

Revenue from the 8.0% Hotel/Motel Occupancy Tax is exceeding the estimate of \$12,600,000 included in the fiscal year 2018-19 Annual Fiscal Plan. This \$3,000,000 increase will cover additional payments to the Greater Richmond Convention Center Authority (GRCCA) resulting from this additional revenue that has been received and is projected to be received through the end of the fiscal year. Payment will be made based on actual collections from the tax. Subsequently, the County's 2.0% local tax component (estimated at \$750,000 for this amendment), will come back to the County. In total, for fiscal year 2018-19, the County expects to receive \$15,600,000 in Hotel/Motel Occupancy Taxes, reflecting an increase when compared to the prior fiscal year. These funds will be disbursed to the GRCCA. Upon completion of the fiscal year, the GRCCA will return 2.0% of the 8.0%, estimated at \$3,900,000 per the Convention Center financing agreement.
