

LETTER FROM THE CHIEF

Chief of Police

As we entered 2023, addressing gun violence and homicides was a priority for the Police Division. Our members worked tirelessly providing visibility in vulnerable areas, as well as removing 866 illegal firearms from our community and making prompt arrests of some of our most violent criminals. We experienced a 20% decrease in homicides compared to 2022, and through the hard work and dedication of our members, we cleared 71% of the homicides in 2023. Although homicides were down, we experienced an increase in violent crime for 2023; therefore, violent crime will continue to be a focal point for us in 2024.

A bright spot regarding crime in the county was the reduction in non-violent crime by 7% in 2023. Much of that reduction was driven by a reduction in burglaries and larcenies. Our School Resource Officers continue to provide quality oversight and interaction with our youth in Henrico County Public Schools. Working

with school administration and county government, we saw a reduction in weapons in our schools, and we continue to work together to make our schools safer.

Overall, the crime rate for Henrico County was down by 8% from 2022. While there is still a lot of work to do, we feel that we are trending in the right direction. Stolen vehicles and larcenies from autos continue to be an issue in the county, and we will work with various community partners to reduce these incidents.

While we look ahead to 2024, we are continuing to face challenges in many different areas - mental health calls, violent crime, and traffic crashes, just to name a few. We will continue to focus on these areas utilizing technology to enhance our footprint in the county, to not only solve crime but to prevent it as well. I am truly amazed and proud of the work that Division members are doing each day. Their commitment to making this county a safer place shows in their efforts and results. Henrico County Police Division will establish strong relationships with communities to ensure we are addressing the needs of our citizens, and together we will continue to improve the safety of Henrico County.

2023 CRIME RATE


In 2023, Henrico County experienced the lowest crime rate (23.43 per 1,000 residents) in the last decade, with the exception of our COVID-19 years in 2020 and 2021. When compared to the 2022 crime rate, this is an 8% decrease and no increase from the county's five-year average.

County-wide Part 1 Crime data in calendar year 2023 shows a 7% decrease, which is primarily attributed to the decrease in rapes (24%) and homicides (20%) when compared to 2022. However, compared to the five-year average, there was an increase in auto theft (38%), arson (37%) and homicides (33%).

In 2023, there was a 3% increase in violent Part I offenses compared to 2022 driven by the 14% increase in aggravated assaults. This increasing trend of aggravated assaults has been occurring in the Commonwealth of Virginia since 2017, according to FBI crime data.

There are natural crime fluctuations year-to-year; while identifying significant spikes in crime over a short period is important, it is equally important to identify crime trends over long periods of time. Nevertheless, the reduction of crime and the safety of the public remain the top priorities of the Henrico County Police Division.


Part I Crime Rate Per 1,000 Residents



About Crime Data

Henrico Police utilizes the FBI's Uniform Crime Report (UCR) reporting methodology, commonly referred to as Part I Offenses. It does not contain information about all known criminal offenses that have occurred in Henrico County. Part I Offenses include violent offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault) and nonviolent offenses (burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson). The Henrico Division of Fire has investigative authority over arson. The 2023 Crime Rate is based on the most current Henrico County Planning 3-C population estimate of 345,734.

ADMINISTRATIVE OPERATIONS

Personnel

The Personnel Unit spent a great deal of time recruiting in 2023. Some of the places they visited include:

In October, Police Personnel also participated in the 3rd Annual Henrico Day at Virginia State University (VSU), which is a career fair for several County departments held on the VSU campus. The event was coordinated by the County Manager's Office in conjunction with VSU staff.

Sergeant P.J. English attended "Find 'em, Hire 'em, Keep 'em" training at the Rappahannock Regional Academy in October. The training focused on modern recruitment and retention practices pertaining to law enforcement.

Training

In 2023, the Training Academy graduated the 76th, 77th, and 78th Basic Police Academies and 14th and 15th Modified Police Academies.

Members of the 79th Basic Police Academy and Training Academy staff visited the US Holocaust Museum and Memorial in Washington, DC, in August. This trip was designed to encourage purposeful learning and increase cultural awareness regarding the history of policing and its impact on different populations.

In August, Training began on the new T10 TASER platform. This training is for all personnel who carry this equipment, including members of Patrol, Community Services, and the Special Operations Group.

