PRESENTATIONS

Mr. Thornton presented a proclamation recognizing September 17 – 23, 2008 as Constitution Week. Accepting the proclamation was Alicia L. Fox, Senior First Vice President of the Colonel Alexander Spotswood Society, Children of the American Revolution. Joining her were Susan Walsh, Senior President; Bev Alexander, Senior Chaplain; Jeffrey Wrobel, Recording Secretary; Nancy Akers, Senior Treasurer; Henry Howells, Senior Registrar; Robinette Wrobel, Senior Recording Secretary; Benjamin Wrobel, Curator; and Alexandra Howells, Newsletter Editor.

Mr. Kaechele presented a proclamation recognizing September 2008 as Alcohol and Drug Addiction Recovery Month. Accepting the proclamation were Catherine C. Hammond, Judge of the Henrico Circuit Court and Henrico Drug Court, and Michael D. O'Connor, Executive Director of Henrico Area Mental Health and Retardation Services. Clyde Harrison, a Henrico Drug Court participant who is in recovery from addiction, also briefly addressed the Board. Joining them were Michael L. Wade, Henrico Sheriff; Stacy Hamilton, Program Manager, Adult Substance Abuse and Jail Services, Henrico Area Mental Health and Retardation Services; and Patricia A. Mr. Donati presented a proclamation recognizing September 2008 as Preparedness Month. Accepting the proclamation was Anna M. McRay, Deputy Coordinator of Emergency Management for the Henrico County Division of Fire. Joining her were Kenneth L. Dunn, Assistant Chief, Henrico Division of Fire; Col. Henry W. 256-08 P-13-08 Varina Richmond 20 MHz LLC: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Sections 24-95(a)(3), 24-120 and 24-122.1 of Chapter 24 of the County Code in order to construct a 151.8' high flagpole-style telecommunications tower and related equipment, on part of Parcel 814-687-3204, located on the west line of Recreation Road approximately 1,200 feet south of its intersection with New Market Road (State Route 5).

In response to a question from Mrs. O'Bannon, Assistant Director of Planning Jean Moore explained that the flag that would be flown on the proposed communications tower would follow federal flag etiquette guidelines and would be up lit to reduce glare on surrounding property.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this case.

On motion of Mr. Donati, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved Agenda Item No. 256-08 subject to the following conditions:

- 1. If the use of the tower for communication purposes is discontinued for 180 days, the tower and all related structures shall be removed from the site within ninety (90) days. Within ten (10) business days after written request by the County, the owner of the tower shall provide the County with written confirmation of the status of the tower, the number of and identity of users on the tower, available co-location space on the tower and such additional information as may be reasonably requested.
- 2. Application for a building permit to install the tower must be made within one year after the Provisional Use Permit is granted by the Board of Supervisors, unless an extension of time is granted by the Director of Planning upon a written request by the applicant.
- 3. The applicant shall obtain approval from the Planning Commission should the FAA require the addition of standard obstruction marking and lighting (i.e. red lighting and orange and white striping) to the tower. Any proposed changes to the original galvanized finish of the tower shall be submitted to the Director of Planning for approval.
- 4. When site construction is initiated as a result of this Provisional Use Permit, the applicant shall complete requirements prescribed by Chapter 10 of the Henrico County Code. Construction plans shall include a detailed drainage and erosion control plan prepared by a professional engineer certified in the State of Virginia. Ten (10) sets of the construction plans shall be submitted to the Department of Public Works for approval.
- 5. The applicant shall allow the co-location of at least two (2) and as many additional users as technically possible at this site in accordance with the provisions of the Letter of Intent to Permit Co-Location on Communications Tower, filed by the applicant with this request.
- 6. If ownership of the lease is transferred to another provider, the applicant shall submit a Transfer of Provisional Use Permit.
- 7. The height of the tower shall not exceed 151.8 feet.
- 8. This permit applies only to the 1,644 square foot lease areas on the property.
- 9. A landscaping plan to provide visual and sound buffering (including tree save areas and supplemental plantings) for the equipment compound and flag-pole shall be submitted to the Planning Department for approval prior to the issuance of a building permit for the tower. The Director of Planning may waive the enforcement of this condition if it is deemed unnecessary.

- 10. Unless dead or diseased, or necessary for operations, the existing tree buffers along all property lines shall be preserved and shall not be pruned to reduce their height.
- 11. Prior to the co-location of any carrier's antennas or addition of equipment lease space, a revised site plan and equipment placement details shall be submitted to the Planning Department for approval.
- 12. In order to reduce the tower's visual profile, all carriers' antennae located on the monopole shall be concealed within the tower's cylindrical structure.
- 13. Unless otherwise approved by the Director of Planning, only an all-weather American flag, 20'x30' in size, shall be flown on the monopole and shall be maintained in accordance with flag etiquette guidelines of the Federal Government. Any additional signage or other advertisement shall not be placed on the tower.
- 14. The 30'x50' equipment compound shall be located adjacent to the rear property set-back line as shown on Exhibit A (see case file). Fencing, a minimum of six (6) feet in height, shall surround the ground equipment compound and blend with the surrounding environment and landscaping. A fence design and visual treatment shall be submitted with the Landscaping Plan as required in Condition #9 and approved by the Planning Department prior to the issuance of a building permit for the tower.
- 15. Flag lighting shall be accomplished with light angles and intensity which minimizes glare on surrounding property. A lighting plan shall be submitted to the Planning Department for approval.

258-08 C-28C-08 Three Chopt Twin Hickory Stables LLC: Request to conditionally rezone from A-1 Agricultural District, R-3C One-Family Residence District (Conditional), R-4C One-Family Residence District (Conditional) and C-1 Conservation District to R-3C One-Family Residence District (Conditional), Parcels 747-776-8848, 748-776-3108, and 747-775-9503, containing 46.7 acres, located on the southwest line of the Chickahominy River and bisected by the proposed Holman Ridge Road Extended between Twin Hickory Road and Lemoore Drive.

Mr. Kaechele pointed out that staff and the Planning Commission were recommending approval of this case and that there had been at least two neighborhood meetings on this case where the applicants, staff, and citizens had cooperated and worked out concerns.

Kathy Burcher, President of the River's Edge Elementary School Parents Teacher Association (PTA), stated that she was speaking on behalf of the PTA's Executive Committee representing nearly 700 members. Mrs. Burcher noted that her school fronts Holman Ridge Road and abuts the property on which the proposed development would be sited. She said that the PTA had no problem with the proposed development and had found the representatives of the family selling the property very responsive and helpful. Mrs. Burcher read a prepared statement expressing concerns regarding the planned extension of Holman Ridge Road and its intersection with Twin Hickory Road. She remarked that the parents and administration at her school consider the unguarded school crosswalk at this intersection a dangerous situation. Her

PTA's Executive Committee requested that the Board appropriate funds for a second crossing guard at the school, to be located at the intersection of Holman Ridge and Twin Hickory Drives once construction of the proposed development begins; and that the Board and Planning Commission develop an acceptable strategy to keep children who live in non-transportation zones safe on their way to and from school.

In response to questions from Mr. Kaechele, Mrs. Burcher clarified that her PTA was principally concerned about the impact of the future extension of Holman Ridge Road on the safety of the intersection of Holman Ridge and Twin Hickory Roads and that it was asking that a school crossing guard be placed there. Mr. Hazelett acknowledged the importance of addressing the safety of school children. He stated that although this matter needed to be considered by the School Board with the assistance of the County's Division of Police he did not believe it was something that should be addressed as part of the zoning case. Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Kaechele pointed out that the proffered conditions in this case included provisions for sidewalks on both sides of Holman Ridge Road Extended.

