Mr. Thornton called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m. and announced Mrs. O'Bannon was attending a high school commencement and not present for the meeting. He led the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Rabbi Scott M. Nagel, Senior Rabbi for Congregation Beth Abahah, delivered the invocation.

MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Owens & Minor, a global healthcare services company based in the Richmond region, has previously published a book titled *Owens & Minor – A History 125 Years and Beyond*. The book is not only an historical account, but also provides an insight into the company's purpose-driven culture that encourages teammate commitment to one another, their customers, and the communities that surround them. Chip Tarkenton, the company's Director of Community Relations, presented a complimentary copy of the book to Mr. Thornton that was signed by G. Gilbert Minor, III, Chairman Emeritus of Owens & Minor. Complimentary copies will also be distributed to the members of the Board and the County's public libraries. Mr. Tarkenton noted the company opened its doors in 1882 and celebrated its 135th anniversary in January.

The fifth Henrico Citizens Academy was held from April 20 through May 25 after normal business hours and provided Henrico residents the opportunity to participate in a free program to learn about the role of local government, how the County fulfills this role, and how residents can become more engaged. Participants attended a weekly, 2.5-hour class at a County facility in each magisterial district where they received a behind-the-scenes tour and heard presentations from members of the Board of Supervisors, School Board, and County's Manager's staff as well as other dedicated professionals from County agencies and the public-school system. The class members saw firsthand how many aspects of their daily lives are tied to local government. The program culminated with a public safety equipment demonstration. Mr. Vithoulkas thanked Holly Zinn from the County Manager's Office for coordinating this year's academy. He recognized Jackson Knox, a Brookland District resident and academy participant, who addressed the Board on behalf of his classmates regarding their academy experience and what they learned about the County from their engagement with key decision makers. Mr. Knox commented on the County's progress and political efficacy and the Board's vision in establishing the academy.

Ty Parr has been appointed as the County's next Director of Social Services, effective June 24. He succeeds Cindee Steinhauser, who is retiring after serving the County with distinction, and will be responsible for the department's activities. These include providing financial assistance and social services programs that help individuals and families meet their basic needs and increase their independence and that protect abused and neglected children as well as aged and disabled adults. Mr. Parr was hired by the department in 2008 as a senior social worker and left the County in 2012 to serve as a financial audit consultant for the Virginia Office of Children's Service. He returned to the County in 2014 to serve as the department's Children's Services Act Coordinator. Mr. Parr holds a master's degree in public administration and is a member of the Virginia Association of Local Human Services Officials, the United Way Education Action Council, and the Central Virginia Partnership on Youth.

PUBLIC HEARINGS - REZONING CASES

150-17 REZ2017-00013 Fairfield Henrico County Vocational/Technical Education Foundation, Inc.: Request to conditionally rezone from R-5C General Residence District (Conditional) to R-3C One-Family Residence District (Conditional) Parcel 813-732-0538 containing 4.422 acres located on the east line of Cedar Fork Road at its intersection with Creighton Road.

Philip Parker, Vice President of the Henrico Vocational/Educational Foundation, addressed the Board at Mr. Branin's request. He explained the role of the foundation, a 501(c)(3) organization composed of volunteers that manages a real-world lab where high school students from Henrico's Advanced Career Education Centers gain hands-on experience building houses that are sold at market value. In response to a question from Mr. Thornton, Mr. Parker elaborated on the construction timetable for the subject site and how the property will be maintained during the construction process.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Branin, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. <u>Foundations.</u> The exterior portions of single family residence foundations which are above ground level shall be constructed of brick or dryvit.
- 2. <u>Fireplaces.</u> Any fireplaces or heating elements that require over a three (3) inch diameter flue and are constructed on the exterior wall of the home shall be constructed of brick, dryvit or stone; gas or ornamental fireplaces may be wall-vented with no chimneys as allowed by applicable building codes.
- 3. <u>Restrictions.</u> No factory modular or mobile homes shall be erected on the Property.
- 4. **Density.** There shall be no more than an overall of two (2) lots or homes per gross acre constructed on the Property.
- 5. Severance. The unenforceability, elimination, revision or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or In part, shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the other proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.

