# COUNTY OF HENRICO, VIRGINIA BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING September 11, 2018

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a regular meeting on Tuesday, September 11, 2018, at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico County, Virginia.

Mr. Thornton called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m. and led the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Reverend Alan Ray, Senior Pastor of Ridge Baptist Church delivered the invocation.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Branin, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved the minutes of the August 14, 2018, Regular and Special Meetings, and January 12 - 13, 2018, Special Meeting.

#### MANAGER'S COMMENTS

On September 11, 2001, 2,823 people were killed when two commercial airliners were deliberately flown into the World Trade Center twin towers in New York City, after terrorists hijacked both aircraft for that purpose. Within 30 minutes of the attack on the World Trade

Center twin towers in New York City, 193 individuals were killed when, in a similar attack, a commercial jetliner was flown into the Pentagon in Washington, D.C. Within a short period of time following the attack on the Pentagon, United Airlines Flight 93, which had been hijacked as well, crashed in an open field in Pennsylvania, killing all 40 individuals on board. It is important not to forget what occurred that day, including the sacrifices made by public safety personnel with the intent of saving as many lives as they could, even if it could cost them theirs. Mr. Vithoulkas asked that the Board of Supervisors and those watching the meeting join him for a moment of silence in an expression of gratitude and respect for those who suffered so much for the cause of freedom.

On August 20, in Charlotte, North Carolina, Jeff Conley of the Department of Finance's Purchasing Division was nominated and selected as the 2018 Coordinator of the Year by the Carolinas-Virginia Minority Supplier Development Council. Mr. Conley was recognized for his selfless commitment to supplier development. Through the work of the Carolinas-Virginia Minority Supplier Development Council, minority business enterprises and corporate members are brought together for the mutual benefit of advancing and innovating supplier development ideals in the marketplace, elevating minority business participation levels, and transforming the economic landscape from the status quo to foster economic development and wealth creation within the region. Mr. Vithoulkas noted he and Mr. Thornton attended a regional event hosted by Henrico on September 10 that talked about cooperative procurement among the jurisdictions of Henrico, Chesterfield, Hanover, and Richmond. Mr. Conley worked significantly on that effort.

Mr. Vithoulkas advised that Hurricane Florence was currently heading northwest from the Atlantic Ocean and classified as a Category 4 hurricane with sustained winds over 140 miles per hour. It could be one of the most catastrophic hurricanes to hit the east coast, with many evacuations ordered in North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia. The Governor of Virginia declared a state of emergency in anticipation of the storm. Florence was projected to make landfall on the Eastern Seaboard mid-day on September 13. In addition to extremely dangerous wind gusts, heavy and prolonged rainfall was predicted locally, making flooding during and after the storm a main area of concern. Henrico County general government and the school system collectively held a storm-related briefing on September 11 where every department head and many assistant department heads were present. Mr. Vithoulkas assured the Board and the public that preparations for an organizational response to this storm were underway. Many of the County's public utility facilities are now equipped with backup power sources to maintain water services for residents. He pointed out it was imperative for Henrico residents to prepare for the storm, and the County was experiencing many evacuees from the Tidewater area and further south. Fire Chief Tony McDowell updated the Board on the anticipated regional impact of Hurricane Florence and the County's emergency preparations for the storm. Deputy Emergency Services Coordinator Anna McRay assisted Chief McDowell and Mr. Vithoulkas in addressing storm-related issues raised by the Board regarding emergency shelters, storm tracking, power outages, and the public water system. Mr. Hinson encouraged citizens to look out for their neighbors who are senior citizens and to stock up with three to five days of food, water, medications, and first aid supplies. Mr. Vithoulkas advised that he had signed a declaration of local emergency.

She noted the restaurant, which is owned by Terry Roberts, is demonstrating the Henrico Way by serving simple, diner-style burgers that are easily customizable and affordable. In an August 30 article highlighting this recognition, the *Richmond Times-Dispatch* incorrectly identified the restaurant as being in Richmond.

