# COUNTY OF HENRICO, VIRGINIA BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING September 23, 2014

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a regular meeting on Tuesday, September 23, 2014, at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico County, Virginia.

Mrs. O'Bannon called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m.

Mrs. O'Bannon led recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Reverend Lloyd Jackson, Chaplain for the Henrico County Police Division, delivered the invocation.

#### MANAGER'S COMMENTS

On Sunday, July 27, the County's Police and Fire Divisions, along with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, assisted Short Pump Town Center in conducting an in-depth training exercise as part of the mall's ongoing emphasis on safety and emergency preparedness for its guests, customers, and employees. This training involved a number of participants carrying out a mock exercise of an active shooter on site and incorporated multiple scenarios designed to test both the mall's and the Police and Fire Divisions' responsiveness to potential risks. Capt. Chris Alberta from the Police Division and his homeland security team were instrumental in the planning, execution, and success of this exercise as was Anna McRay from the Division of Fire, the County's Deputy Coordinator of Emergency Services. Danny Blowe, Regional Security Director of Forest City Enterprises, expressed appreciation to Captain Alberta, Ms. McRay, Police Chief Doug Middleton, and Fire Chief Tony McDowell for their hard work and commitment in regards to this project. Kem Blue, Vice President/General Manager of Short Pump Town Center, presented a plaque to Mr. Vithoulkas thanking the County for its public safety partnership with the Center. Brad Muranko, Security Director for the Center, joined Mr. Blue and Mr. Blowe for this presentation

Rachel Young, a Central Environmental Laboratory employee with the Department of Public Utilities' Water Reclamation Facility, was recently selected as the recipient of the 2014 Virginia Water Environment Association (VWEA) Laboratory Analyst Award. Ms. Young traveled to the 2014 WaterJAM, which was held September 8 – 11 at the Hampton Roads Convention Center. During that event, Ms. Young was recognized by her peers at an awards banquet for her exceptional career as a laboratory analyst. Mr. Vithoulkas extended congratulations to Ms. Young on behalf of himself and the Board and thanked her for providing the County with safe drinking water. Joining her from the Department of Public Utilities were Art Petrini, Director; Bailey Davis, Chief of Laboratory Operations; and Virginia Lambert, Quality Assurance/Quality Control Supervisor for the Water Reclamation Facility's Central Environmental Laboratory.

#### **PRESENTATIONS**

Mrs. O'Bannon presented a proclamation recognizing October 5 – 11, 2014, as Fire Prevention Week. Accepting the proclamation was Chief McDowell. Joining him from the Division were Kenny Dunn, Assistant Chief of Community Risk Reduction, and Battalion Chief/ Fire Marshal Henry Rosenbaum. Battalion Chief Rosenbaum shared information on

two recent residential fire incidents in Henrico County where smoke detectors saved the occupants from death or serious harm.

Mr. Kaechele presented a proclamation recognizing October 6 – 10, 2014, as Customer Service Week. Accepting the proclamation was Rebecca Slough, Senior Human Resources Analyst. Joining her was Paula Reid, Director of Human Resources.

Mr. Thornton presented a proclamation recognizing October 2014 as Henrico History Month. Accepting the proclamation was Sarah Pace, President of the Henrico Historical Society.

242-14 Resolution - Congratulating the Henrico County Police Division Law Enforcement Explorer Post 608.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mr. Kaechele, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

Mr. Glover presented the resolution, which congratulates Explorer Post 608 for 37 years of dedication and service to Henrico County and for earning national recognition at the 2014 National Law Enforcement Explorer Competition in Bloomington, Indiana. The resolution was accepted by Zach Brooks, President of Explorer Post 608, who received the James E. Breining Scholarship Award at the national competition. Chief Middleton thanked the police officers who volunteer their time to the Explorers, complimented the Explorers for their energy and interest, and introduced Mr. Brooks to the Board. Joining Chief Middleton from the Division of Police were Lt. Col. Fred Bolling, Assistant Chief for Field Services; Maj. Tom Leary, Deputy Chief for Support Services; Capt. Linda Toney, Commanding Officer of Community Services; and Lt. Sung Jung, Commander of School Services.