151-17 REZ2017-00014 Three Chopt Gateway Partners: Request to amend proffered conditions accepted with C-57C-90 on Parcel 757-752-7456 located on the south line of N. Parham Road approximately 200' southwest of its intersection with Mayland Drive.

Larry Phillips, the applicant's representative, reviewed the proposed amendment at Mr. Branin's request. He responded to questions and concerns from Mr. Branin regarding overgrown grass and the condition of the property on the subject site.

Laura Howard, a resident of 7012 Bandy Road in the Tuckahoe District, spoke in opposition to this item along with her mother, Fran Leckie, a resident of 2608 Rothland Drive in the Three Chopt District. Ms. Leckie noted she resides immediately behind the subject property. Ms. Howard expressed concerns pertaining to the proposed use of the property for massage therapy, the hours of operation of the proposed business, how the business would affect the safety and property values of adjoining residents, and transient traffic associated with the business. Ms. Leckie voiced additional concerns relating to hours of operation.

Jean Moore, Assistant Director of Planning, responded to the concerns expressed by Ms. Howard and Ms. Leckie and to follow-up questions from Mr. Branin and Mr. Hinson. She clarified that the proposed amendment would allow massage therapists to conduct business on the site only if they are licensed by the Police Division and certified by the Virginia Board of Nursing. Mr. Hinson pointed out the original zoning case for the subject property in 1990 excluded medical facilities as a permitted use. Ms. Moore also clarified that the applicant had limited the hours of operation on the site to 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. and that the proposed use was not projected to generate more traffic than the current use. Mr. Branin noted his initial apprehension concerning this case, staff's diligent efforts to make the case work, Mr. Hinson's confusion over the case, and the concerns expressed by longstanding neighbors.

On motion of Mr. Branin, seconded by Mr. Hinson, and by unanimous vote, the Board did not follow the recommendation of the Planning Commission and denied this item.

PUBLIC HEARINGS - OTHER ITEMS

Resolution – Amendments to the FY 2016-17 Annual Fiscal Plan: June 2017.

At Mr. Vithoulkas' request, Management and Budget Division Director Justin Crawford elaborated on the proposed amendments relating to Fund 2111, the Capital Initiatives Fund, after providing a general overview of this item.

John Martin Owens, a resident of 6315 Millhiser Avenue in the Brookland District, narrated a slide presentation with suggestions on how to optimize the funds designated for the proposed amendments. These included redirecting funds from paving to bus rapid transit for a route from Willow Lawn to Parham Road and redirecting funds from the Greater Richmond Convention Center Authority to mixed income/affordable housing, transit, sidewalks, bike lanes, or parks. In addition, he suggested replacing the County's Real Estate Assistance Program with a real estate tax credit, questioned the proposed allocation of funds from the Self-Insurance Reserve for anticipated expenses relating to property and liability programs, suggested redirecting appropriations targeted for synthetic turf installation from the Short Pump Dog Park to a new midtown dog park, questioned the need to fund four pickleball courts, and objected to the use of public funds to help defray the cost of sending J.R. Tucker High School drama students to a high school theatre program in Scotland.

Chris Brown, Director of Student Activities at J.R. Tucker High School, thanked the Board for its willingness to improve the baseball facilities at Tucker High School. He noted the coaching staff has worked hard over the years to maintain the baseball field and the upgrades that will be funded by a budget amendment will benefit baseball leagues throughout the county while continuing to make the venue popular and appealing for years to come. Joining Mr. Brown were Tucker's head baseball coach, Chris Didlake, and Rob Netherland, an assistant baseball coach at Tucker. They presented the members of the Board and Mr. Vithoulkas with Tucker baseball caps and letters of appreciation.

