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Executive Summary

1. Introduction

Henrico County is an entitlement jurisdiction eligible to receive direct federal assistance from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and as such receives Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships Program, and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds. A requirement of accepting these funds is the preparation of a Five-Year Consolidated Plan, which identifies the County's needs for affordable housing and community development, and an Annual Action Plan, which outlines how the County will use federal funds each year to address the needs of County residents. The County of Henrico's 2015-2020 Five Year Consolidated Community Development Plan covers a five-year period from October 1, 2015 through September 30, 2020.

This Annual Action Plan covers year five of the Consolidated Plan and identifies the activities to be undertaken during the year beginning October 1, 2019. The Annual Action Plan is the formal application to HUD for the PY 2019-20 entitlement funds administered by the County of Henrico Department of Community Revitalization.

With the original adoption of this Action Plan on June 25, 2019 CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds were allocated to twenty-two projects. Action Plan amendments as described below allocated CDBG-CV funds, ESG-CV funds, program income and funds brought forward to additional projects. A summary of sources of funds and projects funded (including amendments) is provided in Appendix B (CDBG, HOME, and ESG) and Appendix S (CDBG-CV and ESG-CV).

May 12, 2020 Amendment #1 Notes:

Amendment incorporated CDBG-CV (\$1,017,678) and ESG-CV (\$508,566), funds to 18 projects.

Documents related to this amendment including public notification and comments received and a list of projects allocated funds can be found in Appendix H.

September 22, 2020 Amendment #2 Notes:

Amendment incorporated HOME program income (\$37,054), prior year funds (\$16,054), and additional ESG-CV funds (\$1,154,168) to 8 projects.

Documents related to this amendment including public notification and comments received and a list of projects allocated funds can be found in Appendix I.

December 30, 2020 Amendment #3 Notes:

This amendment reallocated CDBG-CV funds in the amount of \$160,000 previously identified for future allocation to two existing and one new project. Modifications were made to Sections AP-05, PR-05, AP-10, AP-12, AP-20, AP-35, and AP-38. CDBG-CV funds were reallocated to: St. Joseph's Villa Mobile Grocery delivery program (\$10,000), Virginia LISC Microenterprise Business Relief program (\$105,000), and HCPS Student Remote Learning Equipment (\$45,000).

February 9, 2021 Amendment #4 Notes:

This amendment incorporated tranche 3 of CDBG-CV funds in the amount of \$1,417,098. A total of \$676,000 CDBG-CV funds will go to two existing and three new projects. The remaining \$741,098 will be held for future Board allocation. Modifications were made to Sections AP-05, AP-10, AP-12, AP-20, AP-35, AP-38, AP-55, and AP-65. These funds were allocated to St. Joseph's Villa Mobile Grocery Program (\$15,000), Virginia LISC Small Business Transformation Program (\$350,000), the Partnership for Housing Affordability Housing Resource Line (\$71,000), Henrico Department of Social Services Rental Assistance (\$200,000), and the Henrico Public Relations and Media Services COVID-19 Vaccine Outreach (\$40,000).

March 23, 2021 Amendment #5 Notes:

The amendment reallocated CDBG-CV and ESG-CV funds previously identified for future allocation to two existing and three new projects. Modifications were made to Sections AP-05, AP-10, AP-12, AP-20, AP-35, and AP-38. CDBG-CV funds were reallocated to: OAR of Richmond Reentry Housing and Support Program (\$40,000), HumanKind Workforce Support (\$340,000), Central Virginia Legal Aid Society Civil Justice COVID-19 Relief Program (\$64,000), and Circle Center Adult Day Services Minor Structural Modifications (\$22,000). ESG-CV funds were reallocated to Housing Families First Emergency Shelter Rehabilitation (\$100,000).

July 13, 2021 Amendment #6 Notes:

The amendment reallocated CDBG-CV and ESG-CV funds that are being recaptured from two projects and distributed to three existing projects. Modifications were made to Sections AP-05,

AP-10, AP-12, AP-20, AP-35, AP-38, AP-55, and AP-65. CDBG-CV funds were recaptured from the Henrico Area Mental Health & Development Services Homelessness Prevention Program (\$49,062.47) and reallocated to the Department of Social Services for COVID-19 Recovery Rental Assistance. ESG-CV funds were recaptured from the Department of Social Services COVID-19 Recovery Rental Assistance (\$120,000) and reallocated to CARITAS Emergency Shelter & Case Management (\$90,000) and to Commonwealth Catholic Charities Outreach & Diversion program (\$30,000).

Documents related to this amendment including public notification and comments received and a list of projects allocated funds can be found in Appendix M.

December 14, 2021 Amendment #7 Notes:

The amendment reallocated ESG-CV funds that are being recaptured from three projects and distributed to one existing project and one new project. Modifications were made to Sections AP-05, AP-10, AP-12, AP-20, AP-35, AP-38, AP-55, and AP-65. ESG-CV funds were recaptured from the Salvation Army Emergency COVID-19 Shelter (\$25,000), Henrico Social Services Rental Assistance (\$172,191), and Housing Families First Rapid Rehousing (\$23,000). These funds were reallocated to the Housing Families First Hilliard House Pandemic Response Shelter (\$23,000), ESG-CV Program Administration (\$32,191), and a new program through Commonwealth Catholic Charities for a Regional Inclement Weather Shelter (\$165,000).

June 28, 2022 Amendment #8 Notes:

The amendment contains two components: a minor amendment and a substantial amendment. Together these amendments reallocated CDBG-CV and ESG-CV funds that are being recaptured from six projects and previously unallocated funds which were distributed to five existing projects and two new projects. The minor amendment deals with the recapture of all funds and the reallocation to the five existing projects and the creation of the one new ESG-CV project. The substantial amendment created CDBG-CV project. Modifications were made to Sections AP-05, AP-10, AP-12, AP-20, AP-35, AP-38, AP-55, AP-65, and AP-75.

CDBG-CV funds were recaptured from the Henrico County Health Department for COVID-19 Community Based Testing (\$32,803.35), Henrico County Public Schools for Supplies for McKinney-Vento students (\$464.81), Henrico County Department of Social Services for COVID-19 Recovery Rental Assistance (\$39,204.46), Partnership for Housing Affordability for the Housing Resource Line (\$17,993.40), and the unallocated balance is being reduced by (\$32,202.38). These funds were reallocated to OAR Re-Entry Housing and Support Program (\$50,000), HumanKind for Workforce Support (\$64,000), Circle Center Adult Day Services for Cleaning Equipment and Improvements (\$10,000), and one new project, the Housing Assessment and Transition Support (\$200,000).

