MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Mr. Vithoulkas took a moment to share his sincere gratitude for the County's regional counterparts and the numerous ways they showed their support last week as the County mourned the loss of Henrico Police Officer Trey Sutton. In addition to the many calls and messages of sympathy and encouragement, the County's neighbors lowered their flags in honor of Officer Sutton; offered to respond to significant emergency calls within the County; directed traffic; showed up in droves for Officer Sutton's memorial service; and took on a number of other efforts beyond their geographical borders. Mr. Vithoulkas also took a moment to address Henrico Police Officer Greg Petrohovich, who was Officer Sutton's Field Training Officer and was seriously injured in this accident. The Manager noted the family

of Officer Petrohovich asked that, for those who are able, please donate blood and platelets for Greg, and for other trauma patients.

Mr. Vithoulkas recognized Ty Parr, Director of the Department of Social Services, who highlighted the rows of blue pinwheels planted in honor of Child Abuse Prevention Month, which is recognized in April. Pinwheels are the national symbol for child abuse prevention, and this annual "Pinwheels for Prevention" campaign focuses on the positive efforts that can be made to ensure all children have safe and nurturing families they deserve. The Manager thanked Mr. Parr and his team for this very important reminder. Mr. Parr thanked the Manager for allowing them to place the Pinwheels around the County complex and noted they have seen a dramatic increase in service numbers this fiscal year due to the pandemic, and he recognized his Assistant Director Gretchen Brown for all her efforts in this area.

Mr. Vithoulkas recognized Thomas Meade of the Department of Public Utilities as the 2022 recipient of the American Public Works Association's Exceptional Performance in Adversity Award. This award recognizes exceptional performance in the face of adversity in service to the public and going above and beyond the normal call of service in a situation where the organization responded to a condition marked by misfortune, calamity, or distress. Mr. Meade was nominated for his efforts in the County's extensive testing of private wells near the White Oak Swamp Creek Area. Mr. Meade led the team that sampled 259 residential wells in response to a notification of the presence of PFAS chemicals in the White Oak Swamp Creek Basin to assist residents and safeguard the health and well-being of the community and the environment. Mr. Meade thanked the Manager and the Department of Public Utilities and his staff for all their hard work.

Mr. Vithoulkas recognized Andrew Newby who was sitting in for the first time as County Attorney and welcomed him.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' COMMENTS

Mr. Schmitt noted the passing of Thomas O. "Topper" Phelps who passed away on April 10. Topper loved working in his garden with his wife Camilla and building racecars with sons Travis and Chris and woodworking with his grandchildren. Mr. Schmitt noted when his children were young, Mr. Phelps began coaching baseball at Glen Allen Youth Athletic Association, where he served in various capacities, including President.

RECOGNITION OF NEWS MEDIA

There was no news media present.

PRESENTATIONS

Mrs. O'Bannon presented a proclamation recognizing April 4 – 10, 2022, as National Public Health Week. Accepting the proclamation was Dr. Melissa Viray, Acting District Health Director. Joining her was Alyssa Lewis, Medical Reserve Corps Unit Coordinator, and Deanna Krautner, Chief Operations Officer.

Resolution - Commending the Highland Springs High School Springers Basketball Team.

Mr. Nelson announced there is a community celebration at Dorey Park scheduled for April 24 to honor the team. He explained he was able to attend both championship games for Varina and Highland Springs and was able to celebrate both teams on their wins. Since then, however, tragedy struck the Highland Springs community when one of their team members was murdered. Mr. Nelson thanked everyone who attended the memorial service the night before, and he stated he wanted to read the resolution for Highland Springs that evening and present the resolution on the 24th.

PUBLIC HEARINGS - REZONING CASES AND PROVISIONAL USE PERMITS

114-22 PUP2021-00024 Brookland Holland Associates, LLC: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Sections 24-2306 and 24-3708 of Chapter 24 of the County Code to allow a multifamily development with office and commercial uses on Parcel 774-740-9115 located on the east line of Staples Mill Road (U.S. Route 33) approximately 600' south of its intersection with Bethlehem Road.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Schmitt, seconded by Mr. Branin, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following conditions:

