The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a regular meeting on Tuesday, September 12, 2017, at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico County, Virginia.

Mrs. O'Bannon called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m. and led the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Reverend Art Thomas, Pastor of Willis United Methodist Church, delivered the invocation.

MANAGER'S COMMENTS

As the Board of Supervisors proclaims September as National Preparedness Month 16 years after the 9/11 attacks in New York and Washington, D.C., Henrico County remains committed to the key concepts of emergency preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation. For the past two weeks, County agencies been closely monitoring the progress of Hurricane Irma at the direction of Mr. Vithoulkas and will continue to monitor other threats such as Hurricane Jose.

Many other activities have taken place that may not be as well known to the public. For example, when the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) deployed all 28 of its Urban Search and Rescue Teams to Houston, Capt. Scott Kincaid from the Division of Fire was part of a team of 14 firefighters from Virginia Task Force II that traveled there to perform search and rescue missions. Capt. Mark Cumashot and Firefighter Mike Bassett from the Division of Fire's Technical Rescue Team were subsequently deployed from the same task force to Puerto Rico in advance of Hurricane Irma and since that hurricane hit have been performing damage assessment and search and rescue operations within the U.S. Virgin Islands. In June, Henrico County was recognized by the National Weather Service as one of 51 Storm Ready communities in Virginia, a designation that requires close coordination among the Division of Fire, Police Division, and Department of Public Works. Mr. Vithoulkas thanked Police Chief Humberto Cardounel and Fire Chief Tony McDowell for everything they do to make sure the Henrico community is prepared year-round.

Earlier this year, the new Varina Area Library was awarded the Library Building Award from the American Institute of Architects and American Library Association. It is the only award that recognizes whole library buildings for their design. Varina Area Library, one of only eight American and European libraries to receive this year's award, was noted for "(bridging) its rural and historic context with the contemporary ambitions of the community." Chuck Wray of BCWH, the Richmond architectural firm that designed the library, acknowledged the following members of BCWH's design team that worked with him on the project: Andrea Quillici, Kylan Shirley, Erin Richardson, and Shannon Wray. He also acknowledged the following members of the County staff who were integrally involved in the project and its design: Jerry McKenna, Director of Libraries; Barbara Weedman, Assistant Director of Libraries; John Neal, Director of General Services; and Richard Morse, Capital Projects Manager. Mr. Wray elaborated on Mr. Nelson's insights, thoughts, and suggestions for the project and presented the award to Mr. Nelson, who expressed appreciation to BCWH's design team and the County's project team while reflecting on the significance of the library and its design to the Varina District.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' COMMENTS

Mrs. O'Bannon noted the recent passing of a notable Henrico resident, Robbie Rilee, who was a beloved substitute teacher and homecoming parade grand marshal at Douglas S. Freeman High School. Mrs. Rilee is survived by her husband of 67 years, Gene Rilee. Mr. Rilee served on the Board as the Tuckahoe District representative for two terms during the 1970s.

RECOGNITION OF NEWS MEDIA

PRESENTATIONS

Mr. Thornton presented a proclamation recognizing September 24 – 30, 2017, as Active Aging Week. Accepting the proclamation was Jelisa Turner, Advocate for the Aging, Department of Human Resources. Joining her was Colleen Wilhelm, Director of Strategic Partnerships, Family Lifeline; Paula Reid, Director of Human Resources; Sheila Cunningham and Jennifer Godfrey, Recreation Coordinators, Division of Recreation and Parks; and Cindy Rinker, Arts Outreach Coordinator, The Cultural Arts Center at Glen Allen.

Mrs. O'Bannon presented a proclamation recognizing September 2017 as Preparedness Month. Accepting the proclamation was Anna McRay, Deputy Coordinator of Emergency Management. Joining her were Tony McDowell, Fire Chief; Humberto Cardounel, Police Chief; Maj. Pete MacRae, Deputy Chief of Police, Administrative Services Bureau; Bob "Smokey" Thompson, Fire Corps and Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) member; Grace Harrison, CERT member; and Jasmine Johnson, Henrico Health District Medical Reserve Corps Coordinator.

Mr. Branin presented a proclamation recognizing September 2017 as Recovery Month. Accepting the proclamation was John Marshall, Judge of the Circuit Court and Drug Court. Joining him were Michael L. Wade, Sheriff; Gary Hughes, Director of Community Corrections; Bernard Greene, Drug Court Administrator; Laura Totty, Director of Henrico Area Mental Health & Developmental Services (HAMHDS); Leslie Martin Stephen, Program Manager, HAMHDS; Chelsea Barlow, a person in recovery served by HAMHDS; and Frank Render, a Drug Court participant. Ms. Barlow and Mr. Render shared their personal addiction and recovery experiences and commented on the benefits of the County's treatment programs. Sheriff Wade thanked Mr. Vithoulkas and County Government Center employees for their support of the Opiate Recovery by Intensive Tracking (ORBIT) program, which helps jail inmates overcome opiate addiction and has served as a national model.