Resolution – Commemorating the Courage and Heroism of the United Sates Colored Troops at the Battle of New Market Heights.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

Mr. Nelson presented the resolution to David Ruth, Superintendent of Richmond National Battlefield Park and Maggie L. Walker Historic Site. Also participating in the presentation were Neil Luther, Director of Recreation and Parks, and Dawn Miller, Recreation Tourism Specialist.

#### **PUBLIC HEARINGS ITEMS**

Resolution - Amendments to the FY 2014-15 Annual Fiscal Plan: 244-14

September, 2014.

Terry Stone, Assistant Superintendent for Finance and Administration for Henrico County Public Schools, and Mr. Vithoulkas responded to questions and comments from Mr. Nelson and Mr. Glover pertaining to the Teacher Incentive Fund (TIF) grant amendment request included in the resolution. Mr. Nelson expressed concerns about the lack of information explaining the effectiveness of this program and how it factors into school improvement. Mr. Glover voiced concerns that funds for this grant were not included in the FY 2014-15 budget previously approved by the Board. He and Mr. Nelson noted they are not against teacher incentives. Mr. Vithoulkas advised the Board that he will revisit the grant with the Superintendent of Schools and update the Board at its next meeting.

Mr. Hinton responded to questions from Mr. Kaechele and Mrs. O'Bannon regarding the new appropriations for the County's two Community Development Authorities that were included in the resolution.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board amended this item to remove funding of \$886,424 associated with the TIF grant that was requested for reappropriation in fiscal year 2014-15.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item as amended - see attached amended resolution.

245-14 Resolution - POD2014-00297 - Approval of Plan of Development for HCPD Central Precinct - Fairfield District.

> Kevin Wilhite, Principal Planner, narrated a slide presentation on this item. He responded to questions from Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Glover pertaining to the stormwater best management practices retention pond proposed for this site. General Services Director John Neal, Mr. Rapisarda, Mr. Vithoulkas, and Mr. Wilhite responded to questions and concerns raised by Mr. Glover relating to the County's potential liability should any accidents occur on the site's joint ingress and egress that the County will share with the developer. Mr. Glover expressed concerns that the proposed plan of development did not include a condition

addressing the liability issue. There was extended discussion by Mr. Glover, Mr. Rapisarda, Mr. Vithoulkas, and other members of the Board regarding Mr. Glover's concerns. Mr. Rapisarda advised the Board that in his opinion the Board does not have legal authority to put a liability condition on a land use agreement. Mr. Glover expressed disagreement with Mr. Rapisarda's advice.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Nelson, with Mr. Glover voting "no," the Board approved this item - see attached resolution.

Joe Emerson, Director of Planning, narrated a slide presentation on this item. At Mrs. O'Bannon's request, he briefly explained why the County goes through the "Sübstantially in Accord" process.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item - see attached resolution.

Mr. Wilhite narrated a slide presentation on this item. He responded to questions from Mr. Kaechele and Mrs. O'Bannon.

On motion of Mr. Kaechele, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mr. Kaechele, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached ordinance.

248-14 Resolution - Abandonment of Portion of Old Pump Road - Tuckahoe District.

Mr. Tracy responded to questions from Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Kaechele.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Kaechele, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

249-14 Ordinance – Vacation of Portion of Unimproved Right-of-Way – Perkins Avenue – Eastmoreland Subdivision – Varina District.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached ordinance.

250-14 Resolution - Hearing of Necessity - Creighton Road Improvements - Project #00985 - Fairfield and Varina Districts.