ESG-CV funds were recaptured from St. Joseph's Villa for Rapid Rehousing (\$60,000). These funds were reallocated to Commonwealth Catholic Charities Outreach & Prevention (\$29,000), ESG-CV Administration (\$1,000), and one new project, the Commonwealth Catholic Charities Non-Congregate Exit to Outreach project (\$30,000).

Documents related to this amendment including public notification and comments received and a list of projects allocated funds can be found in Appendix O.

September 1, 2023 Amendment #9 Notes:

ESG-CV funds were recaptured from the Commonwealth Catholic Charities Inclement Weather Shelter program (\$26,031.56), ESG-CV Administration (\$8,779.59) and Housing Families First Rapid Rehousing Program (\$20,000) and were reallocated to the Housing Families First Shelter program. In addition, CDBG-CV funds were recaptured from the CDBG-CV Administration program and reallocated to Housing Families First Shelter program. A sources and uses document for this amendment can be found in Appendix P.

December 6, 2023 Amendment #10 Notes:

The amendment reallocated CDBG-CV funds from funds held for future board allocation (\$41,564.02) and from HOME Inc Foreclosure Prevention Program (\$3,435.98) to a new program – Commonwealth Catholic Charities Dibert Food Pantry (\$45,000). A sources and uses document for this amendment can be found in Appendix Q.

March 26, 2024 Amendment #11 Notes:

This substantial amendment reallocated unspent funds from 5 CDBG-CV activities: Henrico County Dept of PR & Media Services COVID-19 Vaccine Outreach (\$1,394.50), HOME Inc Foreclosure Prevention (\$1,685.89), Housing Assessment & Transition Support (\$40,000), Program Administration (\$1,854.67), and Virginia LISC Micro Business Relief Fund (\$141,066.47) to one new activity – HumanKind Family Crisis Fund (\$156,001.53) and to a program previously funded with ESG-CV – Commonwealth Catholic Charities Outreach and Diversion (\$30,000). This amendment also incorporates text changes from the previous two minor amendments (Amendments 9 and 10). Modifications were made to Sections AP-05, AP-10, AP-12, AP-20, AP-35, AP-38, AP-55, and AP-65.

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

The objectives for the 2019-20 Annual Action Plan are listed below along with the projected outcomes. Expected outcomes for the five-year plan are in parentheses.

- Rehabilitation or minor repair of 75 (240) housing units for low- and moderate-income elderly
 persons and/or disabled homeowners thereby retaining the affordable housing stock and
 increasing the supply of supportive housing.
- Rehabilitation for sale or new construction of 2 (9) housing units for low- and moderate-income homeowners, thereby increasing the availability of affordable permanent housing.
- Provision of down payment and closing cost assistance to 22 (50) low- and moderate-income first-time homebuyers, thereby increasing the supply of affordable housing to low-income and moderate-income individuals.
- Provision of after-school educational and tutoring activities, counseling, and preventative
 activities for 120 (750) children living in subsidized housing, thereby improving the safety and
 livability of neighborhoods.
- Provision of technical assistance to businesses within the County's Enterprise Zone, thereby
 providing job creation and retention, and the establishment, stabilization and expansion of small
 businesses. At least seven (27) jobs, available to low-or moderate-income persons, will be
 created.
- Provision of design assistance grants to encourage investment in properties in the older commercial corridors of the County, thereby providing job creation and retention. At least one (3) jobs, available to a low- or moderate-income person, will be created.
- Provision of fair housing outreach to County residents through seminars, brochure distribution and direct counseling.
- Provision of funds towards the construction involving the adaptive reuse of an abandoned nursing home for 86 units of supportive housing for formerly homeless and other low-income persons.
- Provision of funds for capital improvements to a building serving low-income elderly or disabled adults, serving 100 persons daily.
- Provision of funding for a historic district analysis and architectural surveys in a low-income area.
- Provision of preventative services to 724 families/individuals facing homelessness. (includes 208 added using CDBG-CV and ESG-CV funds)
- Provision of services to rapidly rehouse 47 families who have experienced homelessness.
- Provision of services and/or shelter to 1,245 families who have experienced homelessness.
- Street outreach to 110 families/individuals facing homelessness.

Amendment note: Additional individuals and families will be served through the addition of the CDBG-CV and ESG-CV funds. See sections AP-35 and AP-38 for additional detail.

3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

The Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) described the County's performance relative to the goals established in the Five-Year Consolidated Plan. The following is a summary of the accomplishments for the program year ending September 30, 2018 as described in the PY 2017-18 Performance Report. During PY 2017-18, the County continued to provide and improve housing opportunities for low- and moderate-income individuals, support affordable housing, provide services and opportunities to low- and moderate-income individuals and families, and serve persons who were homeless or at risk of homelessness.

Summary of PY 2017-18 Accomplishments:

- Homeowner Rehabilitation through project: HOMES. Eleven homes were completed at a total cost of \$188,230 CDBG and \$359,994 HOME.
- Emergency and minor repairs to homes owned by low/moderate-income residents through project: HOMES and Rebuilding Together Richmond. A total of 62 repairs were completed at a total cost of \$613,842 CDBG.
- Development of new affordable housing through CHDOs. Three vacant homes were purchased in PY2017-18 for the rehabilitation and/or construction of single-family dwellings for sale to low-income, first-time homebuyers. Total expenditure of HOME (CHDO) funds from prior program years: PY 2012-13 was \$43,113.24; PY 2014-15 was \$19,756.91; PY 2015-16 was \$83,204.54; and PY2016-17 was \$32,278.
- Down payment and closing cost assistance through SCDHC to enable homeownership for lowincome first-time homebuyers. Funding was provided for six homebuyers; seven homebuyers were assisted at a total cost of \$15,750 CDBG and \$58,250 HOME.
- Down payment and closing cost assistance though HOME Inc. to enable homeownership for low-income first-time homebuyers. Funding was provided for 12 homebuyers; 12 homebuyers were assisted at a total cost of \$25,500 CDBG and \$151,986 HOME.
- After-school substance abuse and violence prevention through the CONNECT Program for at-risk youth and their parents residing in 11 low-income communities. 162 students were served throughout the program year at a total cost of \$140,544 CDBG.
- The job creation and retention objective was accomplished through the creation of 12 new jobs (11 low-mod FTEs) through the Commercial Assistance and Enterprise Zone Design Assistance programs. PY2017-18 expenditures (including expenditures from prior year funds): \$187,968
 CDBG. This resulted in an average of one job for every \$15,664 of CDBG expenditures for these programs.
- Completion of a series of workshops providing basic home maintenance skills to Henrico homeowners. 90 people participated. Total CDBG cost of \$3,416.
- Completion of survey work and a Nomination Report in cooperation with the Virginia
 Department of Historic Resources to enable the listing of Highland Springs in the National
 Register of Historic Places. The district was added to the National Register in May 2018. A CDBG
 expenditure of \$36,958 was incurred in PY 2017-18.
- The Henrico ESG program served 558 households/persons through homeless prevention services at a cost of \$20,388; 41 persons through rapid re-housing services at a cost of \$50,000; and 138 persons (47 by Housing Families First; 91 by CARITAS) through case management and shelter services at a cost of \$55,250.

