105-12 Resolution - Signatory Authority - Quitclaim of Portion of Utility Easement - The Manor at Hunton Park - Brookland District.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this resolution.

On motion of Mr. Kaechele, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

Ordinance - To Amend and Reordain Subsections (b) and (c) of Sections 23-359 and 23-360 Titled "Water connection fees" and "Sewer connection fees," Respectively, and Subsection (a) of Sections 23-361 and 23-362 Titled "Water service and volume charges" and "Sewer service charges and rates," Respectively, of the Code of the County of Henrico, All to Change County Utility Fees and Charges.

Art Petrini, Director of Public Utilities, responded to questions from the Board.

Sarah Kellam, President of the Home Building Association of Richmond and a resident of Henrico County, spoke in opposition to the proposed increase in the water and sewer connection fees, which she cited as being detrimental to housing affordability, job creation, and the home building industry.

Kyle Hoffer, a member of the Home Building Association of Richmond and a resident of Henrico County, questioned whether the proposed increase in these fees would encourage new homeowners to install wells instead of connecting to the County's water system and whether the County can prohibit homeowners from constructing wells. Mr. Petrini noted that although the County does not dictate whether homeowners can install wells, homeowners within 300 feet of the County's water system are required by ordinance to connect to public water.

In response to a question from Mr. Nelson, Mr. Petrini elaborated on the history behind and justification for the County's water and sewer connection fee increases since 2008. He also responded to follow-up questions from Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Kaechele.

Mrs. Kellam returned to the podium and asked for more information regarding the basis for the proposed connection fee increases. She also questioned whether the Department's financial performance or allocation of revenues has been studied. Mr. Glover responded to her questions with Mr. Petrini's assistance. He pointed out that the County does not charge impact fees or cash proffers. Mr. Hazelett confirmed for Mr. Glover that the County's taxes and fees are the lowest among the Commonwealth's 13 most populous localities.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached ordinance.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

106-12

Britta Cruz, a resident of the Tuckahoe District, presented slides addressing the advantages of keeping backyard chickens in urban settings. The advantages she cited are superior quality and

fertilizer, excellent pets, natural pest control, reduction of waste in landfills, local food and a sustainable food source, educational value for children, and humane conditions for hens. Ms. Cruz requested that the Board consider changing setback requirements in its current ordinance to allow Henrico residents to keep eight or fewer backyard chickens.

William Spencer, a resident of the Three Chopt District, referred to the County's favorable crime rate, complimented the Board of Supervisors and County Manager, offered personal anecdotes, and emphasized the importance of young people listening to their elders.

GENERAL AGENDA

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85-12 Resolution - Adoption of Operating and Capital Annual Fiscal Plans for Fiscal Year 2012-13 and Allocation of Car Tax Relief for Tax Year 2012.

In response to a question raised by Mr. Kaechele during the public hearing on the resolution to establish the 2012 real estate tax levies, Mr. Walter clarified that the County's tax rate was lowered from 94 cents per \$100 of assessed value in 2004 to 87 cents per \$100 in 2007.

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On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

107-12 Resolution – Award of Construction Contract – Dorey Park Football Field Seating & Site Improvements – Varina District.

Neil Luther, Director of Recreation and Parks, responded to questions from Mr. Nelson and Mr. Kaechele.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mr. Kaechele, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

108-12 Resolution - Settlement of Jeffrey Carroll, et al. v. County of Henrico, Virginia

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Kaechele, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

Mr. Glover clarified comments he made during the public hearing on the ordinance to change utility fees and charges. He noted that he was drawing an analogy in his reference to impact fees and cash proffers and did not intend to mean that the Board has any plans to charge them.

In response to a question from Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Hazelett confirmed that the County adopted its budget on time but will probably have to amend it in light of the General Assembly's belated action on the state budget. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 8:33 p.m.

WHEREAS, National Crime Victims' Rights Week provides an opportunity to extend that vision to every victim of crime in the United States to help ensure their access to the assistance they deserve and the rights they are promised; and

WHEREAS, the Victim/Witness Assistance Program of the Henrico County Commonwealth's Attorney Office is joining forces with victim service programs, criminal justice officials, and concerned citizens throughout Henrico and America to raise awareness of victims' rights and observe National Crime Victim's Rights Week.

Sec. 20-78. Elderly or permanently and totally disabled persons.

(e) Criteria for exemption. Exemption shall be granted to persons subject to the following provisions:

(1) The title to the property for which exemption is claimed is held, or partially held, on December 31 immediately preceding the taxable year, by the person claiming exemption.

(2) The person occupying the dwelling and owning title or partial title thereto is 65 years or older on December 31 of the year immediately preceding the taxable year or the person claiming exemption was permanently and totally disabled on December 31 of the year immediately preceding the taxable year and is so disabled when he files the affidavit or written statement required in subsection (f) of this section. A dwelling jointly held by husband and wife may qualify if either spouse is 65 years of age or over or is permanently and totally disabled. Such dwelling must be owned by and occupied as the sole dwelling of the person claiming exemption. Persons who are otherwise qualified for exemption but are confined to hospitals, nursing homes, convalescent homes or other institutions for physical or mental care shall not be disqualified for exemption so long as the real estate for which exemption is sought is not used by or leased to others for consideration.

