# COUNTY OF HENRICO, VIRGINIA BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING April 13, 2010

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a regular meeting on Tuesday, April 13, 2010 at 6:00 p.m. in the Board Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico County, Virginia.

Mrs. O'Bannon called the meeting to order at 6:05 p.m.

Mrs. O'Bannon led recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Rev. C. Diane Mosby, Pastor, Anointed New Life Baptist Church, delivered the invocation.

### PUBLIC HEARING

90-10 Resolution - Adoption of Operating and Capital Annual Fiscal Plans For Fiscal Year 2010-11 and Allocation of Car Tax Relief for Tax Year 2010.

Mr. Hazelett presented the FY 2010-11 proposed annual fiscal plan and noted that copies of the budget document and *Budget in Brief* packet were available for citizens in the audience. He characterized this budget as the most difficult he had prepared during his 18 years as County Manager and cited three goals that were used in creating the budget – no tax rate increase, no reduction in service levels, and the avoidance of layoffs. Mr. Hazelett pointed to significant revenue

challenges and efficiencies that had to be realized to achieve a balanced budget. He stated that the proposed budget would continue to meet all fixed costs while maintaining current service levels, fund the operating costs of new facilities in FY 2010-11, fully meet the operating funding request of the Henrico County School Board, meet the County's FY 2010-11 debt service obligations, and look forward to FY 2011-12 and beyond as well as fund certain new facilities costs. Mr. Hazelett reviewed the proposed operating budget, including the general fund and department highlights, and also reviewed the FY 2010 through FY 2014-15 capital improvement program and FY 2010-11 proposed capital budget. He concluded his presentation by referring to the long and exhaustive effort on this budget and the fantastic job of staff in preparing it. Mrs. O'Bannon noted that the Board had previously spent an entire week going over the proposed budget line by line.

During the public hearing on this item, the following speakers thanked the Board for continuing to provide funding for their agencies – Jason Young, Executive Director of the Community Futures Foundation that operates the Mill House; Melissa Phillips, a member of the Board of Directors for FeedMore, the umbrella organization for Meals on Wheels and the Central Virginia Foodbank; Felix Sarfo-Kantanka, Jr., a member of the Board of Directors for Senior Connections; and Carol Holmquist, Executive Director of The Read Center. Mr. Young and Ms. Holmquist responded to questions from the Board.

Kathy D. Liamidis and Waneta J. Grignol, representatives of Parents for Community Based Services, thanked the Board for continuing to fund supported employment services for Henrico special education students leaving school.

Scott Mistr, a representative of the Varina District New School Task Force, requested that the proposed eastern area high school be included for funding in the County's next bond referendum. Deanna Parker, a parent of two elementaryaged students in the Varina District, also expressed support for a new eastern area high school and asked the Board to consider using Virginia Public School Authority bonds as an alternative for funding construction of the school.

Karol Akers, a resident of the Tuckahoe District, questioned how the County can reduce its budget without reducing the level or quality of the services it provides to its citizens. She asked the Board to eliminate funding for items that it is not legally required to provide such as donations to charitable organizations. Mr. Thornton commented on and expressed concern regarding Ms. Akers' comments.

William Spencer, a resident of the Three Chopt District, offered prayers for the Board and favorably commented on the County and its school system.

Frances Nicole Gardner, a student at Varina High School, asked about the status of renovations planned for her school and voiced concerns regarding the condition of the school's facilities and use of trailers for classrooms. Mr. Hazelett

responded to her question and comments.

Deborah Moore Gardner, a parent of students in the Varina District, reiterated remarks made by other speakers in support of a new eastern area high school.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mr. Donati, and by unanimous vote, the Board deferred this item to the April 27, 2010 meeting - see attached resolution.

The Board recessed at 7:32 p.m. and reconvened at 7:43 p.m.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Donati, the Board approved the minutes of the March 23, 2010 Regular and Special Meetings.

She asked Mr. Hazelett to comment on this issue and he assured the public that every address in Henrico County will be properly counted by census tract.

## PUBLIC HEARINGS - REZONING CASE AND PROVISIONAL USE PERMIT

92-10 C-31C-09 Varina White Oak Crossing Acquisition, LLC: Request to conditionally rezone from A-1 Agricultural District, R-5 General Residence District and M-1 Light Industrial District to R-5C General Residence District (Conditional) and M-1C Light Industrial District (Conditional), Parcels 811-719-8863, 812-719-1130, 811-718-1589 and part of Parcel 813-720-9405, containing approximately 30.9 acres, located at the northwest intersection of S. Laburnum Avenue and Interstate 64, south of the Southern Railway right-of-way.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to a deferral.

On motion of Mr. Donati, seconded by Mr. Kaechele, the Board deferred this item to May 11, 2010.

91-10 P-3-10 Tuckahoe West End Farmers' Market: Request to amend Conditions 1, 3, and 5 approved with Provisional Use Permit P-4-09, on Parcels 732-751-4078, -0561 and 731-751-8088 located at the southwest intersection of Ridgefield Parkway and Gayton Road.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this case.