PUBLIC HEARINGS - REZONING CASES AND PROVISIONAL USE PERMITS

219-17 REZ2017-00019 Brookland Wilton Acquisition, LLC: Request to conditionally rezone from RTHC Residential Townhouse District (Conditional) to R-6C General Residence District (Conditional) Parcel 767-751-2632 containing 15.17 acres located on the south line of Wistar Road at its intersection with Shrader Road.

Mrs. O'Bannon expressed surprise at the following comment by Schools in the staff report for this case: "At the high school level, larger cohorts of students and other new developments are anticipated to impact Tucker High School. New schools, additions, and/or redistricting may be needed in the future." Mr. Hinson shared her surprise and voiced a concern that the comment was speculative. He commented on the complexity of projecting student yield information for proposed residential developments and questioned whether the baseline data used in these projections has been updated. Mr. Hinson suggested the information needs to be reviewed and confirmed. At Mr. Hinson's request, Planning Director Joe Emerson provided a flow chart containing a general timeline for construction of a residential

community. He commented on Schools student yield projections for this case and previous cases and stated he believes the student capacity at Tucker is sufficient to accommodate this proposed development and other developments that are underway. Mr. Branin commended Schools for attempting to calculate student yields and asked the Planning Department to work better with Schools in explaining how different types of housing affect student yields.

Mr. Hinson noted the County's land use plan is used as the basis for projecting utility capacities and if there is a need for utility improvements because of a new development then the developer is responsible for costs associated with those improvements.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Hinson, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following proffered conditions:

- 1. <u>Maximum Number and Size of Units.</u> The number of dwellings to be constructed onsite shall not exceed one hundred sixty (160) units. There will be 24 townhouses and 136 condominiums. The minimum square footage of finished floor area shall be 1,400 sq. ft. for either the two or four story units.
- 2. <u>Conceptual Plan.</u> Development of the Property shall be in substantial conformance with the attached conceptual site plan, Exhibit 'A' (see case file), unless otherwise approved by the Planning Commission at the time of Plan of Development approval. There will be no more than eight (8) units in a row in the entire development.
- 3. Exterior Materials. All buildings shall have exposed exterior walls (above grade and exclusive of trim) of stone, stone veneer, brick, hardiplank, or a combination of the foregoing unless different architectural treatment and/or materials are specially approved with respect to the exposed portion of any such wall, at the time of Plan of Development review. A minimum of twenty-five percent (25%) surfaces of each building, excluding windows, doors, breezeways, gables and architectural design features, shall be of brick, stone or stone veneer construction. The ends of units of any townhouse or condominium building that are parallel and adjacent to the entrance road shall contain a minimum of two (2) windows.

The applicant shall maintain a record of percentages of the materials for the front of the units where required and shall provide such lists at the time of each building permit.

4. <u>Exterior Elevations.</u> The dwelling units on the Property shall have an exterior architectural style and use design elements similar to the concept drawings attached as Exhibit 'B' (see case file), which such

renderings are conceptual in nature and are provided only as an illustration of the quality of the design and architectural style of such buildings. To minimize visual repetition of buildings, no two adjacent buildings shall have the same identical individual elevation sequence pattern across the front of the building.

- 5. Buffers Fences and Walls. There shall be ten (10) foot buffers along the eastern and southwestern property lines. There shall be a twenty-five (25) foot buffer along Wistar Road with decorative metal fence to have brick or stone columns fifty (50) feet on center and a wrought iron appearance. All buffers and fences are required unless approved during POD review.
- 6. Roads. All roads to be constructed in the development shall be privately maintained but shall be constructed in accordance with the County of Henrico's Public Road Standards and specifications with respect to pavement design and road width. All roads to be at least 24' in width. Prior to the issuance of the 21' Certificates of Occupancy, the applicant's engineer shall certify that the private roads serving the development have been constructed in compliance with the applicable Henrico County Road Standards as to width. This can be done in phases.
- 7. <u>Underground Utilities.</u> Except for junction boxes, meters and existing overhead utility lines and technical or environmental reasons, all utility lines shall be underground.
- 8. <u>Mechanical Equipment.</u> Mechanical equipment shall be screened from public view at ground level at the Property lines in a manner approved at the time of POD review.
- 9. <u>Lighting.</u> All lighting for the townhouses and additional parking areas will be by residential light posts. Parking lot lighting standards shall not exceed 15' in height and shall be positioned in such a manner as to minimize the impact of such lighting offsite.
- 10. <u>Signage</u>. Any detached signs on the Property shall be ground mounted, monolithic-type signs. The entrance sign and landscaping shall be constructed substantially similar to Exhibit 'D' (see case file) and shall include brick, brick veneer, stone, synthetic stone or similar masonry material with wrought iron accents. Such signs shall not exceed six (6) feet in height as measured from grade of the base of the sign and shall be externally lit employing ground-mounted floodlight or spotlight type fixtures directed toward such signs and away from public rights-of-way.
- 11. <u>Sound Suppression.</u> Walls between units shall have a minimum sound transmission coefficient rating of 54.