(3) The gross combined income of the owner during the year immediately preceding the taxable year shall be determined by the director to be an amount not to exceed \$67,000.00. Gross combined income shall include all income from-all-sources only those sources of gross income that are subject to tax under federal income tax laws, regulations, rules, or policies, without regard to whether a tax return is actually filed, of the owner, the spouse and the owner's relatives living in the dwelling for which exemption is claimed. Gross combined income shall not include life insurance benefits or receipts from borrowing or other debt. For the purpose of this subsection, the first \$10,000.00 of annual income of each of the owner's relatives, other than a spouse, living in the dwelling and who does not qualify for the exemption provided by subsection (e)(4) of this section shall be excluded in computing gross combined income. The term "owner," as used in this subsection, shall also be construed as "owners."

2. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after its passage.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. That Subsections (b) and (c) of Section 23-359 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 23-359. Water connection fees.

- (b) Bas/c connection fee.
 - (1) The basic connection fee covers installation of the water meter and partial payment for backup facilities. The basic connection fee shall be assessed all connectors except for fire service and payment shall accompany the application for connection as follows:

The connection fee for a permanent connection which will be used at special events for no more than 12 days per calendar year shall be ten percent of the basic connection fee above. If usage exceeds 12 days per year, the balance of the fees above shall be due within 30 days.

- (c) Local facilities fee. The connector shall pay for all local facilities subject to the off-site and oversized mains credit policy.
 - (1) Where local facilities are not available to the connector's property, the connector shall pay the full cost of the local facilities installed to serve the connector's property. Developers of new subdivisions shall install local water facilities in accordance with chapter 19 and water agreements approved by the board of supervisors. Along any public right-of-way or easement where the property owner desires service for his own personal use (i.e., a single-family residential unit in which the owner intends to reside), the county will extend the local facilities at the owner's expense. The cost of such extension shall be \$30.00 per linear foot of water main extension, except that the cost for such extension to serve an existing single-family dwelling served by an individual private well shall be \$15.00 per linear foot, plus the cost of installing the connection from the main to the property line as follows:



For residential units receiving water service from the City of Richmond, other than multifamily, bimonthly sewer volume charges shall be based on usage determined from the first meter reading cycle of the calendar year. For the purpose of this subsection, if the first reading is estimated as provided in section 23-205 or if the user joins the system after the first reading cycle, or an allowance is made for an underground leak during the first billing cycle, billing shall not exceed charges for 20 CCF.
- (3) Industrial strong waste charge. In addition to the charges set out in subsections
 (a)(1) and (2) of this section, there will be charged to individual users a strong waste charge as applicable:
 - a. Suspended solids, when the concentrations of suspended solids exceed 275 milligrams per liter: \$18.50 \$19.45 per CWT for suspended solids in excess of 275 mg/l.
 - b. BOD, when concentrations of BOD exceed 250 milligrams per liter: \$25.60 \$26.90 per CWT for BOD in excess of 250 mg/l.
- 7. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after July 1, 2012, as provided by law and the following provisions:

Charges set forth in Sections 23-361 and 23-362 shall be pro-rated to apply the old and new charges to that proportion of water supplied and/or sewage collected prior to and after the effective date of the new rates. Calculation of such pro-rated charges shall be computed based on average daily use of service supplied.

The connection fees set forth in Sections 23-359 and 23-360 shall not take effect until October 1, 2012.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the funds included in the Operating and Capital Annual Fiscal Plans for any County department, office, or agency may be used as participating funds in any Federal or State aid program for like purpose upon appropriation by the Board of Supervisors; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board declines to receive any salary increase for 2013 and the salary schedule attached hereto for Boards and Commissions and Unscheduled Salaries effective at the beginning of the 2012-13 fiscal year, hereby is approved; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the approved Operating Annual Fiscal Plan for fiscal year 2012-13 includes a decrease in the personnel complement of 48.6 positions for schools; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in order to implement changes to the Personal Property Tax Relief Act of 1998 (the "PPTRA") made by legislation adopted by the Virginia General Assembly:

- 1. Any qualifying vehicle, as defined in the PPTRA, sitused within the County commencing January 1, 2012, shall receive personal property tax relief in the following marmer:
 - a. Qualifying vehicles valued at \$1,000 or less shali receive 100% tax relief;
 - b. Qualifying vehicles valued at between \$1,001 to \$20,000 shall receive 63% tax relief;
 - C. Qualifying vehicles valued at \$20,001 or more shall receive 63% tax relief on the first \$20,000 of value only; and
 - d. All other vehicles which do not meet the definition of "qualifying vehicles" will not receive any form of tax relief under the PPTRA.
- 2. The amount of tax relief shall be a specific dollar amount offset against the lotal personal property taxes duat would otherwise be due on a qualifying vehicle but for the PPTRA. The specific dollar amount of relief shall be shown on the tax bill for each qualifying vehicle, togedher with a general description of the criteria upon which relief has been allocated.
- COMMENTS: This Board Paper should be considered on April 10, 2012, but should be deferred until Tuesday April 24, 2012, to comply with Virginia Code Section 15.2-2506, which states that "The hearing shall be held at least seven days prior to die approval of the budget...." The Director of Finance recommends approval of this Board Paper and the County Manager concurs.