Mrs. O'Bannon commented favorably on the case.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Kaechele, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The farmers' market shall not operate outside of the following parameters:
  - a) Market season beginning the last Saturday in April, and ending the 2<sup>nd</sup> Saturday in December;
  - b) Market days maximum of two days per week, only on Wednesdays and Saturdays;
  - c) Hours of operation -
    - <u>Regular season</u> (beginning of market season thru 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday in September)
      - Wednesdays (3:00 pm 7:00 pm)
      - Saturdays (8:00 am 12:00 noon);
    - <u>Mid season</u> (after 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday in September thru last Wednesday in October)
      - Wednesdays (3:00 pm 6:00 pm)
      - Saturdays (8:00 am 12:00 noon);
    - <u>Late season</u> (after last Wednesday in October thru end of market season)
      - Wednesdays (market closed, except for holiday market)
      - Saturdays (8:00 am 12:00 noon, except for holiday market);
    - <u>Two holiday markets</u> (4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of November and 1<sup>st</sup> Saturday of December, or 2<sup>nd</sup> Saturday of December in case of rainout)
      - Wednesday and Saturday (10:00 am 4:00 pm).

- 2. The farmers' market shall be no greater than 13,600 square feet in size and shall be located on the site as shown in Exhibit A (see case file). All market-related services shall take place only within this market boundary.
- 3. Market operations shall abide by all rules and regulations set forth in Exhibit C, entitled "West End Farmers Market Rules & Regulations" and dated February 22, 2010 (see case file).
- 4. The applicant shall designate a Market Manager to be in charge of the farmers' market operations, including vendor selection and implementation of the conditions of this permit. The Market Manager shall be responsible for ensuring market compliance with all applicable local, state and federal regulations.
- 5. Other than temporary stands for vendors or the Market Manager, no structures or tents shall be erected on the property. All tents shall be solid in color, and neither text nor logo displays shall be permitted on any tent or similar temporary structure. No later than one hour after the closing of each market, any stands shall be removed from the site and the subject parcels shall be completely cleared of all market-related items and debris.
- 6. No sales or outside storage shall be permitted except in designated vendor spaces during market hours.
- 7. Vehicles shall not be permitted on the grass area of the parcel identified as GPIN 732-751-4078 for any reason.
- 8. Trash receptacles shall be provided and properly serviced to control litter generated by this use.
- 9. Generators, portable toilets, outside live music performances, or use of public address systems (including megaphones) shall not be permitted on the site.
- 10. On-site food preparation and distribution of prepared meals shall not be permitted.
- 11. The sale or consumption of alcohol shall be prohibited.
- 12. The operation of the farmers' market shall not cause loitering, criminal assaults, public nuisance, or unsafe conditions for the adjacent area.
- 13. Except for one temporary banner or board sign for market identification (no greater than 25 square feet in size), any other signage or attention-getting devices related to the market shall be

prohibited. Temporary individual vendor signage shall be permitted, but it shall not be attached to vendor tents, shall only be placed to face the interior of the market sales area, and must be removed at the close of each market.

- 14. Prior to each season, the Market Manager shall submit any necessary Plan of Development (POD) revisions to the Department of Planning for approval. The POD shall delineate the vendor sales areas, specific landscaping information for the proposed perimeter hedge, and details of any temporary tent structures, pedestrian walkways, drive aisles, and parking areas for the site. The perimeter of the vendor area shall be clearly defined by a barrier to discourage unauthorized access into the vendor area and to provide safe and orderly pedestrian access to and from the market.
- 15. This Provisional Use Permit shall expire on December 31, 2012. The Director of Planning shall review the operation of the farmers' market at the end of each market season to ensure compliance with the conditions imposed with this Provisional Use Permit. If the Director finds, based upon his review, that the permit holder has failed to comply with any of the conditions or that the operation of the outdoor farmers' market is having a deleterious effect on the surrounding area, then the Director shall initiate a show cause hearing on revocation of the permit pursuant to the provisions of Section 24-122.1(b) of the County Code.

### **PUBLIC HEARING - OTHER ITEMS**

93-10 Resolution - POD-10-10 - Approval of a Plan of Development for Dumbarton Elementary School Addition.

Leslie News, Principal Planner for Development Review and Design, responded to questions from the Board.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this proposed plan of development (POD).

Mr. Glover thanked staff from the Planning Department and school system for addressing a long overdue need at Dumbarton Elementary School.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mr. Kaechele, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

94-10 Resolution - Condemnation - Right-of-Way and Easements - North Gayton Road Extension Project - Emily Leake Waller - Three Chopt District.

Andy Condlin of Williams Mullen, representing Emily Leake Waller, addressed the Board during the public hearing. He expressed concerns about the responsiveness of the private parties representing the County in this public-private partnership, used slides to depict the uniqueness of Ms. Leake Waller's property and the impact of the project on her property, and stated the case that the appraisal amounts offered to the various property owners in the area have been inconsistent. Mr. Condlin presented for the record a copy of his March 18, 2010 letter to Ken Flint of AECOM detailing Ms. Leake Waller's concerns with the appraisal of her property. He said that he and Ms. Leake Waller felt that a vote to condemn her property was premature so they were requesting a deferral. Should the Board move forward with this resolution, however, Mr. Condlin hoped that the County would become more involved in the process and look very seriously at these issues.