Firearms Range

In the spring of 2023, the Firearms Range hosted a Firearms Instructor School, a Sniper School, a Patrol Rifle Operator School, and a Patrol Rifle Instructor School. On May 19, 2023, they held Commonwealth's Attorney Day, where 27 members of the CA's office visited the Range and received a presentation on how our recruits are trained to use their firearms. They were also given the opportunity to fire the same weapons our officers are issued.

Office of Public Affairs

In May 2023, the Office of Public Affairs (OPA) worked with County IT to create a user-friendly way of gathering traffic complaints from our community members, eliminating the need for the traffic safety hotline. County IT created a form that may be completed online. The information is sent directly to the Traffic Enforcement Unit. A similar form was also created for parents to schedule a child safety seat check.

In response to firearm thefts from vehicles and firearms being taken to schools, OPA collaborated with County Public Relations and others on a firearm safety message. Two PSAs were created in June regarding this important information.

Several other videos and PSAs were created by OPA, on topics such as Driving Habits (about running red lights), a Vice Operation, our Motorist Assistance program, and about the Division's three Patrol Stations.



November, **OPA** launched the Division's WOAH (Watch Out Ahead Henrico) campaign. Vehicle crashes involving pedestrians bicyclists and have been on the rise, often resulting in serious or fatal injuries. As part of

the WOAH program, the Division distributes high visibility vests to the public and provides safety tips to drivers, walkers, runners, and bicyclists.

Administrative Services Bureau

Communications

In June 2023, the Department of Emergency Communications (DEC) was established as its own agency, and it is no longer a section within the Police Division. For a seamless transition and until the DEC becomes fully self-functioning, the Police Division continues to assist with fiscal management and hiring processes.

The Police Division created a DEC Liaison position, which serves as a crucial link between the DEC and the Police Division. To ensure the safety and well-being of the community, the Liaison collaborates with DEC members to establish effective and efficient emergency response protocols and workflows. The Liaison's position is held by a Police Division Lieutenant and contributes to the strategic planning process, offering insights and expertise to assist in the continuity of operations

within the county.

Criminal Records

Due to a 28% increase in FOIA requests from 2021 to 2022, the Criminal Records Unit added a second full-time FOIA position in 2023. The FOIA component's complement is now two full-time positions and one part-time position.

Logistics

In 2023, a new Logistic Technician was hired to assist with the Division's needs. The unit also created a new internal supply ordering system; it launched to the civilian staff at the end of the year, and it is still in a developmental stage.



The Division's new officer uniform (pictured, left) was officially launched in April 2023. The process of outfitting every officer with the new uniform will take about eighteen months.

Technology Support

In March 2023, Technology Support completed the issuance of new laptops to officers and detectives. These new models are customizable based on the officer's assignment, allowing for components such as DVD players and additional storage. The Division also began issuing every officer a cell phone, and the rollout of these phones should wrap up in February 2024.

Fallen Officer Trey Sutton Hero Workout

A Hero Workout is a way to honor the fallen, especially those who have died in the line of duty.

Officer Trey Sutton made the ultimate sacrifice in the performance of his duties for the citizens of Henrico on March 31, 2022. He started his career on June 22, 2021, with the 74th Basic Police Academy. On the 2nd anniversary of the day he began his service, many Division and community members participated in a Hero Workout in his honor at Hermitage High School (pictures, below).





FIELD OPERATIONS

Patrol Bureau

Central Station

Central DART (Directed Action Response Team) is dedicated to addressing specific crime issues and quality of life matters in Central Station. Central DART and the Gang Investigations Team (GIT) targeted a criminal street gang in an apartment community. The combined efforts of these units resulted in the convicted gang members serving a combined 177 years in prison. This initiative led to a significant disruption and dismantlement of this this gang's criminal organization and activities.

DART collaborated with Patrol, Drug K9s, Traffic Enforcement, and Drug Enforcement to conduct 12 initiatives in the station targeting Part I Crimes. During these initiatives and through the work of their normal day-to-day assignments, DART collectively made more than 131 felony arrests, 64 misdemeanor arrests, and located more than 39 wanted subjects. They served more than 70 outstanding warrants and recovered 21 firearms and 5 stolen vehicles. They recovered 828.3 grams of cocaine, 82 grams of heroin, 48 grams of methamphetamine and 5.5 pounds of marijuana.

