Dr. Donald F. Runion, Jr., Senior Pastor, Mount Vernon Baptist Church provided the invocation.

## MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Henrico Police Explorer Post #608 was one of many law enforcement Explorer posts from Virginia, Tennessee, and South Carolina to converge on Goose Creek, South Carolina July 7 – 13, 2008 to compete at the South Carolina State Explorers Conference. Post #608 Explorers Caleb Fields and Ariel Ruffin won first place in the *Arrest Warrant* competition, while Explorers Gabe Stewart and Elijah Bane placed first in the *Drug Search Warrant* competition. Also, during the week of July 21 – 26, 2008, Post #608 traveled to Fort Collins, Colorado for the biennial National Law Enforcement Exploring Conference. Post #608 Explorers Ariel Ruffin, Caleb Fields, Gabe Stewart, Stephen Beasley, and Zach Brooks participated with over 3,000 other Explorers from across the United States in various law enforcement related events and earned a second place trophy in the *Shoot-Don't Shoot* competition. Law Enforcement Exploring is a program of Learning for Life, a subsidiary of the Boy Scouts of America, which offers career opportunities, leadership experience, life skills, service learning, and character education to young adults ages 14 to 21. ## PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

284-08 Resolution – Amendment to the FY 2008-09 Annual Fiscal Plan to (1) Reappropriate Funds for (a) Continuing Grant Programs and (b) Certain Unencumbered Balances from FY 2007-08, and (2) Appropriate Funds for Certain New Programs.

> Mrs. O'Bannon clarified that the radio system funded through the Public Safety Interoperable Communications grant is for the Richmond region and not the Richmond Regional Planning District Commission. Gene Walter, Management and Budget Division Director, confirmed for Mr. Kaechele that the item on page 37 of the budget amendments addressing 12 Social Services positions in the County's personnel complement was for informational purposes only and would not require additional funding. In response to a question from Mr. Donati, Mr. Hazelett advised that the budget amendment on page 19 for Henrico History Book was for a reprint of Dr. Louis Manarin's book. In response to a question from Mr. Thornton, Mr. Hazelett stated that written information on the Maggie L. Walker Governor's School could be provided to the Board. Mr. Thornton suggested that maybe there could be some suggestions for future improvements to how the school is functioning. In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Walter acknowledged that funding for the new Fire Medic Unit at Station #22 would include a new ambulance and Mr. Hazelett anticipated that this vehicle would become operational in June 2009 once the EMS personnel have come on line and received training. In response to another question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Walter stated that the special revenue fund item for the Short Pump Community Development Authority represents the final appropriation for the Short Pump Town Center. He confirmed that sales have been doing well there.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this resolution.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved Agenda Item No. 284-08 – see attached Resolution.

285-08 Resolution – Appeal - POD-03-08 - Third Presbyterian Church Addition.

Mrs. O'Bannon commented that she has served on the State Building Code Technical Review Board for the past 12 years. She briefly explained the responsibilities of the Review Board and said she has learned during her service on the Review Board that there is always something that comes up in any appeals case that was not heard the first time around. She asked the other members of the Board of Supervisors to keep an open mind on this case and listen carefully for new information.

Joe Emerson, Director of Planning, briefly explained the Plan of Development (POD) process. He then addressed the case before the Board by reviewing the area plan for the site; the proposed two-and-a-half-story, 46,268 square foot addition to the existing church; community meetings held earlier in the year after

the POD was originally submitted in January 2008 where a variety of citizen concerns were discussed; a history of improvements to the site, including a variance granted to the church in 1997 allowing for off-site parking; and parking requirements generally applicable to churches and those specifically applicable to this case. Mr. Emerson concluded his comments by elaborating on and responding to the three major assertions contained in the appeal filed on behalf of adjoining property owners Doug and Miriam Tice, which he summarized as follows: the church expansion failed to meet requirements imposed by Section 24-96(a) of the County's zoning ordinance, which contains the parking requirements; reliance on the off-street parking variance was improper; and the failure of a necessary applicant to join in the POD application.