Karen Hamilton, a resident of Kain Road in the Three Chopt District, asked whether there had been a study to show whether there were endangered box turtles living on the site or a study as to which migratory birds inhabit the trees on the property. After stating her belief that the Board has generally ignored the Federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act, she commented on the importance of this law. Ms. Hamilton expressed concerns that developers in the County are not taking nesting season into account when cutting down trees. Mr. Hazelett discussed with Ms. Hamilton the proper decorum of addressing comments to the Board rather than County staff during public hearings before the Board.

Mr. Kaechele reiterated that the applicant and staff had met with citizens on two occasions and that new proffers had been added to address citizen concerns about the orderly development of the property. Mrs. O'Bannon asked that staff respond to a question from Ms. Hamilton pertaining to when environmental studies would be done on the property. Mrs. Moore explained that the United States Army Corps of Engineers would consider wetland and other environmental issues after rezoning of the property. In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mrs. Moore identified an area of the property that would be retained as natural space and could be inhabited by wildlife.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Donati, the Board followed the recommendations of the Planning Commission and approved Agenda Item No. 258-08 subject to the following conditions:

1. <u>Underground Utilities.</u> All proposed utilities except for junction boxes and meters shall be placed underground, unless technical or environmental reasons require otherwise.

- 2. <u>Density.</u> No more than ninety-one (91) single-family residential units shall be constructed on the Property.
- 3. Garages. Each residential unit on the Property shall be constructed with a two (2) car garage. Front loading garages shall be recessed beyond the front line of the dwelling, a minimum of four (4) feet. Thirty-three percent (33%) of the garages shall be side or rear loaded.
- 4. <u>Minimum House Size.</u> Any new house constructed on the Property shall have a minimum of 2,250 square feet of finished floor area.
- 5. <u>Sidewalks.</u> A sidewalk a minimum of four (4) feet in width shall be provided on both sides of Holman Ridge Road Extended if requested by the County at the time of subdivision review. A grass strip a minimum of two (2) feet in width shall be provided between the back of curb and the sidewalk if requested by the County at the time of subdivision review.
- 6. Foundations and Front Steps. All new houses shall be constructed on crawl space foundations, except for garages and basements. The exterior portion of the foundations below the first floor level which is visible above grade shall be finished with brick or stone. This proffer shall not apply to direct vent gas fireplaces or appliances. Steps to the main entrance of all homes, except for homes with country porches, shall be faced with brick or stone or a cementitious mortared stone appearing product with a finished concrete or exposed aggregate landing. Any country porches shall have brick piers.
- 7. <u>Cantilevering.</u> There shall be no cantilevered chimneys, direct vent gas fireplaces, closets or bay windows.
- 8. <u>Driveways.</u> All new driveways shall be constructed of either cobblestone, brick, asphalt, pre-cast pavers, concrete or other similar materials approved by the Director of Planning.
- 9. Exterior Building Materials. All new houses shall be constructed with brick, stone, cultured stone, EIFS, cementitious siding (e.g. Hardiplank, or an equivalent), high-grade vinyl (a minimum of .040" nominal thickness as evidenced by manufacturer's printed literature) or a combination of the foregoing unless different architectural treatment and/or materials are specifically approved with respect to the exposed portion of any wall at the time of subdivision review. A minimum of twenty-five percent (25%) of all homes as to the visible portions of the front exterior building wall surfaces below eave height, excluding windows, doors, dormers, breezeways, gables and architectural design features shall be of brick or stone construction, unless an equivalent

- material is requested and specifically approved at subdivision review. Fiberboard shall not be permitted as an exterior wall material.
- 10. <u>Landscaping.</u> A minimum of two (2) trees measuring a minimum of 2.5" in caliper shall be retained or planted in the front yard of each new residential lot. The front and side yards shall be irrigated and planted with sod except where landscaping may occur.
- 11. Restrictive Covenants. Prior to or concurrent with the recordation of the subdivision plat approved by the County and before the conveyance of any portion of the property covered by said subdivision plat (other than for the dedication of easements, roads, or utilities), there shall be recorded a document in the Clerk's Office of the Circuit Court of Henrico County, Virginia setting forth quality controls on the development and maintenance of all portions of the Property.
- 12. Access. Access to the Property shall be from Holman Ridge Road Extended. There shall be no driveway access to Holman Ridge Road Extended from any lot. Except for Holman Ridge Road Extended, no proposed street shall connect to adjacent subdivision streets. Holman Ridge Road Extended shall be designed and developed to County standards as a 55' right-of-way, and shall be dedicated to Henrico. If Henrico fails to accept Holman Ridge Road Extended, then ownership of it shall remain in the Applicant or its successor in interest. Upon acceptance by Henrico County of Holman Ridge Road Extended, the Applicant shall quit claim all right, title and interest it might have in Twin Hickory Lane.
- 13. <u>Fences.</u> No chain link fences shall be permitted on the Property. Any fence adjacent to Holman Ridge Road Extended shall not exceed forty-eight (48) inches in height, shall be of uniform design and construction, and shall be constructed of maintenance-free materials.
- 14. <u>Floodplain</u>. Application to rezone the floodplain portion of the Property to Conservation District (C-1) for areas of the Property that include floodplain shall occur prior to subdivision approval.
- 15. <u>Communications Facility.</u> All residential lots shall be located outside the communications facility fall zone.
- 16. Minimum Lot Width. Fifty percent (50%) of the lots shall have a minimum lot width at the building line as defined by Henrico County of 85'.

17. Amenities.

(a) A tot lot improved with playground equipment shall be provided in the common area.

- (b) A walking trail shall be provided in the common area and shall be linked to adjacent trails if requested by Henrico County.
- 18. Construction Hours. The hours of exterior construction activities, including operation of bulldozers and other earthmoving equipment, shall be between 7:00 a.m. 7:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday, except in emergencies or where unusual circumstances require extending the specific hours in order to complete work such as concrete pours or utility connections. Construction traffic shall not be permitted to access the property via the Twin Hickory Road and Holman Ridge Road intersection prior to 8:00 a.m. when school is in session, unless required otherwise by the Henrico County Department of Public Works.
- 19. <u>Building Permit.</u> The Director of Public Works shall approve all required final grading and drainage plans for development of the Property or the applicable portion thereof and shall require evidence that all easements made necessary by such plans have been obtained prior to the issuance of grading and drainage permits for the development of the Property or portion thereof.
- 20. Greenbelt. A greenbelt, exclusive of adjacent lots, for landscaping, natural open areas and scenic vistas will be provided twenty (20) feet in width adjacent to the right-of-way lines of Holman Ridge Road Extended, except to the extent necessary for utility easements, bicycle paths, jogging trails, signage, sidewalks and other purposes requested and specifically permitted, or if required, at the time of subdivision approval, or by any other governmental body. A landscape plan which provides for street trees in the green belt area shall be provided at the time of subdivision review.
- 21. <u>Chimneys.</u> The exposed portions of all fireplace chimneys shall be of brick or a siding similar to the exterior treatment of the dwelling. This proffer shall not apply to direct vent gas fireplaces or appliances. The exposed bases of all chimneys shall be of the same material as the dwelling foundations.
- 22. Lot Clearing. The clearing of healthy trees measuring six (6) or more inches in diameter on any lot shall be limited to areas required to accommodate the dwellings, driveways, sidewalks, open yard areas, utility lines and any other areas typically required for the construction of a dwelling.
- 23. <u>Severance.</u> The unenforceability, elimination, revision or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the other proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.

PUBLIC HEARINGS - OTHER ITEMS

259-08 Resolution - POD-28-08 -Approval of a Plan of Development and Master Plan for Eastern Henrico Recreation Center.

