Mr. Kaechele called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Mr. Kaechele led recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance and a moment of silent prayer.

MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Chris Winstead, who has served as the County's Director of General Services since 2011, has submitted his resignation effective May 24, 2013. Mr. Winstead first joined the County staff in 2009 as Assistant Director of Public Works and is leaving the County to continue his career in public service as the Lynchburg District Administrator for the Virginia Department of Transportation. During his four years with the County, Mr. Winstead has provided superior customer service and helped steer two large County departments as they experienced transitions in staff due to retirements. He has maintained operations and made significant contributions in the face of a tough budgetary and fiscal environment. Mr. Vithoulkas expressed gratitude to Mr. Winstead for his faithful service to the County's citizens and employees.

Mr. Winstead characterized his local government service with the County as priceless and noted that this perspective will shape how he serves future customers for the rest of his career. He thanked the Board for placing its trust in him and investing in him as a fellow servant leader. Mrs. O'Bannon remarked that Mr. Winstead did it the Henrico way by listening to Henrico's citizens and customers and figuring out a way to accomplish at least a part of what they wanted. On behalf of the Board, Mr. Kaechele thanked Mr. Vithoulkas and Mr. Winstead for their comments, thanked Mr. Winstead for his excellent service to the County, and wished Mr. Winstead good luck for the future. Mr. Thornton stated that he will remember Mr. Winstead as a consummate professional with special sensitivities and sensibilities and that the County is better for having had Mr. Winstead as part of its team.

Gilliken and Dewayne R. Wilson from the Division of Police's Marine Control Unit.

PUBLIC HEARINGS – PROVISIONAL USE PERMITS AND REZONING CASE

106-13 PUP2013-00004 Fairfield The Rebkee Company: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Sections 24-58.2(a), 24-120 and 24-122.1 of Chapter 24 of the County Code in order to allow 24 hour operation of a proposed convenience store with fuel pumps (Wawa) on part of Parcel 807-730-9116 located in the northwest quadrant of the intersection of N. Laburnum Avenue and Creighton Road.

Joe Emerson, Director of Planning, reviewed the case and explained why staff did not support this request. In response to a question from Mr. Thornton, he asked Assistant Planning Director Jean Moore to distribute 19 conditions prepared by staff that might ameliorate some of the impacts of the proposed development on the surrounding area should the Board choose not to agree with the recommendation of the Planning Commission and staff. After reading the conditions, Mr. Emerson responded to further questions from the Board.

Andrew Condlin, an attorney with the law firm of Roth Doner Jackson, presented the case on behalf of the applicant. He advised that the applicant was willing to accept the conditions shared by Mr. Emerson, explained why the case was unique, and commented on the quality of the proposed development and surrounding neighborhoods. He responded to questions from Mrs. O'Bannon.

Mike Rothermel, an attorney with the law firm of Spotts Fain and a representative of Wawa, commented on the company's involvement in the community, employment and jobs, and provision of safety and services around the clock.

The following persons spoke in opposition to the case:

- Bernice B. Newell, a resident of the Varina District, expressed concerns that this proposed 24-hour operation would add to crime in this area of the County.
- Richard McNeil, a resident of the Varina District, voiced concerns about a 24-hour operation at this intersection in close proximity to houses.
- Gloria B. Johnson, a resident of Creighton Road in the Varina District, stated concerns regarding traffic and noise that would be generated by the proposed development and disputed assertions that it would improve property values and add to the sense of community.
- Bessie Hawkes, a resident of the Huntwood subdivision in the Varina District, conveyed concerns that the existing road infrastructure is inadequate to handle additional pedestrian and vehicular traffic that would be generated by the proposed development.

The following persons spoke in support of the case:

 Cheryl Henry, a resident of the Glenwood Lakes subdivision in the Fairfield District, pointed to Wawa's superior customer service, job opportunities, use of local construction contractors, willingness to comply with the County's conditions, community involvement, and contributions to the tax base. She also pointed to this site's close proximity to a new County fire station and to existing bus service.