Lisa Dyer, the theater teacher at Tucker High School, extended gratitude to the Board for the County's financial support of the drama program's trip to Scotland this coming summer to compete in the American High School Theatre Festival. She elaborated on the cultural and artistic implications of the trip. Joining Ms. Dyer was Kate Fickland, the assistant theater coach at Tucker. Mr. Branin congratulated Ms. Dyer on the program's fundraising efforts for the trip and asked her to report back to the Board after the competition.

155-17 Resolution – Transfers within the Henrico County Public Schools FY2016-17 Annual Fiscal Plan: June, 2017.

As requested by Mr. Vithoulkas and with the approval of Mr. Thornton and concurrence of the Board, this item was brought forward from the general agenda because of its impact on the budget.

Bill Bowen, Assistant Superintendent of Schools for Finance and Administration, responded to many questions from the Board regarding the magnitude of the revenue shortfall, which required rebalancing of the budget and two budget transfers. Most of the shortfall (approximately \$3.8 million of the \$5.3 million total) was due to the Henrico County Public Schools (HCPS) average daily membership being substantially Mr. Nelson expressed frustration over below the estimated levels. recently being told by a School Board member and the School Superintendent there was no money in the school budget for needs identified by school PTA presidents yet funds were subsequently found to cover the budget shortfall. Mr. Hinson voiced concern about the process and analysis currently used by HCPS to estimate student population given the recent missed projections. Mr. Branin questioned the need for funding new school positions in the budget when many existing positions remain unfilled.

After extended discussion of the revenue shortfall and missed projections, Mr. Thornton suggested there needs to be more accountability on the part of the School Board in addressing and redressing the concern stated by his colleagues on the Board. He also emphasized the importance of putting forth an excellent team effort. Mr. Vithoulkas clarified for Mr. Nelson that in his opinion action on this item was required so the School budget could conform to Henrico standards before being presented to the County's auditors.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mr. Branin, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

Mr. Hinson requested that Mr. Vithoulkas meet soon with the School Superintendent to provide a new direction for determining future school populations based on what the County knows about development. He remarked there is something wrong in this process that needs to be fixed. Mr. Vithoulkas agreed to have this meeting and report back to the Board.

Revenue from the 8.0 percent Hotel/Motel Occupancy Tax is exceeding the estimate of \$11,200,000, included in the fiscal year 2016-17 Annual Fiscal Plan. This \$3,000,000 increase will cover additional payments to the Greater Richmond Convention Center Authority (GRCCA), resulting from this additional revenue that has been received and is projected to be received through the end of the fiscal year. Payment will be made based on actual collections from the tax. Subsequently, the County's 2.0 percent local tax component (estimated at \$750,000 for this amendment), will come back to the County. In total, for fiscal year 2016-17, the County expects to receive \$14,200,000 in Hotel/Motel Occupancy Taxes, reflecting an increase when compared to the prior fiscal year. These funds will be disbursed to the GRCCA. Upon completion of the fiscal year, the GRCCA will return 2.0 of the 8.0 percent, estimated at \$3,550,000 as per the financing agreement for the Convention Center.

- (c) The county may enter into contracts for purchases for special police work without competitive sealed bidding or competitive negotiation when the chief of police certifies that the items are needed for undercover police operations.
- (d) Except in the case of contracts for state aid projects governed by Code of Virginia, § 2.2 4305, and contracts for professional services governed by Code of Virginia, § 2.2 4301, the county may award single or term contracts not to exceed \$30,000.00 without competitive sealed bidding or competitive negotiation under procedures established by the purchasing director The county may enter into contracts up to the amounts set forth in Code of Virginia § 2.2-4303(G) or its successor for goods, professional services, non-professional services, transportation-related construction, and non-transportation-related construction without competitive sealed bidding or competitive negotiation under procedures established in writing by the purchasing director. However, the county must use competitive sealed bidding or competitive negotiation for construction of a new building or an addition or improvement to an existing building when the county will use more than \$50,000 in state funds.
- (e) The county may enter into contracts for purchases of library books and legal publications without competitive sealed bidding or competitive negotiation.