Steve Terrell, the Chief Designer with HKS Architects, led a Power Point presentation on the specifics of the design program, the building design, and the phasing of the project (see enclosed copy). Kateri Simon with Burgess & Niple assisted Mr. Terrell in reviewing site and civil engineering issues and Brian Pounds assisted with technology. Mr. Kaechele commented on the attractiveness and functionality of the structure and noted that the Board had been provided with an opportunity to review the project in great detail during a work session earlier in the evening.

In response to a question from Ms. Hamilton, Mr. Hazelett advised that Henrico citizens had approved this project in a 2005 bond referendum and approximately \$13.3 million was allocated for the project. Albert Strother, a resident of 2909 Sandy Lane in the Fairfield District, asked about plans for the proposed extension of Watts Lane. Mr. Hazelett responded that this likely would not be considered until after phase two of the project. He asked Lee Priestas, Director of Public Works, to show Mr. Strother the location of the proposed extension on a map of the area.

Gatewood Stoneman, a resident of the Varina District, expressed joy that there would at last be a place for youth to come in off the street. Mrs. Stoneman suggested that this facility should be thought about in different ways than Dorey Park and other recreation centers in the County. She referred to the facility as an outreach of two ladies who have consistently come before the Board. Mrs. Stoneman asked that prior to construction of the facility the County consider how much room would be available for one-on-one tutoring because she feels education is the answer to the County's crime problem.

In response to questions from Mr. Thornton, Deputy Director of General Services Bill Smith commented as to why the anticipated completion date for the project has changed, noting that the County is awaiting consultant recommendations for constructing the building to LEED (Leadership in Energy

and Environmental Design) Silver certification standards. Mr. Smith pointed out that this will require an amendment to the County's existing architectural contract. He also elaborated on the advantages of LEED certification.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved Agenda Item No. 259-08 – see attached Resolution.

Ordinance – To Amend and Reordain Section 22-356 of the Code of the County of Henrico Titled "Penalty" Reducing the Penalty for Parking in a Space Reserved for Persons with Disabilities Without Properly Displaying a Placard When the Placard is Present in the Vehicle.

In response to several questions from members of the Board, Col. Stanley and Mr. Hazelett clarified that this ordinance was made possible by the Virginia General Assembly, that it would apply only to handicapped persons who are legally parked but who have forgotten to display their placard on their rearview mirror, and that it would give courts discretion to reduce the fines for such persons. There was some discussion among Mrs. O'Bannon, Col. Stanley, and Mr. Hazelett pertaining to the ticketing procedures followed by the Division of Police for these types of violations.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this ordinance.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Donati, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved Agenda Item No.260-08 – see attached Ordinance.

261-08 Resolution – Abandonment of Portion of Three Chopt Lane – Three Chopt District.

In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Hazelett clarified that the abandonment would occur upon adoption of this resolution.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this resolution.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Donati, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved Agenda Item No. 261-08 – see attached Resolution.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Margie Swart, a resident of 11069 Old Millrace Terrace in the Three Chopt District, expressed opposition to locating the Division of Recreation and Parks' Western Maintenance Facility on the Twin Hickory Park site and urged the Board and County staff to suspend any further expenditures on the planning and development of this facility pending the imminent decision of the Board to purchase property on Kain Road. She suggested that the Kain Road property, where the County had already proposed building a fueling facility, would be a more appropriate site for the maintenance facility. Ms. Swart stated her belief that placing the maintenance facility on the

Twin Hickory Park site constituted spot zoning, was in conflict with the County's plan for future land use on this site, and was not consistent with the County's Land Use Plan. She remarked that the County had a moral, ethical, and legal obligation to develop the site according to the Twin Hickory Park Master Plan that was approved by the Board with citizen input in 1999. Ms. Swart referred to the County's 2005 general obligation bond referendum and asserted that under Virginia law general obligation bond referendum revenue may not be used for anything other than what is was advertised for. She pointed out that the Deep Run High School cross country team will be hosting cross country meets this fall on trails on this property and contended that building a maintenance facility on this land would most likely prohibit any future cross country meets or school activities at this location. Ms. Swart distributed a packet containing a fact sheet and information on the bond referendum on Twin Hickory Park that was sent out to Henrico citizens in 2005 (see enclosed copy).

In response to questions from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Hazelett noted that the County had held public neighborhood meetings on the proposed maintenance facility and that the funds allocated for the facility were not contained in the 2005 bond referendum and that the approximately \$1.5 million allocated for the facility came from general fund revenues in the County's FY 2006-07 budget. There was discussion between Ms. Swart and Mr. Hazelett regarding the use of the \$3 million included for the park in the 2005 bond referendum, the timing and format of the neighborhood meetings, whether the project would meet traffic engineering concerns and County requirements, and the impact of a maintenance facility on park uses.

At Mr. Hazelett's request, Director of Recreation and Parks Karen Mier reviewed concerns that were raised at a May 1, 2007 citizen input meeting on a proposed satellite maintenance facility at Twin Hickory Park, a project that was included in the Recreation and Parks' CIP (Capital Improvements Plan) in 2001. The main concern that was raised at the meeting was ingress and egress of vehicles accessing Shady Grove Road from the maintenance facility. Mrs. Mier clarified the proposed location and size of the facility. In response to questions from Mr. Kaechele, Mrs. Mier confirmed the passive park uses called for in the park's master plan, that her staff was working with consultants to shift the proposed maintenance facility further from the road, and that the facility would be heavily landscaped. She confirmed for Mr. Hazelett that the next step after relocating the building would be obtaining a POD (plan of development) for the property. In response to another question from Mr. Kaechele, Mrs. Mier suggested that the maintenance facility might be needed before the Kain Road property becomes available. Mr. Hazelett and Mrs. Mier confirmed for Mr. Kaechele that there would be a POD public hearing for the facility in November 2008 prior to the project going out to bid.

Ms. Swart suggested that it would be more cost effective to build this maintenance facility next to a fuel facility and that the County should study the feasibility of placing the facility on the Kain Road site. Mr. Kaechele and Mr. Hazelett indicated that Ms. Swart's suggestion could be considered and evaluated after the Board makes a decision on acquisition of the Kain Road property.

Sarah Powell, a resident of 5300 Axe Handle Road in the Three Chopt District, responded to Ms. Swart's comments by stating that the Twin Hickory Park site was a preferable location for the

maintenance facility because Shady Grove Road was better equipped than Kain Road to handle snow plows and trucks that would be traveling to and from the facility.

GENERAL AGENDA

262-08 Resolution - Signatory Authority - Acquisition of Real Property - Kain Road - Three Chopt District.

Mr. Hazelett confirmed for Mr. Kaechele that this item would be treated like a public hearing item and suggested that it be opened up for public comment although it was on the general agenda. He remarked that there was a need to provide information that the Board had requested. Mr. Kachele commented that the Board had been dealing with this piece of property for almost 18 months and that it had been a controversial piece of property in many respects but was still considered a very important and strategic piece of property in the orderly development of the west end. He noted that studies had been done and charges made, and that the County's land commission had studied this piece of property. The Board wanted to do everything it could to make this process open and transparent so the public could understand the decisions the Board was trying to make in regards to this land.

