What are Implicit Biases?

- The word *implicit* means, "Implied or understood, though not directly expressed. Contained in the nature of something, though not readily expressed."*
- The word bias is defined as, "A preference or an inclination, especially one that inhibits impartial judgment. An unfair act or policy stemming from prejudice."*
- Implicit biases are part of human nature. We all possess them.
- Implicit biases facilitate prejudices that are not based on facts but instead are based on false assumptions.
- Implicit biases also affect how we relate to others based on those false assumptions.
- The Police Division is taking a stand to help its employees recognize, understand, and overcome implicit biases.
- Every employee will attend training designed to overcome implicit biases and thus ensure fair and impartial policing for all.




Fair and Impartial Policing (FIP)

Goals of Fair and Impartial Policing:


- Provide officer and civilian employee training that helps our employees recognize and understand their own implicit biases, which all humans possess
