COUNTY OF HENRICO, VIRGINIA BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING

June 23, 2020

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a regular meeting on Tuesday, June 23, 2020, at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico County, Virginia.

Mr. Branin called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and led the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mr. Branin welcomed the public to the meeting. He provided instructions to those persons watching a live stream of the meeting at home on how to participate remotely in the public hearing part of the meeting.

Mr. Nelson delivered the invocation.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved the June 9, 2020, Regular and Special Meeting Minutes.

MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Mr. Vithoulkas reported that the County is now 15 weeks into the COVID-19 pandemic, during which time Henrico residents and businesses and the County government have learned to adjust, adapt, and develop new ways to live and work. The County hit its peak of "percent positive" COVID-19 tests in early April, with seven-day weighted averages above 20 percent, but then experienced a steady decline in the average rate until it began to plateau in early May. The current weighted average is 7.2 percent compared with 11.6 percent on June 6. Although Henrico residents watching the news have heard about increases in coronavirus cases in states and cities across the United States, they have not seen this trend in Virginia. On June 22, Governor Ralph Northam reported that in addition to the decline in percent-positive cases across the state, hospitalizations are continuing to drop as well. Personal protective equipment supplies are sustainable, testing has increased, and the Commonwealth is hiring more than a thousand people to serve the contact tracers. Earlier in the afternoon, the Governor announced the Commonwealth will move to Phase Three on July 1. This phase allows gatherings of up to 250 people (from the current level of 50), retail businesses and restaurants to open to normal activity, entertainment venues to operate at 50 percent capacity, and gyms and pools to operate at 75 percent capacity.

Mr. Vithoulkas further reported that Henrico County agencies will continue to implement their transition plans in a gradual, incremental, and planned manner. Many employees will continue to telecommute. For those who must come into a County facility, the County will provide flexible staffing options and other carefully planned arrangements to provide social distancing and a healthy environment. One of the major efforts the County has undertaken since the beginning of the COVID-19 event has been outreach to vulnerable populations. In response to the public health crisis, Henrico County Public Schools, the Henrico Education Foundation, Henrico general government, and Richmond Raceway created a public-private partnership that has provided over 12,000 food bags to support vulnerable children and families. Mr. Vithoulkas tipped his hat to Deputy County Manager for Community Affairs Monica Callahan for her role in this effort. Thanks to the generosity of 840 businesses and individuals, over \$650,000 has been donated to the COVID-19 Response Fund. Henrico County government has also partnered with Richmond Raceway and its President, Dennis Bickmeier, to secure space where thousands of pounds of food have been received, packed, and distributed. For 13 weeks, County employees from the Department of Finance and Division of Recreation and Parks handled food items and worked alongside one another in the height of the COVID-19 crisis. HCPS' Family and Community Engagement and Equity, Diversity & Opportunity departments identified individuals, families, and food pantries that had a need for supplemental food items. Food packing and distribution officially ended June 11. Mr. Vithoulkas thanked all the employees who packed food and the donors whose dollars not only supported the purchase of food but also the purchase of basic household items, hygiene products, and Wi-Fi hotspots that aided remote learning for students.

Mr. Vithoulkas advised that Police Chief Humberto Cardounel, Jr., has announced his retirement, effective September 1. Chief Cardounel began his 32-year career with the Police Division in 1988 as a patrol officer and SWAT team medic and rose through the ranks as investigator, sergeant, command sergeant, lieutenant, captain, major, and deputy chief for the Parole Bureau and Investigative Bureau. Chief Cardounel led the Criminal Investigations Section; developed and implemented the Homeland Security Section; and provided leadership and service to the Training Academy, Internal Affairs Unit, Media Relations Unit, Organized Crime Section, and Personnel Unit. He was promoted to chief in

2016. Chief Cardounel graduated from Douglas S. Freeman High School and holds a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Richmond and a master's degree in public administration from Virginia Commonwealth University. Mr. Vithoulkas remarked that it has truly been an honor to serve alongside Chief Cardounel. Following Mr. Vithoulkas' comments, Chief Cardounel addressed the Board. He noted his parents came to this country as immigrants and had an opportunity to start a new life, which gave him a chance to be born and raised in Henrico. Chief Cardounel expressed his gratitude to the County; said he is proud, honored and humbled to have served the County for 32 years; and remarked that he is indebted to the Board, Mr. Vithoulkas, and all 330,000-plus Henrico residents for their confidence and trust in him.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' COMMENTS

Mr. Branin pointed out Mr. Thornton was not present for the meeting due to a health issue.

Mrs. O'Bannon noted the recent passing of her good friend and great neighbor, Ormonde Wilkinson, who served for several years as the Tuckahoe District representative on the County's Library Advisory Board. Mrs. Wilkinson was the subject of a December 2019 Richmond Time-Dispatch article by Bill Lohmann, where she discussed having a letter addressed to Santa Claus in 1949 returned to her 70 years after it was written and posted. Mrs. O'Bannon characterized Mrs. Wilkinson "as a remarkable lady who was always a ray of sunshine."