#### **PUBLIC HEARING - REZONING CASES**

203-18 REZ2018-00029 Brookland Jeff Small: Request to conditionally rezone from B-3 Business District and R-6 General Residence District to B-3C Business District (Conditional) Parcel 766-749-2740 containing 1.78 acres located on the east line of W. Broad Street (U.S. Route 250) approximately 480' south of its intersection with Sunnybrook Road.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Hinson, seconded by Mr. Branin, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. <u>Vehicular Access.</u> Unless otherwise and specifically permitted at the time of Plan of Development, there shall be no more than one (1) direct vehicular access point to the Property from West Broad Street.
- 2. <u>Trash Receptacles.</u> Dumpsters and trash receptacles, not including convenience cans, shall be screened from public view at ground level with architectural material similar to the main building using such dumpster or trash receptacle and as otherwise approved at the time of Plan of Development.
- 3. <u>Trash Removal.</u> Trash removal on the Property shall be limited to the hours between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m.
- 4. <u>Drainage and Utilities.</u> All utility lines on the Property shall be underground, except for already existing utilities, junction boxes, meters, utility lines in wetland areas and utility lines required to be above ground by the utility company.

#### 5. Parking Lot and Exterior Lighting.

- a. Parking lot lighting standards within the Property shall not exceed twenty-five feet in height as measured from the grade of the lighting standard, except as otherwise permitted at the time of Plan of Development.
- b. Parking lot lighting standards shall not exceed twenty (20) feet in height within three hundred (300) feet of the boundary line of the Property along West Broad Street. Parking lot lighting on the Property shall be produced from concealed lighting sources to minimize the impact of such lighting on adjacent properties, unless otherwise permitted at the time of Plan of Development. Exterior light fixtures shall be produced from concealed sources of light unless other low light intensity decorative ornamental fixtures such as gas style lamps are approved at the time of Plan of Development. Such lighting shall be reduced to no more than a security level following the close of business operations each day. At no time shall the parking lot lighting exceed one-half (1/2) foot-candle at the right-of-way lines along West Broad Street.
- c. The exterior lighting on the Property shall be designed with a cohesive plan so that all exterior lighting shall use compatible design elements.

- 6. <u>Uses.</u> The following uses shall be prohibited:
  - a. Automotive filling and service stations;
  - b. Gun shop, sales, and repair;
  - c. Permanent on-site recycling facility;
  - d. Flea markets or antiques auctions;
  - e. Establishments whose primary business is check cashing and/or the making of payday loans as defined and regulated by Sections 6.2-2100 et seq. and 6.2-1800 et seq. of the Code of Virginia (1950), in effect as the date of the approvals of these proffers (the foregoing shall not preclude banks, savings and loans or other financial institutions that are not regulated by the foregoing Virginia Code Sections);
  - f. Private club, lodge, meeting hall and fraternal organizations;
  - g. Establishments whose primary business is the making of motor vehicle title loans as defined and regulated by Section 6.2-2200 et seq. of the Code of Virginia;
  - h. Fortuneteller, palmist, astrologist, numerologist, clairvoyant, craniologist, phrenologists, card reader, spiritual reader or similar activity;
  - i. Manufactured home sales display and or storage or sales, rentals, display and storage of travel trailers, travel vans, campers and truck camper tops;
  - j. Rifle or pistol range;
  - k. Adult businesses as defined in the Henrico County Zoning Ordinance;
  - 1. Billiard, bagatelle, video game or a bingo parlor;
  - m. Dance halls;
  - n. Truck stops;
  - o. Bars, which, for purposes of this restriction, shall mean a
    business establishment whose primary business is the sale of
    alcoholic beverages for on-premise consumption. This
    restriction shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages in
    restaurants as licensed by the Virginia Department of Alcoholic
    Beverage Control;
  - p. Recording studios; and
  - q. Carnivals, fairs, and circuses.
- 7. Hours of Operation. Hours of operation for any carwash use shall be limited to 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Hours of operation for all other permitted uses shall be as regulated in the B-2 zoning district.

#### 8. Exterior Elevations.

a. Any car wash developed on the Property shall be consistent in quality and architectural appearance with the attached architectural drawing titled "RIO CARWASH EXTERIOR ELEVATIONS" prepared by Balzer and Associates, Inc. dated 6-27-18 (see case file).

