The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a regular meeting on Tuesday, June 12, 2018, at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico County, Virginia.

Angela Davis, Church Administrator for the City of Refuge Church of Our Lord of Jesus Christ in Sandston, delivered the invocation.

#### **MANAGER'S COMMENTS**

Lt. James A. Price is celebrating 45 years of service with the Henrico County Police Division. Lieutenant Price began his career as a Communications Officer at Virginia Commonwealth University and was hired as a Henrico Police Officer on May 30, 1973. He has served in numerous Henrico Police units, including Patrol Operations, Communications, Criminal

Investigations, Internal Affairs, Homeland Security, and Evidence and Logistics. Lieutenant Price was a member of the Incident Management Team's Crisis Negotiations Unit from 1977 to 1996 and was the unit's Team Leader from 1980 to 1996. In 2011, he completed the Administrative Officers Management Program, a three-month leadership and professional development program at North Carolina State University. Lieutenant Price has a keen knowledge of the Police Division's history, has been dubbed the division's historian, and takes great pride in sharing the division's history with recruits and younger officers to ensure the values, traditions, and sacrifices made by others are not forgotten. Mr. Vithoulkas thanked and congratulated Lieutenant Price on his 50 years of public service, 45 of which have been dedicated to Henrico County. Joining Lieutenant Price were his wife of 26 years, Bonnie, and other public safety officials who were present. Mr. Thornton also thanked Lieutenant Price for his years of stellar service.

## **BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' COMMENTS**

Mrs. O'Bannon:announced her mother turned 99 years old on June 11.

Mrs. O'Bannon recognized Susie Romans, Director of Public Affairs for the Richmond Stake of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, who was joined by Fire Chief Tony McDowell and Fire Captain Joe Powers. Over the past three months, Mrs. Romans and her team collaborated with the Henrico County Division of Fire and fire departments from Chesterfield, Hanover, and Richmond to develop and present an event focusing on community risk reduction. These agencies worked together to develop a "Firefighter Appreciation Day" on May 19, 2018, which was attended by more than 300 members of the metropolitan Richmond area's Mormon community. During this event, Captain Powers provided an overview of the Henrico Division of Fire's community-based services as well as a community risk reduction message that focused on the importance of having working smoke alarms in the home. Also, firefighters from Gayton Firehouse #13 provided fire truck demonstrations and interacted with both children and adults to spread the message of the importance of exit drills in the home and the importance of working smoke alarms. Mrs. Romans addressed the Board and expressed her appreciation for the partnership that made the event a success.

Mr. Nelson reported that the Highland Springs Historic District was recently listed on the National Park Services' National Register of Historic Places. The district encompasses 60 blocks, and over 1,400 properties are affected. State and federal tax credits are available to property owners to rehabilitate their homes and other structures. There will be a press conference on June 21 at the Henrico Theatre officially acknowledging this national designation.

Mr. Nelson pointed out Mr. Vithoulkas' son graduated from Glen Allen High School earlier in the day and he will have the opportunity to see his own son cross the stage and graduate from Highland Springs High School on June 20.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

135-18 Resolution - Resignation of Member - Henrico County Planning Commission.

Mr. Vithoulkas stated this resignation was deemed appropriate because the member, Varina District representative Eric Leabough, has been hired as the County's first Housing Specialist.

On motion of Nelson, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

Mr. Branin noted he served with Mr. Leabough on the Planning Commission and thinks Mr. Leabough is quite an asset to the County. Mr. Nelson commented on Mr. Leabough's understanding of planning from the perspective of local government and acknowledged Mr. Leabough's work with citizens and businesses to make a better Varina and Henrico County. He referred to Mr. Leabough's many years of professional experience in state and local government and the wealth of knowledge he will bring to his new role. Mr. Nelson remarked that his nominee to replace Mr. Leabough, William Mackey, has served on several County boards and commissions during Mr. Nelson's tenure on the Board of Supervisors and will be a great addition to the Planning Commission. In reference to Agenda Item No. 134-18, Mr. Nelson remarked that Walter Johnson resigned from the Cable Television Advisory Committee to become available for appointment to the Board of Zoning Appeals by the Henrico Circuit Court.