- 1. <u>Master Plan.</u> The master plan for the property shall consist of all layout, architectural, and landscaping documents submitted as part of this request (see case file). All development on the property shall be in general conformance with the master plan, unless otherwise approved at the time of Plan of Development review.
- 2. Height Limitations. Buildings shall be limited to 140' in height.
- 3. Reservation of Future Right of Way or Access Easement. The plan of development shall provide for the ability to construct a future roadway (public or private) along the property's northern boundary to create additional access between Staples Mill Road and Edward Holland Drive. Evidence of necessary easements shall be provided prior to final plan of development approval in a form approved by the Director of Planning.
- 4. <u>Sidewalks and Street Lights.</u> Sidewalks shall be provided along all public street frontages in addition to those areas indicated on the master plan (see case file). Streetlights shall be provided along adjacent public streets in a manner determined at the time of lighting plan review.
- 5. <u>Fire Access.</u> Prior to approval of construction plans for the development, the applicant shall provide the Director of Planning evidence that any building restrictions on adjacent property necessary to meet fire access requirements have been agreed to by the owner of such property.
- 6. Emergency Communication Systems. The owner shall install a fire command center and emergency radio communication equipment within any new building exceeding 60 feet in height to allow for adequate public safety and radio coverage within and between the buildings. A communications consultant shall certify such equipment as compatible with the County's emergency communication system within 90 days of the owner or tenant obtaining a Certificate of Occupancy for any such building. The County shall be permitted to perform communications testing within the buildings at any time.
- 7. Fire Protection-Structured Parking. A 3" standpipe for fire protection shall be provided within all structured parking at approximately 200' intervals. The exact location of these improvements will be determined by the Division of Fire during Plan of Development review.

- 8. <u>Fire Protection.</u> All structures, including parking structures, other than open, standalone parking garages, shall be fully sprinkled for fire protection.
- 9. <u>Crime Prevention.</u> Prior to occupancy of any structure containing commercial or office uses, the applicant and the Crime Prevention Unit of the Division of Police shall conduct a security survey of the property. The applicant shall implement mutually agreed upon security recommendations.
- 10. Parking Plan. Parking may be reduced in accordance with the parking plan titled "2369 Staples Mill Road Parking Study" (see case file) but shall in no case be less that the combined peak parking demand for any proposed uses as shown in Table 1 or Table 2 of the referenced document. Any plan of development submitted for the property shall include a tabulation of all parking required per a licensed engineer's determination. Shared parking information, including updates to the parking calculations demonstrating the parking rate is meeting the needs of approved development on the property, shall be provided with each plan of development, or as requested by the Director of Planning. Each plan of development submitted shall identify the location and means of creating additional parking that could accommodate the difference between the reduced parking standard approved by this permit and the standards contained in the Henrico County Code.
- 11. Residential Density and Unit Size. There shall be no more than 232 dwelling units of which no more than 10% of the dwelling units shall be 3 or more bedrooms.

116-22 REZ2022-00008 Varina Jon Beckner: Request to conditionally rezone from B-1 and B-3 Business District to B-3C Business District (Conditional) Parcel 823-722-8996 containing 0.295 acres located on the west line of E. Nine Mile Road (State Route 33) approximately 30' north of its intersection with S. Oak Avenue.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mr. Branin, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. <u>Use Restrictions.</u> The Property may not be used for the following purposes:
 - a. Fortuneteller, palmist, astrologist, card reader, spiritual reader, or similar activities.
 - b. Rifle or Gun Store
 - c. Adult business as regulated in section 24-4316.
 - d. Flea markets, Pawn shop and tattoo parlors.
 - e. Private clubs, lodges, meeting halls, and fraternal organizations.
 - f. Alternative lending institutions, including pay day lenders as regulated by Chapter 18, Title 6.2, Code of Virginia, and motor vehicle title lenders as regulated By Chapter 22, Title 6.2, Code of Virginia.
 - g. Business establishments whose primary business is the sale of alcoholic beverages, which does not include restaurants as licensed by the Virginia Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control.
- 2. Hours of Operation. There shall be no service to the public or outside activity on the subject site after 11:00pm or before 7:00am.
- 3. Parking lot Lighting. All parking lot lighting on the property shall use concealed sources of light (such as shoe box type fixtures) and be dark sky compliant.
- 4. <u>Trash Receptacles.</u> Trash receptacles shall be screened from public view at ground level. No trash pickup, parking lot cleaning

or leaf blowing shall occur before 7:00am or after 7:00pm.

