short period of time before re-entering to extinguish the fire. A search of the home revealed no occupants or pets were inside. The fire was marked under control in just over an hour.

The roof and attic were lost, and the second floor suffered significant damage. The family was displaced and made arrangements to stay elsewhere.

FEMA Virginia Task Force 2

Congratulations **FF Grayson Elam, FF Adam Corwin, and FF John Tyrcha** for being selected to represent Henrico Division of Fire on FEMA Virginia Task Force 2. These three went through a rigorous application process, including panel interviews, and were added to the VA-TF2 roster as a HAZMAT Specialist, Rescue Specialist, and Rescue Specialist, respectively.

VA-TF2 is one of only two FEMA teams in the Commonwealth and one of only 28 teams in the United States. VA-TF2 is made up of personnel from a handful of different fire departments, mostly in the Tidewater Area, and is managed by the Virginia Beach Fire Department. Henrico County is the only fire department in Central Virginia represented on the team, although many have applied over the years. The addition of these members speaks to their skill and professionalism, as well as Henrico Fire's reputation built by those members brought on to the team before them.

The addition of Grayson, Adam, and John brings our total VA-TF2 compliment to ten personnel. The incumbent members are FF Mike Bassett, FF J.J. Leach, FF Jay Hudnall, FF Alan Pollard, LT Bruce Ivey, Captain Scott Kincaid, and Captain Mark Cumashot.

Battalion Chief Jackson Baynard has been in the fire service for 20 years, including 13 years with the Division of Fire. A nationally registered paramedic, Jackson has worked in numerous operational and administrative positions within the Division. Although firefighters are taught basic knots and rope skills early in their careers, it's always good to have a refresher course from a crew who may utilize ropes on a more frequent basis.




...and More Training

Shoring means to create a structure that supports the sides of an excavation and is designed to prevent cave-ins or the collapse of damaged buildings.





FMO Corner

The Fire Marshal's office is responsible for enforcing the current Statewide Fire Prevention Code, as well as: issuing permits, performing safety inspections, reviewing plans for development, investigations of incidents involving fires, environmental crimes and bombings, as well as public education, public information and other related issues.

The office conducts an average of three hundred fire investigations annually, with a clearance rate well above the national average. Assistant Fire Marshals conduct well over a thousand business inspections each year. In the average year, they issue over a thousand certificates of occupancy, as well as permits for burning, blasting and welding. The office has a Fire Protection Engineer, who performs the review on all plans of development; these amount to several hundred a year. In addition, personnel assigned to our fire stations perform approximately three to four thousand inspections of small businesses annually.

Burn Laws

Burning of leaves is only permitted in areas of Henrico County that do not have bagged leaf pickup service.

This burning can only be done from 8 AM to 8 PM.

Fire Lanes and Hydrants

Virginia Law is as follows:

No person shall stand, stop or park a vehicle within 15 feet, in front of or adjacent to a fire hydrant.

And...

Parking in a fire lane is prohibited in the Commonwealth of Virginia. All fire lanes must be clearly marked with approved signs that display words, 'NO PARKING FIRE LANE TOWING ENFORCED' with an arrow pointing towards the restricted area.

We all know somebody who has parked in the fire lane because, "I just have to run into the store for a few minutes" or "It's raining and I was only running in and running out" or "Somebody is in the car so it's okay" or "The only spot open was too far away. I'm not parking that far just to get one thing" and "I'm just waiting for my friend to get off work" etc. etc. etc.

Bottom line: It's prohibited so DON'T DO IT!

The same for fire hydrants. You never know when that one day will be that a fire truck needs to use that hydrant. Water is more important to a firefighter than the need to find a car owner and have them move their car. They're not going to wait for you, so don't take the chance by blocking a hydrant.

The Way it Was: 1970-1980

Building Upon the Foundation Laid by Our Predecessors

**Welcome a new section of the newsletter inspired by Retired Volunteer Firefighter David Nowell. Nowell was a volunteer at Eng. Co. #8 from 1971-1979 and transferred to Eng. Co. #9 from 1979-1982. Two Teenagers Saved from House Fire

Firemen praised for speedy rescue in Henrico

A 42-year-old western Henrico County man today is thankful that a fire station is only two blocks from his home and that firefighters acted quickly in rescuing his two teen-age sons from a blaze that did extensive damage to the two-story brick house.