- b. The exposed portion of each exterior wall surface (front, rear and sides) of any building on the Property shall be similar in high quality of construction and shall have compatible architectural design (incorporating compatible, but not necessarily the same, design elements, color and architectural styles).
- c. All buildings on the Property shall have exposed exterior walls (above finished grade and exclusive of architectural features, windows and doors) constructed of brick, stone, pre-cast concrete, exterior insulating finishing systems (E.I.F.S.) and/or glass and may have varying amounts of these exterior materials or an equivalent permanent architecturally finished material, unless different architectural treatment and/or materials are requested and specifically approved with respect to the exposed portion of any such wall, at the time of Plan of Development. Wood or composite siding, natural or cultured stone, marble, pre-cast or cast-in-place architectural concrete, exposed aggregate concrete, E.F.I.S., and/or glass, or an equivalent, permanent, architecturally finished material may be utilized as accent materials on such buildings and any car wash.
- d. No building on the Property shall be covered with or have exposed view to any painted or unfinished concrete block, sheet or corrugated aluminum, iron and/or steel or other materials unless requested and specifically permitted at the time of Plan of Development.
- e. Any shade structures associated with any car wash developed on the Property shall generally be consistent with the main building roof color(s).
- 9. <u>HVAC Equipment.</u> HVAC equipment shall be screened from public view at ground level at the property line as approved at the time of Plan of Development.
- 10. <u>Outside Speaker.</u> No outside loud speakers, which can be heard beyond the boundaries of the Property, shall be permitted on the Property.
- 11. Carwash Development. Any carwash use developed on the property shall be developed substantially similar to the layout as shown on the attached drawing titled "RIO CARWASH SCHEMATIC LANDSCAPE PLAN" prepared by Balzer and Associates, Inc. dated 4-19-2018 (see case file), unless otherwise approved by the Planning Commission at time of Plan of Development.

- 12. <u>Signage.</u> The existing freestanding sign that is nonconforming shall be removed. A new freestanding sign may be erected but such new sign shall not exceed 20 feet in height and the sign face shall not exceed 100 square feet. The design and location of the new freestanding sign shall be approved as part of Plan of Development.
- 13. <u>Severance.</u> The unenforceability, elimination, revision, or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the other proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.

204-18 REZ2018-00032 Brookland Donald Rudd: Request to conditionally rezone from R-3 One-Family Residence District and B-3 Business District to B-3C Business District (Conditional) Part of Parcel 771-740-3432 containing .58 acres located at the northeast intersection of W. Broad Street (U.S. Route 250) and Henderson Road.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Hinson, seconded by Mr. Branin, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. **Prohibited Uses.** The following uses shall be prohibited:
  - a. Billiard, bagatelle, video game or a bingo parlor;
  - b. Dancing establishments and dance halls;
  - Drive-in theaters, golf driving ranges, baseball batting cages, miniature golf courses, pony rides and similar amusement establishments;
  - d. Riding academies and target ranges;
  - e. Fortune tellers, palmists, astrologists, numerologists, clairvoyants, craniologists, phrenologists, card readers, spiritual readers or advisors;
  - f. Carnivals, fairs, and circuses;
  - g. Adult businesses as defined In the Henrico County Zoning Ordinance;
  - h. Establishments whose primary business is check cashing and/or the making of payday loans as defined and regulated by Sections 6.2-2100 et seq. and 6.2-1800 et seq. of the Code of Virginia (the foregoing shall not preclude banks, savings and loans or similar institutions that are not regulated by the foregoing Virginia Code sections);
  - Rifle or pistol range;

- j. Attention getting devices as defined in the Henrico County Zoning Ordinance (the foregoing shall not preclude signs otherwise permitted by right pursuant to the Henrico County Zoning Ordinance);
- k. Establishments whose primary business is Automobile Service Station as defined in the Henrico County Zoning Ordinance (the foregoing shall not preclude the servicing of motor vehicles incidental or accessory to the primary use of the property);
- I. Flea markets; and