Mr. Kaechele acknowledged the impact and concerns of this taking of property but pointed out the necessity of keeping the project moving forward and on track. He expressed the Board's sorrow for any shortcomings or inconsistencies that may have occurred and also expressed the Board's desire to be fair. Mr. Hazelett assured the Board and Mr. Condlin that the County would continue to be fully involved in the condemnation from the time the Board indicated it wished to proceed and would attempt to resolve this matter with Ms. Leake Waller to her satisfaction if possible before going to court. There was further discussion by Mr. Condlin, Mr. Kaechele, and Mr. Hazelett. Mr. Tracy noted that staff would be meeting with Mr. Condlin soon to address concerns stated in Mr. Condlin's letter to AECOM. He and Mr. Rapisarda responded to questions and comments from the Board pertaining to how the proposed condemnation of Ms. Leake Waller's property would impact her participation in the County's land use taxation program. There was also discussion by Mr. Tracy and the Board regarding offers made on adjoining properties. Mr. Hazelett commented on the difficulty of the process but assured the Board that staff would make every effort to provide information to Ms. Leake Waller and treat her and other property owners fairly. He responded to another question from the Board concerning the timeframe of the condemnation process.

On motion of Mr. Kaechele, seconded by Mr. Glover, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

95-10 Resolution - Condemnation - Easements - North Gayton Road Extension Project - Timothy Willis and Rae M. Willis - Three Chopt District.

Jon Tracy, Director of Real Property, noted that Rae M. Willis is employed by the County's Real Property Department. He further noted that his staff was working towards a settlement with Mr. and Mrs. Willis. Mr. Rapisarda confirmed that a settlement agreement with these property owners would need to come before the Board for approval as a requirement of the State and Local Government Conflicts of Interest Act because Ms. Willis is a County employee.

There was brief discussion by Mr. Kaechele and Mr. Hazelett regarding the settlement process.

Tim Willis addressed the Board during the public hearing. He commented that the settlement involving his property was not yet complete because the private firm responsible for the acquisition of right-of-way for this public-private partnership project (AECOM) was not thorough and had not answered all of his questions. Mr. Hazelett responded to questions and concerns from the Board regarding AECOM's role in property acquisition for this project and the manner in which property owners have been treated by that contractor. Mr. Hazelett assured the Board that the County will hold meetings with the contractor and reach an understanding of the County's expectations.

On motion of Mr. Kaechele, seconded by Mr. Glover, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

96-10 Ordinance - Vacation of Lot Lines and Unimproved Portion of Alley - Sunset Heights - Varina District.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this ordinance.

On motion of Mr. Donati, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached ordinance.

### **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

Artie Waller, a resident of the Varina District, requested the County's assistance in locating the owner of an adjoining parcel of property so that the owner can be contacted about removing pine trees that could potentially damage her property. She responded to several questions from Mrs. O'Bannon. There was discussion by Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Donati, and Mr. Hazelett pertaining to how the County can assist Ms. Waller in this civil matter between two private property owners. Mr. Hazelett advised Ms. Waller that the County would try to obtain more information on the adjoining property and then get back in touch with her.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the funds included in the Operating and Capital Annual Fiscal Plans for any County department, office, or agency may be used as participating funds in any Federal or State aid program for like purpose upon appropriation by the Board of Supervisors; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board declines to receive any salary increase for 2011 and the salary schedule attached hereto for Boards and Commissions and Unscheduled Salaries effective at the beginning of the 2010-11 fiscal year, hereby is approved; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the approved Operating Annual Fiscal Plan for fiscal year 2010-11 includes a decrease in the personnel complement of 72.5 positions for general government and a decrease of 45.0 positions for schools; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that in order to implement changes to the Personal Property Tax Relief Act of 1998 (the "PPTRA") made by legislation adopted by the Virginia General Assembly:

- 1. Any qualifying vehicle, as defined in the PPTRA, sitused within the County commencing January 1, 2010, shall receive personal property tax relief in the following manner:
  - a. Qualifying vehicles valued at \$1,000 or less shall receive 100% tax relief;
  - b. Qualifying vehicles valued at between \$1,001 to \$20,000 shall receive 65 % tax relief;
  - c. Qualifying vehicles valued at \$20,001 or more shall receive 65% tax relief on the first \$20,000 of value only; and
  - d. All other vehicles which do not meet the definition of "qualifying vehicles" will not receive any form of tax relief under the PPTRA.
- 2. The amount of tax relief shall be a specific dollar amount offset against the total personal property taxes that would otherwise be due on a qualifying vehicle but for the PPTRA. The specific dollar amount of relief shall be shown on the tax bill for each qualifying vehicle, together with a general description of the criteria upon which relief has been allocated.

COMMENTS:

This Board Paper should be considered on April 13, 2010, but should be deferred until Tuesday April 27, 2010, to comply with Virginia Code Section 15.2-2506, which states that "The hearing shall be held at least seven days prior to the approval of the budget...." The Director of Finance recommends approval of this Board Paper and the County Manager concurs.

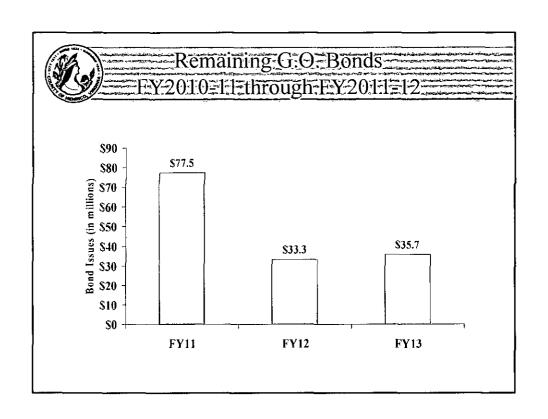




# FY2010-11 Proposed Capital Budget

- In the current economic climate, the balance between available resources and competing priorities, has become extremely difficult.
- The proposed FY2010-11 capital budget assumes the issuance of \$77.5 million in General Obligation Bonds that were originally scheduled for FY2009-10.
- Debt service costs have been reduced by nearly \$6.0 million in FY2010-11 from bond refundings.
- Debt service costs from new issuance will impact FY2011-12 budget.