As of May 1, 2019, the spend rate was calculated at 1.18. Henrico County consistently meets the required CDBG spend rate.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Summary from citizen participation section of plan.

Over the course of the year, County CDBG/HOME/ESG staff continued to meet with subrecipients on a regular basis, representatives of County agencies, and other community service providers (including the Continuum of Care) to understand the needs of the community, to adjust existing programs, and to develop goals and specific objectives for the upcoming annual plan. Specific consultations are outlined in Section AP-10.

Henrico County conducted two public hearings, one on March 7, 2019 and one with the County Board of Supervisors on June 25, 2019. Opportunities for public input also included attendance by staff at neighborhood and business association meetings as well as consultations with County agencies and non-profit service providers.

There were eight additional public hearings related to plan amendments held with the County Board of Supervisors on the following dates: May 12, 2020; September 22, 2020; February 9, 2021; March 23, 2021; July 13, 2021; December 14, 2021; June 28, 2022; and March 26, 2024. These hearings were held to discuss the proposed budgets for the CDBG-CV and/or ESG-CV funds, discussed in the amendments. Appendices H through R provide documentation pertaining to these meetings.

Advertising of public hearings and opportunities for public input included the following:

- Newspaper advertisement in the *Richmond Times-Dispatch*, the *Richmond Free Press*, and the *Henrico Citizen*.
- Direct emailing to the Department of Community Revitalization email list
- Notices on the County website
- Staff attendance at community and neighborhood association meetings

5. Summary of public comments

This could be a brief narrative summary or reference an attached document from the Citizen Participation section of the Consolidated Plan.

Comments received at the staff public hearing concerned the County's efforts towards addressing vacant and boarded homes, assisting existing homeowners with issues not eligible for the use of federal funds, quality of public infrastructure in low-income neighborhoods, need for assistance with connection fees when septic systems fail, and a variety of items that were referred to other County departments to address. Citizens asked about partnerships with non-profit organizations.

At the Board of Supervisors' public hearing on June 25, 2019, no comments were received.

At the Board of Supervisors' public hearing on March 12, 2020, one comment letter was submitted. This letter requested funding for rental payment assistance, which the proposed budget included a total of \$360,000 for this purpose, representing approximately 24% of the program budgets.

At the Board of Supervisors' public hearing on September 22, 2020, no comments were received. At the Board of Supervisors' public hearing on February 9, 2021, no comments were received. At the Board of Supervisors' public hearing on March 23, 2021, no comments were received. At the Board of Supervisors' public hearing on July 13, 2021, no comments were received. At the Board of Supervisors' public hearing on December 14, 2021, no comments were received.

At the Board of Supervisors' public hearing on June 28, 2022, no comments were received. At the Board of Supervisors' public hearing on March 26, 2024 no comments were received.

6. Summary of comments or views not accepted and the reasons for not accepting them

All comments received were accepted and considered in the formulation of the 2019-20 Annual Action Plan. Of note, this plan provides funding to Homeward for the Homeless Management Information System to assist with coordination of service providers; provides nearly \$1.2 million for housing rehabilitation and repair for low-income homeowners, with half of that amount targeted to elderly and disabled homeowners. This program can be used to address connection fee needs. While all comments were "accepted" not all could be addressed through projects funded in this Action Plan due to limits on funding and limits on eligible uses of CDBG, HOME, and/or ESG funds.

7. Summary

For the preparation of the Annual Plan and the subsequent amendments, County staff sought citizen input through a variety of means and received several comments. Comments, along with staff research and analysis resulted in the development of the goals and outcomes described in this Plan.

AP-10 Consultation – 91.100, 91.200(b), 91.215(l)

1. Introduction

Throughout the year, CDBG, HOME, and ESG staff met with local agencies and groups. These meetings are intended to maintain a current understanding of the housing, community development, and public service needs of low- and moderate-income County residents and to identify opportunities for funding in upcoming program years and funding adjustments in the current year. Listed in Table 2 and discussed below are some of the meetings undertaken by staff as part of an ongoing dialog to discuss the needs of the County's citizens in preparation of the 2019 Annual Action Plan.

Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction's activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(I))

Staff in the Department of Community Revitalization meet regularly throughout the year with a variety of organizations involved in the provision or maintenance of housing for low- and moderate-income citizens, as well as County and non-County agencies providing other services to low- and moderate-income citizens. These discussions are designed to identify specific community needs and implement strategies for program enhancement. The Continuum of Care Ranking Committee was formally consulted before developing ESG funding recommendations. Individual ESG providers were also consulted.

The Department of Community Revitalization convenes a monthly meeting of a multi-disciplinary task force that addresses housing and social service needs of County residents. County agencies represented on this task force include: Police, Social Services, Fire, Building Inspections, Mental Health, Community Revitalization, and Henrico County Public Schools.

In addition to meeting with individual organizations and other County Departments, staff also consults regularly in formal and informal settings with Community Development staff from surrounding jurisdictions and meets bi-monthly with an organization of area non-profit housing providers. This group includes CHDOs, CDFIs, CBDOs and other community development corporations.

Agencies consulted are listed in Table 2.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

Staff from the Henrico County Manager's Office represents the County and serves as a voting member of the Continuum of Care Board (CoC). The Department of Community Revitalization is represented on the CoC Ranking Committee. This panel of community stakeholders is convened at least annually to review and assess funding requests for the HUD Continuum of Care Program. The Ranking Committee meets to review applications and to review the effectiveness of the proposed work in addressing community priorities and needs. A discussion of requests for Henrico ESG funding took place with CoC staff and the Ranking Committee on March 11, 2019. Recommendations were provided for funding organizations with Henrico County ESG Entitlement funds. Allocations of ESG funds, as described in this Plan, are

based substantially on recommendations from the CoC staff and the Ranking Committee in an effort to coordinate with funds allocated by the CoC.

