

White Oak Quercus alba Native to every county in Virginia

- -Can grow to be 100 feet tall
- -Has the potential to live for centuries
- -Host plant to many butterflies and moths including Banded Hairstreak and White-M Hairstreak

Virginia Creeper Parthenocissus quinquefolia Native to every county in Virginia

- -Known to prevent erosion and protect watersheds
- -Member of the grape family
- -Can cause allergic reaction similar to poison ivy
- -Host plant to several species of sphinx moths

Orange Jewelweed Impatiens capensis Native to every county in Virginia

- Another common name of this plant is spotted touch-me-not
- -Blooms from July to October
- -Attracts hummingbirds, bees, and butterflies

Common Milkweed Asclepias syriaca Native to every county in Virginia

- -Named after the latex, found in their stems, leaves and pods.
- -Produces high quality nectar and relies on a variety of pollinators for its reproduction
- -Host plant to the Monarch Butterfly