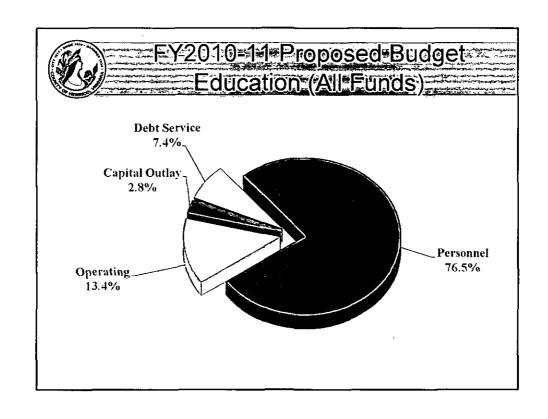

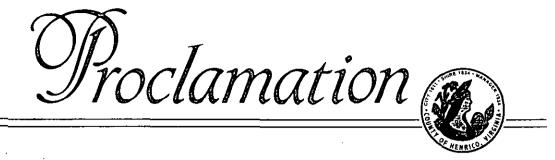

- 1. The Director of Public Utilities shall approve the construction plans for public water and sewer prior to beginning any construction of these utilities. The Department of Public Utilities shall be notified at least 24 hours prior to the start of any County water or sewer construction.
- 2. The parking lot shall be subject to the requirements of Section 24-98 of the Henrico County Code.
- 3. The parking spaces shall be marked on the pavement surface with four-inch wide white painted traffic lines. All lane lines and parking lines shall be white in color with the exception that those dividing traffic shall be yellow.
- 4. Sufficient, effective usable parking shall be provided. If experience indicates the need, additional parking shall be provided.
- 5. Curb and gutter and necessary storm sewer shall be constructed as shown on approved plans.
- 6. The plan of development shall be revised as annotated on the staff plan dated April 13, 2010, which shall be as much a part of this approval as if its details were fully described herein. Eight (8) sets of revised plans, including the detailed drainage, erosion control and utility plans shall be submitted by the design engineer who prepared the plans to the Department of Planning for final review. Upon notice from the Department of Planning that all comments have been addressed, twenty-one (21) sets of final plans for signature shall be submitted to the Department of Planning for approval signatures.
- 7. The Department of Public Works shall be notified at least 24 hours prior to the start of any construction.
- 8. Two copies of an Erosion and Sediment Control Agreement shall be submitted to the Department of Public Works. Approval is required prior to construction plan approval and beginning construction.
- 9. A detailed landscaping plan shall be submitted to the Department of Planning for review and approval prior to the issuance of any occupancy permits.
- 10. All ground cover and landscaping shall be properly maintained in a healthy condition at all times. Dead plant materials shall be removed within a reasonable time and replaced during the normal planting season.
- 11. Prior to the approval of an electrical permit application and installation of the site lighting equipment, a plan including light spread and intensity diagrams and fixture specifications and mounting height details shall be submitted for Department of Planning review and approval.
- 12. All exterior lighting shall be designed and arranged to direct the light and glare away from nearby residential property and streets.
- 13. The site including the parking areas shall be kept clean of litter and debris on a daily basis. Trash container units/litter receptacles and recycling containers shall be maintained with scheduled regular pickups and shall be screened properly on all four sides. The gate(s) shall remain closed except when the receptacle(s) are being filled or serviced and shall be repaired or replaced as necessary. Details shall be included with the final site plan or required landscape plan review and approval.
- 14. Required fire lanes shall be marked and maintained in accordance with the Virginia Statewide Fire Prevention Code.