Formal consultation occurred with the CoC Ranking Committee as described above and prior to that with CoC staff. Through representation on the CoC Board, Henrico County staff participates in the evaluation of CoC funded programs. These entitlements reflect a 0.8% decrease in CDBG, a 4.5% decrease in HOME, and a 3.7% increase in ESG from the prior Program Year. This Action Plan implements the final year of the Five-year Consolidated Plan. The CDBG amounts available reflect \$92,064 of funds brought forward from prior program years.

Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

- Local and State Enterprise Zone Grants: Henrico County provides grant funding to supplement CDBG funds invested in qualifying businesses for the purpose of job creation for low- and moderate-income persons. Several grant programs are funded with CDBG funds; others with County general funds. Businesses undertaking improvements resulting in job creation can utilize either or both grant programs. Enterprise Zone businesses/properties are also eligible for state grants.
- Henrico County funds a variety of non-profit organizations in the non-departmental general fund budget for the purpose of providing public services serving predominantly low- and moderate-income persons.
- Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC): The federal 4% and 9% LIHTC is a substantial source of funding for the construction and rehabilitation of affordable rental units. They are a dollar-fordollar credit against federal tax liability. There are currently 5,535 LIHTC supported housing units in Henrico within 44 apartment communities. Two additional communities, representing a total of 131 new units received approval for tax credit allocations in 2018 and have not been completed. 170 units received approval for 2019, including 86 units of supportive housing.
- Portable Housing Choice Vouchers: Vouchers used in Henrico County are administered primarily through four entities: Richmond Redevelopment Housing Authority, Henrico Area Mental Health and Developmental Services, Central Virginia Resource Corporation, and Richmond Residential Services.
- Down payment and closing cost assistance is leveraged and/or matched with additional private grants, homeowner contributions, state grants, and in-kind contributions.
- Emergency Solutions Grant Funds are leveraged and matched with state ESG funds, private
 charitable contributions, foundation funds, United Way and similar funding, and in-kind
 contributions from public and private agencies, and funding provided through the Continuum of
 Care, and CDBG funds provided for homelessness prevention. Administrative funds are

- matched with CDBG funds that pay for the additional time spent by County staff administering the ESG program.
- Match contribution to HOME-eligible households is provided in-part through three volunteer assistance programs utilizing the value of contributed labor and materials, and through the provision of homebuyer assistance provided by private financial institutions.
- Henrico County also provides support to CDBG, HOME, and ESG funded organizations and others that serve low- and moderate-income individuals. Agencies funded and amount are provided in Appendix F Agencies Provided County General Funds.
- Henrico County provides office space and support services to house the administration of these grants.

Volunteer assistance, in-kind contributions, and direct financial contributions will be provided to subrecipients that will provide direct match to their home repair programs that will be serving in excess of 60 low-income homeowners annually.

If appropriate, describe publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan

Recreation needs and facilities serving low- and moderate-income areas will be met using existing County-owned facilities. Facilities serving populations with special needs are frequently County-owned and used to address many of the needs identified in this plan. Henrico County owns the buildings that are leased to Housing Families (HFF) where the Hilliard House Shelter for families operates, and the HFF administrative offices where rapid rehousing services are provided. County schools, recreation and community centers, libraries, and administrative offices are used for a variety of opportunities to serve citizens with programs meeting needs identified in the Plan. These uses include: public hearings, community meetings, educational classes and workshops, and general program outreach.

The City of Richmond currently owns the real estate at 1900 Cool Lane (owned by the City of Richmond, but located in Henrico County) and is in negotiations with Virginia Supportive Housing to transfer the property to them in order to develop it into 86 units of Supportive Housing. This Plan provides funding for this project.

Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

Funds are allocated based on priorities established in the Five-Year Consolidated Plan, including the need to address issues with the aging housing stock in the County, the need to provide services and facilities for special needs populations, and funding requests received. Over the past several years, an overall downward trend in the HOME entitlement allocation has significantly impacted the ability to address priorities and underserved needs. Acquisition of severely dilapidated, vacant homes has proven challenging. The recent dramatic rise in construction costs has also limited the number of low-income households that can be served. For programs that serve homeless persons, funding is responsive in-part to priorities identified by the Continuum of Care (CoC) and opportunities to fund programs that it is difficult for the CoC to fund.

Description of the geographic areas of the entitlement (including areas of low-income and minority concentration) where assistance will be directed

Henrico County uses all of its CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds to benefit low- and moderate-income people. As a result, CDBG funded activities are located where these people live, receive services, and/or work. Henrico County does not plan for, or allocate, these resources on a racial or ethnic basis.

Henrico offers residential rehabilitation and repair programs for low-income homeowners. Eligibility is based on household income and is available county-wide.

Homebuyer assistance programs are available for anyone who meets the income and eligibility requirements. Housing purchased under these programs can be anywhere in the county.

Housing for sale that is built or rehabilitated with CDBG or HOME funds may be anywhere in Henrico County. Purchasers of these homes must meet income and eligibility guidelines.

The CONNECT Program serves children living in subsidized and low-income multi-family housing. The program operates four locations serving 11 communities: Coventry Gardens (also serving Newbridge Village, Summerdale, Ironwood, Viviana Hall, and Woodpost Townhomes), Henrico Arms (also serving Williamsburg Place), Oakland Village (also serving Woodlands), and Richfield Place.

Programs that provide assistance to businesses create jobs available to low-income persons. Businesses assisted must be located in the Enterprise Zone, which follows commercial corridors and industrial areas throughout Henrico.

Funding will be provided to rehabilitate a former nursing home into a facility providing permanent, supportive housing to formerly homeless individuals. This facility is located in Henrico and will provide services to individuals in the Richmond region.

A facility providing adult day care will receive funds. The facility is located in a low-mod block group in Henrico but provides services to clients throughout the Richmond region. The majority of clients are Henrico residents.

ESG and some CDBG funds will provide financial assistance, case management, and homeless outreach services to homeless persons and households and those facing homelessness. Assistance is given to persons or households who meet the income and eligibility guidelines regardless of where they live or lived in Henrico County. Assistance to those who will be placed in housing will be for housing in any part of the County or metropolitan area that meets the needs of the household.