Sandy Cherry with the firm of Randolph, Boyd, Cherry & Vaughan presented this agenda item to the Board. Mr. Cherry advised the public that he was assisting as outside counsel in the County's effort to acquire the Kain Road property. He explained as a preface that he was not a real estate appraiser and was not suggesting a value for the property. He pointed out that the issues of public use and public necessity are essential policy questions for the Board to consider before it purchases any property or commences condemnation. Mr. Cherry stated without equivocation that he was convinced that County staff had studied this property very thoroughly with the assistance of J. K. Timmons to determine that it could be used for the proposed purposes and that all of the property would be necessary for these purposes. He cited these purposes as a public school, park, fire station, fuel station, and possibly water storage facility. Mr. Cherry further clarified that he was not recommending a process to resolve this matter. He noted that the next step was to either proceed with acquiring the property voluntarily or Mr. Cherry stated that he had a degree of going through condemnation. objectivity and was here to discuss the settlement value of a potential condemnation case and recommend a figure, \$24.4 million, which had been offered by the owners of the property. He clarified that this figure was not arrived at during the August 20, 2008 mediation proceeding but was subsequently put in the form of a contract by the owners after the parties continued to talk.

Mr. Cherry reviewed a slide listing the four appraisals of the property that were exchanged between the landowner and the County (see enclosed copy). He commented on the credentials of the four appraisers and elaborated on differences and similarities among the appraisals and factors considered by the appraisers. In

response to a comment by Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Cherry clarified that the appraisers had used the same universe of 12 sales but had chosen the ones from this group that they thought were most comparable.

Mr. Cherry reviewed a second slide that identified possible court results in a condemnation case that goes to trial (see enclosed copy) and elaborated on various formulas commonly used by juries in cases of this nature. Based on current information, Mr. Cherry suggested that the best award the County could anticipate would be a figure of \$22.745 million and the highest figure the County could anticipate would be around \$27 million. Because the mid-point between those two figures is \$24.9 million, Mr. Cherry concluded that a settlement in the range of \$24.4 million (\$118,000 to \$119,000 an acre) would be an excellent settlement.

Mr. Cherry then brought up other factors that needed to be considered in bringing a condemnation case before a jury. He emphasized the unpredictability of the results and pointed out that the decision would be made by five disinterested free holders from the community based upon the evidence presented, which would include all four appraisals. Mr. Cherry further noted that the process of a voluntary acquisition avoids the risk of a challenge on public use, public necessity, or bona fide offer although he did not believe the County would face a serious challenge because it had built a strong case in these areas. He pointed out that voluntary acquisition also avoids the expense of litigation, outside counsel, and expert witnesses as well as the time and resources of County staff.

In response to questions from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Cherry clarified that the figures discussed during the mediation process were confidential and could not be used in a condemnation case. Mr. Cherry confirmed that the landowner had indicated during the mediation process it would not accept a \$25 million figure and he also confirmed that \$24.4 million was considerably less than the landowner's last demand at mediation. In response to a question from Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Cherry commented on why the Board had a contract in front of it after mediation had broken down. He noted that the landowner initiated a phone call to Mr. Hazelett after the one-day mediation in order to resume discussions.

Mrs. O'Bannon expressed disappointment that a contract was now before the Board when the mediation process agreed to by the Board had broken down. Mr. Hazelett stated that although the County was in the process of condemnation, he had a fiduciary responsibility to the Board and County citizens to settle at the lowest possible price that he could while recognizing that the ultimate decision rests with the Board. He referred to his communications with the Board on this matter after mediation ended and a telephone call from Robert Atack inquiring about the status of the County's land acquisition process. After receiving a second telephone call from Mr. Atack, Mr. Hazelett agreed to meet with him on neutral ground to discuss this matter. During this meeting, Mr. Hazelett placed the figure of \$24.4 million on the table. The next morning, Mr. Atack called to advise that he and his partners were in agreement. After receiving a letter agreement and

signed contract from Mr. Atack's attorney, Mr. Hazelett advised the Board in a special session on September 2, 2008 that he was recommending this offer. Mr. Hazelett referred to his obligation as County Manager to negotiate to the very last moment of decision but noted that the ultimate decision rests with the Board and not with him. He emphasized that he had continued to negotiate after having met the commitment of the County's land commission based upon his experience, abilities, and knowledge of what he believed the Board would want him to do. Mrs. O'Bannon indicated she was concerned that Mr. Hazelett had met privately with the property owner rather than adhering to a transparent process. Hazelett explained that the Board has placed him in a position that requires him to meet with individuals and have private conversations on matters affecting the County. He noted that he is charged with bringing recommendations to the Board and that ultimately the Board makes its decisions in a public setting. O'Bannon asked how the Board could know that this was a proper meeting devoid of subtle intimidation by either party. Mr. Hazelett responded by alluding to his 36 years of professional experience with the County, including almost 17 years as County Manager, and his ability and desire to serve the County.

Mr. Kaechele interjected that Mrs. O'Bannon did not speak for the Board in this matter and that the Board has trust in Mr. Hazelett's integrity. He said that this case had gotten out of hand, that it was not fair Mr. Hazelett's honesty and integrity had been put on the line, and that Mr. Hazelett's record speaks for itself. There was discussion between Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Kaechele regarding the mediation process and Mrs. O'Bannon's concerns about discussions being held in a private post-mediation meeting without attorneys or other parties being present. Mrs. O'Bannon questioned the legitimacy of the proposed settlement figure and characterized the landowner's appraisals as fatally flawed. She spoke to the merits of the County's appraisals. Mr. Cherry generally agreed with Mrs. O'Bannon's analysis but said some persons may hold the view that the County's appraisers had neglected to pay enough attention to the potential of mixed use for the property as called for in the County's draft 2026 Land Use Plan.

In response to questions from Mr. Kaechele and Mr. Donati, Mr. Cherry acknowledged that appraisers are impacted by the party that hires them, that appraisals have some degree of subjectivity, and that comparable sales play an important role in appraisals. Mr. Cherry noted that County school sales were among the higher sales considered by the appraisers and that it would be difficult for a jury to ignore them.

Mrs. O'Bannon commented that in her view the Board was here to do what was best for the citizens of Henrico and to get the best price for the property. She said she felt that the Board could do better than what was being proposed and that she would like to see the two parties go back to the mediation table with a level playing field or go to condemnation if the mediation does not work. Mrs. O'Bannon remarked that in her opinion the County's attorneys could make a very strong case to get a better price.

Mr. Kaechele noted that the Board was committed to acquiring the property and was arguing about the price rather than the need for the property. He spoke to the tremendous effort and talent working for the County in the mediation and negotiation process. Mr. Kaechele pointed out that the condemnation process had many uncertainties and that the County had paid \$130,000 an acre or more for other parcels in this vicinity. There was discussion by Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Kaechele about the availability of water and sewer in the area and how this issue had impacted the appraisals. Mr. Kaechele reiterated that the critical questions before the Board were ones of process and price. In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Cherry stated he did not believe the property owners would accept a price below \$24.4 million. He and Mrs. O'Bannon discussed whether the County should reasonably expect its lowest appraisal to be considered by the jury as the basis for an award.

Mrs. Powell, who addressed the Board earlier in the evening during the Public Comment period, spoke to the importance of the County acquiring this property. She expressed concern that Mr. Atack would bulldoze or clear cut the property if it is developed for residential uses. Mrs. Powell said that residents in the area would like to see some of the acreage preserved for green space and maintained for a park. She reluctantly agreed that the County needed to pay the price that the County's outside counsel was recommending. Mrs. Powell remarked that the County has made many concessions to developers and that Mr. Atack owes the County a favor.

Ms. Hamilton, who addressed the Board earlier in the evening on a provisional use permit case, stated that she was in agreement with Mrs. Powell. She said that she would like for the County to purchase the property but did not want to see Mr. Atack and developers continue to be rewarded for damaging natural habitats. Ms. Hamilton expressed concern about the proposed purchase price of the property and Mr. Cherry's legal fees. She commented that the Federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act prohibits the destruction of migratory bird nests and that the County has the power to stop trees from being cut down during nesting season. Ms. Hamilton named 37 species of bird that she has seen in woods bordering Kain Road (see enclosed copy of her prepared statement). After mentioning that these woods are home to the endangered Box Turtle, she spoke to the environmental value of trees and plants.