In response to questions from Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Emerson explained that conditions no. 32 and 33 were placed on the case to ensure that adequate parking was provided to cover the uses on site. He explained that staff will ensure that all parking spaces required by the Planning Commission's approval of the POD are provided and that County inspectors will continue to respond to citizen complaints or concerns about church parking. In response to further questions from Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Emerson stated that the Planning Commission found there is sufficient parking on two adjacent lots and the variance lot to accommodate two concurrent services at the church. He confirmed for Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Kaechele that there are parking spaces available to the church in unstructured, offsite parking areas in the vicinity of the church and that the Planning Commission's conditions contained in a letter are enforceable.

Tom O'Brien, an attorney with Spotts Fain representing Doug and Miriam Tice residing at 701 Silverspring Drive in the Tuckahoe District, presented the appeal he filed with the County on July 8, 2008. He cited the grounds for the appeal as follows: the POD failed to meet the off-site parking requirements of Section 24-96(a) of the County Code, failed to meet the requirements of providing parking on the premises to be served (on-site parking), and not all of the property owners signed the POD application. Mr. O'Brien commented that the extensive testimony presented by residents of Spottswood Park subdivision at the Planning Commission's June 25, 2008 public hearing on the POD focused on current parking problems as well as additional problems that would be faced with the church's expansion. After stating that the Planning Commission's approval of the POD seemed capricious on its face, Mr. O'Brien referred to parking concerns, elaborated at length on what he termed the legal deficiencies of the POD, and disputed Mr. Emerson's interpretation of the parking requirements in the County's zoning ordinance. In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. O'Brien contended that off-site parking on the other side of Forest Avenue and at other business establishments in the area should not count towards the County's parking He complimented Mr. Emerson and the County's Planning requirements. Department staff on the excellent job they do but said that in this case, in his view, Mr. Emerson had misconstrued the parking requirements of the zoning ordinance as they pertain to the church and also what is required of Third Presbyterian

Church. Mr. O'Brien then formally submitted an appeal of the decision of the Director of Planning (see enclosed copy) and asserted that the Board of Supervisors no longer had the power to hear the appeal of this POD. He explained his reasoning for this assertion.

In response to comments and questions from Mr. Kaechele and Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Rapisarda suggested that he provide legal counsel to the Board in a closed meeting after the appellants finished submitting all of their information and all public comments were received by the Board from representatives of the church and any citizens wishing to speak. He stated he did not think that the Tices and Mr. O'Brien after filing the appeal could now suggest that the Board is deprived of authority to hear the matter and decide it. Mr. Rapisarda acknowledged that the appellants could proceed with the Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA) and in the courts should they receive an adverse decision from the Board. In response to another question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Rapisarda advised that under the County's zoning ordinance the Board was obliged to rule on the matter at this meeting unless the POD applicant consented to another extension of the deadline.

Mr. O'Brien concluded by countering that no provision of the County's ordinance trumps State enabling legislation. In response to comments and questions by Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Kaechele, Mr. O'Brien contended that any action of the Board on this matter would have to wait until the appeal of the Planning Director's decision ran its course and confirmed that this new appeal was addressing the interpretation of the ordinance by the Planning Director rather than the POD itself. Mr. Hazelett pointed out that this was an advertised public hearing and that it was the Board's responsibility as a legislative body to proceed with the hearing. He and Mr. O'Brien discussed the timing of the filing of the appeal of Mr. Emerson's decision. In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Rapisarda noted that there were myriad possibilities as to how the BZA and Circuit Court could rule on this latest appeal. He opined that this appeal was not duly filed on this date because it was filed after the County's offices closed at 4:30 p.m. Mr. O'Brien countered that he thought the appeal was legally filed on this date since the County's Zoning Administrator (Planning Director) was present at the hearing on official County business. In response to further comments and questions from Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Rapisarda reiterated that it was important to let the neighbors and church representative address the Board and let this proceeding come to its conclusion. He agreed that Mr. O'Brien had identified the issue but noted that the question was whose interpretation was correct. Mr. Rapisarda also stated that he did not feel that the County's ordinance and State law were inconsistent in this case.