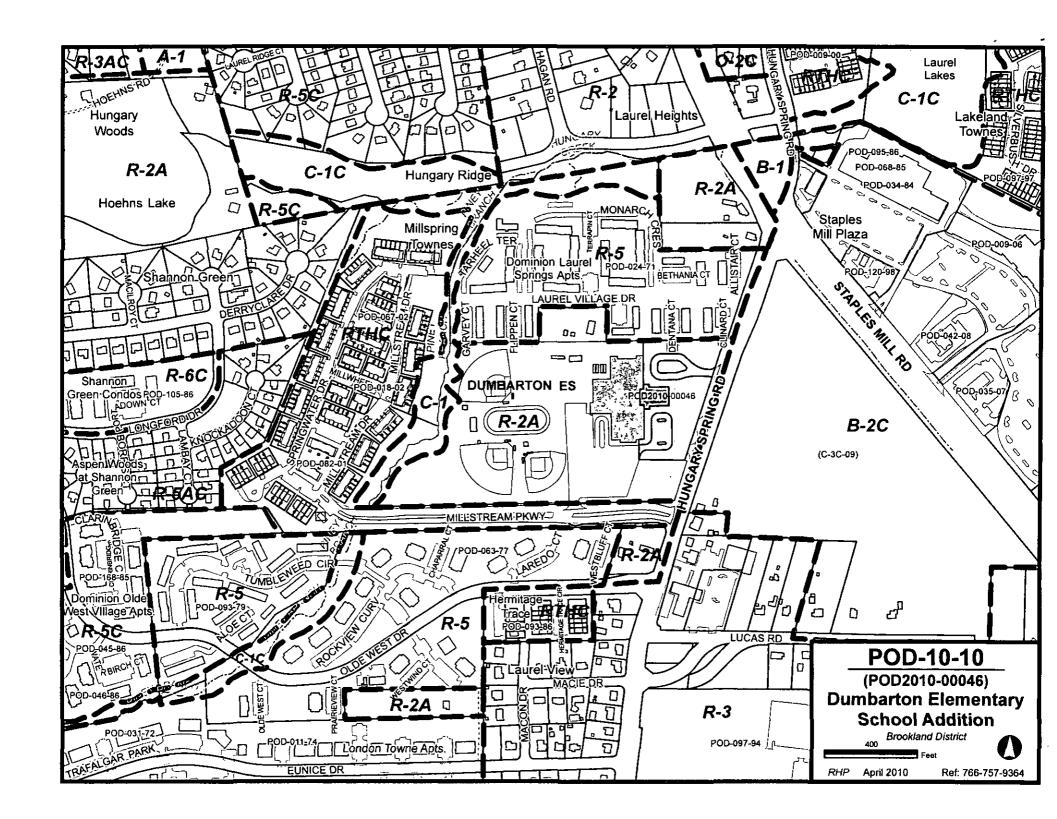

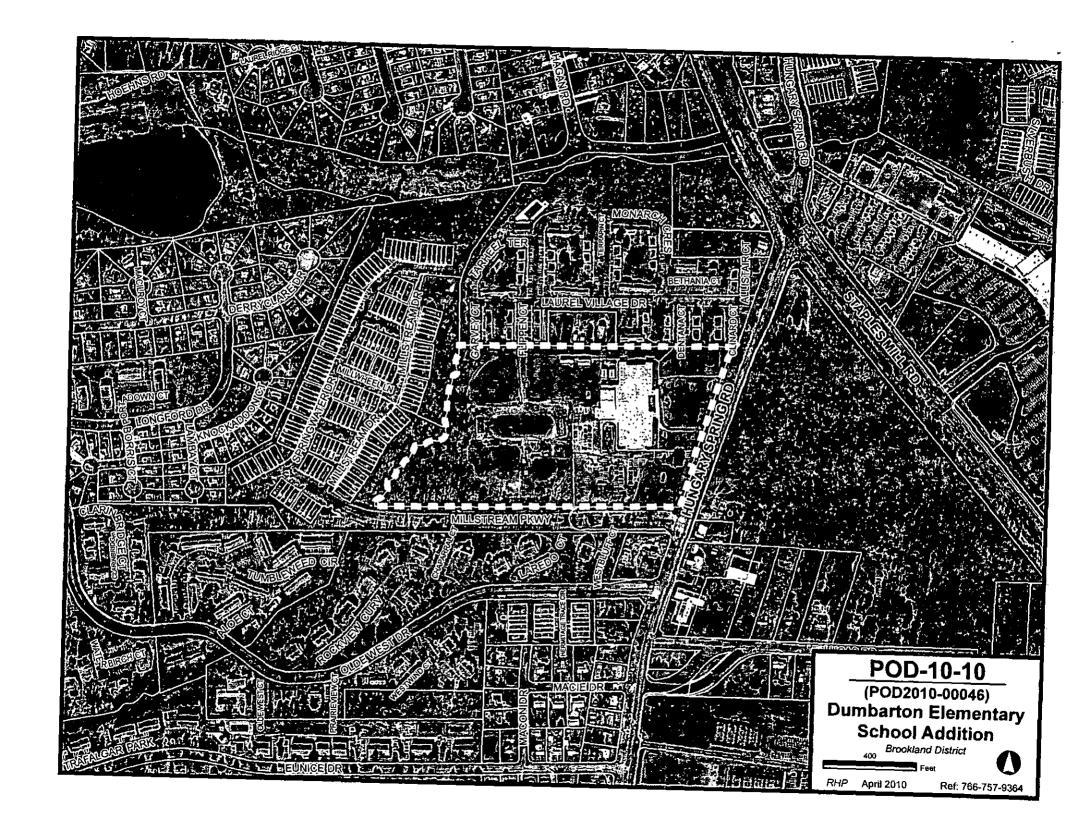

- 15. Traffic control signs shall be provided as indicated on the Planning staff plan. All signs shall be fabricated as shown in <u>The National Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways</u> and <u>The Virginia Supplement to The Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways</u>.
- 16. The assigned property number shall be displayed so it is easily readable from the street. If assistance is needed with the address, please contact the Department of Planning at 501-4284. The Planning Department must assign all property addresses.
- 17. The contractor shall have a set of plans approved by the Director of Public Works, Director of Public Utilities and the County Manager available at the site at all times when work is being performed. A designated responsible employee shall be available for contact by County inspectors.
- 18. The property shall be developed generally as shown on the plan filed with the case and no major changes or additions to the layout shall be made without the approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- 19. Upon completion of the improvements and prior to the certification of the permanent occupancy permit, the engineer or land surveyor who prepared the POD plan shall furnish a statement to the effect that all construction, including water and sewer is in conformance with the regulations and requirements of the POD.
- 20. The developer shall provide fire hydrants as required by the Department of Public Utilities and Division of Fire
- 21. Insurance Service Offices (ISO) calculations should be included on the final construction plans for approval by the Department of Public Utilities prior to issuance of a building permit.
- 22. Any necessary offsite drainage easements must be obtained in a form acceptable to the County Attorney prior to final approval of the construction plans by the Department of Public Works.
- 23. Deviations from County standards for pavement, curb, or curb and gutter design shall be approved by the County Engineer prior to final approval of the construction plans by the Department of Public Works.
- 24. Vehicles shall be parked only in approved and constructed parking spaces.
- 25. The construction shall be properly coordinated to ensure that safe access, circulation and adequate parking is provided for the facility. A plan to indicate the phasing of improvements and the handling of traffic (construction and employees) shall be submitted to the Department of Planning prior to the issuance of a building permit.
- 26. The easements for drainage and utilities as shown on approved plans shall be granted to the County in a form acceptable to the County Attorney prior to any occupancy permits being issued. The easement plats and any other required information shall be submitted to the County Real Property Agent at least sixty (60) days prior to requesting occupancy permits.
- 27. Approval of the construction plans by the Department of Public Works does not establish the curb and gutter elevations along the Henrico County maintained right-of-way. The elevations will be set by Henrico County.

COMMENTS: The Director of Planning has reviewed the plans submitted by Timmons Group and SHW Group and recommends approval, and the County Manager concurs.

Dear Ken:

As I believe you are aware, I represent Ms. Waller and am assisting her in this phase of the potential condemnation of her property located on Kain Road. We have seen the offer presented to Ms. Waller, including the appraisal provided in your package to her (the "Offer"). We have a number of questions and comments regarding the Offer presented to Ms. Waller, which I have outlined below. Ms. Waller is in no way looking for anything other than what she believes is due her as a result of the damages to be caused to her property because of the North Gayton Road extension (the "Project"). It should come as no surprise that really any amount of payment will not adequately compensate her for her loss. Further, we are not necessarily in the best position to provide answers to many of the questions, yet Ms. Waller is put in the position of having to find many of the answers that have not otherwise been provided to her. We honestly have done as much as we can, but are giving the best estimate as is available to us to determine the damages resulting from the Project. I would categorize our issues into two categories: those items for which we disagree with the Offer or resulting conclusion provided; and second, those items that we do not believe were addressed by the Offer.