Katherine White, a resident of 12271 Kain Road in the Three Chopt District, advised that she had no problem with the County purchasing this land.

In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Hazelett confirmed that if the paper before the Board was denied then staff would initiate the necessary proceedings for condemnation. At Mr. Kaechele's request, Mr. Hazelett reiterated his recommendation that the County purchase the property at a price of \$24.4 million. He spoke to the necessity of this property for the future of the

northwest quadrant of the County and his work over a long period of time to bring a price to the Board that he characterized as extremely reasonable.

Mr. Glover remarked that he had been a partner of Mr. Hazelett for the past 25 years and that he thought very highly of Mr. Hazelett's ethics and integrity. In response to a question from Mr. Glover, Mr. Cherry reiterated that he predicted an award in the range of \$25.9 million if this matter were to go to condemnation. He reiterated for Mrs. O'Bannon that he thought the lowest a jury would go would be \$22.7 million and the highest it would go would be about \$27 million. Mr. Cherry said he thought the property owner wanted to avoid condemnation and saw condemnation as a real threat.

After referring to Mr. Cherry's 36-year professional reputation, Mr. Glover voiced concerns that the County had two appraisals valuing the property at \$19 million and \$20 million. He questioned Mr. Cherry as to why the County would go to the expense of these appraisals. Mr. Cherry spoke to the advantages in most cases of obtaining a second appraisal when dealing with higher value properties. He confirmed for Mr. Glover that he thought \$24.4 million was a good figure that should be accepted and alluded to the quality of counsel who would be representing the property owner should the matter go to condemnation and a jury.

Mr. Thornton commented that Henrico has one of the best county managers but that the Board must keep in mind the citizens who are not present during these discussions and should also listen very carefully to the citizens who do come before it. Mr. Thornton suggested that citizens might feel that some of the County's developers have taken advantage of the County's affluence and padded the price of things. He pointed to Henrico's stellar reputation and asked that the County learn from this experience. Mr. Thornton pointed out that citizens might not understand all of the ramifications but that the Board as stewards of the County must make the best decision. He indicated that he did not see how the Board could do better than what was being proposed.

Mr. Kaechele noted that two citizens who live in the vicinity of this property had expressed concern about quality of life and how the property would be developed should the County not acquire it. He spoke to the value and commercial potential of the landbeing considered. Mr. Kaechele expressed confidence that the Board saw eye to eye with the Manager that this would be an important acquisition of property. Mr. Hazelett confirmed for Mr. Glover that the School Board had previously identified a need for a new high school to open in the northwest quadrant of the County by 2016.

Mr. Donati pointed out that this piece of property had been scrutinized and had been in the public eye for 18 to 20 months. He said that although he and the County Manager disagreed on things from time to time, he really trusted Mr. Hazelett's judgment and the process that the County had gone through with the County's land commission. Mr. Donati concluded that it was time for the Board

On motion of Mr. Donati, seconded by Mr. Glover, with Mrs. O'Bannon voting "No", the Board approved Agenda Item No. 262-08 – see attached Resolution.

Mrs. O'Bannon explained her vote by reiterating that she felt the County should go to condemnation.

In response to a question from Mr. Glover, Assistant Fire Chief Kenny Dunn stated that he believed the cost of the Port 02 Vent CPAP (Continuous Positive Airway Pressure) unit addressed by this resolution was about \$900.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved Agenda Item No. 264-08 – see attached Resolution.

265-08 Resolution - Signatory Authority - Amendment No. 2 to the Contract for Architectural and Engineering Services - Recreation and Parks Western Maintenance Facility.

In response to questions and comments from Board members, Director of General Services Paul Proto clarified that this amendment would provide for additional architectural and engineering design services to accommodate a request by citizens to relocate the proposed structure further south on the site and that a plan of development for this project would be coming to the Board in November 2008.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Glover, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved Agenda Item No. 265-08 – see attached Resolution.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

September 17 – 23, 2008

WHEREAS, when the delegates to the 1787 Constitutional Convention began working on the document that would become the United States Constitution, they understood that a great democracy must be built on the twin foundations of national consent to a federal government and respect for individual rights; and

WHEREAS, these founding fathers were aware of the inherent dangers in concentrating too much power in one person, branch, or institution and wisely crafted a government that balanced the functions and authority of a federal system among three separate but equal branches – the executive, legislative, and judicial; and

WHEREAS, to ensure a further check and balance on central powers, the framers granted citizens the right to vote, thereby giving them the power to express political preferences peacefully and to effect change in their government; and

WHEREAS, the Convention delegates ratified the Constitution on September 17, 1787 and submitted it to the states for approval; and

WHEREAS, after much discussion among the original states, the Bill of Rights was created as an amendment to the Constitution to thwart the fear of tyranny, excessive centralization of power, and loss of local control; and

WHEREAS, these ten amendments provided a clear set of limits on federal power and established protective rights to American citizens; and

WHEREAS, today our nation celebrates the longest-living written constitution in world history; and

WHEREAS, our republic would founder were it not for the faith and confidence Americans place in the Constitution, so it is appropriate that we continue to honor the spirit of this enduring document as we have for the past 221 years; and

SICKLE CELL DISEASE AWARENESS MONTH

September 2008

WHEREAS, sickle cell disease is an inherited blood disorder that causes pain, infection, disability, economic strain, and even death; and

WHEREAS, the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America has reported that sickle cell disease is responsible for about 750,000 hospitalizations a year at a cost of approximately \$475 million; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that more than 80,000 Americans are living with sickle cell disease, including 1 in 375 African-Americans, 1 in 1,100 to 1,400 Hispanics, and 1 in 58,000 Caucasians; and

WHEREAS, the sickle gene is also found in people from South and Central America, the Middle East, and the Mediterranean; and

WHEREAS, sickle cell trait, the healthy carrier state for sickle cell disease, occurs in approximately eight percent of African-Americans; and

WHEREAS, it is projected that more than two million Americans are sickle trait carriers and nearly 4,000 Virginians are living with sickle cell disease; and

WHEREAS, since Virginia's Newborn Screening Program was established in 1989, an average of 75 newborns have been diagnosed each year with this disease; and

WHEREAS, sickle cell screening is offered through the Henrico Health Department in both family planning and maternity clinics; and

WHEREAS, Sickle Cell Chapters of Virginia, Incorporated (SCCV), a non-profit community-based organization, has worked closely and cooperatively with health professionals and the general public to develop a health policy and plan of action concerning the impact of sickle cell disease; and

WHEREAS, Sickle Cell Association (SCA) of Richmond – OSCAR is a member of SCCV and was formed on July 1, 2008 as the result of the merger of three sickle cell organizations in the greater Richmond region for the purpose of enhancing sickle cell awareness and education to the public, supportive services and resources to sickle cell clients and their families, and aid to health organizations in the promotion of sickle cell programs and projects; and