Mr. Kaechele opened the public hearing and the following persons spoke in support of the appeal:

- Miriam Tice responded to an earlier question from Mrs. O'Bannon by stating that she had a letter from the County indicating that there was no agreement between the church and Tuckahoe Elementary School allowing the church's parishioners to park at the school.
- Ken Dickinson, a resident of 8009 Silverspring Drive, spoke to the previous PODs and variance pertaining to expansion of the church and alluded to a problem with church parking on Sunday mornings that he said has persisted in creating a traffic nightmare since he moved into the neighborhood in 1993.

The following representative of the church spoke in defense of the POD Approval:

Bruce Kay, a representative of Third Presbyterian Church as a courtappointed trustee and a managing member of 607 Silverspring LLC, briefly explained why expansion of the church was necessary and referred to the church's efforts to work with the County and the neighborhood during the POD process. He stated that the church would consent to whatever the County needed in order for the Board to be comfortable in its decision. In response to questions from Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Kay said that the church was prepared to comply with the rules as defined by the County, that the church had invested significant sums of money to address off-site drainage issues that have nothing to do with the church, that the church had received one written agreement and additional oral agreements from nearby property owners and businesses to allow parking on their premises on Sundays by members of the church, that the church's parking lot is open to persons attending activities at Tuckahoe Elementary School, and that the church has a police officer on duty on Sundays to assist with traffic safety. In response to questions from Mr. Kaechele and Mr. Donati, Mr. Kay explained how the church has been trying to discourage members from parking on Silverspring Drive, and that contrary to the neighbors' opinions, in his opinion the parking problem only occurs on Sundays. Mrs. O'Bannon commented that she had spoken with some business owners in the area who indicated they had not been asked if their property could be used for church parking and she felt it was incumbent upon the church to write them a note or talk to them for the purpose of seeking their approval. Mr. Kay clarified for Mr. Kaechele that the church has an officer on duty on Sunday mornings across from the elementary school.

The following persons also spoke in support of the appeal:

• Doug Tice commented on problems with parking in the neighborhood during daytime services on Wednesdays, contended that church members were totally disregarding any church requests not to park on

Silverspring Drive, mentioned how the church's structure and activities impacted his home next door, and remarked that the church had been absolutely unwilling to negotiate with the neighborhood.

• Angie Gilson, a resident of 706 Silverspring Drive, remarked that the church's written agreement with the property owner at 8010 Ridge Road was for only 29 of the 230 commercial spaces that the church uses for off-site parking and that a recent Wednesday Bible study at the church resulted in 42 cars being parked on Silverspring Drive.

At the conclusion of the public hearing, Mr. Emerson and Mr. Rapisarda responded to a number of questions and comments from members of the Board. In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Emerson expressed confidence in staff's interpretation of the code. In response to a suggestion and query from Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Rapisarda advised her that the Board could add a condition to the POD such as prohibiting concurrent church services to assist with the parking issue on Sundays. Mr. Glover questioned whether amending condition no. 33 to prohibit concurrent services could set a precedent for the future and expressed discomfort about the Board stepping into that area. Mr. Emerson clarified for Mr. Donati that church parking is based on the number of fixed seats in the sanctuary and confirmed that a number of County businesses have shared off-site parking He confirmed for Mr. Glover that the church could correct the agreements. hypothetical technical deficiencies in the POD claimed by Mr. O'Brien by resubmitting a POD with the proper signed agreements and finding three additional on-site parking spaces. Mr. Emerson advised Mr. Thornton that he believes the County's existing zoning ordinance has sufficient built-in flexibility to address parking issues arising from changing church demographics Mr. Rapisarda and Mr. Emerson advised Mr. Glover that the Board could defer a decision on the appeal with the church's consent in order to allow the applicant an opportunity to address the hypothetical technical deficiencies claimed by the appellants but that this would likely not satisfy the claims as there would still be differing legal interpretations between the appellants and the County. Mrs. O'Bannon stated that she would like to see condition no. 33 modified to prohibit concurring church services. Mr. Emerson clarified for Mr. Kaechele that in his opinion the property owned by the church satisfies the parking requirements of the County's zoning ordinance and condition by the Planning Commission and that additional parking sites listed by the church on its web site are simply to satisfy demand.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Glover, the Board approved going into a Closed Meeting at 9:22 p.m. for the following purpose:

Consultation with the County Attorney regarding specific legal matters requiring the provision of legal advice pertaining to the appeal of the plan of development for Third Presbyterian Church, pursuant to Section 2.2-3711(A)(7) of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

Mr. Kaechele announced that the Board would not hear any more testimony on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Donati, seconded by Mr. Glover, with Mrs. O'Bannon voting "No," the Board approved Agenda Item No. 285-08 – see attached Resolution.

Mrs. O'Bannon stated that she simply felt that the previous matter could have been worked out with the concurrence of both the church and the neighbors to a better resolution although it may not have been the total resolution everyone wanted.

286-08 Resolution – Authorizing and providing for the issuance of not to exceed ninety-five million eight hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$95,850,000) principal amount of general obligation public improvement bonds of Henrico County, Virginia, for the purpose of providing funds to finance certain school capital improvements, fire stations and facilities, recreation and parks facilities improvements, and road projects in the county; fixing the form, denomination and certain other details of such bonds; approving the sale of such bonds; approving the form of and distribution of a preliminary official statement in connection with the sale of such bonds; and approving other actions with respect to the issuance and sale of such bonds; and ratifying certain acts and proceedings.

287-08 Resolution – Award of Annual Contract for Engineering Services for Drainage Projects.

In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Director of Public Works Lee Priestas clarified that this resolution would award a one-year contract that could be renewed and that compensation for services performed under the contract would not exceed \$1.5 million in a single year or \$300,000 for any single project.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Donati, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved Agenda Item No. 287-08 – see attached Resolution.

288-08 Resolution – Ending Local Emergency Declared September 5, 2008.

Mr. Hazelett confirmed for Mr. Kaechele that this resolution was a technicality and that the emergency had already ended.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved Agenda Item No. 288-08 – see attached Resolution.

WHEREAS, customer service is an ever-changing process that is a critical part of the success of any organization, especially local government; and

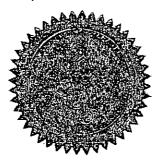
WHEREAS, the County of Henrico is continually attempting to ensure that customer service remains an integral part of our employees' daily lives; and

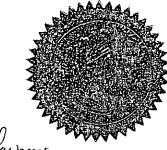

WHEREAS, there are many houses, buildings, and sites of historic, archaeological, and architectural value that are an important part of the cultural heritage of the County; and

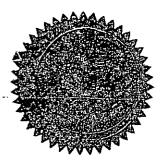

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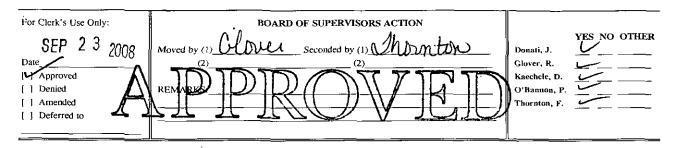

### EXHIBIT A Appeal of a Decision of the Director of Planning

Specific order, requirement, decision or determination of the Director of Planning to be appealed:

The appellant is appealing the decisions and determinations that have been made by the Director of Planning in regard to the applicable parking requirements governing the proposed expansion of the Third Presbyterian Church as proposed in POD-03-08. Specifically, the appellant challenges the Director of Planning's determination and decision that the owner of the property is not required to provide parking for <u>each and every use</u> proposed on the property, including areas designated as "Multi-Purpose", "Class"[rooms], "Nursery", "Office" and/or "Music Suite" and the other areas which should be construed as "assembly areas without fixed seats" pursuant to Section 24-96 (a) of the Henrico County Code of Ordinances.