Steve Yob, Director of Public Works, acknowledged the presence of Richard Leininger, the project engineer for AECOM, as well as Todd Eure, Margaret Ann Hilliard, and Cynthia Robinson from the Department of Public Works' transportation development group. Mr. Yob narrated a slide presentation on this item and responded to questions from the Board.

Timothy Walker, a resident of 2600 Sandy Lane in the Fairfield District, spoke in opposition to this item. He expressed concerns that the proposed road improvements will impact his neighborhood by bringing in more traffic, noise, and litter. There was extended discussion by the Board, Mr. Yob, and Mr. Vithoulkas of the proposed improvements, which would realign Creighton Road and eliminate an unsafe curve. Mr. Vithoulkas asked Mr. Emerson to follow up with Mr. Walker with more information on the proffered conditions that were required in the rezoning case for a Ryan Homes residential development adjoining Mr. Walker's property. Mr. Nelson suggested Doug Middleton, Chief of Police, follow up with Mr. Walker on concerns he expressed relating to speed limit enforcement on Creighton Road and vehicles skidding into his property.

Helen Crockett, a resident of Dabbs House Road in the Varina District, expressed concerns relating to how the proposed realignment of Creighton Road will affect traffic on Old Creighton Road and resident access to Dabbs House Road. There was extended discussion of her concerns by Mr. Yob, Ms. Hilliard, Mrs. O'Bannon, and Mr. Kaechele. Mr. Nelson asked Mr. Yob to send Public Works staff to Mrs. Crokett's home to walk her through the plans for the proposed improvements and to illustrate how similar road projects previously undertaken by the County have proceeded.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

251-14 Resolution – Hearing of Necessity – Dabbs House Road Improvements – Project #00610 – Varina District.

Mr. Yob acknowledged the presence of Brian Curtis of Baker Engineers, the consultant on this project. He narrated a slide presentation on this item and responded to a question from Mr. Kaechele.

Phillip Darrell Brown, who was representing his brother Reginald Darnell Brown, addressed the Board and expressed opposition to this item. Reginald Brown is a resident of 471 Dabbs House Road in the Varina District. Phillip Brown voiced concerns pertaining to the proposed realignment of Dabbs House Road, which will cross Reginald Brown's property. He questioned the safety of the new alignment and how the newly aligned road will impact vegetation and wetlands that currently exist on Reginald Brown's property. There was discussion by the Board, Mr. Yob, and Mr. Vithoulkas regarding the process the County plans to follow in acquiring a portion of Mr. Brown's property to make the proposed improvements. In response to a question from Mr. Glover, Phillip Brown noted Reginald Brown has not yet made a decision as to whether he will sell this property to the County. Mr. Nelson stated he was concerned this project was brought to the Board before resolving the property acquisition issue. Mr. Kaechele and Mr. Rapisarda pointed out the County has historically addressed land acquisition issues after the Board's finding of necessity of proposed road improvements. Mr. Thornton suggested the County needs to work with citizens more so they can better understand their rights and the County's process for acquiring land for these types of projects. Mr. Vithoulkas disagreed with Mr. Rapisarda's opinion that material changes to the proposed alignment should not be made after the Board finds the necessity of the proposed improvements. Nonetheless, he suggested the Board defer action on this item until Mr. Yob can answer the Board's questions.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and by unanimous vote, the Board deferred this item to the October 28, 2014, meeting.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

William Spencer, a resident of the Three Chopt District, complimented the County and the County Manager, expressed thanks for the Board, and shared personal anecdotes.

The Board recessed at 9:44 p.m. and reconvened at 9:54 p.m.