WHEREAS, on September 12, 2008, SCA of Richmond – OSCAR will host the 30th Annual Statewide Sickle Cell Conference in Henrico County at the Sheraton Richmond West Hotel, with SCCV serving as the sponsor for this daylong seminar.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED that the Board of Supervisors of Henrico County, Virginia hereby recognizes September 2008 as Sickle Cell Disease Awareness Month, calls this observance to the attention of all Henrico citizens, and welcomes the 30th Annual Statewide Sickle Cell Conference to our locality.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Henrico County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the application, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The Director of Public Utilities shall approve the construction plans for public water and sewer prior to beginning any construction of these utilities. The Department of Public Utilities shall be notified at least 24 hours prior to the start of any County water or sewer construction.
- 2. The parking lot shall be subject to the requirements of Section 24-98 of the Henrico County Code.
- 3. The parking spaces shall be marked on the pavement surface with four-inch wide white painted traffic lines. All lane lines and parking lines shall be white in color with the exception that those dividing traffic shall be yellow.
- 4. Sufficient, effective usable parking shall be provided. If experience indicates the need, additional parking shall be provided.
- 5. Curb and gutter and necessary storm sewer shall be constructed as shown on approved plans.
- 6. The plan of development shall be revised as annotated on the staff plan dated **September 9, 2008**, which shall be as much a part of this approval as if its details were fully described herein. Eight (8) sets of revised plans, including the detailed drainage, erosion control and utility plans, shall be submitted by the design engineer who prepared the plans to the Department of Planning for final review. Upon notice from the Department of Planning that all comments have been addressed, twenty-one (21) sets of final plans for signature shall be submitted to the Department of Planning for approval signatures.
- 7. The Department of Public Works shall be notified at least 24 hours prior to the start of any construction.
- 8. A detailed landscaping plan shall be submitted to the Department of Planning for review and approval prior to the issuance of any occupancy permits.
- 9. All ground cover and landscaping shall be properly maintained in a healthy condition at all times. Dead plant materials shall be removed within a reasonable time and replaced during the normal planting season.
- 10. Prior to the approval of an electrical permit application and installation of the site lighting equipment, a plan including light spread and intensity diagrams and fixture specifications and mounting height details shall be submitted for Department of Planning review and approval.
- 11. All exterior lighting shall be designed and arranged to direct the light and glare away from nearby residential property and streets.

- 12. The site, including the parking areas, shall be kept clean of litter and debris on a daily basis. Trash container units/litter receptacles and recycling containers shall be maintained with scheduled regular pickups and shall be screened properly on all four sides. The gate(s) shall remain closed except when the receptacle(s) are being filled or serviced and shall be repaired or replaced as necessary. Details shall be included with the final site plan or required landscape plan review and approval.
- 13. Required fire lanes shall be marked and maintained in accordance with the Virginia Statewide Fire Prevention Code.
- 14. Traffic control signs shall be provided as indicated on the Planning staff plan. All signs shall be fabricated as shown in <u>The National Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways</u> and <u>The Virginia Supplement to The Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways</u>.
- 15. The assigned property number shall be displayed so it is easily readable from the street. If assistance is needed with the address, please contact the Department of Planning at 501-4284. The Planning Department must assign all property addresses.
- 16. The contractor shall have a set of plans approved by the Director of Public Works, Director of Public Utilities and the County Manager available at the site at all times when work is being performed. A designated responsible employee shall be available for contact by County inspectors.
- 17. The property shall be developed generally as shown on the plan filed with the case and no major changes or additions to the layout shall be made without the approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- 18. Upon completion of the improvements and prior to the certification of the permanent occupancy permit, the engineer or land surveyor who prepared the POD plan shall furnish a statement to the effect that all construction, including water and sewer is in conformance with the regulations and requirements of the POD.
- 19. The developer shall provide fire hydrants as required by the Department of Public Utilities and Division of Fire.
- 20. Insurance Service Offices (ISO) calculations should be included on the final construction plans for approval by the Department of Public Utilities prior to issuance of a building permit.
- 21. Any necessary offsite drainage easements must be obtained in a form acceptable to the County Attorney prior to final approval of the construction plans by the Department of Public Works.
- 22. Deviations from County standards for pavement, curb, or curb and gutter design shall be approved by the County Engineer prior to final approval of the construction plans by the Department of Public Works.
- 23. Vehicles shall be parked only in approved and constructed parking spaces.
- 24. The construction shall be properly coordinated to ensure that safe access, circulation and adequate parking is provided for the facility. A plan to indicate the phasing of improvements and the handling of traffic (construction and employees) shall be submitted to the Department of Planning prior to the issuance of a building permit.

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





- 26. The subdivision plat for Watts Lane shall be submitted for review prior to signature of final construction plans and shall be recorded before any occupancy permits are issued.
- 27. The right-of-way for widening of Laburnum Avenue and Sandy Lane as shown on approved plans shall be dedicated to the County prior to any occupancy permits being issued. The right-of-way dedication plat and any other required information shall be submitted to the County Real Property Agent at least sixty (60) days prior to requesting occupancy permits.
- 28. Approval of the construction plans by the Department of Public Works does not establish the curb and gutter elevations along the Henrico County maintained right-of-way. The elevations will be set by Henrico County.
- 29. The conceptual master plan, as submitted with this application, is for planning and information purposes only. All subsequent detailed plans of development and construction needed to implement this conceptual plan may be administratively reviewed and approved and shall be subject to all regulations in effect at the time such subsequent plans are submitted for review/approval.
- 30. The final design and construction program shall achieve a Silver Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Certification, unless modifications to the program requirements are approved by the County Manager.


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

AN ORDINANCE - To amend and reordain Section 22-356 of the Code of the County of Henrico titled "Penalty" reducing the penalty for parking in a space reserved for persons with disabilities without properly displaying a placard when the placard is present in the vehicle.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF HENRICO, VIRGINIA:

1. That Section 22-356 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 22-356. Penalty.

A violation of section 22-349 shall be punishable by a fine of not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$500.00. However, if there is a placard within a vehicle utilizing a parking space reserved for persons with disabilities, but that placard is not displayed as required by section 22-349, the fine shall be not less than \$20.00 nor more than \$50.00.

2. That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after its passage.





Of this total General Fund reappropriation, \$1,473,400 is to be transferred to the Capital Projects Fund via an interfund transfer from the General Fund for three ongoing projects, which include the continuation of the Traffic Signals project, \$300,000, the Bridge Rehabilitation project, \$600,000, and \$573,400 for General Road Construction. In addition, found elsewhere in this document, is \$3,364,306 in General Fund balance being added to the Public Works' budget via new amendments to the fiscal year 2008-09 budget. The total increase in the Public Works' fiscal year 2008-09 budget is \$7,608,953.

Funding for twelve Social Services positions changed at the beginning of fiscal year 2007-2008 as a result of changes in the State Department of Social Services cost allocation process. These Day Care and VIEW Employment positions were previously funded exclusively with Federal and State funds and required no local match. The new "Service Administration" funding stream requires a 15.5% local funding match to the combined Federal and State match of 84.5%. These positions need to be reclassified from Complement III to Complement II, which will increase the County's personnel complement by twelve positions. This action requires no additional funding from the County of Henrico.

RESOLUTION – Affirmation of Authorization to Pick-up Employee's Contribution to Virginia Retirement System for Henrico County, Virginia, 55143, under § 414(h) of the Internal Revenue Code

WHEREAS, Henrico County, Virginia (the "County") provides its employees with tax deferral pursuant to § 414(h) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States with respect to their member contributions to the Virginia Retirement System ("VRS") by picking up member contributions to VRS;

WHEREAS, VRS keeps track of such picked-up member contributions, and treats those contributions as employee contributions for all purposes of VRS;

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service in Notice 2006-43 has provided transition relief for existing pick-up arrangements provided that an authorized person takes formal action to evidence the establishment of the pick-up arrangement no later than January 1, 2009; and

WHEREAS, in order to avail itself of the protection given under Notice 2006-43, the County desires to affirm its intention to establish and maintain a pick-up arrangement through formal action by its governing body.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Henrico County, Virginia:

- 1. The existing member contribution pick-up arrangement is hereby affirmed as it relates to salary reduction elections in effect prior to the date of this resolution.
- 2. Effective the first payday after the date of this resolution, the County shall pick-up member contributions of its employees to VRS, and such contributions shall be treated as employer contributions in determining tax treatment under the Internal Revenue Code of the United States.
- 3. Such contributions, although designated as member contributions, are to be made by the County in lieu of member contributions.
- 4. Pick-up member contributions shall be paid from the same source of funds as used in paying the wages to the affected employees.
- 5. Member contributions made by the County under the pick-up arrangement shall be treated for all purposes other than income taxation, including but not limited to VRS benefits, in the same manner and to the same extent as member contributions made prior to the pick-up arrangement.