Appellant also appeals the Director of Planning's determination and decision that the parking spaces located on the "South Lot" as referenced in POD-3-08, which is south of and across Silverspring Drive from the Church, can be used to satisfy the parking requirements applicable to the expansion of the Church.

# How was the appellant aggrieved (or injured) by that order, requirement, decision or determination?

The appellant, as an adjacent property owner, is aggrieved in that the determinations and decisions of the Director of Planning will allow a more intensive use on the adjacent property than is otherwise allowed by the Henrico County Zoning Ordinance and/or the Virginia Code. Consequently, the proposed use, and the lack of adequate and required parking, will detrimentally affect the surrounding property owners, including the appellant.

# Basis of the appeal (Did the director make a mistake of fact, or apply an erroneous principle of law?)

The Director of Planning failed to adequately interpret and/or apply the appropriate local ordinance and state statutory requirements. Specifically, the Director of Planning failed to impose the necessary requirements established by Section 24-96(a) of the Henrico County Zoning Ordinance which requires that adequate off-street parking shall be provided in connection with each and every use on the premises.

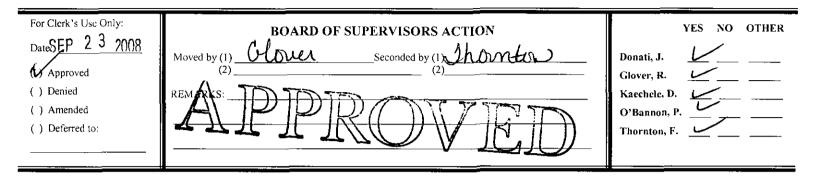
Additionally, the Director of Planning has erred in his interpretation of local and state code by determining that the parking spaces located on the "South Lot" as referenced in POD-3-08, which is south of and across Silverspring Drive from the Church, can be used to satisfy the parking requirements applicable to the expansion of the Church. These spaces are "off-site" and are not "on the premises to be served" as required by Section 24-96 (a) of the Henrico County Code of Ordinances. Moreover, the variance granted by the Henrico County Board of Zoning Appeals (the "BZA") in Case #A-118-97 does not allow the County to count these parking

spaces by virtue of the nature of the underlying variance request, as well as the application of Section 15.2-2309(2) of the Code of Virginia (1950), as amended. The Director of Planning has erred in determining that no new parking variance would be required in connection with the proposed expansion.

The Bonds shall be numbered from R-1 upwards in order of issuance and shall have such other series designation as shall be determined by the Director of Finance; shall mature in such years and in such amounts in each year as shall be determined by the Director of Finance; and shall bear interest, calculated on the basis of a 360-day year comprised of twelve 30-day months, at such rate or rates per annum as shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of Section 8, such interest to be payable semiannually; provided the first interest payment date may be any date within one (1) year from the date of the Bonds as determined by the Director of Finance. The Director of Finance is authorized to determine, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of this Resolution: the date or dates of the Bonds; the interest payment dates thereof; the maturity dates thereof; the amount of principal maturing on each maturity date; and whether or not the Bonds shall be subject to redemption prior to their stated maturity or maturities and if subject to such redemption, the premiums, if any, payable upon such redemption and the respective periods in which such premiums are payable.