- 12. Restrictive Covenants/Homeowners Association. Prior to or concurrent with the conveyance of any part of the Property covered on the POD approved by the County, restrictive covenants describing development controls and maintenance of the property shall be recorded in the Clerk's Office of the Circuit Court of Henrico County. In addition, there shall be a Homeowners Association of the owners of the units on the property that shall be responsible for the enforcement of the restrictive covenants, including maintenance of the lots, common areas, roads and unit exteriors. Parking of recreational vehicles, boats and campers shall be prohibited in the development.
- 13. Trash Pickup and Street Cleaning. There shall be no trash pickup or street cleaning between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. any day of the week. There shall be no street cleaning or trash pick-up on Sundays. There shall be no central trash receptacles.
- 14. Mailboxes. All mailboxes shall be of a uniform design.
- Model Home. No more than two (2) dwelling units on the Property may be used for a model home. The garage for any such dwelling unit may be used for the office for the model home, provided that such office shall be converted to a garage when the dwelling unit is no longer used as a model home.
- 16. <u>Severance.</u> The unenforceability, elimination, revision or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the other proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.
- 17. Construction Hours. The hours of exterior construction activities, including operation of bulldozers and other earthmoving equipment shall be between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday, except in emergencies or where unusual circumstances require extending the specific hours in order to complete work such as concrete pours and utility connections. Hours shall be posted in both English and Spanish during construction of the community. Sunday hours shall be between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.
- 18. Conservation Areas. Notwithstanding the uses permitted and regulated by the zoning of the property, such portions of the Property which lie within a one hundred (100) year flood plain as determined by definitive engineering studies approved by the Department of Public Works, and such portions of the Property which may be inundated by waters impounded to a maximum elevation determined in a controlled, regulated manner by a structure or structures approved by the Department of Public Works, may only be used for the following purposes:
 - a. Stormwater management and retention areas;

- b. Ponds, lakes and similar areas intended as aesthetic or recreational amenities or wildlife habitats;
- c. Access drives, utility easements, signage, walkways and recreational facilities installed in a manner to minimize their impacts; and
- d. Such additional uses to be uses identified in (a), (b), and (c) above as may be deemed compatible and of the same general character by the Director of Planning pursuant to Chapters 19 and 24 of the County Code.
- 19. <u>BMP's.</u> Should any above ground BMP be required the BMP shall be landscaped per the Planning Commission and maintained by the homeowners' association of the R-6 zoned property. Any wet BMP required shall be aerated.
- 20. <u>Chimneys.</u> Any dwellings with a fireplace other than direct vent gas fireplaces or appliances shall have masonry chimneys faced with brick or stone similar to the foundation.
- 21. <u>Irrigation.</u> Front and side yards shall be sodded and irrigated.
- 22. Garages. Each residential unit on the Property shall be constructed with at least a one (1) car garage which can accommodate a car parked inside. Attached garages shall be integrated into the overall design and massing of the house. Windows shall be offered as an option for garage doors. All front load garage doors shall have, at a minimum, one architectural detail, including but not limited to windows, carriage door handles, exposed hinges or accent columns.
- 23. <u>Driveways.</u> All driveways shall be constructed of either cobblestone, brick, asphalt precast pavers, concrete or other similar materials approved by the Director of Planning. There shall be no driveways that directly access Wistar Road.
- 24. <u>Interior Sidewalks.</u> Sidewalks a minimum of four (4) feet in width shall be provided in front of all buildings.
- 25. <u>Trees and Landscaping.</u> There shall be at least one (1) tree with a minimum caliper of two and a half (2) inches at the time of planting, retained or planted on each side of each building. Landscape plans shall be subject to Planning Commission review. Once approved, minor alterations to the plan may be approved by the Director of Planning.
- 26. **Foundation Planting.** Each townhome shall have a minimum of four (4) shrubs planted along the front foundation.
- 27. **Perimeter Sign.** No trespassing signs will be installed around the perimeter of the wetlands.