- m. Gun shops, sales and repair.
- 2. Outdoor Speakers. Outdoor speakers shall be prohibited.
- 3. <u>Building Design and Materials.</u> Any building constructed on the property shall be as follows:
  - a. Shall not exceed a height of thirty-five (35) feet;
  - b. Shall be generally consistent with the attached Conceptual Architectural Plan (see case file), which is conceptual in nature and may vary in detail as requested and approved at Plan of Development review or required by a governmental entity having jurisdiction.
- 4. <u>HVAC Equipment.</u> Any heating, ventilating, and air equipment shall be screened from public view at ground level at the perimeter of the property.
- 5. <u>Dumpsters.</u> All dumpsters shall be enclosed and screened from public view at ground level with architectural material similar to the building or as otherwise approved at the time of Plan of Development review. Dumpsters shall not be emptied prior to 9 a.m. on Saturdays and Sundays.
- 6. Hours of Operation. Hours of operation shall be limited to 7:00 a.m. through 8:00 p.m.
- 7. <u>Lighting.</u> All lighting standards on the premises shall be no more than twenty-five (25) feet in height. Lighting shall be reduced to minimum security levels after hours.
- 8. **Repair.** Automobile repair shall be performed only within an enclosed building on the property.
- 9. Storage of Vehicles. No vehicles shall be parked, stored or displayed in areas not designed and constructed for such parking, storage or display and so designated on a Plan of Development approved in accordance with Section 24-106. No vehicles shall be parked, stored or displayed within ten (10) feet of Henderson Road.

- 10. <u>Severability</u>. The unenforceability, elimination, revision or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any of the other proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.
- 11. Parking Lot Cleaning. Parking lot cleaning shall be limited to the hours between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday, exclusive of snow removal.
- 12. Construction Hours. The hours of exterior construction, including operation of bulldozers and other earthmoving equipment, shall be between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, and between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. on Sunday, except in emergencies or where unusual circumstances require extending the specific hours in order to complete work, including, but not limited to, concrete pours or utility connections.
- 13. Commencement of Business. The operation of business on the property shall not commence until the completion of improvements generally consistent with the attached Conceptual Architectural Plan (see case file), which is conceptual in nature and may vary in detail as requested and approved at Plan of Development review or required by a governmental entity having jurisdiction.

#### PUBLIC COMMENTS

The following residents of the Brookland District expressed concerns pertaining to periodic flooding on Indigo and Reed Roads from Horsepen Branch Creek and requested assistance from the County in addressing this issue. Bill Campbell, Evan Naeher, Josh Brooksaunders, Craig Griffith, and Matthew Akin. Mr. Naeher clarified for Mr. Branin the proximity of his home to the creek. In response to a question from Mr. Nelson, Public Works Director Steve Yob responded to comments from Mr. Griffith and disputed Mr. Griffith's contention that the flooding problem was caused by the County when it stopped bush hogging the creek due to environmental regulations. Mr. Yob spoke to the complexity of the waterway and suggested a hydrologic evaluation will be necessary to determine a solution to the flooding problem. Mr. Hinson agreed that the situation is complicated and should be studied. Mr. Vithoulkas pointed out drainage will be a topic at the Board's January 2019 retreat and staff will have suggestions at that time for addressing long-term drainage issues. He acknowledged this is an issue that has worsened over time and confirmed the County no longer has the legal authority to bush hog Horsepen Branch Creek. There were further comments on this matter by Mr. Nelson, Mrs. O'Bannon, and Mr. Hinson.

Rufus Adkins, a resident of the Fairfield District, voiced concerns relating to flooding caused by grass trimmings and leaves on County roads and in roadside ditches. He asked the Board to consider an ordinance requiring homeowners to bag leaves and yard debris.

Marcos Liedke, a resident of the Brookland District, also expressed concerns relating to flooding on Indigo Road and asked the County to look into the issue. Mr. Vithoulkas committed to the Board that staff will study the area and report back to the Board. Mr. Thornton suggested the County needs to hold its state and national representatives accountable in providing localities with the flexibility to address issues such as this that affect homeowners. Mr. Nelson noted this issue can be broached at the Board's annual dinner with its legislative delegation to see what kind of assistance may be available because addressing it is going to be a huge financial endeavor.