WHEREAS, the County's customer service initiatives focus on communication, education, training, and recognition; and

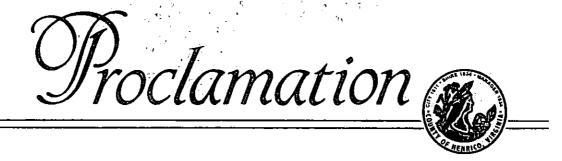
WHEREAS, the County continues to be recognized locally, nationally, and internationally for the quality of service it provides to all its customers; and

WHEREAS, the Henrico County Police Division Law Enforcement Explorer Post 608 (the "Post") was chartered in 1977 and provides educational and experiential activities for youth ages 14 to 20 years; and

WHEREAS, the Post has embraced the mission statement of its parent organization, Learning for Life, by "...enabling young people to become responsible individuals by teaching positive character traits, career development, leadership, and life skills so they can make ethical choices and achieve their full potential"; and

WHEREAS, the Post has dedicated countless hours of community service to Henrico County and has supported the Police Division with awards programs, Basic Police Academy graduations, and other Division-sponsored programs; and

WHEREAS, 27 sworn and communications officers are products of the Post, and nearly 400 youth have been trained to be future leaders and role models; and

WHEREAS, in July 2014, the Post attended the 2014 National Law Enforcement Explorer Competition in Bloomington, Indiana, where it received a third place trophy in the White Collar Crime competition and a Post member received the James E. Breining Scholarship Award.

# Zone Strategy Overview

1. As a community, what are the largest, ongoing economic development efforts?

The economic development efforts of Henrico County focus on business attraction, retention, and expansion programs designed to promote and maintain Henrico County as a pro-business community. The County offers a variety of business development programs through the Economic Development Authority (EDA) geared towards business retention and expansion such as outreach marketing and digital marketing initiatives using social media and email campaigns, a business appreciation campaign, and business incentives and grants.

Henrico County also promotes the revitalization of older commercial areas and offers a variety of revitalization incentives and programs focused on reinvestment and job creation. Revitalization, economic development, and commercial assistance/programs include: Architectural Design Assistance, Building Façade Grants, Paving and Parking Lot Sealing Grants, Landscaping Grants, Existing Freestanding Signage Grants, Building Demolition Grants, Plan Review/Permit Fee Waivers, Off-Site Improvement Grants and real estate tax exemptions.

2. Briefly describe the overall economic restructuring strategy for the locality.

Henrico County does not have an overall economic restructuring strategy. The Henrico County economic development strategy focuses on maintaining a strong and growing economic base by encouraging new development and improving existing development. The recession in 2009 impacted Henrico significantly, with the loss of the County's largest private employer and taxpayer when a semiconductor plant closed and two Fortune-500 level corporate headquarters filed for bankruptcy. Since the recession, the County has focused on backfilling vacant space — office and industrial. This strategy has shown success and the County has also started to see activity in the construction of speculative buildings. The unemployment rate for Henrico is down to 5.3% from almost 8% at the beginning of 2010.

The Economic Development Authority (EDA) of Henrico County adopted a Strategic Plan in June 2010. The mission at the EDA as described in the Plan is "to increase county revenue through the attraction of high quality jobs and new capital investment with domestic and international companies, as well as the retention and growth of existing businesses, resulting in continued improvement of the county's well-being and the quality of life for Henrico citizens". The Strategic Plan identifies four goals for economic development:

- 1. Market Henrico County as a desirable pro-business location
- 2. Expand and diversify the business tax base
- 3. Attract well-paying jobs
- 4. Maintain and strengthen a pro-business environment

The EDA Strategic Plan does not specify the need for economic restructuring.

4. Identify what specific sectors and types of businesses are being pursued for the community and briefly discuss the following:

Major industry sectors that Henrico County targets include advanced manufacturing and distribution, finance and insurance, high-tech businesses including data centers and technology-based companies, health services and biotechnology professional services.

Important factors and considerations for these businesses include labor force, access to market/consumers, competitive tax and operating costs, stable and friendly business environment, high-quality of life, and existing infrastructure. These components are essential to their operations in general, with nuances in the exact requirements based on the specific industry. For example, food manufacturing requires extensive water and sewer capacity, while data centers are reliant on uninterrupted electric power. Henrico County is strong in all of the above categories which makes Henrico a location of choice for businesses.