- Floyd Palmer, a resident of 912 Dabbs House Road in the Varina District, highlighted Wawa's job opportunities, college scholarship support, community involvement, and competitive prices.
- Sherita Bryant, a resident of the Micheltree subdivision in the Fairfield District, noted Wawa's competitive fuel prices and contributions to the tax base and also noted the convenience of this site to many Henrico and Hanover residents.
- Willard Mack, a resident of 4121 Mylan Road in the Fairfield District, spoke to Wawa's competitive gasoline pricing, safe and clean conditions, and well-lighted facilities and to this site's convenient location.
- Reverend Marcus Martin, a resident of the Dominion Townes community in the Fairfield District, commented on this site's convenient location and Wawa's competitive gasoline pricing.
- Jennifer Sibley, a resident of the Micheltree subdivision in the Fairfield District, said that approving a Wawa at this location would be a progressive move for this community.
- Kenny Ragland, a resident of the Fairfield District, emphasized Wawa's reasonably priced gasoline, healthy food choices, and amenities and also emphasized this site's convenient location.
- Michael Greene, a resident of the Huntwood subdivision in the Varina District, referred to Wawa's competitive pricing and the current absence of safe 24-hour facilities in the vicinity of the proposed development.
- Samuel Henderson, Sr., a resident of the Varina District, discussed the benefit to the neighborhood of having of having a well-lighted 24-hour Wawa store nearby and complemented the company for its contributions to the education of children.

Mr. Thornton offered his perspective and observations pertaining to this case. He pointed out that there was a groundswell of citizens supporting this request. Mr. Thornton also expressed concern about the level of intervention by state legislators in the case. He referred to changes in lifestyles and demographics that are occurring in Henrico County and the Fairfield District and concluded that now is the time to be more flexible in regards to the County's previously stipulated policy limiting 24-hour operations in this corridor, which continues to serve as a gateway.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board did not follow the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following conditions:

- 1. This permit shall only apply to the 24-hour operation of a Wawa convenience store with fuel sales on a parcel currently identified as GPIN 807-730-9116, and it shall not be transferable to any other operator or owner.
- 2. Development of the convenience store shall be in general conformance with the architectural appearance shown on the elevations entitled "Proposed Wawa," prepared by LMA Architects LLC and contained in the case file, as determined at the time of Plan of Development.
- 3. The installation of pay phones on site shall be prohibited.
- 4. Any outside speakers and/or sound system shall comply with the following standards:
 - a) Sound systems shall be equipped with controls that permit full and complete volume control;
 - b) Sound(s) emitted from the system shall not be audible beyond a distance of one hundred (100) feet measured from the source;
 - c) Any music being played over any outside speaker system shall be prohibited from 12:00 midnight until 6:00 a.m.
- 5. Prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy, the applicant shall submit a security plan to the Director of Planning and the Chief of Police for review and approval. The security plan shall contain details regarding the standard operating procedures pertaining to employees, facility security, security personnel, crime prevention, and fire prevention. Prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy, the applicant and the Crime Prevention Unit of the Division of Police shall conduct a security survey of the property and store operations. The owner/occupant of the Wawa shall implement security measures affecting the property as described in the approved security plan.
- 6. The owner or operator shall be responsible for the installation, operation, and maintenance of exterior security camera(s) and video system of professional grade and quality, and rated for the exterior surveillance of retail operations. This security system shall at a minimum include:

- a) Exterior surveillance cameras shall monitor all entrance(s), fueling area(s), parking area(s), delivery area(s), and other areas determined necessary by the Crime Prevention Unit of the Division of Police. Such security cameras shall provide clear imagery of the establishment's patrons and their vehicles.
- b) Recordings of all activities under surveillance shall be preserved for a period of four (4) months by the applicant or owner/operator. Authorized representatives of the Henrico County Division of Police shall have full and complete access to all recordings upon request.
- 7. Store windows shall not be tinted or obscured by advertisements, posters, blinds, and/or visual obstructions that inhibit or hinder exterior surveillance. The installation and use of light blocking devices during daylight hours shall be permissible if approved by the Crime Prevention Unit of the Division of Police.
- 8. The owner or operator shall provide adequate lighting for the entrances, exits, and parking areas serving the use or location. "Adequate lighting" means lighting sufficient for clear, visual and security camera surveillance. Parking lot lighting shall not exceed twenty (20) feet in height, as measured from the grade of the lighting standard, except as otherwise permitted at the time of Plan of Development. In addition, lighting shall be directed to minimize glare on public roads and adjacent properties. Direct embedded light poles and standards shall be prohibited. Any lighting over any fuel pumps shall be recessed, flat lens fixtures.
- 9. The twenty-five (25) foot landscaped buffer areas required per C-29C-07 shall at a minimum contain the following:
 - a) An average of four trees for each 100 feet of road frontage, with the exception of driveways. Such trees shall be evenly spaced along the right-of-way frontage, located within ten feet of the edge of roadway pavement, and placed between the edge of roadway pavement and sidewalk if sidewalks are constructed parallel to the roadway. This requirement may be satisfied if such trees are located within the right-of-way instead of the landscaped buffer areas. Such trees shall be regularly trimmed so that the bottom six to eight feet of the tree trunk remains clear of branches and vegetation.
 - b) A continuous line of evergreen shrubbery planted along the entire length of the landscaped buffer areas not more than ten feet behind the trees along the right-of-way frontage. The