"I'll tell you, they just did a superb job," David Graham said today of the efforts of three members of Henrico Engine Co. 12, which is at 3803 West End Drive, near his home at 9105 Greenford Drive.

Henrico Fire Capt. Walter R. Hawkins said the firefighters rescued from an upstairs bedroom Michael D. Graham, 16, a sophomore at J.R. Tucker High School, and Christopher Scott Graham, 13, a seventh-grader at Tuckahoe Middle School. Both boys were treated at St. Luke's Hospital for possible smoke inhalation and released.

The rescuers were identified as

Firefighter R. W. Adams, who has been with the division eight years; Firefighter C. D. Jones, who has been with the division 12 years; and Lt. W. M. Bledsoe, who has been with the division 18 years.

Adams, the firefighter who entered the smoke-filled room, was treated for smoke inhalation at Henrico Doctors' Hospital and released, Hawkins said.

"If it hadn't been for these three firefighters, we'd have had two dead kids," Hawkins said. "The fire was to the point that we could not get up the stairs."

Adams, 29, said today. "What threw me off was when the young one stopped yelling and I threw all my equipment off and went in as I was, without the breathing apparatus, and that's when I got smoke inhalation. He (Scott) was about five feet from the window, so I figured I could take that chance."

Scott said the last thing he remembers was choking in the thick, black smoke. "I went unconscious up by the bed and woke up down here on the grass."

Firefighters from three companies responded last night to the 11.25 alarm and had the fire under control within 15 minutes, Hawkins said. He said damage was estimated at \$35,000 to the house, which he said had a total value estimated at \$70,000.

Graham, who is food service director at Westminster Canterbury House nursing home, said he and his wife, Theresa, 37, assistant cafeteria manager at Henrico Government Center, were downstairs in the living room at the time of the blaze.

"The boys had just gone up to bed maybe 20 minutes to a half-hour before," Graham said. He said he

reached for a kerosene heater the family has had for several years and "for some reason or other when I went to turn it off, kerosene leaked out of it real fast and it just caught fire and went.

"Instantly, it gave out a black sooty smoke and we couldn't see anything. The boys were upstairs and we couldn't get to them," he continued. "We told the two boys to shut the door to their bedroom and get over by the window and get on the floor.

"They did and the fire company was here immediately. The fire company is just about two blocks from us. I called them from my own home. They put a ladder up to the window, climbed up, broke out a window and pulled the boys out."

Graham said he slightly singed some hair on his eyebrows but refused treatment. The family stayed at a neighbor's house last night.

St. Bartholomew Episcopal Church Fire

After fire, parish picks up pieces

"The church is the people, not the building . . . I have a feeling we'll have to start from the ground up," said Joan Jones, a parishioner of St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church, looking at the remains of the one-story structure hit by a two-alarm fire yesterday morning.

Henrico firefighters said they were called to the church at 10627 Patterson Ave. shortly before 7 a.m. by a passing motorist, believed to be a member of the parish.

Battalion Chief X.L. Shook said flames were shooting up 50 feet from the rear of the building when the first unit arrived. He said the sanctuary was gutted and the rest of the building suffered heavy heat and smoke damage. The roof over the center of the sanctuary had partially collapsed and the remainder of the roof was damaged, firefighters

The church, said the sanctuary, which is in the center of the one-story structure, was gutted. The charred remains of wood roof beams lay on the sanctuary floor.

"They (fire officials) said the roof is in imminent danger of coming down, so, as far as I'm concerned, that means we'll have to completely rebuild," Jones said.

The building was made from a special design that included a stucco-and-concrete outer shell and an interior of concrete blocks faced with stucco, Jones said. "But there were lots of wood beams inside, and those are what really burned."

Eastbound and westbound traffic on Patterson Avenue, in the area about one mile east of the Goochland County line, was rerouted for more than two hours this morning because of the fire.

RECTOR OUT OF TOWN

The church's rector, the Rev. Malcolm Turnbull, was contacted this morning at the home of relatives in South Carolina, for which he left following yesterday's

services, Jones said.

"It was a perfectly normal Sunday-after-Christmas service," Jones said.

"I think everybody that's involved with the church is quite distressed at this point. It's not a very large church (about

400 people). It's very like a family . . . I'm going to do."