## PUBLIC HEARINGS - REZONING CASES AND PROVISIONAL USE PERMIT

137-18 REZ2018-00006 Three Chopt CR APT Land LC: Request to conditionally rezone from O-3 Office District and O-3C Office District (Conditional) to UMUC Urban Mixed-Use (Conditional) Parcel 747-759-4312 containing 5.427 acres located on the west line of Cox Road at its overpass of I-64.

Mr. Vithoulkas pointed out this item and Agenda Item No. 138-18 (PUP2018-00001) were companion cases requiring separate votes but would be presented together.

Joe Emerson, Director of Planning, clarified the parking requirements for this proposed development, in response to a concern expressed by Mrs. O'Bannon. He confirmed for Mr. Branin that staff was satisfied with the proposed development's connectivity and walkability for pedestrians. Mr. Emerson and Tiffany Hinton, Director of Research and Planning for Henrico County Public Schools (HCPS), responded to questions from Mr. Branin concerning student yield information contained in the staff report for this case. Mr. Emerson explained why the number of students generated by this proposed development is expected to be lower than the projections made by HCPS. Steven Middleton, a representative of the applicant, clarified for Mrs. O'Bannon the anticipated number of one-bedroom, two-bedroom, and three-bedroom units.

Andy Condlin from the law firm of Roth Jackson presented the case on behalf of the applicant. He highlighted the key location of the proposed development, its multiple points of access, the provision of a pedestrian-oriented activity center, the variety of mixed uses in this quadrant, and the counter traffic pattern that will result from the proposed development's residential component.

Karen Hamilton, a resident of the Three Chopt District; spoke in opposition to this item and Item No. 138-18. She expressed concerns relating to traffic, density, and environmental impacts, including the destruction of forests and habitats for migratory birds and other wildlife.

Mr. Branin requested that the environmental study conducted for the subject property be reviewed by the Director of Planning and a copy provided to the Board. He asked that a letter be directed to the County's Building Official confirming the proposed development will not cause overcrowding.

On motion of Mr. Branin, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

1. <u>Master Plan.</u> The Property shall be developed in general conformance with the standards set forth in the pattern book entitled "COX ROAD MULTI-FAMILY DEVELOPMENT, HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA, COMMUNITY PATIERN BOOK," dated May 1, 2018, prepared by Poole & Poole Architecture, LLC (the

"Pattern Book"), (see case file) which is conceptual in nature and may vary in massing, height and final density provided the design, general layout, elevations and other details are in general conformance with the Pattern Book. The specific design, general layout, elevations and other details may vary from the Pattern Book as required for final engineering, design or compliance with governmental regulations, or as approved during any Plan of Development, subdivision, or building permit review or by the Director of Planning provided the Director of Planning finds the deviations are generally in keeping with the spirit and intent of the Pattern Book.

- 2. <u>Prohibited\_Uses.</u> The following uses shall be prohibited on the Property:
  - a. automotive filling and service stations including towing service;
  - b. billiard, bagatelle, video game or a bingo parlor, unless accessory to a permitted use;
  - c. flea markets or antique auctions;
  - d. billboards:
  - e. recycling facilities;
  - f. funeral homes, mortuaries, crematories and/or undertaking establishments;
  - g. dance halls;
  - h truck stops;
  - i. gun shop, sales and repair;
  - j. sign painting shops;
  - k. theaters:
  - l. communication towers;
  - m. adult businesses as defined by Section 24-3 of the Henrico County Code:
  - n. establishments whose primary business is check cashing and/or the making of payday loans as defined and regulated by Sections 6.2-2100 et seq. and 6.2-1800 et seq. of the Code of Virginia (the foregoing shall not preclude banks, savings and loans or similar financial institutions that are not regulated by the foregoing Virginia Code sections):
  - o. restaurants with drive-thru windows, not to exclude, however, restaurants with dedicated parking spaces for the pick-up of carry-out food nor restaurants whose primary business is the sale of specialty coffees or other non-alcoholic beverages or pastry;
  - p. car title loan operations;
  - q. fuel pumps associated with permitted uses; and
  - r. motels or motor lodges.
- 3. <u>Severance.</u> The unenforceability, elimination, revision or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the other proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.