shrubbery must be at least two feet high when planted and shall be regularly trimmed for appearance and height not to exceed 3½ feet.

- c) Vegetation planted in the landscaped buffer areas shall be of a type and/or positioned so as to not interfere with overhead or underground utility lines when fully grown.
- d) Landscaped buffer areas shall be irrigated and properly maintained.
- e) Landscaped buffer areas shall adhere to all sight distance requirements as determined by the Department of Public Works.
- f) All ground cover and landscaping shall be properly maintained in a healthy condition at all times. Dead plant materials shall be removed and replaced during the normal planting season.
- 10. A landscaping and lighting plan shall be filed at the time of Plan of Development.
- 11. The site shall be limited to two (2) detached signs that will be monument-style signs not to exceed eight (8) feet in height and shall contain materials that are compatible with the exterior materials on the building. No pole signs or inflatable or other attention-getting devices shall be permitted.
- 12. All heating and air conditioning and mechanical equipment shall be screened from public view at the ground level in a manner approved at the time of Plan of Development.
- 13. Dumpsters, trash receptacles, not including convenience cans and recycling receptacles, and compactors shall be screened from public view with masonry enclosures which complement the architectural design of the building as approved at the time of Plan of Development.
- 14. Convenience cans and/or recycling receptacles shall be within or part of a decorative container and shall be properly serviced to control litter generated by this use.
- 15. No dumpster service or parking lot cleaning shall take place between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m. In addition, the parking lot shall be cleaned of trash and debris at least twice a week.

- Except for ice coolers, no merchandise shall be displayed or stored outside.
- 17. Overnight parking shall not be permitted. No idling of delivery trucks shall be permitted between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m.
- 18. The owner or operator shall not permit loitering on the premises during hours of operation.
- 19. Should evidence (i.e. police calls to the premises, complaints from other businesses, criminal assaults, etc.) or registered complaints (i.e. increased public nuisance, loitering, excessive noise, etc.) indicate that 24-hour exterior operation is having adverse effects on the area, the Board of Supervisors may hold a public hearing to consider revoking the PUP, amending all or some conditions, or adding new conditions.

107-13 PUP2013-00006 Three Chopt Sprint: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Sections 24-95(a)(3), 24-120 and 24-122.1 of Chapter 24 of the County Code in order to replace an existing light pole with a 124' high monopole-style telecommunications tower and related equipment, on part of Parcel 743-770-4669, located approximately 750' northwest of the intersection of Twin Hickory Lake Drive and Twin Hickory Road (Deep Run High School).

Ms. Moore responded to questions from the Board. Mr. Rapisarda responded to a question from Mrs. O'Bannon.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this case.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following conditions:

1. If the use of the tower for communication purposes is discontinued for 180 days, the antennas and all related structures shall be removed from the site within ninety (90) days. Within ten (10) business days after written request by the County, the owner of the antennas and equipment shall provide the County with written confirmation of the status of the facility, the number of and identity of users, available