- 28. Graveyard. Prior to POD approval the owner or developer shall have a visual examination survey performed by a registered professional archeologist to determine whether any graves exist on the property. If any graves are discovered, either prior to or during construction, the owner or developer shall either remove and reinter the remains or shall protect the remains and provide an ingress/egress easement, all as required by law.
- 29. <u>Sidewalk.</u> A standard 4' wide sidewalk with a 2' wide utility strip, shall be installed along the entire frontage of Wistar Road.

220-17 PUP2017-00016 Fairfield Dignus Holdings LLC: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Section 24-58.2(a), 24-120, and 24-122.1 of the County Code to allow 24-hour operation of a fitness facility on part of Parcel 811-723-6565 located on the south line of Nine Mile Road (State Route 33) approximately 900' southeast of its intersection with S. Laburnum Avenue.

Mark Harris, the shareholder in the shopping center where Planet Fitness is located, spoke in support of this item. He thanked the County, especially the Police Division, for assisting with this project and suggested the best way for the County to keep the area safe is to keep it clean through mandatory grass cutting. Mr. Harris responded to questions from Mr. Nelson regarding the ownership and economics of the shopping center. He made a further suggestion that the Planning Department focus more on security measures and outdoor trash cans than architecture in working with developers. Mrs. O'Bannon asked Mr. Harris to share these comments directly with Mr. Emerson.

Jean Moore, Assistant Director of Planning, responded to questions from Mr. Thornton regarding security measures associated with this case and the shopping center. Mr. Thornton asked that the Department of Planning let him know when security cameras and a video system are in place on the subject site. At Mr. Thornton's request, Ms. Moore commented on why this case is more efficacious than a similar case that was recently denied by the Board.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Hinson, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following conditions:

1. All proffered conditions accepted with case C-69C-04 shall be made a part of this Provisional Use Permit.

- 2. This permit shall apply only to the tenant space occupied by Planet Fitness as shown on Exhibit A (see case file).
- 3. The owner and/or operator of the establishment shall allow the Crime Prevention Unit of the Division of Police to conduct a security survey of the location to identify potential security risks and to recommend additional prevention measures, if any, to be implemented by the business.
- 4. The owner and/or operator of the establishment shall install and maintain a security camera and video system designed by a security specialist. The security system shall include the following items:
 - a. Exterior surveillance cameras monitoring the entrance(s), parking area(s), and any other areas deemed necessary by the Division of Police. Such security cameras shall provide clear imagery of the establishment's patrons and their vehicles.
 - b. Tapes or digital files showing recorded activities in the areas under surveillance shall be preserved for a period of thirty (30) days. Authorized representatives of the Henrico County Police Department and the Henrico County Planning Department shall have access to such tapes upon request.
- 5. The owner and/or operator of the establishment shall provide adequate lighting for the entrances, exits, and parking areas serving the business. Adequate lighting shall be defined as lighting sufficient for clear visual and security camera surveillance.
- 6. Trespassing enforcement authorization, including the placement of "no trespassing" signage, shall be provided to the Police Division prior to 24-hour operation.
- 7. Extended hours of operation shall not result in loitering, criminal activity, traffic or public nuisance in the area surrounding the business. In the event that evidence (i.e. police calls to the premises or complaints) indicates the extended hours of operation are having an adverse effect (i.e. increased public nuisance, loitering, excessive noise outside the building, criminal assault, traffic, etc.) on the surrounding area, the Board of Supervisors may hold a public hearing to consider revoking the provisional use permit.

Neal Luther, Director of Recreation and Parks, responded to a question from Mr. Nelson concerning the project schedule for the Four Mile Creek Restroom project. Mr. Vithoulkas responded to a question from Mr. Nelson regarding the County's arrangement with Chesterfield County to relieve overcrowding at Henrico County's jail.

Mr. Crawford and Al Ciarochi, Assistant Superintendent of Schools for Operations, responded to a series of questions from Mr. Nelson pertaining to funding for additional instructional assistants at Glen Lea, Montrose, and Ratcliffe Elementary Schools. Mr. Nelson and Mr. Vithoulkas expressed concern that requests for this funding were directed to Mr. Nelson after the Board of Supervisors had already fully funded the budget requested by the School Board. Mr. Branin raised concerns that some of the new teacher positions funded by the Board of Supervisors in the current year's budget to lower student-teacher ratios remain unfilled. Mr. Thornton suggested the Board needs to be more active in questioning requests for funding from the school system. There were further comments by Mr. Nelson and comments by Mrs. O'Bannon relating to this funding request. Mr. Vithoulkas assured Mr. Nelson he will have answers to the Board's questions about this funding request prior to the public hearing on this item at the Board's September 26 meeting.