- 6. Nothing in this resolution shall be construed to permit or extend an option to VRS members to receive the pick-up contributions made by the County directly instead of having them paid to VRS.
- 7. Notwithstanding any contractual or other provisions, the contributions of each member of VRS who is an employee of the County shall be picked-up using the method under which the employer will pay the employees' statutorily required contributions to VRS and the salary will not be modified.





Congratulations on your recent award. In establishing financial assistance programs, Congress linked the receipt of Federal funding to compliance with Federal civil rights laws. The Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), U.S. Department of Justice is responsible for ensuring that recipients of financial aid from OJP, its component offices and bureaus, the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) comply with applicable Federal civil rights statutes and regulations. We at OCR are available to help you and your organization meet the civil rights requirements that come with Justice Department funding.

Ensuring Access to Federally Assisted Programs

As you know, Federal laws prohibit recipients of financial assistance from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability in funded programs or activities, not only in respect to employment practices but also in the delivery of services or benefits. Federal law also prohibits funded programs or activities from discriminating on the basis of age in the delivery of services or benefits.

Providing Services to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Individuals

In accordance with Department of Justice Guidance pertaining to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d, recipients of Federal financial assistance must take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to their programs and activities for persons with limited English proficiency (LEP). For more information on the civil rights responsibilities that recipients have in providing language services to LEP individuals, please see the website at http://www.lep.gov.

Ensuring Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations

The Department of Justice has published a regulation specifically pertaining to the funding of faith-based organizations. In general, the regulation, Participation in Justice Department Programs by Religious Organizations; Providing for Equal Treatment of all Justice Department Program Participants, and known as the Equal Treatment Regulation 28 C.F.R. part 38, requires State Administering Agencies to treat these organizations the same as any other applicant or recipient. The regulation prohibits State Administering Agencies from making award or grant administration decisions on the basis of an organization's religious character or affiliation, religious name, or the religious composition of its board of directors.

The regulation also prohibits faith-based organizations from using financial assistance from the Department of Justice to fund inherently religious activities. While faith-based organizations can engage in non-funded inherently religious activities, they must be held separately from the Department of Justice funded program, and customers or beneficiaries cannot be compelled to participate in them. The Equal Treatment Regulation also makes clear that organizations participating in programs funded by the Department of Justice are not permitted to discriminate in the provision of services on the basis of a beneficiary's religion. For more information on the regulation, please see OCR's website at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/oct/etfbo.htm.

State Administering Agencies and faith-based organizations should also note that the Safe Streets Act, as amended; the Victims of Crime Act, as amended; and the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act, as amended, contain prohibitions against discrimination on the basis of religion in employment. Despite these nondiscrimination provisions, the Justice Department has concluded that the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) is reasonably construed, on a case-by-case basis, to require that its funding agencies permit faith-based organizations applying for funding under the applicable program statutes both to receive DOJ funds and to continue considering religion when hiring staff, even if the statute that authorizes the funding program generally forbids considering of religion in employment decisions by grantees.

Questions about the regulation or the application of RFRA to the statutes that prohibit discrimination in employment may be directed to this Office.

Enforcing Civil Rights Laws

All recipients of Federal financial assistance, regardless of the particular funding source, the amount of the grant award, or the number of employees in the workforce, are subject to the prohibitions against unlawful discrimination. Accordingly, OCR investigates recipients that are the subject of discrimination complaints from both individuals and groups. In addition, based on regulatory criteria, OCR selects a number of recipients each year for compliance reviews, audits that require recipients to submit data showing that they are providing services equitably to all segments of their service population and that their employment practices meet equal employment opportunity standards.

Complying with the Safe Streets Act or Program Requirements

In addition to these general prohibitions, an organization which is a recipient of financial assistance subject to the nondiscrimination provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act (Safe Streets Act) of 1968, 42 U.S.C. § 3789d(c), or other Federal grant program requirements, must meet two additional requirements:(1) complying with Federal regulations pertaining to the development of an Equal Employment Opportunity Plan (EEOP), 28 C.F.R. § 42.301-.308, and (2) submitting to OCR Findings of Discrimination (see 28 C.F.R. §§ 42.205(5) or 31.202(5)).

1) Meeting the EEOP Requirement

In accordance with Federal regulations, Assurance No. 6 in the Standard Assurances, COPS Assurance No. 8.B, or certain Federal grant program requirements, your organization must comply with the following EEOP reporting requirements:

If your organization has received an award for \$500,000 or more and has 50 or more employees (counting both full- and part-time employees but excluding political appointees), then it has to prepare an EEOP and submit it to OCR for review within 60 days from the date of this letter. For assistance in developing an EEOP, please consult OCR's website at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm. You may also request technical assistance from an EEOP specialist at OCR by dialing (202) 616-3208.

If your organization received an award between \$25,000 and \$500,000 and has 50 or more employees, your organization still has to prepare an EEOP, but it does not have to submit the EEOP to OCR for review. Instead, your organization has to maintain the EEOP on file and make it available for review on request. In addition, your organization has to complete Section B of the Certification Form and return it to OCR. The Certification Form can be found at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm.

If your organization received an award for less than \$25,000; or if your organization has less than 50 employees, regardless of the amount of the award; or if your organization is a medical institution, educational institution, nonprofit organization or Indian tribe, then your organization is exempt from the EEOP requirement. However, your organization must complete Section A of the Certification Form and return it to OCR. The Certification Form can be found at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm.

2) Submitting Findings of Discrimination

In the event a Federal or State court or Federal or State administrative agency makes an adverse finding of discrimination against your organization after a due process hearing, on the ground of race, color, religion, national origin, or sex, your organization must submit a copy of the finding to OCR for review.

Ensuring the Compliance of Subrecipients

If your organization makes subawards to other agencies, you are responsible for assuring that subrecipients also comply with all of the applicable Federal civil rights laws, including the requirements pertaining to developing and submitting an EEOP, reporting Findings of Discrimination, and providing language services to LEP persons. State agencies that make subawards must have in place standard grant assurances and review procedures to demonstrate that they are effectively monitoring the civil rights compliance of subrecipients.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS

6. This special condition facilitates compliance with the provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) relating to clandestine methamphetamine laboratory operations, including the identification, seizure, or closure of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories [hereinafter, "meth lab operations"]. No monies from this award may be obligated to support meth lab operations unless the grantee implements this special condition.