If the Bonds are subject to redemption and if any Bonds (or portions (b)thereof in installments of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof) are to be redeemed, notice of such redemption specifying the date, numbers and maturity or maturities of the Bond or Bonds to be redeemed, the date and place or places fixed for their redemption, the premium, if any, payable upon such redemption and, if less than the entire principal amount of a Bond called for redemption is to be redeemed, that such Bond must be surrendered in exchange for payment of the principal amount thereof to be redeemed and the issuance of a new Bond or Bonds equalling in principal amount that portion of the principal amount of such Bond not to be redeemed, shall be mailed not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption, by first class mail, postage prepaid, to the registered owner of such Bond at his address as it appears on the books of registry kept by the Registrar (as hereinafter defined) as of the close of business on the forty-fifth (45th) day next preceding the date fixed for redemption. If any Bond shall have been called for redemption and notice thereof shall have been given as hereinabove set forth, and payment of the principal amount of such Bond (or of the principal amount thereof to be redeemed) and of the accrued interest and premium, if any, payable upon such redemption shall have been duly made or provided for, interest on such Bond (or on the principal amount thereof to be redeemed) shall cease to accrue from and after the date so specified for the redemption thereof. So long as the Bonds are in book-entry only form, any notice of redemption shall be given only to The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), or to its nominee. The County shall not be responsible for providing any beneficial owner of the Bonds any notice of redemption.

SECTION 3. The full faith and credit of the County are irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds as the same become due. In each year while the Bonds, or any of them, are outstanding and unpaid, the Board of Supervisors is authorized and required to levy and collect annually, at the same time and in the same manner as other taxes of the County are assessed, levied and collected, a tax upon all taxable property within the County, over and above all other taxes, authorized or limited by law and without limitation as to rate or amount, sufficient to pay when due the principal of and premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds to the extent other funds of the County are not lawfully available and appropriated for such purpose.

SECTION 4. (a) The Bonds shall be executed, for and on behalf of the County, by the manual or facsimile signature of the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors and shall have a facsimile of the corporate seal of the Board of Supervisors imprinted thereon, attested by the manual or facsimile signature of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors.

(b) The Director of Finance is hereby appointed as the Registrar and Paying Agent for the Bonds (the "Registrar"). No Bond shall be valid or obligatory for any purpose unless and until the certificate of authentication endorsed on such Bond shall have been manually executed by an authorized officer of the Registrar. Upon the authentication of any Bonds the Registrar shall insert in the certificate of authentication the date as of which such Bonds are authenticated as follows: (i) if the Bond is authenticated prior to the first interest payment date, the certificate shall be dated as of the date of the initial issuance and delivery of the Bonds of the series of Bonds of which such Bond is one, (ii) if the Bond is authenticated upon an interest payment date, the certificate shall be dated as of such interest payment date, (iii) if the Bond is authenticated after the fifteenth (15th) day of the calendar month next preceding an interest payment date and prior to such interest payment date, the certificate shall be dated as of such interest payment date as of such interest payment date and (iv) in all other instances the certificate shall be dated as of the interest payment date next preceding the date upon which the Bond is authenticated.

(c) The execution and authentication of the Bonds in the manner above set forth is adopted as a due and sufficient authentication of the Bonds.

SECTION 5. (a) The principal of the Bonds shall be payable upon presentation and surrender thereof, at the office of the Registrar. Interest on the Bonds shall be payable by check mailed by the Registrar to the registered owners of such Bonds at their respective addresses as such addresses appear on the books of registry kept pursuant to this Section 5. The principal of and premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds shall be payable in such coin or currency of the United States of America as at the respective dates of payment is legal tender for public and private debts.

(b) At all times during which any Bond of any series remains outstanding and unpaid, the Registrar shall keep or cause to be kept at its office books of registry for the registration, exchange and transfer of Bonds of such series. Upon presentation at its office for such purpose, the Registrar, under such reasonable regulations as it may prescribe, shall register, exchange or transfer, or cause to be registered, exchanged or transferred, on the books of registry the Bonds as hereinbefore set forth.

(c) Any Bond may be exchanged at the office of the Registrar for such series of Bonds for a like aggregate principal amount of such Bonds in other authorized principal sums of the same series, interest rate and maturity.