Henrico County defines areas of minority or racial concentration as those in which 50.1% or more of the population is non-white. The non-white minority population comprises 44.7% of the total county

population, compared to 42.2% non-white population for the entire Richmond Metropolitan Statistical region (Source: 2017 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates). Census tracts with concentrations of minority population (greater than 50% minority) are shown on the map, "Henrico County Minority Concentrations" provided in the Appendix. These areas are generally spread throughout the County, with some higher concentrations in the central third of the County.

The 2015-2019 Five Year Consolidated Community Development Plan identifies priorities based on market analysis, citizen and stakeholder input, and census data. Several priorities also coincide with goals and/or objectives of Henrico County Vision 2026, the County Comprehensive Plan, adopted August 2009. These priorities have resulted in the following allocations for housing activities in PY 2019-20. The target date for the completion of the majority of these activities is September 30, 2022.

- \$121,542 from CDBG and \$506,609 from HOME funds to project:HOMES for the rehabilitation of homes owned by very low- or low-income elderly and/or disabled County homeowners.
- \$571,500 from CDBG funds to project:HOMES for critical home repairs to homes owned by very low- or low-income residents of the County.
- \$25,000 from CDBG funds to Rebuilding Together of Richmond for home repair program.
- \$27,500 from CDBG and \$125,000 from HOME funds to HOME Inc. for down-payment and closing cost assistance for the purchase of homes by low-income, first-time homebuyers.
- \$18,000 from CDBG and \$65,000 from HOME funds to Southside Community Development and Housing Corporation for down-payment and closing cost assistance for the purchase of homes by low-income, first-time homebuyers.
- \$250,000 from CDBG to Virginia Supportive Housing for the development of supportive housing units.
- \$129,000 from HOME CHDO funds for affordable housing development through new construction or acquisition and rehabilitation of vacant homes.
- \$30,000 from CDBG to Commonwealth Catholic Charities for homeless prevention.
- \$14,500 from ESG funds to the YWCA for homeless prevention.
- \$29,940 from ESG funds to Home Again for rapid rehousing.
- \$160,000 from CDBG-CV funds to the Housing Assessment and Transition Support project to transition households using long term stays at hotels into appropriate rentals.
- \$547297 from ESG and ESG-CV funds and \$486 of CDBG-CV to CARITAS, St. Joseph's Villa, and Housing Families First for emergency shelter and/or case management for shelter residents, shelter rehabilitation and rapid rehousing.
- \$143,000 from ESG and ESG-CV funds and \$30,000 of CDBG-CV to Commonwealth Catholic Charities for homeless outreach and diversion.
- \$352,000 from ESG-CV to Homeward for data collection and operating a pandemic response shelter.
- \$27,809 from ESG-CV and \$449,858 from CDBG-CV to Henrico County Social Services for a COVID-19 rental assistance program.
- \$165,000 of ESG-CV to Commonwealth Catholic Charities for operating an Inclement Weather Shelter.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i) Introduction

The County utilizes all of its CDBG, ESG and HOME Program allocations for the benefit of very low- and low-income persons to reduce effects of poverty and assist families to transition into the economic mainstream. The County utilizes CDBG and/or HOME funds in keeping its elderly, very low- and low-income, homeowners in their homes through critical home repairs and housing rehabilitation programs. The County continues to use CDBG and HOME funds for housing repairs and rehabilitation for disabled individuals.

The goals for ESG funding are to reduce the number of individuals/households who become homeless; shorten the length of time an individual or household is homeless; and reduce the number of individuals/households returning to homelessness. The County will meet these goals through supporting Continuum of Care (COC) strategies, homeless services, and prevention programs that align with program goals. Funding will support coordinated community-based activities that are designed to support the goals of the ESG program. Henrico County will use ESG funding for rapid re-housing, homeless prevention, emergency shelter, and street outreach and support services for homeless individuals in a coordinated manner with other service providers, homeless prevention providers, and resources within the County.

As of May 8, 2018, Henrico Area Mental Health & Developmental Services (HAMHDS) had 260 Section 8 housing vouchers under lease; 237 of those vouchers are being used in Henrico County. VHDA is not allowing Henrico to pull from their waiting list to issue vouchers due to anticipated HUD budget cuts. VHDA is currently limiting the search time for vouchers from 120 days to 60 days with case-by-case approval for extensions. HAMHDS has approximately 124 people on their waiting list as of May 8, 2018.

The Central Virginia Resource Corporation reported on May 20, 2019, that they have 1,527 leased families throughout the Richmond metropolitan area and of those 419 are currently leased in Henrico County. When last reported, Richmond Residential Services manages 185 vouchers for adults with intellectual disabilities and through the HUD Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) program. The specific number of these vouchers currently used in Henrico County is not available. Richmond Redevelopment and Housing Authority (RRHA) manages vouchers in the Richmond metropolitan area. According to HUD e-Cart data (https://egis.hud.gov/cart/#), there are a total of 1,881 housing choice vouchers in use in Henrico County. Based on prior year data, 78% of these units are project-based with the remainder as portable vouchers. These numbers are consistent with prior year data provided by the RRHA for portable vouchers in use in Henrico.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The County participates in street outreach which provides individualized assessments and provides services to unsheltered homeless persons. Information gathered during this process is incorporated in the annual homelessness point in time count, coordinated twice a year by Homeward. Henrico

coordinates with a large number of agencies to provide services to homeless individuals and families and provides over \$319,000 annually in financial assistance in the General fund Budget to a number of agencies including:

- Feedmore (Meals on Wheels, Central Virginia Foodbank)
- FISH (Eastern Henrico County)
- Housing Families First/Hilliard House
- Homeward
- Safe Harbor
- Salvation Army
- St. Joseph's Villa Flagler Homeless Services
- CARITAS
- The Healing Place
- YWCA

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The ESG program funds service providers for programs related to Rapid Rehousing, Case Management, Street Outreach and Homeless Prevention. These programs provide short- and medium-term shelter and supportive services to homeless individuals and families while affordable, suitable permanent housing is being sought.

Based on the 2019-20 ESG program year, ESG service providers anticipate assisting 608 households and individuals with homeless prevention services; 10 households with rapid re-housing and street outreach to 50 individuals; provide support service to shelter operations and/or case management benefiting 160 households and individuals.

For the September 22, 2020, amendment, the ESG service providers anticipated assistance changing to reflect the following new estimates. Assist 760 households and individuals with homeless prevention services; 65 households with rapid rehousing; street outreach to 110 individuals; provide support service to shelter operations and/or case management benefiting 473 households and individuals. For the February 9, 2021, amendment, the ESG service providers anticipated assistance changed to reflect the following new estimate: assist 818 households and individuals with homeless prevention.