138-18 PUP2018-00001 Three Chopt CR APT Land LC: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Sections 24-32.1(a, n, s, t, v, w, and z), 24-120 and 24-122.1 of Chapter 24 of the County Code to allow for an area designated for the preparation or service of food or beverages or the sale or display of merchandise conducted in an open area or structure; parking garage with no associated ground floor retail uses; buildings and structures exceeding 60' in height; density of residential exceeding 30 dwelling units per acre; open space within a development of less than 20 percent; commercial or office square footage of less than 25 percent of the total building square footage of the UMU district; and the number of for-lease multifamily dwelling units exceeding 30 percent of the total units of the UMU district on Parcel 747-759-4312 located on the west line of Cox Road at its overpass of I-64.

On motion of Mr. Branin, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following conditions:

- 1. Master Plan, Density, and Percentage of For-Lease Multifamily Units. All development on the property shall be in general conformance with Cox Road Multifamily Development Community Pattern Book, dated May 1, 2018, (see case file) which is conceptual in nature. The development of the Property may be phased and may vary in massing, height and final density provided the design, general layout, elevations and other details are in general conformance with the Pattern Book. The specific design, general layout, elevations and other details may vary from the Pattern Book as required for final engineering, design or compliance with governmental regulations, or as approved during any Plan of Development, subdivision, or building permit review or by the Director of Planning provided the Director of Planning finds the deviations are generally in keeping with the spirit and intent of the Pattern Book. Development shall not exceed (but may be less than) seventy-five 75 units per acre. The total number of dwelling units shall not exceed (but may be less than) 407 units. The number of for lease multi-family dwelling units may exceed 30% of the total units of the UMU district and all of the units developed on the Property may be multi-family for-lease.
- 2. Outdoor Vending Areas. Areas of the Property may be designated on the master plan, which may be revised from time to time, or a Plan of Development, for the preparation of food or beverages or the sale or display of merchandise conducted in an open area or structure by one or more individual vendors operating from stalls, stands, carts, vehicles or other spaces which are rented or otherwise

made available to such vendors. Such activities may include a market, sale of merchandise as part of a permitted festival or other similar special event, or the outdoor display or sale by a single food or beverage vendor, operated as an incidental part of retail activity regularly conducted from within a permanent building on the premises. Sidewalk widths adjacent to outdoor vending areas shall not be reduced to less than five (5) feet, except to accommodate a permitted festival or other similar special event. Trash receptacles shall be provided and conveniently located for each block that contains an outdoor vending area. Any outdoor vending areas shall not be open to the public after 10:00 p.m.

The number of outdoor events shall be limited to no more than four events during the calendar year and administratively approved by the Planning Department.

- 3. Parking Structure Design and Fire Protection. Parking structures without ground floor retail uses along at least one facade or without usable floor space for residential or nonresidential uses along any facade that faces a one-family use or public or private street shall be permitted, provided the design of such structures is consistent with the Cox Road Multi-Family Community Pattern Book (see case file REZ2018-0006) as determined at the time of Plan of Development Review. A 3" standpipe for fire protection shall be provided within all structured parking at approximately 200' intervals. The exact location of these improvements will be determined during Plan of Development review.
- 4. Building Height and Emergency Communication Systems.
  Buildings may exceed 60' in height. Buildings on the Property shall not exceed 85' in height. For any building above 60' in height, the owner shall install a fire command center and emergency radio communication equipment in the building to allow for adequate public safety and radio coverage within and between the buildings. A communications consultant shall certify such equipment as compatible with the County's emergency communication system within 90 days of the owner or tenant obtaining a Certificate of Occupancy for any such building. The County shall be permitted to perform communications testing within the buildings at any time.
- 5. Open Space. Open space on the site may be less than 20%, but no less than 10%.
- 6. <u>Commercial/Office Square Footage.</u> The minimum commercial and office square footage may be less than 25% of the site's aggregate building square footage provided the layout is consistent with the concept plan as determined at the time of POD.