- 5. <u>Public Address Systems.</u> No public address systems will be permitted.
- 6. <u>Vehicle Repair.</u> All vehicle repair work shall be performed within an enclosed building on the property.
- 7. Outside Storage. All refuse, tires, salvage, damaged or scrap vehicle parts shall be screened from view from the perimeter of the property within a building or by an opaque wooden fence or masonry.
- 8. Buffer. There shall be no improvements to the back portion of the property other than fencing, utilities or as otherwise specifically permitted by the Planning Commission or the Director of Planning at the time of Plan of Development review. Other than the foregoing, such portion of the property shall remain it its natural state. Underbrush, fallen, diseased or dead trees and plant growth may be removed from any buffer area; if such underbrush, trees, and plant growth are removed, additional supplement planting shall be added to such buffer.
- 9. <u>Severance.</u> The unenforceability, elimination, revision or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any of the other proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.

117-22 PUP2022-00007 Varina GRP 1780 Union Ave, LLC; GRP 1770 Union Ave, LLC; GRP 232 Cockeyesville, LLC; and Erdessy Portugee, LLC: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Sections 24-4205 and 24-2306 of Chapter 24 of the County Code to allow vehicle salvage on part of Parcels 837-703-5428 and 839-702-5177 located on the south line of Portugee Road approximately 500' east of La France Road.

Jean Moore, Assistant Director of Planning, responded to questions from Mr. Nelson regarding this case and what was currently on the property.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mr. Schmitt, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following conditions:

- 1. <u>Use Restrictions.</u> This permit shall be limited to allowing only the temporary commercial collection, storage, and sale of vehicles designated as non-repairable by the Department of Motor Vehicles within the boundary identified on layout Exhibit A (see case file). Vehicles designated as non-repairable shall be moved into the appropriate storage area within 24 hours of delivery to the property or, if already on the property, within 24 hours of such designation. The following shall be prohibited: permanent or long-term storage of vehicles designated as non-repairable by the Department of Motor Vehicles, auto graveyard/junkyard, crushing of vehicles, vertical stacking of vehicles, in-person auctions, general public access, and harvesting of individual parts.
- 2. Perimeter Screening. If an 8'-tall, finished masonry wall is not installed along the perimeter of the storage area for non-repairable vehicles, alternative screening shall be provided around a portion of the outer perimeter of the subject parcels. At a minimum, this alternative screening shall consist of an 8'-tall board-on-board opaque wood fence with a top cap and bottom rail securing each board to minimize warping, consistent with Exhibit B (see case file). At any time, if portions of the fence are determined to be in a general state of disrepair, the affected sections shall be replaced to ensure a consistent, well-maintained appearance. The fence shall be installed behind a 25'-wide buffer of retained natural vegetation or supplemental landscaping consistent with Transitional Buffer 35 standards, or an acceptable equivalent as determined by the Director of Planning at the time of landscape plan review, along property lines identified as "Buffer" on Exhibit A (see case file).
- 3. <u>Lighting.</u> Lighting shall be limited to only the amount necessary for safety and security.
- 4. <u>Internal Signage</u>. Signage shall be installed and easily visible to fully identify the entire internal boundary of the area used for storing vehicles designated by the Department of Motor Vehicles as non-repairable.
- 5. <u>Water Connection</u>. To provide fire protection and potable water for the site, the development shall connect to the adjacent County water lines in Portugee Road and/or La France Road.
- 6. Safe Conduct of Operations. All uses shall be conducted so as not to create any danger to the health, safety and welfare or any material adverse impact on the Property or surrounding areas by creating any excessive noise, vibration, smoke, dust, lint, odor, heat or glare beyond the boundaries of the Property. The site shall not be operated in a manner which contributes to the breeding of rats, flies, mosquitoes or other disease-carrying animals and insects.
- 7. Spill Prevention Control and Counter Measure Plan (SPCC

Plan). There shall be no storage of any material containing, or contaminated with, dangerous explosives, chemicals, gases, or radioactive substances. While any portion of the property is used for the storage of motor vehicles and/or equipment, there shall be a written SPCC Plan in place and followed by the operators. Said plan shall contain the following elements:

- A. Advance written notice to, and contractual provision with, the sellers of all motor vehicles and equipment that the seller certifies that any motor vehicle and equipment brought to the property for auction (i) shall not be discharging or leaking any hazardous substances, as said substances may be defined by the Environmental Protection Agency, including but not limited to, gasoline, diesel fuel, oil, and machinery lubricants or any similar products; and (ii) that seller assumes liability for all prevention and/or cleanup cost for violation of such certification.
- B. Inspection of motor vehicles and equipment by trained personnel for any evidence or discharge or leakage of hazardous substances prior to the motor vehicles and/or equipment coming on to the property.
- C. While motor vehicles and equipment are on site, periodic monitoring by trained personnel to detect any discharge or leakage of hazardous substances.
- D. Various sorbents, supplies, equipment and containers stored and readily available on site to collect and contain any contaminating fluids and contaminated soils.
- E. Licensed Contractor specializing in environmental work on call for response including analysis, removal action, and proper disposal of any contaminants and/or contaminated soils.
- F. SPCC Plan(s) and records maintained on site and available for inspection by Henrico County officials.