For the July 13, 2021, amendment, the ESG service providers anticipated assistance change changing to reflect the following new estimates: assist 711 households and individuals with homeless prevention and assist 540 individuals with shelter, supportive services, and outreach.

For the December 14, 2021, amendment, the ESG service providers anticipated assistance changing to reflect the following new estimates: assist 724 households and individuals with homeless prevention and assist 1,145 individuals with shelter, supportive services, and outreach.

For the June 28, 2022, amendment, the ESG service provides anticipated assistance changing to reflect the following new estimates: assist 47 households through rapid rehousing, and 784 households and individuals with homeless prevention.

For the September 2023 amendment, the ESG service providers anticipated ESG-CV assistance changing

to provide additional support to overnight shelter for families. This amendment also incorporated a previous minor budget transfer from September 2022 that swapped money from rapid re-housing to emergency shelter.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The ESG program funds Rapid Rehousing and Homeless Prevention programs which provide short and medium-term rental assistance and supportive services to homeless individuals and families and those at risk of homelessness, so that they can access and maintain affordable, suitable permanent housing.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

For PY 2019-20 Henrico County has allocated ESG funds to organizations that provide services to clientele including homeless persons and persons at risk of homelessness. These organizations, program descriptions and allocations include the following:

- CARITAS Case Management -- \$20,000 to fund a program that will provide case management services to 150 individuals residing in shelters.
- HomeAgain Rapid Rehousing -- \$29,940 to fund a program to provide rapid re-housing for 10 households.
- YWCA -- \$14,500 towards the cost of operating a regional domestic violence hotline. It is estimated that 600 Henrico County residents will benefit from this hotline.
- Housing Families First Hilliard House Emergency Shelter -- \$42,000 to fund a program that provides services to 10 households residing in shelter.
- Commonwealth Catholic Charities -- \$24,000 to fund a program that provides services to 50 persons living in a place not meant for habitation.
- Homeward -- \$2,500 for data collection and assistance is report preparation through the Homeless Management Information System.

The following programs were funded or provided supplemental funding through the ESG-CV and/or CDBG-CV funds. Funds listed below are ESG-CV unless otherwise noted.

 Henrico County Social Services Department -- \$27,809 to fund a program that will provide homelessness prevention through rental assistance to 123 households. \$449,858 of CDBG-CV was provided to assist 278 persons facing homelessness. Henrico Area Mental Health and Development Services will serve 4 persons with rental assistance to prevent homelessness using

\$938 of CDBG-CV.

- OAR of Richmond \$130,000 to assist persons exiting incarceration with costs associated with quarantining or securing housing in order to prevent homelessness. At least 80 individuals served.
- Commonwealth Catholic Charities -- \$89,000 supplemental funds for the homelessness outreach program to assist 150 additional people, \$138,968.44 funds for the operation of an Inclement Weather Shelter, and \$30,000 in funds for outreach focused specifically for individuals experiencing homelessness exiting non-congregate shelters to assist 50 persons. \$30,000 of CDBG-CV for homeless outreach and diversion. \$160,000 of CDBG-CV for a program to assist families living in hotels with obtaining permanent housing.
- CARITAS -- \$240,000 supplemental funds for congregate and non-congregate shelter operations and case management.
- Homeward -- \$539,950 to fund a program that provides non-congregate and family shelters for those affected by homelessness.
- Housing Families First Hilliard House Emergency Shelter -- \$127,811.15 to fund case management and shelter operations, and \$200,000 to fund the rehabilitation of the emergency shelter. \$122,000 to fund a program to provide rapid re-housing to 20 households.
- St. Joseph's Villa Flagler Rapid Rehousing -- \$60,000 to fund a program to provide rapid rehousing to 35 households.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

Introduction:

Despite recent increases in housing costs locally and nationally, much of Henrico County remains an affordable housing market. A large percentage of homes for sale remain affordable for families earning 80% or less than Area Median Income.

As reported in the 2010-2015 Five Year Consolidated Community Development Plan, Henrico has tracked the affordability of its single-family housing, which documented that 74% were affordable in 2001, and following fluctuations during the decade, resulted in a 71% affordability rate in 2010. Also, in 2010, 91% of homes were affordable as workforce housing for families earning 120% of AMI. Looking at housing affordability for low- and moderate-income homeowners, analyses by County staff in 2013, 2015, and 2017 determined in 2013, 66.1% of single-family homes were affordable for households earning up to 80% AMI. That percentage decreased to 55% in early 2017, based on preliminary data, and reflecting 2016 median income data. These numbers do not reflect actual sales indicated actual availability of affordable housing. A more recent analysis has not been completed.

Henrico County has 2,311 housing units supported by project-based vouchers and 5535 units supported by Low Income Housing Tax Credits. For 2019, two additional projects, representing 131 units, approved in 2018 have not yet been constructed. For 2019, 86 new units of supportive housing were identified in the preliminary rankings to receive a tax credit allocation. Henrico County has earmarked \$250,000 of CDBG funds in 2019-20 for this project.

In addition, Section 8 housing choice vouchers, issued by Central Virginia Resource Corporation, Henrico Mental Health and Development Services, the Richmond Redevelopment and Housing Authority, and Richmond Residential Services, are in use by households in Henrico County. Henrico County Public Schools also serves and tracked 1,099 identified McKinney-Vento qualified students as of May 20, 2019, 274 of whom reside in hotels.

In support of housing affordability, Henrico County each year provides CDBG and HOME funding for downpayment and closing cost assistance to enable the purchase of homes to first-time homebuyers.

For the fourth year in a row, the Action Plan provides funding to Housing Opportunities Made Equal of Virginia to undertake outreach to Henrico County residents on Fair Housing rights. This includes participation at community events, advertising on English and foreign language radio, targeted social media ads, and training for county officials coming in contact with populations most likely to experience housing discrimination.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

Specific actions during PY 2019-20 to remove barriers and promote affordable housing include the following:

- Allocation of \$129,000 for CHDO Activities aimed at increasing the supply of affordable housing for low- and moderate-income homeowners or renters.
- Allocation of \$190,000 of HOME and \$45,500 of CDBG for down payment assistance to support first-time low- and moderate-income homebuyers.
- Allocation of a total of \$1,224,651 for rehabilitation and minor repair programs in support of the retention of existing affordable housing.
- Allocation of \$2,342,429 of County General Funds to the Community Maintenance and Building Inspection Programs that includes the administration of a volunteer housing assistance program designed to improve the housing conditions of low-income County homeowners and a program of facilitating the maintenance of affordable housing communities.
- Lowest real estate tax rate of the 13 largest jurisdictions in Virginia.
- Real Estate Advantage Program (REAP) provides real estate tax exemption for qualified seniors totaling an estimated savings of \$9,000,000 in FY20 to qualified seniors.
- Tax abatement for single-family and multi-family housing rehabilitation.
- Henrico County is in the process of a comprehensive review of the County Zoning Ordinance. This review will include modifications that address issues inhibiting the development of affordable infill housing in older neighborhoods.