If at any time the residential use changes to commercial and/or office uses (other than the leasing office shown on the conceptual plan), the

applicant shall provide a traffic study if requested by the traffic engineer.

- 7. <u>Crime Prevention.</u> Prior to occupancy of any new structure containing commercial or office uses, the applicant and the Crime Prevention Unit of the Division of Police shall conduct a security survey of the property. The applicant shall implement mutually agreed upon security recommendations.
- 8. **Proffered Conditions.** All proffered conditions accepted with case REZ2018-00006 shall be made a part of this Provisional Use Permit.

139-18 REZ2018-00005 Three Chopt John Chandler & Company LLC: Request to conditionally rezone from A-1 Agricultural District to R-2AC One-Family Residence District (Conditional) Parcels 751-764-6432 and 751-764-6608 containing 3.59 acres located on the east line of Thorncroft Drive approximately 300' north of its intersection with Chicopee Road.

Steve Yob, Director of Public Works, confirmed for Mr. Branin that all of the roads in this community will be repaided by November 2018 in response to road maintenance concerns raised during a community meeting on this item.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Branin, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. <u>Min. Finished Area.</u> Homes shall be a minimum of 2,300 square feet.
- 2. <u>Foundations & Chimneys.</u> Foundations shall be finished in brick or stone veneer or stucco/parge coat. Other than direct vent fireplaces, no fireplace or chimney shall cantilever.
- 3. <u>Utilities.</u> All should be underground except for junction boxes and meters, or where technical or environmental reasons prohibit.
- 4. Garages. All shall be attached, min. one car, side or rear load.
- 5. **Driveways.** Acceptable materials are asphalt, concrete or pavers.
- 6. <u>Construction Hours.</u> Work can be in progress Monday through Friday, 7:30 AM until 6:00 PM. Saturday hours are 9:00 AM until

4:00 PM. If circumstances require extending these hours, they would be limited to utility connections, concrete pours or other similar circumstances.

- 7. <u>Density.</u> No more than (4) four buildable lots. All homes shall front Thorncroft.
- 8. <u>Log Cabin.</u> Prior to its deconstruction and removal, Henrico County is permitted to photo document the exterior.
- 9. <u>Lot Widths.</u> Lot widths shall be a minimum of (100') one hundred feet.
- 10. <u>Site Plan Conformance.</u> The development shall follow, within general conformance, the attached, proposed, survey plat dated 5-9-18 (see case file).
- 11. <u>Severance.</u> The inability to enforce, elimination, revision or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall not affect the enforceability of the proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.

140-18 REZ2018-00021 Varina Godsey & Son, Inc.: Request to conditionally rezone from A-1 Agricultural District to M-2C General Industrial District (Conditional) Parcels 813-711-5121 and 813-711-6615 containing 4.506 acres located on the north line of Charles City Road approximately 500' west of Glen Alden Drive.

The applicant's representative, John Montgomery, agreed to waive the applicant's right to present the case, at the request of Mr. Nelson.

Ms. Hamilton spoke in opposition to this item. She expressed concerns regarding the loss of open space and migratory bird and wildlife habitats. She disputed the validity of environmental and traffic studies associated with the proposed development. Mr. Rapisarda countered Mrs. Hamilton's contention that the Board has violated the United States Constitution with its zoning decisions. Mrs. Hamilton offered further comments alleging the Board is violating the Constitution and Comprehensive Plan.