(d) Any Bond of any series may, in accordance with its terms, be transferred upon the books of registry by the person in whose name it is registered, in person or by his duly authorized agent, upon surrender of such Bond to the Registrar for cancellation, accompanied by a written instrument of transfer duly executed by the registered owner in person or by his duly authorized attorney, in form satisfactory to the Registrar.

(e) All transfers or exchanges pursuant to this Section 5 shall be made without expense to the registered owner of such Bonds, except as otherwise herein provided, and except that the Registrar shall require the payment by the registered owner of the Bond requesting such transfer or exchange of any tax or other governmental charges required to be paid with respect to such transfer or exchange. All Bonds surrendered pursuant to this Section 5 shall be cancelled.

(f) (i) The Bonds shall be issued in full book-entry form. One Bond representing each maturity of the Bonds will be issued to and registered in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of DTC, as registered owner of the Bonds and each such Bond will be immobilized in the custody of DTC. DTC will act as securities depository for the Bonds. Individual purchases will be made in book-entry form only, in the principal amount of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. Purchasers will not receive physical delivery of certificates representing their interest in the Bonds purchased.

(ii) Principal, premium and interest payments on the Bonds will be made by the Registrar to DTC or its nominee, Cede & Co., as registered owner of the Bonds, which will in turn remit such payments to DTC participants for subsequent disbursal to the beneficial owners of the Bonds. Transfers of principal and interest payments to DTC participants will be the responsibility of DTC. Transfers of such payments to beneficial owners of the Bonds by DTC participants will be the responsibility of such participants and other nominees of such beneficial owners. Transfers of ownership interests in the Bonds will be accomplished by book entries made by DTC and, in turn, by DTC participants who act on behalf of the indirect participants of DTC and the beneficial owners of the Bonds.

(iii) The County will not be responsible or liable for sending transaction statements or for maintaining, supervising or reviewing records maintained by DTC, its participants or persons acting through such participants or for transmitting payments to, communicating with, notifying or otherwise dealing with any beneficial owner of the Bonds.

SECTION 6. (a) CUSIP identification numbers may be printed on the Bonds, but no such number shall constitute a part of the contract evidenced by the particular Bond upon which it is printed; no liability shall attach to the County or any officer or agent thereof (including any paying agent for the Bonds) by reason of such numbers or any use made thereof (including any use thereof made by the County, any such officer or any such agent) or by reason of any inaccuracy, error or omission with respect thereto or in such use; and any inaccuracy, error or omission with respect to such numbers shall not constitute cause for failure or refusal by a purchaser of the Bonds to accept delivery of and pay for such Bonds. All expenses in connection with the assignment and printing of CUSIP numbers on the Bonds shall be paid by the initial purchasers of the Bonds.

(b) A copy of the final legal opinion with respect to the Bonds, with the name of the attorney or attorneys rendering the same, together with a certification of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, executed by a facsimile signature of that officer, to the effect that such copy is a true and complete copy (except for letterhead and date) of the legal opinion which was dated as of the date of delivery of and payment for the Bonds, may be printed on the Bonds.

SECTION 7. The County covenants and agrees to comply with the provisions of Sections 103 and 141-150 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 and the applicable Treasury Regulations promulgated thereunder throughout the term of the Bonds.

SECTION 8. The Bonds shall be sold in one or more series in accordance with the provisions of Section 2 at competitive or negotiated sale at not less than ninety-eight percent (98%) of the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest thereon from their date to the date of delivery thereof and payment therefor, and on such other terms and conditions as are provided in the Notice of Sale thereof or in the Purchase Contract relating thereto.