West Station

On March 19, 2023, officers responded to a disorderly situation and robbery that occurred in the 4000 block of Cox Road. This event involved foot pursuits, officers being fired upon, and one suspect running toward West Broad Street and attempting a

carjacking of an occupied vehicle. When officers challenged the suspect, he refused to comply with their commands. Officers fired at the suspect, who then fled into a nearby wooded area. A perimeter was established, and the SWAT Team and Air Unit were dispatched. The suspect was ultimately found with critical injuries and was taken to the hospital where he succumbed to his wounds. In this perilous situation, officers left points of safety putting their lives in jeopardy to stop this armed and dangerous suspect. In recognition of their bravery in this volatile situation, the officers (pictured, below), received the following Division Awards in October:

These officers were also recognized at the Metro Richmond VALOR Awards, which is a regional event celebrating first responders who performed exceptional acts of courage.

On July 6, 2023, officers responded to a call for service where they seized numerous items, including: 3 handguns, 1 rifle, 75 grams of powder cocaine, multiple bottles of codeine cough syrup, and illicit mushrooms (pictured, below). The firearms and drugs were in an area accessible to a 5 year-old child who lived at the residence. As a result of these findings, eleven charges were placed.



South Station

Officer M.T. Murray was the recipient of the 2023 Varina Ruritan Officer of the Year. He was recognized for his efforts in the Varina District and was amongst the top producers for South Station in both traffic and criminal categories.

In 2023, construction began on the new South Station Patrol Headquarters that is being built on land acquired by Henrico County in FY21. The project is expected to be completed at the beginning of 2025. The custom-built station, which will be located near the intersection of Airport Drive and Renee Lane, will alleviate the challenges of South Station's current location and building. The facility will also house a 911 training center and a dedicated Police K-9 center.

On December 5, 2023, South DART and patrol officers worked together to educate motorists on the importance of safe driving. Teams focused their efforts on high crash locations, areas that had received traffic complaints, and Commercial Motor Vehicle enforcement. The initiative's 41 traffic stops resulted in 21 summons and 18 warnings issued, 4 warrants served, and 3 CMV Inspections completed.

2023 Help Eliminate Auto Theft (HEAT) Awards

On September 11, 2023, Virginia State Police's HEAT program presented awards recognizing efforts in reducing vehicle theft and theft of vehicle parts across the Commonwealth. The Henrico County Police Division was the agency winner for departments serving a population of more than 100,000. Detectives A.M. Lancaster and J.L. VonCanon and Officer C.W. Silk were individual finalists. Certificates of Merit were presented to Henrico Officers D.R. Crosby, Jr., T.L. Giannini, C.J. Signorelli, D.R. Thurman, and J.T. Wootton.

Emergency Services Unit

The Emergency Services Unit is comprised of the K9 Unit, Emergency Response Team, EOD Team, SWAT Team, Negotiations, and Civil Disturbance Team.

In January 2023, the Division hosted a National Tactical Officers Association SWAT Team Leader School, which was attended by our SWAT supervisors and other students from across the East Coast.

In February 2023, Officers C.A. Finchum and K.J. Mullens attended a Bloodhound Seminar in Louisa County, and on March 1, 2023, Officer Finchum certified as a Police Bloodhound K9 Team instructor, becoming the first Division instructor of this type.

In November 2023, Henrico's SWAT Team participated in joint training with the FBI at Quantico, VA. This joint training helped the team consider different response methods and enabled them to work closely with a unit that could assist our team with calls within the county.

Metro Aviation

The Metro Aviation Unit is a partnership with Chesterfield, Richmond, and Henrico.

On December 13, 2023, the Metro Aviation Unit procured a 2019 Piper M350 aircraft (pictured, below) to replace the current 1979 Cessna 182 transport plane. The new plane is certified for flight into known icing, has 6 seats, and a 25,000 foot service ceiling. The aircraft cost \$1,296,000, which was under budget. The old transport plane will be sold in early 2024.



Traffic Enforcement

In February 2023, Officers L.C. Jones and T.W. Holmes, who are both state certified Drug Recognition Experts (DRE), taught in a two-week school at Virginia State Police headquarters. Both of these officers were recognized nationally in the 2022 Drug Evaluation and Classification Report for the number of DRE evaluations they had performed. Officer Holmes was 4th in the nation and Officer Jones was 5th.