In response to questions from Mr. Branin, Mr. Yob confirmed that construction projects have been suspended until September 2018 because of migratory bat season. Mr. Nelson noted the request before the Board was for a rezoning in an industrial district rather than a residential area. He commented favorably on the proposed development, which he thinks will add to the corridor.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. Best efforts shall be made to preserve the existing vegetation within all of the required transitional landscape buffers.
- 2. No building constructed on the property shall exceed thirty (30) feet in height.
- 3. Parking lot lighting fixtures shall not exceed twenty (20) feet in height as measured from the grade of the base of the lighting standard. The light shall be from a concealed source and shall be reduced to minimum security levels after business hours.
- 4. All roof top heating and air conditioning equipment shall be screened from public view from the adjacent properties and public streets.
- 5. All proposed utility lines such as electric, telephone, CATV or other similar uses shall be installed underground.
- Freestanding signs shall not exceed six (6) feet in height and signage shall be limited to monolithic type signs, attached signs and directional signs.
- 7. All trash receptacles shall be screened with materials compatible with the proposed building.
- 8. Dedication of right-of-way, pavement widening and installation of curb and gutter and any necessary storm sewer along Charles City Road shall be provided as required by the Department of Public Works at the time of plan of development approval.
- 9. All retail uses shall be prohibited on the property.
- 10. A twenty-five (25) foot landscaping buffer shall be provided along the property line adjacent to Charles City Road.
- 11. The enforceability, elimination, revision or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the other proffers or unaffected part of such proffer.
- 12. The exterior building materials and colors shall be in substantial conformity to the plan prepared by Engineering Design Associates and dated April 25, 2018 (see case file).
- 13. The property will be developed in substantial conformity to the conceptual site plan prepared by Engineering Design Associates and dated February 12, 2018, and last revised April 20, 2018 (see case file).

- 14. The property will only be used for the following Principal Uses: uses permitted in the M-1 District and contractors equipment storage yard.
- 15. All outdoor storage of equipment and materials will be beyond the "storage limit line" as shown on the conceptual site plan prepared by Engineering Design Associates and dated February 12, 2018, and last revised April 20, 2018 (see case file).

141-18 REZ2018-00023 Fairfield Land One, LLC: Request to conditionally rezone from R-5C General Residence District (Conditional) and B-2C Business District (Conditional) to R-5C General Residence District (Conditional) Parcel 804-737-7961 and part of Parcel 804-736-0481 containing 20.58 acres located on the north line of Neale Street approximately 300' east of its intersection with Mechanicsville Turnpike (U.S. Route 360).

In response to a question from Mr. Thornton prompted by citizen concerns and requests, Mr. Yob clarified that the traffic signal at the intersection of Neal Street and Mechanicsville Turnpike is controlled by the Virginia Department of Transportation but the widening of Neal Street would be a County responsibility.

Mr. Condlin presented the case on behalf of the applicant. He pointed out the applicant has proffered a density that is approximately half of what was allowed under the existing zoning on the subject property. Mr. Condlin also commented on the proposed development's environmental features, quality standards, and reduced construction hours. He responded to a question from Mr. Thornton regarding the proffered density.

Ms. Hamilton spoke in opposition to this item. She stated the proposed development would violate the U.S. Constitution, several environmental treaties, and the County's Comprehensive Plan; eliminate wildlife habitat; provide too much density; and desecrate the landscape.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mr. Branin, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

1. Proffer 1 of Case C-11C-09 shall be deleted in its entirety and the following inserted in its place:

Conceptual Layout. The development of the property shall be comparable to that shown on the plan entitled "GROVE POINT TOWNHOMES, FAIRFIELD DISTRICT, HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA, COLOR PLAN", dated February 14, 2018, prepared by

the Bay Companies, and attached as Exhibit 1 (see case file), (the "Conceptual Plan"). Sidewalks and the boulevard entrance shall be located as generally illustrated on the Conceptual Plan. All landscaping and grassed areas shall be irrigated.

2. Proffer 2 of Case C-11C-09 shall be deleted in its entirety and the following inserted in its place:

Construction. No Construction traffic for the development of the subject Property shall be permitted to use Orchard Glen Drive and the construction entrance shall be located on Neale Street, unless otherwise approved at the time of Plan of Development approval. The hours of exterior construction activities, including operation of bulldozers and other earthmoving equipment shall be permitted only between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and 7:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on Saturdays, except in emergencies or where unusual circumstances require extending the specific hours in order to complete work such as concrete pours and utility connections. Signs, in both English and Spanish, stating the above-referenced provisions, shall be posted and maintained at all construction entrances to the Property prior to any land disturbance activities thereon.