Henrico County's central location, pro-business atmosphere, AAA Bond rating and low tax rates make it an excellent place to live and work making it easy to relocate, and attract and retain top-quality professional and technical employees.

5. What is being done to stimulate private participation in economic development efforts throughout the locality?

The Henrico County EDA sends two distinct monthly email newsletters outlining current events in Henrico and available properties to nearly 3,000 recipients - target companies, influencers, and allies. Through the Business First program, a team of 25 volunteers surveys over 200 Henrico companies each year to help establish the EDA as a liaison between the business community and the county government. Outreach for the Enterprise Zone program includes a Henrico County specific Enterprise Zone website, Enterprise Zone and Tax Abatement brochures, monthly mailings to new property owners and building permit applicants within the Zone as well as presentations regularly offered by staff.

Henrico County provides targeted incentives which aim to stimulate business development and job growth for qualifying projects. The Henrico County Enterprise Zone, encompasses a total of 3,364 acres, consists of two non-contiguous areas, and encompasses primarily older commercial corridors along a number of major arterials in the eastern, northern and western portions of the County. The Zone began in April 2003 with the redesignation of the City of Richmond North Enterprise Zone, incorporating areas along W. Broad Street from the corporate limits at Willow Lawn Shopping Center to Glenside Drive and an area of Nine Mile Road from Dabbs House Road to Hanover Road.

Zone expansions were approved by the Commonwealth of Virginia in 2004, 2006, 2008, 2010, 2011, and 2012. These expansions added several commercial corridors and industrial areas and a number of new local incentives. The following areas became part of the Zone: additional areas along Nine Mile Road and Creighton Road, areas along Staples Mill Road between the City line and Parham Road, property adjacent to the CSX rail line between I-64 and Parham Road, the Lakeside Avenue commercial corridor, the Brook Road corridor from the City limits north to Maryland Avenue, the Mechanicsville Tumpike commercial corridor, the commercial area of Laburnum Avenue from the City limits to Mechanicsville Tumpike, Regency Square Mall and surrounding commercial areas, the commercial area at the intersection of Woodman and Hungary Roads, areas of Williamsburg Road in Sandston from Charles City Road to Nine Mile Road, South Laburnum Avenue north of Seven Hills Boulevard. including areas along Audubon Drive to I-64, Chamberlayne Road at Wilmer Avenue, Glenside Drive at Broad Street, and part of the Richmond International Airport property.

## 12. Why have these areas of the locality been selected for the Enterprise Zone?

The Henrico County Enterprise Zone Program consists primarily of older commercial corridors along major arterials in the eastern, northern and western portions of the County. These areas were selected in order to provide assistance and incentives as a means to strengthen existing business, encourage revitalization, and enhance the appearance of these commercial corridors. Several locations, representing economic development opportunities in lower and moderate income areas of the County were also included.

13. Describe any specific properties the locality has identified for rehabilitation, expansion, or development.

All Enterprise Zone properties were selected in order to achieve the above objectives.

14. How do these areas relate to the locality's package of local incentives and the targeted businesses it is trying to leverage?

The local incentive package has been developed and modified based on identified needs of small businesses located in the targeted commercial corridors, and opportunities for improving the overall conditions and business environment of these corridors.

15. Discuss the priority this zone has for the locality.

The Enterprise Zone and several areas in particular are specifically mentioned in the Henrico County 2026 Comprehensive Plan. A number of these areas are identified in the plan as areas for revitalization or as Special Focus Areas. The Enterprise Zone and the incentives offered are a very high priority for the County and the County has consistently funded the incentives.

16. How will the Enterprise Zone designation be combined with the existing incentive programs identified above to create a comprehensive suite of economic development tools?

All county-wide economic development programs are available and are marketed to businesses located within the Enterprise Zone.