Also in February, Lt. R.G. Netherland, III instructed a two-week class on At-Scene Crash Investigations for local officers in Virginia. This class expands the training an officer receives in the police academy and starts the path to more advanced training.

Officer L.C. Jones received the Leslie T. Sheppard Award at the Division's Spring Awards ceremony. This award was given in recognition of Officer Jones' significant contributions to the Division and to community safety. He is a leading authority on impaired driving, shares his knowledge with others through training, and continues to make our roads safer through his enforcement efforts. In 2022, he issued almost 1500 traffic summonses, including 10 DUI arrests.

In August 2023, Officer Holmes and other members of the Division assisted our public safety partners in Louisa, Richmond, and Chesterfield with firefighter funerals in each of these jurisdictions.

SUPPORT OPERATIONS

Support Services Bureau

School Services

In 2023, the Division continued the efforts of some of our successful school programs, including the Open Doors, Open Hearts program and the First Responders Club.

On January 19, 2023, Officer J.R. Johnson (pictured, below) taught approximately 100 Nuckols Farm Elementary students about community helpers and the job of the police officer.



On April 20, 2023, several School Resource Officers (SROs) assisted with the Special Olympics' Feet Meet at Freeman High School.

Twice in 2023, officers visited Dumbarton Elementary to engage with students. In April, SWAT

Team members spoke about their duties and showed off several pieces of equipment. In September, Officers A.S. Marzullo (pictured, below) and M.R. Daly had lunch with students and shared with them about their duties.



Over the summer, the Division held its Youth Police Academy with 20 students participating. Students learned about various Division components, such as Forensics, K9, Metro Aviation, Marine Patrol, and Traffic Safety. Presentations and hands-on demonstrations were provided. Training cadres from EVOT, Firearms, and Defensive Tactics also gave presentations during the week-long academy.

On September 19, 2023, Officers D.M. Miller and J.G. Jarvis attended the Life Ready Expo at Hermitage High School. The Life Ready Expo is a Henrico County district-wide career exploration

event for students and their families. Our officers spoke to attending students about careers in law enforcement.

National Walk to School Day was October 4, 2023, and our SROs walked to school with students from all over the county to their assigned schools.

School Services once again participated in two holiday-time programs. On November 18, 2023, they assisted with the Henrico Police Athletic League (HPAL) Annual Turkey Drive, distributing over 500 turkey meals to families in need. On December 16, 2023, SROs and other Division members assisted with the HPAL Kids and Cops program, assisting children with shopping for Christmas.

Community Policing

In 2023, the Division held one Citizens Police Academy and two Senior Citizens Police Academies. The goal of these academies is to teach the community about policework, the people behind the badge, and the different challenges facing police today. Participants get to ask questions and learn about the different facets of the Police Division.

On March 9, 2023, Officer S.C. Phillips coordinated a bicycle engagement event with Henrico Recreation and Parks at the Deep Run Park. The theme of the event was "Mario Day" based on the video game character, Super Mario. Officers designed a fun bike course and accompanied children as they negotiated the course in pedal cars and bicycles. Officers were outfitted with moustaches and white gloves as

the lead character, Mario. Approximately two dozen children participated in this community event.

The Henrico United Bike Rodeo was held on March 31, 2023, at St. Luke's Apartments. Officers from Community Policing partnered with Domino's Pizza, Henrico Libraries, Henrico Mental Health, and Henrico Recreation and Parks for this community engagement event. The staff at St. Luke's provided crucial support for the event with assistance from the on-site social worker, management, and the grounds department. Many families came to the event and enjoyed the music, food, and fellowship. Parents had candid discussions about the neighborhood with officers and staff.

Between April 21 and May 26, Henrico United focused on Nottingham Green and Kingsridge Apartment communities. Officers from Community Policing and other county agencies engaged with youth and adults, providing information to help better the community. Officers also set up a bike rodeo to help educate young people on bike safety.

Officers instructed bike-riding skills and rode alongside the participants. These events attracted numerous youth and their parents from the area and helped foster a favorable relationship between the children, their parents, and the police.

On April 22, 2023, the Division partnered with Public Utilities for the bi-annual document shredding and electronics recycling event at Dabbs House. The event assisted the public with drive through dropoff stations where large shredding trucks were present. Officers unloaded the documents from citizen's vehicles and deposited them into the bins for the shredding trucks.