3. Proffer 3 of Case C-11C-09 shall be deleted in its entirety and the following inserted in its place:

Entrances. The entrance to the property from Neale Street shall be a boulevard entrance complemented with landscaping and a brick, stone or stucco monument entrance feature as generally shown on "SCHEMATIC AMENITY PLAN, GROVE POINT, HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA", dated February 28, 2018, prepared by HG design studio, and attached as Exhibit 2 (see case file). Prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy permit for the 82nd dwelling unit constructed on the Property, if requested and approved by the County at the time of subdivision approval, an emergency access entrance road from Orchard Glen Drive, as an alternative to a public road entrance, shall be constructed to the below specifications in the location shown on the Concept Plan (the "Emergency Access Road"). The Emergency Access Road shall be paved with asphalt at a width of 12 feet, and have posts and chains or gates with locks on each end as required by the County. No vehicular traffic shall be permitted to use the Emergency Access Road other than public emergency vehicles.

## **PUBLIC HEARINGS - OTHER ITEMS**

Resolution - Amendments to the FY 2017-18 Annual Fiscal Plan: June, 2018.

Neil Luther, Director of Recreation and Parks, responded to questions and comments from the Board pertaining to a proposed amendment to provide funding for professional services to convert the existing three multipurpose fields at Deep Run Park into a cricket field that can also be used for other Mr. Nelson expressed concerns the Central Virginia Cricket Association is being displaced from Holladay Elementary School where the organization has played cricket for more than 20 years. The displacement is occurring because of the construction of a new elementary school on that site. Mr. Luther elaborated on the advantages of the new field that is being constructed at Deep Run Park and how demand for the field will be accommodated through scheduling. Mr. Nelson suggested the Board should consider looking at other locations where additional fields can be constructed. Mr. Thornton noted he has also been contacted by the association and believes it is important the County show sensitivity to this group and other athletic groups that have been around for a long time, so they do not feel they are being marginalized. Mrs. O'Bannon pointed out the availability of college athletic scholarship drives much of the need for athletic fields at high schools. Mrs. Lynch expressed concerns relating to the type of pitch that is being constructed at Wilder Middle School for a new developmental level cricket field at that site. Ms. Lynch commented on the challenge of scheduling multiple clubs at one field during prime cricket season and suggested there is a need for more cricket facilities in this community. Mr. Nelson reiterated the concern about having multiple cricket organizations sharing one facility. Mr. Branin pointed out the Richmond Strikers currently have 200 youth signed up to play cricket and will be requesting access to the Deep Run field.

There was further discussion by Mr. Nelson, Mr. Branin, and Mr. Luther regarding field scheduling through the Division of Recreation and Parks. Mrs. O'Bannon noted the demand for more pickleball fields. Mr. Nelson recommended the Board begin looking for funding and a location for another cricket field. Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Nelson, and Mr. Branin requested a future work session to discuss capital funding for additional athletic fields and facilities to meet the growing demand. Mr. Vithoulkas advised the Board that staff will prepare for a work session on this topic in anticipation of the upcoming year's capital budget.

Ms. Hamilton voiced concerns that the County's parks are sporting venues and not wildlife habitats. She stated the Board has marginalized and not shown sensitivity towards bird watchers and nature lovers, and sporting events are frightening parent birds during nesting season. Ms. Hamilton alleged the Board is violating the Constitution and international treaties.

On motion of Mr. Branin, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

Ordinance - To Amend and Reordain Section 2-146 of the Code of the County of Henrico Titled "Funding of law library" to Reflect the Relocation of the Municipal Government & Law Library.

In response to a comment by Mr. Vithoulkas, Mr. Rapisarda explained the Municipal & Law Library has been moved to Tuckahoe Area Library due to a court refresh project and the judges' desire to dedicate that space for jury assembly.