- co-location space and such additional information as may be reasonably requested.
- 2. Application for a building permit to install the light pole replacement/ telecommunication tower must be made within one year after the Provisional Use Permit is granted by the Board of Supervisors, unless an extension of time is granted by the Director of Planning upon a written request by the applicant.
- 3. The applicant shall obtain approval from the Planning Commission should the FAA require the addition of standard obstruction marking and lighting (i.e. red lighting and orange and white striping) to the light pole/tower. Any changes to the proposed galvanized finish of the light pole/tower shall be submitted to the Director of Planning for approval.
- 4. When site construction is initiated as a result of this Provisional Use Permit, the applicant shall complete requirements prescribed by Chapter 10 of the Henrico County Code. In particular, land disturbance of more than 2,500 square feet will require that construction plans include a detailed drainage and erosion control plan prepared by a professional engineer certified in the State of Virginia. Ten (10) sets of the construction plans shall be submitted to the Department of Public Works for approval.
- 5. If ownership of the lease is transferred to another provider, the new owner shall submit a Transfer of Provisional Use Permit.
- 6. The height of the light pole/tower and any attached equipment shall not exceed 124 feet.
- 7. This permit shall apply only to the 247± square foot lease area identified on Exhibit C (see case file). Ground equipment shall be located within an enclosed and secure building of the type shown on Exhibit E (see case file).
- 8. Low-profile "flush mounted" antennas or a similar style of equipment as approved by the Director of Planning to reduce the visual profile of equipment shall be installed on the light pole/tower.
- 9. The co-location of additional users, as technically feasible and in accordance with the Lease Agreement with the County School Board shall be allowed at this site.
- 10. Prior to the co-location of any carrier's antennas or addition of equipment lease space, a revised site plan and equipment placement details shall be submitted to the Planning Department for approval.

- 11. To maintain visual and sound buffering, a supplemental landscaping plan may be required by the Director of Planning. The Director of Planning may waive the enforcement of this condition if it is deemed unnecessary.
- 12. Any UHF, VHF or other type of receivers/transmitters that would interfere with the County's Division of Police emergency communications are prohibited from this pole/tower.
- 13. A UV resistant, vinyl coated polyester shade density screen or equivalent shall be submitted to the Director of Planning and Henrico County Public Schools for approval and installed and maintained around the security chain link fence. The density and color shall match existing screening and dimensions. Installation shall be in accordance with manufacturer's specifications. If the shade screen is found to be in need of maintenance or replacement, the tower owner shall repair or replace the screen within 30 days from being notified.
- 14. Telecommunication cables shall be prohibited on the exterior of the light pole/tower.
- 15. Any future owner of the communication facility shall abide by all conditions approved with this request.

SAFE BOATING WEEK

May 18 - 24, 2013

WHEREAS, many Henrico residents choose recreational boating as a way to relax with their families and friends; and

WHEREAS, opportunities for on-the-water activities grow each year; and

WHEREAS, with this growth comes additional risk and responsibility; and

WHEREAS, more than 5,000 of the approxhnately 240,000 boats currently registered in the Commonwealth of Virginia are owned by residents of the County of Henrico; and

WHEREAS, the use of kayaks and other self-propelled watercraft not required to be registered is increasing rapidly; and

WHEREAS, additional boaters from outside the County visit our waters each boating season; and

WHEREAS, it is important that both novice and experienced boaters practice safe boating habits, maintain essential safety equipment, and wear a life jacket; and

WHEREAS, the law requires that a wearable life jacket be carried for each person on board all boats; and

WHEREAS, the life jackets of today are more comfortable, attractive, and wearable than the styles of the past; and