# Marketing Efforts

Enterprise Zone marketing efforts consist of a Henrico County specific Enterprise Zone website, Enterprise Zone and Tax Abatement brochures, monthly mailings to new property owners and building permit applicants within the zone as well as presentations regularly offered by staff. Staff also directly visits businesses in the Zone to explain the program.

AN ORDINANCE to amend and reordain Section 20-78 of the Code of the County of Henrico titled "Elderly or permanently and totally disabled persons" to increase the maximum annual real estate tax exemption for qualified real estate advantage program applicants from \$1,500 to \$2,500, eliminate the requirement that applicants pay their taxes by certain dates or lose their exemption, and conform to 2014 state legislation.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. That Section 20-78 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 20-78. Elderly or permanently and totally disabled persons.

(e) Criteria for exemption. Exemption shall be granted to persons subject to the following provisions:

(4) Notwithstanding subsection (e)(3) of this section, if a person qualifies for an exemption under this section, and if the person can prove by clear and convincing evidence that the person's physical or mental health has deteriorated to the point that the only alternative to permanently residing in a hospital, nursing home, convalescent home or other facility for physical or mental care is to have a relative move in and

provide care for the person and if a relative does move in for that purpose, then none of the income of the <u>owner's</u> relatives <u>living in the dwelling and providing bona fide caregiving services to the owner, whether such relatives are compensated or not, or of the relative's spouse shall be counted towards the income limit, provided the owner of the residence has not transferred assets in excess of \$10,000.00 without adequate consideration within a three-year period prior to or after the relative moves into such residence.</u>

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(f) Affidavit or written statement. No later than April 1 of the taxable year, the person claiming an exemption must file in writing an affidavit or written statement with the director. In lieu of the filing of an annual affidavit or written statement, once a taxpayer is determined to be eligible, an affidavit or written statement may be filed on a three-year cycle with an annual certification by the taxpayer that no information contained on the last preceding affidavit or written statement filed has changed to violate the limitations and conditions provided in this section. Such annual certification must be filed not later than April 1 of the taxable year. Affidavits or written statements from first-time applicants or in hardship cases, as determined by the director of finance, will be accepted through December 31 of the taxable year.

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(3) If, after an audit and investigation, the director determines that the person is qualified for exemption, he shall certify that such person is so qualified and shall determine the amount of exemption applicable to the claimant's real estate tax liability. Such exemption shall apply only to the tax year for which issued. In order to avoid the payment of any penalty, the person to whom an exemption has been issued shall, on or before the past-due date established for the payment of such real estate tax, present payment for the difference between such exemption and the full amount of the tax payment then due on the property. Any tax not paid by June 30 in settlement of taxes due June 5, or by December 31 in settlement of taxes due December 5, shall cause such exemption to be null and void, and the director of finance may not reinstate the exemption for such tax year. The director of finance or his assignee may, in cases of proven hardship, extend the settlement date by 15 days.

(g) Amount of Exemption. Each qualified applicant shall receive a 100 percent real estate tax exemption up to an annual exemption of \$2,500 \$1,500. The tax exemption granted under this section shall apply only to the dwelling occupied by the applicant, and the land, not exceeding ten acres, upon which it is situated.

- (i) Applicability to life estates and certain trusts; inapplicability to leaseholds and terms of years. For purposes of this section, a dwelling owned and occupied as the sole dwelling of a person claiming exemption shall include, among other forms of ownership, a dwelling (i) held by the person claiming exemption alone or in conjunction with his spouse as tenant or tenants for life or joint lives, (ii) held in a revocable inter vivos trust over which the person claiming exemption or the person claiming exemption and his spouse hold the power of revocation, or (iii) held in an irrevocable trust under which a person claiming exemption alone or in conjunction with his spouse possesses a life estate or an estate for joint lives or enjoys a continuing right of use or support. However, a dwelling owned and occupied as the sole dwelling of a person claiming exemption shall not include a dwelling held under a leasehold or term of years.
- 2. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon passage and shall apply retroactively to July 1, 2014, except that the amendment to Sec. 20-78(g) shall be in full force and effect beginning on January 1, 2015.