I realize AECOM is under pressure to continue the acquisition of property in support of the Project, but this is Ms. Waller's home for she and her daughter. This is where Ms. Waller grew up. Beyond the emotional issues related to losing part of your home, this is a particularly impactful project. The proposed road and permanent easement are splitting her property, coming within 6.23 feet of her home, there is a pond that will be drained with no guarantee of being returned to its prior state or re-stocked, a loss of much of her best farm land, and, as described by the appraisal, an almost entire loss of the actual value of her house located on the property. I would say that no homeowner in this entire area is impacted as much by this Project than Ms.

Waller. Gathering the right information is very important to her and I think it is only reasonable to ask that AECOM and the County wait to take further action until all of the questions below are answered and you respond to our position on the various issues below.

Finally, there is a real frustration by Ms. Waller that anyone with authority to negotiate for AECOM or the County has yet to contact Ms. Waller. I know you and Ms. Waller discussed dealing with her directly. It can still be done that way, but I would appreciate any further communications with Ms. Waller be presented to me as well. I need to be kept up to date so that I can advise Ms. Waller of the best steps to take for the benefit of her property during this phase of the process.

Please find below our comments on the Package:

#### Driveway:

- The location of the new driveway for Ms. Waller has moved from N. Gayton Road to Kain Road. This is appreciated, but the new alignment destroys much of the rear yard and takes out a shed and one of three shade trees in the rear yard. It simply is unacceptable.
- I understand you should have received by now a new proposed layout for the driveway. This new alignment is designed to retain as much of the backyard as possible, as it is the last remaining usable area around the house after the road comes through. It also connects with the back of the existing parking area so Ms. Waller can continue to have use of her garage/shed. This new location will also protect the existing drainfield on the property. Please confirm your acceptance of this new alignment for the driveway.
- Another issue with respect to the driveway is the use of the driveway during
  construction. We would like to make sure that upon completion of the driveway,
  the temporary construction easement, with respect to the driveway, shall expire,
  subject to repair and correction obligations. For the safety of Ms. Waller and her
  daughter, they don't want contractors to be able to use the driveway as part of the
  two year temporary easement period.

#### Sidewalk:

• Upon relocation of the driveway and parking areas, the sidewalks on Ms. Waller's property will also need to be relocated to access the new drive and parking area

- The existing sidewalk interferes with the permanent slope and drainage easement.
   In addition, given the house's proximity to North Gayton Road on the eastern side will inhibit pedestrian traffic, the existing sidewalks will be rendered useless to Ms. Waller.
- We have obtained a price to demolish the existing sidewalk and construct sidewalks from the new drive and parking area to the entrances of the home.
- The price we received for such work was \$6,662.00. This should be paid directly
  to Ms. Waller so she can control the location of the sidewalks and the quality of
  construction.