AP-85 Other Actions – 91.220(k)

Introduction:

Henrico County undertakes a variety of actions to meet underserved needs, foster and maintain affordable housing, reduce lead-based paint, reduce the number of poverty level families, and enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. These actions are part of the administrative culture of the County and will continue through PY 2019-20. Despite annual unpredictable variations in federal entitlement funds, the County will maintain a focus on the most critical needs in these areas.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

While there are several constraints to meeting the needs of low-, very low-, and moderate-income residents, the primary obstacle is the lack of funding to fully address all needs in light of rising costs and unpredictable federal resources. In response to the level of need, the County continues to provide local funding to nonprofits.

The County continues to administer Housing Choice Vouchers, provide homeless prevention services and assistance for County residents, and continues on a County-wide basis to encourage economic development leading to job growth, much of which is targeted to very low-, low-, and moderate-income persons. The County also encourages all types of residential development and has been supportive of the use of low-income housing tax credits for the rehabilitation of multi-family housing for low- and moderate-income persons.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

During PY 2019-20, Henrico County will commit a total of \$1,224,651 for homeowner rehabilitation and repair for 71 low- and moderate-income households, the majority of which will be elderly householders.

An additional \$129,000 will be committed for the acquisition, rehabilitation, and sale of vacant homes to low- and very low-income first-time homebuyers. The County is providing \$235,500 in homebuyer assistance and education to 22 first-time low/mod homebuyers.

The Community Maintenance Program (funded through the General Fund) includes the administration of a volunteer housing assistance program designed to improve the housing conditions of low-income County homeowners and a program of facilitating the maintenance of affordable housing communities.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

The County budgets an additional \$5,000 above the maximum \$45,000 per unit cost for moderate rehabilitation to address potential lead-based paint abatement.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The Commercial Assistance Program facilitates development and expansion of businesses to create jobs

available to low- and moderate-income persons as well as persons in poverty.

The County will continue to support appropriate activities that preserve and expand the supply of housing that is affordable to low-income households. This will include support for applications for low-income housing tax credits for the rehabilitation of existing multi-family units, providing housing opportunities for low-and moderate-income persons.

The CONNECT Program provides after-school mentoring and tutoring to improve educational achievement (a significant factor in determining future income) for children residing in low-income housing communities. The County has committed \$171,500 of CDBG funds towards this program in PY 2019-20.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The County also has a designated staff position to administer the programs and activities funded with CDBG funds and a HOME Program Manager to administer the programs and activities funded with HOME and ESG funds. Staff works with the individual County departments such as Public Works, Social Services, Recreation and Parks, Mental Health, Planning, Human Resources, Public Utilities, Building Inspections, and the Division of Community Maintenance to develop procedures and coordination for administering programs that will be carried out by these divisions. Staff regularly tracks the production and effectiveness of all agencies, including subrecipients, tasked with implementing programs with CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds. Adjustments are regularly made as needed.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

CDBG, HOME, and ESG staff will continue to participate in monthly meetings with County social services agencies, bi-monthly meetings with non-profit housing providers, and regular interactions with housing agencies, advocacy groups, and other County agencies.

By accepting ESG funds Henrico County agrees to administer the funds in accordance with the Henrico County Emergency Solutions Grant Manual and HUD ESG regulations. The Henrico County Emergency Solutions Grant Manual was last revised in June 2017 and includes descriptions of ESG regulatory requirements, written standards for ESG subrecipients, internal procedures for submitting and processing payments, and forms and checklists for use by subrecipients. The Manual is available from the Henrico County Department of Community Revitalization.

The community has had a centralized point of entry into the shelter system since 2004. It is called Housing Crisis Line, is run by HOMEWARD, and provides screening and assessment for shelter assistance. All households seeking shelter are assessed using the Richmond Housing Barrier Assessment, which is a tool that has been designed to identify demographic information and service needs. Most agencies use the form since their receipt of state funding requires the use of that barrier assessment tool.

2. Identify the process for making sub-awards and describe how the ESG allocation available to private nonprofit organizations (including community and faith-based organizations).

The County and the Greater Richmond CoC actively encourage new applicants to apply for funds. The County meets with all interested applicants about the funding process and local priorities. All applicants are encouraged to participate in the Greater Richmond CoC and work to address gaps in service. The County solicits applications from all qualified service providers and makes them aware of funding through various notification letters, phone calls, emails and information. Funding applications and instructions are posted on the County's website.

3. If the jurisdiction is unable to meet the homeless participation requirement in 24 CFR 576.405(a), the jurisdiction must specify its plan for reaching out to and consulting with homeless or formerly homeless individuals in considering policies and funding decisions regarding facilities and services funded under ESG.

The County has met the requirements of 24 CFR 576.405(a) by participating in and seeking input from the Greater Richmond CoC's Ranking Committee regarding gaps in service and gained input that was applied in the funding decisions. The Ranking Committee membership includes a homeless or formerly homeless person.

The Performance Measurement Committee of the Greater Richmond Continuum of Care developed detailed performance measures for each program type. The GRCoC system project and performance measures were approved by the Greater Richmond Continuum of Care (GRCoC) Board in January 2017. The performance measures address 7 issues in two categories "coordinated entry" and "system and project." With the exception of providers primarily serving survivors of domestic violence, all programs use HMIS to collect data and monitor program outcomes.



Appendix E - Henrico County Recapture Provision

Henrico County Recapture Provision for the Use of HOME Program Funds

The County of Henrico uses the Recapture Provision when HOME program funds are used to provide homebuyer assistance or to undertake rehabilitation of owner-occupied single-family homes. This is intended to ensure homes remain the buyer's or homeowner-occupant's principal residence throughout the applicable affordability period. The following table outlines the affordability periods.