Ordinance - To Add Article X Titled "Technology zones" to Chapter 6 of the Code of the County of Henrico to Establish a Technology Zone in the Innsbrook Redevelopment Overlay District and to Provide Incentives for Businesses and Redevelopment in the Zone.

Mr. Thornton requested the Manager define what the technology zones are for anyone in the audience or anyone listening who may not know

what technology zones are.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Schmitt, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached ordinance.

119-22 Resolution - Real Estate Tax Levies, 2022.

Mr. Thornton asked when the County could change the wording of *sanitary districts* to another proper term. Andrew Newby stated these terms go back to many years but had no objection changing the wording in future resolutions.

David Goodall, Sr., a resident of the Fairfield District, thanked the Board for the 2+2 incentive. He was very appreciative of the refund but requested the Board and the Manager look at reducing the real estate tax rate by two cents each year going forward, especially with such growth in the County.

On motion of Mr. Branin, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

David Goodall, Sr., a resident of the Fairfield District, asked that the maximum income to participate in the program be increased so more residents can be eligible. He also encouraged Henrico to reduce the real estate tax rate. Mr. Vithoulkas noted no other locality has done the 2-cent rebate back to residents; Mrs. O'Bannon noted we are at the maximum allowed by the State for the REAP program, and the County continues to adjust the program.

Mr. Thornton noted the County needed to take a very close look at how to help our retirees in the future to ensure they are aware of all the tax relief offered.

For residential units receiving water service from the City of Richmond, other than multifamily, bimonthly sewer volume charges shall be based on usage determined from the first meter reading cycle of the calendar year. For the purpose of this subsection, if the first reading is estimated as provided in section 23-205 or if the user joins the system after the first reading

cycle, or an allowance is made for an underground leak during the first billing cycle, billing shall not exceed charges for 10 CCF.

- (3) Industrial and commercial strong waste charge. In addition to the charges set out in subsections (a)(1) and (2) of this section, there will be charged to individual users a strong waste charge as applicable:
 - a. Suspended solids, when the concentrations of suspended solids exceed 275 milligrams per liter: \$26.80 \$28.15 per CWT for suspended solids in excess of 275 mg/l.
 - b. BOD, when concentrations of BOD exceed 250 milligrams per liter: \$37.15 \$39 per CWT for BOD in excess of 250 mg/l.

5. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after July 1, 2022, as provided by law and the following provisions:

Charges set forth in Sections 23-361 and 23-362 shall be pro-rated to apply the old and new charges to that proportion of water supplied and/or sewage collected prior to and after the effective date of the new rates. Calculation of such pro-rated charges shall be computed based on average daily use of service supplied.







BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the funds included in the Operating and Capital Annual Fiscal Plans for any County department, office, or agency may be used as participating funds in any Federal or State aid program for like purpose upon appropriation by the Board of Supervisors.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Schedule of Compensation attached hereto effective at the beginning of the 2022-23 fiscal year is approved; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the approved Operating Annual Fiscal Plan for fiscal year 2022-23 includes an increase in the personnel complement of 59 positions for general government and 145 positions for schools and funding for a 2.628% scale adjustment and a 2.372% wage increase for all eligible general government and school employees, to be effective on June 18, 2022; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in order to implement changes to the Personal Property Tax Relief Act of 1998 (the "PPTRA") made by legislation adopted by the Virginia General Assembly:

- 1. Any qualifying vehicle, as defined in the PPTRA, sitused within the County commencing January 1, 2022, shall receive personal property tax relief in the following manner:
 - a. Qualifying vehicles valued at \$1,000 or less shall receive 100% tax relief;
 - b. Qualifying vehicles valued at between \$1,001 to \$20,000 shall receive 40% tax relief;
 - c. Qualifying vehicles valued at \$20,001 or more shall receive 40% tax relief on the first \$20,000 of value only; and
 - d. All other vehicles which do not meet the definition of "qualifying vehicles" will not receive any form of tax relief under the PPTRA.
- 2. The amount of tax relief shall be a specific dollar amount offset against the total personal property taxes that would otherwise be due on a qualifying vehicle but for the PPTRA. The specific dollar amount of relief shall be shown on the tax bill for each qualifying vehicle, together with a general description of the criteria upon which relief has been allocated.