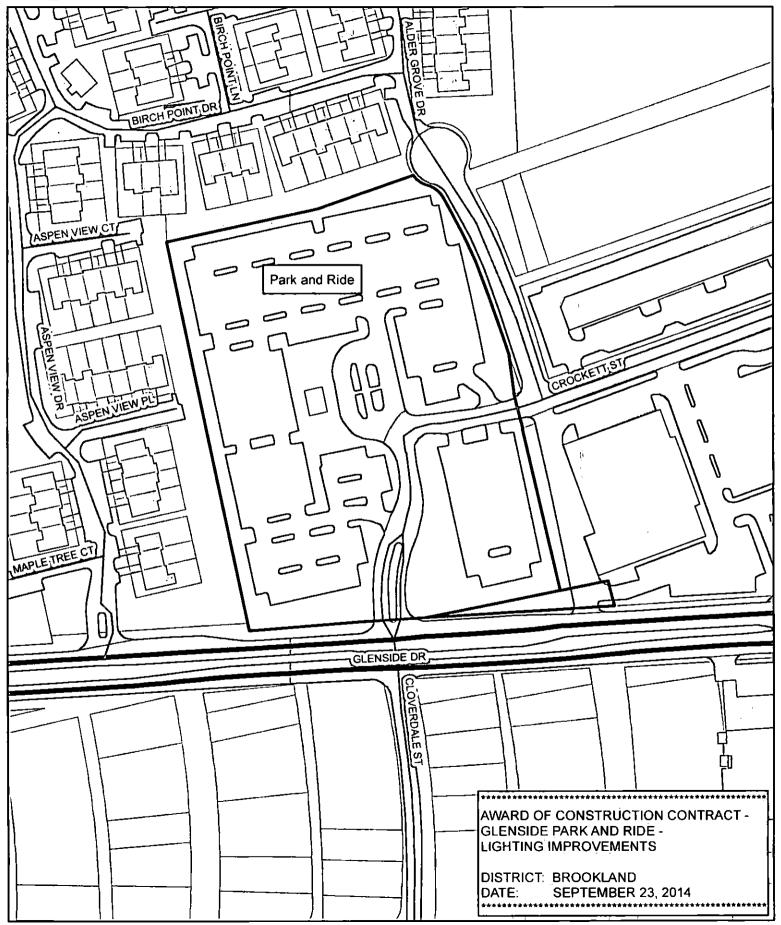

AN ORDINANCE to amend and reordain Section 23-33 of the Code of the County of Henrico titled "Maintenance of sewage disposal system; pump-out requirement" to conform to state legislation providing for the submission of documentation relating to septic tank pump-out.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. That Section 23-33 be amended and reordained as follows:

# Sec. 23-33. Maintenance of sewage disposal system; pump-out requirement.

It shall be unlawful for any owner, tenant or lessee of premises supplied with a sanitary privy, flush toilet or other approved device for the disposal of human excrement to allow it or cause it to be unsanitary. In addition, owners of all private sewage disposal systems and septic tank systems in the Chesapeake Bay Preservation Areas (as defined in section 24-3) shall, at least once every five years, be either pumped out their septic tanks and submit documentation thereof at least once every five years, and records evidencing each pump out shall be maintained by the owner of the premises: or submit documentation, certified by an operator or on-site soil evaluator licensed or certified under chapter 23 of Title 54.1 of the Code of Virginia as being qualified to operate, maintain, or design on-site sewage systems, that the septic system has been inspected within the last five years, is functioning properly, and the tank does not need to have the effluent pumped out of it. All documentation shall be submitted to the director of public works.

2. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after its passage as provided by law.