Ms. Hamilton addressed the Board on this item. Mr. Rapisarda clarified for her that the public hearing for this item was advertised twice in the Richmond Times-Dispatch as required by the Code of Virginia. Mrs. O'Bannon responded to concerns voiced by Ms. Hamilton that the new location of the Municipal Government & Law Library is less accessible from the County bus lines. Mr. Vithoulkas clarified for Ms. Hamilton that there was no cost associated with the relocation, just a reallocation of shelf space.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Branin, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached ordinance.

Ben Blankinship, Zoning Division Manager, narrated a slide presentation. He referred to the rapid growth in the brewery industry in the last couple of decades and reviewed current and proposed County zoning regulations for breweries, wineries, and distilleries.

Ms. Hamilton spoke in opposition to this item. She questioned the need for more breweries and expressed concerns regarding drunk driving. On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Branin, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached ordinance.

## **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

Yvette Ohree, a resident of the Varina District speaking on behalf of employees of The East End Landfill (TEEL), asked that the County reconsider closing the landfill. She noted TEEL donated \$10,000 to Baker Elementary School last year after the school was damaged by a fire. Ms. Ohree illustrated how closing the landfill would create a hardship for its employees.

Ms. Hamilton voiced concerns regarding testimony offered by a Henrico police officer at a Circuit Court trial. The case involved a complaint filed by Mrs. Hamilton alleging that an unlicensed surveyor trespassed on her mother's property.

#### GENERAL AGENDA

Resolution - Amendment to Operating and Capital Annual Fiscal Plans for Fiscal Year 2018-19 and Appropriation of Funds for Fiscal Year 2018-19.

Mr. Hinton noted this amendment would amend the FY 2019 budget approved by the Board of Supervisors at its April 24 meeting by adding \$3.2 million to the general fund budget for schools. The additional funding is a product of a conversation that began on March 21 between the Board of Supervisors and the School Board during the legislative budget reviews regarding classroom sizes and staff supports. The conversation was further validated on April 16 in a special joint meeting of the Board of Supervisors and the School Board. Of the \$3.2 million under consideration, \$2 million will come from additional state aid provided in the recently adopted state budget and the other \$1.2 will come from estimated meals tax and sales tax receipts. Mr. Hinton shared a plan for anticipated allocation of the additional funding that was finalized by the School Board and submitted to the County Manager by the Superintendent of Schools on June 8. The plan contains an itemized list of school supports to improve teacher retention. The list primarily addresses classroom sizes and teacher supports, but also includes an item not previously discussed with the Board of Supervisors for additional pay increases for bus drivers.

Mr. Nelson questioned some of the items on the list, particularly the hourly wage step increase for bus drivers, and questioned a statement in the letter from the Superintendent of Schools that the School Board has not acted on any of the items and some may change. Mr. Vithoulkas pointed out the action the Board of Supervisors is considering is to change one number in the budget for the general fund component of education. Mr. Rapisarda clarified that under Virginia state law it is the prerogative of the School Board to manage funds that are appropriated by the Board of Supervisors for education, and the plan submitted by the Superintendent for allocating the proposed \$3.2 million appropriation does not legally bind the School Board to those items.

Mr. Nelson commented further on his questions and concerns pertaining to the Superintendent's letter and the School Board's plan. There was extended discussion by the Board of Supervisors relating to the School Board's responsibility for allocating education funds and the Board of Supervisors' limited control over the education funds its appropriates. Mrs. O'Bannon remarked she liked some of the items on the list, especially the focus on behavior modification. Mrs. Lynch stated she is glad a proactive stance is being taken in the market for bus drivers but pointed out her original request was for an additional \$4.3 million for teacher compensation. In response to Mr. Nelson's concerns regarding the Board of Supervisors' limited control over school expenditures, Mr. Branin acknowledged that although the School Board could detour around some of the items in the plan for this appropriation the Board of Supervisors could call out the School Board during next year's budget discussions should this be the case. He commented that he believes if the School Board does threequarters of these items it will better the teachers' work situation.