The March Maintenance Springer Event was held on March 29, 2023, at the Henrico Theatre. Community Officers planned this large-scale community engagement and crime prevention event. There were several sponsoring agencies such as Dominion Energy, Henrico Recreation and Parks, Henrico Fire, United Healthcare, and Citizen and Farmers Bank to name a few. Vendors included Social Services, Virginia Department of Health, United Bank, Domino's Pizza, Righteous Nails, Adult Education Center, Virginia Barber School, AAA, Highland Springs High School Drumline, and Senior Connections. This event required extensive planning and preparation, and it was a huge success.

Community Policing coordinated with the Chief's Office for community walks in April, May, June, and October. Officers, staff members, and others from various Division components participated in these walks to engage with the community and help ad-

dress quality of life issues. Audubon Village, Place One Apartments, The Greens Apartments, and Newbridge Village Apartments were the communities visited on these walks.

On June 9, 2023, the Last Day of School Event was held at the Eastern Henrico Recreation Center. Community Officers set up a bike rodeo to help educate young people on bike safety. Officers instructed bike -riding skills and rode alongside the students.

The Division hosted the annual Police Chaplains Conference on October 27, 2023. It provided the

opportunity for Chaplains from around Virginia to fellowship with each other, train on relevant topics, and hear from various presenters on meaningful topics.

In November, Community Officers participated in the Boys2Men Tie Event in Newbridge Village, Oakland Village, and Coventry Gardens. Officers taught young men from these communities how to tie neckties, shake hands, and the importance of looking people in the eye while engaging with them. Approximately 50 children attended the combined events.

Investigative Bureau

Technical Support

In April 2023, major upgrades were implemented to the OCS surveillance van to enhance its capabilities. This upgrade included new recording equipment, internet connectivity, and monitors. The van now

can record and stream video from multiple cameras, providing real-time monitoring and information that can be passed along to senior stakeholders during operations.

In April 2023, CovertTrack provided free basic law enforcement GPS training to 50 detectives from the Division and across the Commonwealth. The comprehensive training covered pertinent information about how the devices work, best practices for installation, preserving evidence, preparing for court, and case management.

In late fall, Sergeant P.F. Johnakin and Detective C.A. Vosvick participated in the Silvus StreamCaster Program of Instruction (POI). This extensive training program was designed to equip organizations with essential skills needed for effective utilization of the Silvus radio system. The training focused on radio frequency communications, mobile ad hoc networks (MANETs), and the proficient operation of Silvus radios along with associated accessories to better prepare users for success in their operational com-

munications. Sergeant Johnakin and Detective Vosvick each earned two certificates (Certified Silvus Operator and Certified Silvus Technician) upon successful completion of the training.

Vice Investigation Team (VIT)

In 2023, Henrico VIT took the lead in collaborating with its regional law enforcement partners by hosting monthly meetings with other agency's vice detectives. Individuals from the Commonwealth's Attorney's Office, FBI, Virginia State Police (VSP), Hanover Sheriff's Office, Richmond Police, Chesterfield Police, and Homeland Security Investigations attended these meetings to share trends occurring within the region. This collaboration resulted in significant information sharing and team building among regional partners.

In April 2023, VIT held an Undercover School for law enforcement officers who would like to work in an undercover capacity during operations. About 25 officers from VSP, Chesterfield, King William, New Kent, Henrico, Hanover, and Chesterfield attended this weeklong training.

At the end of May, 2023, VIT conducted a two-day To Catch a Predator Operation targeting offenders who solicit juveniles for sex online. This operation was in partnership with the FBI and VSP, as well as the Division's Drug Enforcement Unit, Emergency Response Team, and DART. After Detectives engaged with subjects online, the offenders traveled to a location in the county and were taken into custody by ERT. With the assistance of almost 50 law enforcement officials, a total of 13 individuals

were charged as a result of this operation.

Detectives D.P. Dietrick, Jr., C.B. Jones, and D.C.J. Strickland were sworn in as task force officers for the newly formed VSP Capital Region Human Trafficking Task Force in June. Henrico's VIT was instrumental in helping this team with training, as they are recognized across the Commonwealth for their work in this area.