#### Fences:

- Due to the loss of privacy for Ms. Waller and for the safety of her daughter and guests, we would like to have an opaque wooden privacy fence installed on the property line facing North Gayton Road upon completion of the road. The price for such a fence is \$5,471.17. This should be payable directly to Ms. Waller so she can control the location of the fence and its quality of construction.
- Further, a three board fence should be provided around the perimeter of the eastern part of the property, along Gayton and Kain Roads and back along the open fields to the wooded areas to the rear, with a gate along Kain Road in front of the existing entrance. This will help delineate Ms. Waller's remainder property located east of Gayton Road from the public right-of-way as well as provide a modest amount of security. We have estimated the cost for such a fence and gate to be \$9,000.00. This amount should also be payable directly to Ms. Waller so she can arrange for the construction of this fence and its exact location.

#### Tax Allowance:

- Ms. Waller's property is currently in the County's Land Use program. We met with Ms. Wanda Wells of the County to discuss the impact of the Project on Ms. Waller's ability to remain in Land Use.
- Upon the taking proposed by the Offer, Ms. Waller will no longer be able to
  qualify for Land Use as there is not enough remaining usable acreage to qualify.
  Further, it is simply not feasible for Ms. Waller to apply for an Open Use
  designation.

- Ms. Wells confirmed that roll back taxes will not be due upon the take, but if Ms. Waller sells her property within the next five years, she will be subject to the roll back taxes for each of the five years prior to the take, with one year being credited for every year she remains as owner of the property. By way of example, if she remains on the property for one year prior to sale, she owes 4 years of roll back taxes. If she remains on the property for two years, she owes 3 years of roll back taxes. Clearly, Ms. Waller has no idea if she will remain on the property and for how long. Prior to the take she at least had an opportunity to have the purchaser continue in Land Use and avoid roll back taxes. With the take, that option is now not even available to her. We believe it is fair to reserve the right to collect any roll back taxes due should Ms. Waller sell the property within the next five years.
- Ms. Waller previously qualified for Land Use and therefore her ad valorum real property taxes were substantially lower. By being removed from Land Use her taxes will obviously increase. But for the Project, these taxes would not be incurred. The tax rate has not yet been set for this year and clearly has not been set for future years. There is no reason to believe Ms. Waller will move anytime soon and quite frankly, prior to the Project, had planned on living in her home indefinitely. Using historic figures and assessments, a reasonable ad valorum tax on the property was approximately \$9,000, but reduced to \$2,000 \$2,500 per year through the Land Use program. This resulted in a savings of \$6,500 \$7,000 per year. Upon the take, Ms. Waller will now owe this additional \$6,500 \$7,000 each year. But for the project, Ms Waller would not owe this additional amount. I propose to use the lower number of \$6,500 over 10 years resulting in a payment of \$65,000 to quantify the additional tax burden the Project will cause to Ms. Waller.

#### Access to remaining Eastern portion of property:

• What was once a beautiful property with easy access to a huge open area, woods and a pond, will now be completely changed by the Project. Gayton Road, a 4-6 lane road, will now split Ms. Waller's property. The views from her kitchen window to this beautiful area will now be destroyed. She can now expect to enjoy the view of cars travelling by. Beyond the damage to the pond, described below, Ms. Waller will no longer have even a reasonable access to the remainder of her property, including the pond. Her home will now be located at what seems to be a major intersection with up to 6 lanes of traffic just a few feet off of her house. What was once a simple and bucolic walk is now a major endeavor that can only safely be done in a car. Why was there no compensation provided to address this loss?

- We expect there to be compensation for this loss of access by Ms. Waller to the
  remainder of her property, on the eastern side of the road, as well as the impact of
  splitting the property into two. Please have the appraisal revised to include an
  appraisal of this resulting damage.
- Any access will now have to come from Kain Road in the area across from 12291 Kain Road. There is currently an entrance at this location and she would like it to remain the same. There is already an asphalt base/parking area that Ms. Waller has installed close to the entrance area stated above. Please provide written assurance that any necessary construction and improvements made as part of the Project will not interrupt this access to this portion of the property and this access and parking area will otherwise remain the same.

#### Pond;

- It is my understanding that the pond on Ms. Waller's property will be drained, certain structural elements and construction will occur, and then the pond will be left. There is no plan to re-fill the pond or to re-stock it. There has been no assessment made to determine the impact on the long term viability of the pond, whether it will even re-fill naturally, and certainly no accommodation made for the fish and other aquatic life in the pond. It will simply be drained and left.
- We are undertaking a baseline water study and assessment of the supported wildlife. To be quite frank, these studies should have been done by the County or AECOM as part of the Project. These studies can not be assured of completion prior to April 30, 2010. IN NO WAY SHOULD ANY WORK BE DONE ON THE POND UNTIL AFTER THIS STUDY IS COMPLETED.
- The cost of this study will be approximately \$1,500. This amount should be reimbursed to Ms. Waller.
- There should also be compensation for loss of the use of the pond during the period it is drained and is waiting to be re-filled. A reasonable amount should be \$5,000 per month, based on a pro-rata basis for the time period for which Ms. Waller will not have reasonable use of the pond.
- Ms. Waller presented at the County meeting in July of 2009 various questions about the pond. She specifically asked if this pond would be turned into a stormwater basin or otherwise be designed to handle the additional run off coming from this new Gayton Road. Her questions have never been answered other than someone telling her they didn't think it would be a stormwater basin. Clearly

there will be some impact on the pond from the vehicles and the road. Has any assessment been done to determine this impact on the pond? Can documentation be provided we can send to a qualified engineer to determine if the pond will be used as a stormwater basin or otherwise be impacted by the road?