Chris Sorenson, Assistant Superintendent for Finance, addressed the Board at Mrs. Lynch's request and explained why the School Board's plan includes an hourly wage step increase for bus drivers. He responded to questions from the Board. Mr. Vithoulkas noted the Board of Supervisors was confused because there was no previous discussion by the Superintendent or School Board with him or the Board of Supervisors regarding additional compensation for bus drivers. He indicated part of the issue is the Department of Human Resources for Henrico Public Schools has established six different pay scales for bus drivers. Mr. Vithoulkas suggested to Mr. Sorenson that this issue be addressed by Schools. There were further comments by Mr. Nelson and Mrs. O'Bannon pertaining to the School Board's stewardship of funds appropriated by the Board of Supervisors. Mrs. Lynch expressed hope the School Board will have the same courage in addressing teacher pay as it has demonstrated by taking a market approach toward compensation for bus drivers.

Mr. Thornton closed the discussion by suggesting the Board of Supervisors needs to remember its mission and recognize it cannot control the School Board. He remarked there must be public participation and all parts must be working in a collegial way to have an outstanding educational system. He asked that both the Board of Supervisors and School Board strive to do better to reach the oasis of excellence.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mr. Branin, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

For the purpose of interpreting and construing this chapter, certain words and terms used herein shall have the following meanings, unless the context requires otherwise.

Brewery. A business licensed by the commonwealth to brew beer without limitation as to number of barrels per year, which may include bottling and wholesale distribution.

<u>Distillery.</u> A business licensed by the commonwealth to manufacture alcoholic beverages other than wine and beer, which may include bottling and wholesale distribution.

<u>Farm winery</u>. A business licensed by the commonwealth as a farm winery under title 4.1 of the Code of Virginia.

Limited brewery. A business licensed by the commonwealth to manufacture no more than 15,000 barrels of beer per calendar year, provided (i) the brewery is located on a farm in the commonwealth on land zoned agricultural and owned or leased by such brewery or its owner and (ii) agricultural products, including barley, other grains, hops, or fruit, used by such brewery in the manufacture of its beer are grown on the farm.

Limited distillery. A business licensed by the commonwealth to manufacture no more than 36,000 gallons of alcoholic beverages other than wine or beer per calendar year, provided (i) the distillery is located on a farm in the commonwealth on land zoned agricultural and owned or leased by such distillery or its owner and (ii) agricultural products used by such distillery in the manufacture of its alcoholic beverages are grown on the farm.

<u>Microbrewery.</u> A business licensed by the commonwealth to brew beer that brews no more than 3,000 barrels of beer per calendar year for sale at a restaurant or retail business on the same premises where the beer is brewed.

Winery. A business licensed by the commonwealth as a winery under title 4.1 of the Code of Virginia.

2. That Section 24-32 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 24-32. Principal uses permitted.

A building or land shall be used only for the purposes stated in this section. Unless otherwise provided by this section, no principal use other than a place of worship, office building, hotel, or motel shall exceed 10,000 square feet in floor area.

(ee) Restaurant, delicatessen, <u>microbrewery</u>, and ice cream parlor, but not restaurants having drive-through windows.

3. That Section 24-51 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 24-51. Principal uses permitted.

A building or land shall be used only for the following purposes:

(i) Farm winery, limited brewery, or limited distillery.

4. That Section 24-54.1 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 24-54.1. Principal uses permitted.

A building or land shall be used only for the following purposes:

(v) Stores or shops for the conduct of retail sales including sale of art and art supplies, auto parts and accessories (but no service and/or installation), beverages (but not including brewing, distilling, or manufacturing alcoholic beverages), books, carpets, clothing, computers and software, draperies, drugs, fabrics, furniture and appliances, garden supplies, gifts, glass sales and service excluding auto or truck repairs, handcrafts, hardware or locksmiths, hobby supplies, jewelry, office supplies and stationery, paint, picture framing, wallpaper, shoes and shoe repair, sporting goods, televisions, video recorders, stereos, radios, microwaves, sales, service and small appliance repair, video store, variety store and stores and shops similar to the preceding. No individual shop or store shall occupy more than 10,000 square feet of floor area except when located within an approved shopping center.