The Office of Justice Programs (OJP), in consultation with the Bureau of Justice Assistance, the Drug Enforcement Administration, and the Office for Community Oriented Policing Services, prepared a Program-level Environmental Assessment (Assessment) governing meth lab operations. The Assessment describes the adverse environmental, health, and safety impacts likely to be encountered by law enforcement agencies as they implement specific actions under their methamphetamine laboratory operations. Consistent with the Assessment, the following terms and conditions shall apply to the grantee for any OJP funded methlab operations:

- A. The grantee shall ensure compliance by OJP funded sub-grantees with federal, state, and local environmental, health, and safety laws and regulations applicable to meth lab operations, to include the disposal of the chemicals, equipment, and wastes resulting from those operations.
- B. The grantee shall have a Mitigation Plan in place that identifies and documents the processes and points of accountability within its state. This plan will be used to ensure that the adverse environmental, health, and safety impacts delineated in the Assessment are mitigated in a manner consistent with the requirements of this condition.
- C. The grantee shall monitor OJP funded meth lab operations to ensure that they comply with the following nine mitigation measures identified in the Assessment and whose implementation is addressed in the grantee's Mitigation Plan. These mitigation measures must be included as special conditions in all subgrants: (See Part II of this special condition)
- Provide medical screening of personnel assigned or to be assigned by the grantee to the seizure or closure of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories;
 - 2. Provide Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) required initial and refresher training for law enforcement officials and all other personnel assigned to either the seizure or closure of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories:
 - 3. As determined by their specified duties, equip the personnel with OSHA required protective wear and other required safety equipment;
 - 4. Assign properly trained personnel to prepare a comprehensive contamination report on each seized/closed laboratory;
 - 5. Utilize qualified disposal personnel to remove all chemicals and associated glassware, equipment, and contaminated materials and wastes from the site(s) of each seized laboratory;
 - 6. Dispose of the chemicals, equipment, and contaminated materials and wastes at properly licensed disposal facilities or, when allowable, at properly licensed recycling facilities;
 - 7. Monitor the transport, disposal, and recycling components of subparagraphs numbered 5, and 6, immediately above in order to ensure proper compliance;
 - 8. Have in place and implement a written agreement with the responsible state environmental agency. This agreement must provide that the responsible state environmental agency agrees to (i) timely evaluate the environmental condition at and around the site of a closed clandestine laboratory and (ii) coordinate with the responsible party, property owner, or others to ensure that any residual contamination is remediated, if determined necessary by the state environmental agency and in accordance with existing state and federal requirements; and
 - 9. Have in place and implement a written agreement with the responsible state or local service agencies to properly respond to any minor, as defined by state law, at the site. This agreement must ensure immediate response by qualified personnel who can (i) respond to the potential health needs of any minor at the site; (ii) take that minor into protective custody unless the minor is criminally involved in the meth lab activities or is subject to arrest for other criminal violations; (iii) ensure immediate medical testing for methamphetamine toxicity; and (iv) arrange for any follow-up medical tests, examinations, or health care made necessary as a result of methamphetamine toxicity.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS

- The recipient is required to establish a trust fund account. (The trust fund may or may not be an interest-bearing account.) The fund may not be used to pay debts incurred by other activities beyond the scope of the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program (JAG). The recipient also agrees to obligate and expend the grant funds in the trust fund (including any interest earned) during the period of the grant. Grant funds (including any interest earned) not expended by the end of the grant period must be returned to the Bureau of Justice Assistance no later than 90 days after the end of the grant period, along with the final submission of the Financial Status Report (SF-269).
- The grantee agrees to comply with all reporting, data collection and evaluation requirements, as prescribed by the BJA in the program guidance for the Justice Assistance Grant (JAG). Compliance with these requirements will be monitored by BJA.
- The recipient agrees that any information technology system funded or supported by OJP funds will comply with 28 C.F.R. Part 23, Criminal Intelligence Systems Operating Policies, if OJP determines this regulation to be applicable. Should OJP determine 28 C.F.R. Part 23 to be applicable, OJP may, at its discretion, perform audits of the system, as per 28 C.F.R. 23.20(g). Should any violation of 28 C.F.R. Part 23 occur, the recipient may be fined as per 42 U.S.C. 3789g(c)-(d). Recipient may not satisfy such a fine with federal funds.
- 11. The recipient agrees to ensure that the State Information Technology Point of Contact receives written notification regarding any information technology project funded by this grant during the obligation and expenditure period. This is to facilitate communication among local and state governmental entities regarding various information technology projects being conducted with these grant funds. In addition, the recipient agrees to maintain an administrative file documenting the meeting of this requirement. - 12. To avoid duplicating existing networks or IT systems in any initiatives funded by BJA for law enforcement information sharing systems which involve interstate connectivity between jurisdiction, such systems shall employ, to the extent possible, existing networks as the communication backbone to achieve interstate connectivity, unless the grantee can demonstrate to the satisfaction of BJA that this requirement would not be cost effective or would impair the functionality of an existing or proposed IT system.
- 13. The grantee agrees to comply with the applicable requirements of 28 C.F.R. Part 38, the Department of Justice regulation governing "Equal Treatment for Faith Based Organizations" (the "Equal Treatment Regulation"). The Equal Treatment Regulation provides in part that Department of Justice grant awards of direct funding may not be used to fund any inherently religious activities, such as worship, religious instruction, or proselytization. Recipients of direct grants may still engage in inherently religious activities, but such activities must be separate in time or place from the Department of Justice funded program, and participation in such activities by individuals receiving services from the grantee or a sub-grantee must be voluntary. The Equal Treatment Regulation also makes clear that organizations participating in programs directly funded by the Department of Justice are not permitted to discriminate in the provision of services on the basis of a beneficiary's religion.

All grants funded under the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program (JAG) will carry the following NEPA special condition:

1) The grantee agrees to assist BJA in complying with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and other related federal environmental impact analyses requirements in the use of these grant funds, either directly by the grantee or by a subgrantee. Accordingly, prior to obligating grant funds, the grantee agrees to first determine if any of the following activities will be related to the use of the grant funds. The grantee understands that this special condition applies to its following new activities whether or not they are being specifically funded with these grant funds. That is, as long as the activity is being conducted by the grantee, or any third party and the activity needs to be undertaken in order to use these grant funds, this special condition must first be met. The activities covered by this special condition are:

a. New construction;

- b. Minor renovation or remodeling of a property either (a) listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places or (b) located within a 100-year flood plain;
- c. A renovation, lease, or any proposed use of a building or facility that will either (a) result in a change in its basic prior use or (b) significantly change its size; and,
- d. Implementation of a new program involving the use of chemicals other than chemicals that are (a) purchased as an incidental component of a funded activity and (b) traditionally used, for example, in office, household, recreational, or education environments.

Application of this special condition to grantee's existing programs or activities: For any of the grantee's or its subgrantees' existing programs or activities that will be funded by these grant funds, the grantee, upon specific request from BJA, agrees to cooperate with BJA in any preparation by BJA of a national or program environmental assessment of that funded program or activity.

15. SUMMARY DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT (See instruction on reverse)

The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program (JAG) allows states, tribes, and local governments to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control crime based on their own local needs and conditions. Grant funds can be used for state and local initiatives, technical assistance, training, personnel, equipment, supplies, contractual support, and information systems for criminal justice for any one or more of the following purpose areas: 1) law enforcement programs; 2) prosecution and court programs; 3) prevention and education programs; 4) corrections and community corrections programs; 5) drug treatment programs; 6) planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs; and 7) crime victim and witness programs (other than compensation).

The County of Henrico will use their Fiscal Year 2008 JAG award in the amount of \$35,921 to enhance the ability of its police department to provide professional and efficient service to its citizens. The County of Henrico will purchase three GPS Hardware kits that will provide investigators with real-time data of a suspect's vehicular movements; two GIS licenses that will enable investigators from the Criminal Investigations Section to use the Orion GPS Trackers; two relay boxes that are necessary for installing one extra Orion GPS Tracker license; one covert outdoor surveillance system that allows for remote viewing of suspects through video, and controlled in the internet environment; seven Elite Face Masks that will increase the SWAT Team's capability to "Level B" coverage; and four SWAT sniper rifle scopes that will give the SWAT rifles more accuracy at night.