Mr. Nelson expressed his desire for a more formal recognition of Chief Cardounel's service to the County and received confirmation from Mr. Vithoulkas that Barry Lawrence, Assistant to the County Manager and Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, will be retiring from the County, effective September 1.

Mr. Schmitt brought attention to the National Association of Counties Achievement Awards recently earned by the following County agencies: Henrico Area Mental Health & Developmental Services, Police Division, Department of Public Relations, Department of Human Resources, Public Library, Department of General Services, and Schools. For the 15th consecutive year, Henrico received the most awards of any Virginia county and the seventh-most nationally. Mr. Schmitt commented that this fantastic statewide and national comparison is one way to quantify how the County operates, and this Board serves its constituents, in the best way possible. He remarked that the County earned multiple awards for opioid and recovery efforts, healthy lifestyles and leadership for youth, and workforce and career development. Mr. Nelson asked that the Department of Public Relations put out information highlighting the awards and winning programs.

Mr. Nelson received confirmation from Mr. Vithoulkas and Ben Sheppard, Director of Public Relations, that there will be a Board work session, media event, and ribbon-cutting ceremony for the Henrico Aquatics Center on September 8 and that the pool is already full of water.

Mr. Branin announced that the County hosted its first pickleball tournament during the weekend of June 19-21, with 135 people in attendance from out of state. He pointed out this was a good boost for Henrico's hospitality industry. Mr. Branin thanked the Division of Recreation and Parks and tournament director Jack Singer, a Brookland District resident, for doing a great job with the tournament.

157-20 Ordinan

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached ordinance.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Emily Griffey, a resident of the Tuckahoe District, asked the Board to support full-day, inperson school instruction and to prioritize resources for the health and wellbeing of students that are disadvantaged by skin color or financial means.

Wayne Commodore, a resident of the Fairfield District, voiced concerns pertaining to the Police Division's internal affairs section and its process for following up on citizen complaints.

Alexcia Cleveland, a resident of the Varina District, asked that Henrico's Police Division not provide mutual aid to the Richmond Police Department in confronting protestors. At Mr. Nelson's request, Mr. Vithoulkas explained the County's public safety mutual aid agreement with the City of Richmond and his and Chief Cardounel's recent decision to cease sending police officers to the City unless there is an extremely elevated call for assistance. There was further discussion of this matter by Mr. Branin and Mr. Nelson. In response to a request by Mr. Nelson, Mr. Vithoulkas agreed that the County will not in the future provide police assistance to the City in controlling demonstrations unless lives are truly endangered. Mr. Nelson remarked that there is enough going on in Henrico to keep Henrico police officers busy. Mr. Branin voiced his agreement with Mr. Nelson's request and point of view that Henrico police officers should concentrate on Henrico and not other localities. Mr. Nelson also expressed concerns pertaining to the cost to Henrico taxpayers of providing mutual aid public safety assistance to another locality where police officers are engaging with protestors.

Eric Kittleson, a resident of the Brookland District, echoed concerns regarding police brutality and spoke in support of renaming recreational facilities and streets that memorialize the Confederacy. He encouraged the County to continue taking a hands-off approach in terms of police involvement with protestors.

Scott Lebow, a resident of the Tuckahoe District, expressed concerns that low-income and minority students in Henrico are being placed in lower-quality and less-funded schools and

echoed concerns relating to policing across the nation. Mr. Vithoulkas clarified for the record that property taxes are not dedicated to specific schools in areas that generate the revenues and pointed out a majority of school funding is being spent on those schools located east of Interstate 95. Mr. Branin reiterated these points. Mr. Nelson noted the County's longstanding philosophy was to allocate school funding to the most populous areas of the County, but this philosophy shifted after adoption of the meals tax. He asked that more be done to educate the community about where the County's public dollars are being spent. Mr. Branin concurred with this request. Mr. Vithoulkas agreed to have staff put together another educational piece addressing this issue. There was discussion by Mr. Nelson and Mr. Branin regarding the County's substantial investment in public facilities in eastern Henrico.

This Board paper would authorize the County Manager to execute a performance agreement among the County, the County's Economic Development Authority (EDA), the Virginia Economic Development Partnership Authority (VEDP), and ASGN Incorporated (ASGN). ASGN will relocate its world headquarters from California to Innsbrook, making this Henrico's fifth Fortune 1000 headquarters, and expand its existing facilities in Virginia Beach and Roanoke.

Pursuant to the agreement, VEDP will pay a \$900,000 grant from the Commonwealth's Development Opportunity Fund to ASGN. To match the Commonwealth's grant, the County will appropriate \$400,000 to the EDA over a four-year period for \$100,000 annual grants by the EDA to ASGN. In return, ASGN has agreed to make a capital investment of at least \$5,000,000 in a facility at 4400 Cox Road and to create at least 121 jobs in the County.