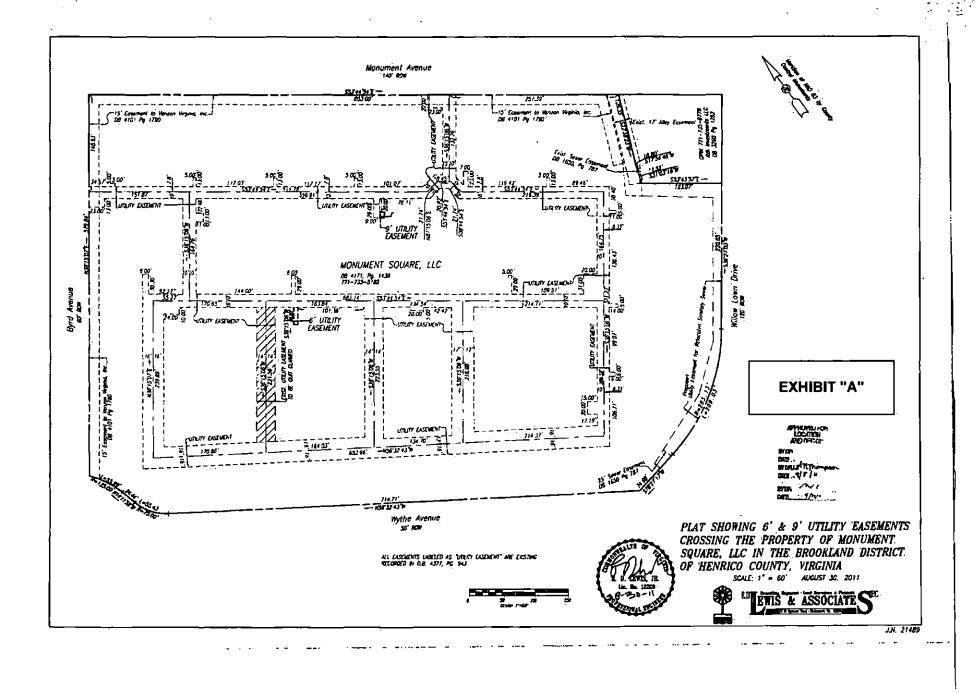

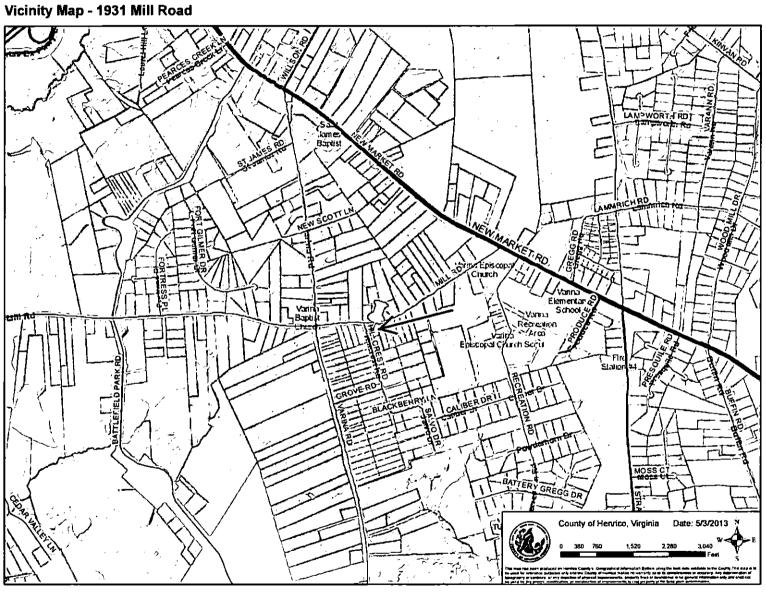

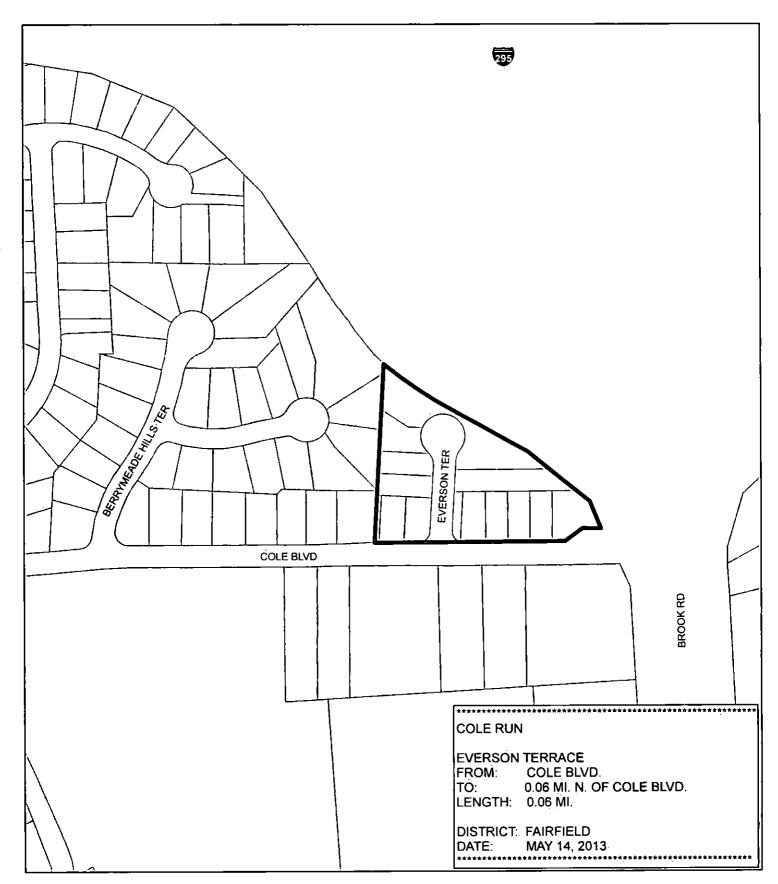