- Any construction has an impact on water quality. Has anyone looked at sediment and erosion control methods during construction of the Project to protect the pond?
- I understand you were going to get Ms. Waller information with respect to limiting erosion on the eastern portion of the property. Please copy me on any such information.
- We are hereby putting you on notice and reserving our right to bring consequential damages for the impact the planned construction will have on the pond and the wildlife it supports.

### Compensation for Take:

- We have closely reviewed the appraisal, comparable sales in the area, and appraisals for other properties in the area, both for this Project and for prior sales and projects.
- The offer of \$50,000 per acre is inadequate. Why is the property right across Kain Rd from Ms. Waller assessed at \$15,000 more an acre than Ms. Waller's property? Looking at surrounding comparable sales and appraisals supporting such sales, even with an adjustment for current economic conditions, the amount of \$50,000 per acre is unsupportable. Sales in the entire area have been depressed with the knowledge of this Project. You should not now be able to take advantage of an artificial factor in the pricing you or the County created.
- Ms. Waller deems a reasonable amount, based on the above analysis, to be \$95,000 per acre. Accordingly, the area to be taken together with the temporary easements (including the additional area for the revised driveway) would result in a payment due of \$255,703.00.
- Ms. Waller will agree, subject to the above, that the impact of the project on her house itself has been reasonably ascertained by the appraisal. What was once a home with a \$210,000 value will now be reduced by \$173,000 to \$37,000. This amount should be paid as well.

This Project will obviously have a monumental impact on Ms. Waller's enjoyment of her property. She seems to be bearing a significant portion of the burden in determining even the most basic information and assessment of damages to her. No one has explained to her or me the reason why there has been no offer to take the entirety of her property. The appraisal admits the house will be valued at almost nothing. There will be a loss of the ability to use the resulting two pieces together. Someone should look at that potential and explain to us why it has not been addressed. We have done the best we could to provide you as complete a draft counter-offer as possible. The above information and the counter-offer is subject to review by Ms. Waller and of course we reserve the right to give final approval to any final amount. Further, we reserve the right to bring such consequential damages as may result from the Project that are not otherwise addressed in this offer.

Please call should you have any questions. Again, I ask that AECOM and the County wait to take further action on the Project as it applies to Ms. Waller's property until all of the questions above are answered and you respond to our position on the various issues set forth above. Hook forward to hearing from you.

Buckingham Branch Railroad sincerely appreciates the past support of the Henrico County Board of Supervisors. Buckingham Branch Railroad would like to ask the County of Henrico for a resolution supporting Buckingham Branch's request for funds from the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation Rail Preservation Fund. Buckingham Branch Railroad will provide the local matching funds if these grants are approved. Should the locality have the funds and desire to be involved, Buckingham Branch will welcome local participation.

Buckingham Branch Railroad purchased and began to operate seventeen miles of track in Buckingham County in 1989. Since that time, we have leased 200 miles of track from CSX and commenced operating the Richmond and Alleghany Division on December 20, 2004. This operating lease was for track from Clifton Forge, Virginia to Richmond, Virginia, including 9.9 miles known as the Orange Branch.

We expanded our operations this year by leasing fifty-six additional miles of track from the Norfolk Southern Railroad. The Virginia Southern Division of Buckingham Branch Railroad runs from Burkeville, Virginia through Keysville to Clarksville, Virginia. **AN ORDINANCE** — To Amend and Reordain Subsection (a) of Sections 23-313 and 23-314 Titled "Water service and volume charges" and "Sewer service charges and rates," Respectively, of the Code of the County of Henrico, All to Increase County Utility Charges.

## BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. That Subsection (a) of Section 23-313 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

### Sec. 23-313. Water service and volume charges.

- (a) Amount of charges. The charges for water service shall consist of a service charge and a volume charge, as follows:
  - (1) Service charge. All users billed bimonthly shall pay the following charge. Users billed monthly shall pay one-half of this charge.

For single-family residential customers using six CCF or less bimonthly, the volume charge shall be \$1.40 \$1.47 per CCF.

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2. That Subsection (a) of Section 23-314 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

### Sec. 23-314. Sewer service charges and rates.

- (a) Amount of charges. The charges for sewer service shall consist of a service charge, and a volume charge, as follows:
  - (1) Service charge. All users billed bimonthly for water service shall pay the following charge for each water meter or sewage meter which serves the premises to which sewer service is available. Users billed monthly shall pay one-half of this charge.

a. In addition to the service charges, the following volume charges shall apply to all water delivered:

- b. For single-family residential customers using six CCF or less bimonthly, the volume charge shall be \$1.46 \$1.53 per CCF.
- c. For residential units, other than multi-family, bimonthly sewer volume charges shall be based on the lesser of actual usage or usage determined from the first meter reading cycle of the calendar year. For the purpose of this subsection, if the first reading is estimated as provided in section 23-205 or if the user joins the system after the first reading cycle, or an allowance is made for an underground leak during the first billing cycle, billing shall not exceed charges for 20 CCF.

3. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after July 1, 2010, as provided by law and the following provisions:

Charges set forth in Sections 23-313 and 23-314 shall be pro-rated to apply the old and new charges to that proportion of water supplied and/or sewage collected prior to and after the effective date of the new rates. Calculation of such pro-rated charges shall be computed based on average daily use of service supplied.
