
Henrico's Historical Sites

- 1. The _____ Museum was dedicated in 1970 to a creative leader in education.
- 2. This structure reflects a new era of dairy farming after the development of pasteurization. Today the building serves as a recreation center.
- 3. A luxury hotel which housed 150 rooms and stood six stories high on 1,000 acres.
- 4. The Henrico ______ built in 1938 and was constructed of poured concrete and brick. Today it hosts second-run movies and live performances.
- Now known as the Confederate Hills Recreation Center, this building originally served as a meeting place for the Club of Richmond.
- 6. This house was constructed in 1810 and continues to host tours year-round.
- This farm, formerly known as Locust Grove, was home to the family from 1849 until 1972.
- 8. This tavern is a 19th century brick structure and one of the oldest taverns in Henrico County.
- 9. This one-room school for African Americans likely received its name after the nearby Springfield mines.