If the Bonds are sold at competitive sale, they may be sold contemporaneously with other bonds of the County under a combined Notice of Sale. If the Bonds are sold at competitive sale, the Director of Finance is hereby authorized to cause to be published and distributed a Notice of Sale of the Bonds in such form and containing such terms and conditions as the Director of Finance may deem advisable, subject to the provisions hereof. In lieu of publishing the full text of the Notice of Sale in accordance with the provisions of the immediately preceding sentence, the Director of Finance is hereby authorized to cause a Summary Notice of Sale in such form as the Director of Finance shall approve to be published in *The Bond Buyer* on a date selected by the Director of Finance.

Upon the determination by the Director of Finance to sell the Bonds at competitive or negotiated sale, the Director of Finance is hereby authorized, without further notice to or action by the Board of Supervisors, to determine the rates of interest the Bonds shall bear; *provided, however*, in no event shall the true interest cost for the Bonds exceed eight percent (8%) and *provided further* in no event shall the premium payable by the County upon the redemption of the Bonds exceed two percent (2%) of the principal amount thereof.

If the Bonds are sold at negotiated sale, the Director of Finance is hereby authorized, without further notice to or action by the Board of Supervisors, to select the underwriters for the Bonds (the "Underwriters") and to execute and deliver to the Underwriters a Bond Purchase Contract or Forward Delivery Agreement relating to the Bonds.

The Director of Finance is hereby authorized to cause to be prepared and distributed a Preliminary Official Statement and a final Official Statement relating to the Bonds. The Director of Finance is hereby further authorized to certify that the Preliminary Official Statement for the Bonds of each series authorized hereunder is "deemed final" for purposes of Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities Exchange Act of 1934. The County Manager and the Director of Finance are hereby authorized to execute and deliver the final Official Statement for the Bonds of each series authorized hereunder, and the County Manager, the Director of Finance and the County Attorney are hereby authorized to execute and deliver to the purchasers of the Bonds of each series certificates in the forms provided for in the Official Statement for the Bonds of such series.

The Director of Finance is hereby further authorized to execute and deliver to the purchasers of the Bonds of each series authorized hereunder a Continuing Disclosure Certificate or a Continuing Disclosure Agreement evidencing the County's undertaking to comply with the continuing disclosure requirements of Paragraph (b)(5) of such Rule 15c2-12 to the extent

applicable to the Bonds, such Continuing Disclosure Certificate or Continuing Disclosure Agreement to be in such form as shall be approved by the Director of Finance upon the advice of counsel (including the County Attorney or Bond Counsel to the County), such approval to be conclusively evidenced by his execution of such Continuing Disclosure Certificate or Continuing Disclosure Agreement.

SECTION 9. The Bonds, the certificate of authentication of the Registrar and the assignment endorsed on the Bonds shall be in substantially the form set forth in Exhibit A, with such necessary or appropriate variations, omissions, and insertions as are incidental to their numbers, interest rates, and maturities, or as are otherwise permitted or required by law or this Resolution.

SECTION 10. The County Attorney is hereby directed to file a copy of this Resolution, certified by the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors to be a true copy hereof, with the Circuit Court of the County.

SECTION 11. All resolutions and proceedings in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, repealed.

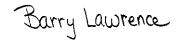

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## EXHIBIT "A" RESCINDMENT OF DECLARATION OF LOCAL EMERGENCY

I, the undersigned, as the County Manager of Henrico County, Virginia, in response to the effects of Tropical Storm Hanna Henrico County on September 5-6, 2008, which posed a threat to the property and the health, safety, and welfare of persons in Henrico County and in order to ensure that County agencies could enlist the necessary resources to respond quickly and effectively to these conditions, declared, pursuant to Virginia Code \$44-146.21(a), the existence of a Local Emergency in Henrico County on September 5, 2008 at 3:00pm.

As of September 9, 2008, due to the passing of Tropical Storm Hanna in addition to the cooperative efforts of the numerous County utilities agencies, and numerous other volunteer organizations and individuals conditions which led to this emergency declaration, the conditions which warranted the local emergency declaration have been resolved and the effects of the emergency have diminished.