Amount of HOME Investment	Length of the Affordability Period
Under \$15,000	5 years
\$15,000 to \$40,000	10 years
Over \$40,000	15 years

REDUCTION DURING AFFORDABILITY PERIOD:

If the homebuyer or homeowner occupies the property as his/her principal place of residence for a period of time less than the applicable affordability period, then the amount of the Direct HOME Subsidy subject to recapture will be reduced on a pro-rated basis for each full year that the homeowner or homebuyer owned and occupied the property, as described below. If the recapture provision is triggered by a sale of the property, Henrico County will recapture the pro-rated amount from the net proceeds available from the sale.

The "Direct HOME Subsidy" is defined as the amount of HOME assistance provided to the homebuyer towards the purchase of the property or for rehabilitation projects not involving acquisition, the amount of HOME assistance provided to the homeowner-occupant towards the cost of the rehabilitation work undertaken on the property. Direct HOME Subsidy includes down-payment, closing costs or other HOME assistance provided directly to the homebuyer or for rehabilitation projects, the cost paid for construction benefitting the homeowner-occupant.

The pro-rated HOME Investment recaptured and returned to Henrico County is calculated as follows:

- Divide the number of full years the homebuyer occupied the home by the period of affordability.
 When HOME funds were used for rehabilitation not involving acquisition, divide the number of
 years the homeowner occupied the home following completion of the rehabilitation (the date of
 completion means the date of the applicable Deed of Trust Note) by the period of affordability.
- Multiply the resulting figure by the total amount of Direct HOME Subsidy originally provided to the homebuyer or homeowner. This is the amount forgiven.
- Subtract the forgiven amount from the total amount of Direct HOME Subsidy.
 - o Example:

Mr. Smith received a \$12,000 downpayment assistance grant. This required an affordability period of 5 years. He sold the home after 3 years and 7 months and moved out. He therefore resided in the home for 3 full years. 3 years / 5 years = 0.6; $0.6 \times 12,000 = 7,200$: 12,000 - 7,200 = 4,800, which is the amount recaptured.

In the event of foreclosure or other involuntary sale, the recaptured HOME investment is prorated as described above.

When the recapture provision is triggered by a sale of the property, under no circumstances will Henrico County recapture more than is available from the Net Proceeds of the sale. "Net Proceeds" is defined as the sales price minus primary loan balance (other than HOME funds) and any closing costs.

DUE ON SALE; ACCELERATION:

If all or any part of the property, or interest therein, is leased, sold or otherwise transferred by the homebuyer or homeowner during the applicable affordability period, excluding the granting of a lien subordination or by rights of survivorship, all sums secured are immediately due and payable to Henrico County, except as provided above.

SUBORDINATION:

The lien for HOME funds shall be in no worse than second position.

REFINANCING:

The County of Henrico may agree to subordinate an existing lien associated with HOME funds to new debt in order to protect its interests and in the best interest of the homeowner. Refinancing is limited to circumstances in which any one of the following occurs:

- The homeowner must be securing better terms that reduce monthly housing costs.
- The new interest rate must be fixed for the life of the loan (no balloon or ARM loans).
- Cash equity withdrawn may only be used for emergency property repairs or catastrophic expenses upon approval by Henrico County.

In the event refinancing does not meet one of the circumstances described above, Henrico County will not agree to subordination.

ENFORCEMENT:

Recapture provisions shall be enforced through contractual agreements between Henrico County, its subrecipients (or CHDOs), and the homebuyer or homeowner-occupant(s). Subrecipients (or CHDOs) will be responsible for securing the recapture provision for the Direct HOME Subsidy provided by obtaining a promissory Note from the homebuyer or homeowner and recording a Deed of Trust with a term that runs concurrently with the affordability period. Prior to disbursement, Henrico County and its subrecipients (or CHDOs) enter a signed homebuyer (or in the case of rehabilitation not involving acquisition, an authorization and release) agreement, wherein the recapture provisions are disclosed, and the homebuyer or homeowner acknowledges receipt of the recapture provisions.

Summary of Citizen Participation Process and Citizen Participation Comments CARES Act CDBG-CV and ESG-CV Funding

The County of Henrico Citizen Participation Plan (CPP) was amended to accommodate a shorter time period for public review and comment pursuant to the waivers provided by HUD for the CARES Act funds, and to accommodate virtual public hearings. 



Justin Crawford, Budget Division Director, highlighted the FY 2024-25 budget. He explained the budget was built with four pillars in mind: the people who serve, the people we serve, the businesses we serve, and the fiscal discipline required to provide the best service at the lowest tax burden to our residents and community. Mr. Crawford continued by noting the real estate tax remains the same, and the budget will continue to allocate the lion's share of resources to our highest priorities: education and public safety, with nearly \$75 million of the general fund budget growth dedicated to these two areas. Noting employees are essential to every service provided by the County, the budget includes a 4.8% salary increase for all employees and a nearly \$17 million for adjustments where the County is experiencing critical employee shortages.

EXCEPTION: In accordance with the CARES Act, the certification in this paragraph does not apply with respect to CARES Act funding that is used to provide temporary emergency shelters (through leasing of existing property, temporary structures, or other means) to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus.

**Renovation** – Any renovation carried out with ESG assistance shall be sufficient to ensure that the building involved is safe and sanitary.

**Supportive Services** – The jurisdiction will assist homeless individuals in obtaining permanent housing, appropriate supportive services (including medical and mental health treatment, victim services, counseling, supervision, and other services essential for achieving independent living), and other Federal State, local, and private assistance available for such individuals.

Matching Funds - The jurisdiction will obtain matching amounts required under 24 CFR 576.201.

Confidentiality – The jurisdiction has established and is implementing procedures to ensure the confidentiality of records pertaining to any individual provided family violence prevention or treatment services under any project assisted under the ESG program, including protection against the release of the address or location of any family violence shelter project, except with

the written authorization of the person responsible for the operation of that shelter.

**Homeless Persons Involvement** – To the maximum extent practicable, the jurisdiction will involve, through employment, volunteer services, or otherwise, homeless individuals and families in constructing, renovating, maintaining, and operating facilities assisted under the ESG program, in providing services assisted under the ESG program, and in providing services for occupants of facilities assisted under the program.

**Consolidated Plan** – All activities the jurisdiction undertakes with assistance under ESG are consistent with the jurisdiction's consolidated plan.

**Discharge Policy** – The jurisdiction will establish and implement, to the maximum extent practicable and where appropriate policies and protocols for the discharge of persons from publicly funded institutions or systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care or other youth facilities, or correction programs and institutions) in order to prevent this discharge from immediately resulting in homelessness for these persons.
