COUNTY OF HENRICO, VIRGINIA BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING July 14, 2020

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a regular meeting on Tuesday, July 14, 2020, at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico County, Virginia.

Mr. Branin called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Before leading the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance, Mr. Branin welcomed back persons who were attending the meeting in the Board Room and thanked those who were watching a live stream of the meeting. He provided instructions to citizens who wished to comment, ask questions, or offer opinions remotely via WebEx during the meeting's public hearings.

Brandon and Hannah Baldwin, Co-Lead Pastors of New Community Church, delivered the invocation.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved the June 23, 2020, Regular and Special Meeting Minutes.

MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Earl Wynn, the longest-serving member of the Henrico Sheriff's Office, retired from the County for the second time on July 8. Mr. Wynn was originally hired by the Sheriff's Office on June 26, 1974, as a jailor. Over the next 22 years, he rose through the ranks and held the following positions: Correctional Deputy in Jail West Security, Correctional Deputy in Civil Process, Correctional Corporal in Court Security, Correctional Sergeant in Jail West Security, Correctional Lieutenant in Jail West Booking, Correctional Lieutenant in Courts, and Correctional Captain in Courts. After taking a voluntary step-down in rank in 1996 due to changes in the organizational hierarchy, Mr. Wynn held the positions of Correctional Lieutenant in Security, Correctional Lieutenant as Jail Farm Commander, and Correctional Lieutenant in Jail East Security. Mr. Wynn retired from full-time employment with the Sheriff's Office on February 1, 2008, and was rehired by the Sheriff's Office one month later as a part-time Courthouse Deputy Sheriff, a position he held for more than 12 years until his second retirement on July 8. He served under seven elected Sheriffs. Mr. Branin presented a Certificate of Recognition to Mr. Wynn in appreciation of Mr. Winn's 46 years of dedicated and extraordinary service to the Sheriff's Office. Joining Mr. Winn for this presentation was his wife, Jane.

The Department of General Services' custodial team is composed of 22 employees - one superintendent, four custodial managers, and 17 custodial workers. The team has been hard at work since COVID-19 has been in the news. Prior to the Board agreeing to a declaration of local emergency on March 13, the team was preparing for the virus by installing hand sanitizing stations, developing an enhanced cleaning regimen, and obtaining the necessary cleaning supplies to ensure proper disinfecting. Since the declaration, the custodial team has responded to nearly 200 requests for service. The requests ranged from establishing special cleaning schedules for high-traffic areas, providing disinfectant supplies, installing sanitizing stations and paper towel dispensers, and deep cleaning areas with suspected and confirmed COVID-19 cases. The custodial team has gone above and beyond the normal expectations to ensure County employees and citizens have a safe and clean environment. Mr. Vithoulkas recognized General Services Director John Neal and acknowledged the diligent service of the following members of the custodial team who were present at the meeting: Michael VanAudenhove, Renee Douglas, Jackie Freeman, Lynette Hardy, David Hilliard, Paul Owens, Cielo Rada, LeeAnn Suggs, and Marjorie Sykes. Mr. Neal expressed pride in the team's dedication and initiative in stepping up and doing an excellent job in taking care of the "House of Henrico." Mr. Branin thanked the team for being unsung heroes every day.

Mr. Vithoulkas recognized Monica Smith-Callahan, Deputy County Manager for Community Affairs, who provided a slide presentation with a COVID-19 update and information on two new County initiatives related to the pandemic. As of July 13, a total of 41,243 people in Henrico have been tested for COVID-19 and there have been 2,839 confirmed cases and 76 deaths, 40 of which were outside of long-term care facilities. The current average of positive tests is 5.7 percent, just above where it was the previous week. Virginia is seeing a slight uptick in cases, and Governor Ralph Northam is watching this situation very closely. Henrico Jail West has seen an outbreak resulting in 46 positive tests among 70 inmates who are isolated in the admissions area.

COVID-19 challenges over the next few weeks include supporting the jail to ensure the outbreak is contained and inmates and staff have what they need, supporting Henrico

County Public Schools (HCPS) in its planning efforts for the fall semester, continuing to make testing available for vulnerable populations, monitoring national and local trends to make sure the County is maintaining preparedness in case there is another outbreak, managing the County's inventory of personal protective equipment and other critical supplies, and maintaining a gradual and consistent re-opening of County facilities and services.

In response to the financial hardships brought on by the COVID-19 crisis, the County has announced an emergency rental assistance program, aimed at Henrico residents who are at risk of losing their rental house or apartment. Funding is available for qualifying, incomeeligible households that have been impacted by loss of jobs, a reduction in hours of pay, or other factors resulting from the economic shutdown. The program is designed to prevent homelessness, and assistance is intended for Henrico renters facing the imminent loss of their residences. The County has received \$360,000 from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act to fund this effort. Applications in English and Spanish are available from the Department of Social Services. Residents can download and print the applications at https://henrico.us/dss/ or request that one be mailed to them. Emergency rental payments of up to \$1,500 per month will be made to qualified Henrico residents for up to four months. The County estimates that it will be able to support 240 residents through this program. Ms. Callahan-Smith responded to questions from Mr. Nelson regarding the format of the applications. Mr. Nelson remarked that this is a tremendous program and asked that staff develop an online application process as an option for residents.

The Department of Community Revitalization is also working on a regional solution that would support additional Henrico families beyond the rental assistance program. The Counties of Chesterfield, Hanover, and Henrico recently launched a "Know Your Rights" website, https://henrico.us/Know-Your-Rights-and-Resources, which conceptually began as a discussion among the County Manager and his regional counterparts about local responses to the civil unrest taking place around the country. The County will help create a clearinghouse of regional, state, and national resources where residents can connect to anti-discrimination information and institutions. This regional effort exemplifies a commitment by the participating localities to listening, discussing, and sharing ideas that build community collaboration and trust and work towards solutions that overcome barriers and injustices for all. Numerous institutions, many of which operate within the region, educate people about laws that protect them, advocate for their rights, and legally challenge instances of discrimination. The three local websites have been promoted by a press release and social media and will be updated simultaneously as additional resources are brought to the localities' attention.

Mr. Nelson asked that County staff share information on both programs with Board members so they can put it out on their own social media platforms. Mr. Vithoulkas complimented Ms. Callahan-Smith on working with the Department of Information Technology while quickly leading the charge for the region on these programs. In response to a question from Mr. Nelson, Ms. Callahan-Smith provided the Board with a status report on the distribution of additional COVID-19 care kits to Henrico residents. She pointed out that the County's nine area and branch libraries have been serving as points of distribution and that recreation and park facilities will begin serving as distribution access points within the next two weeks. The County currently has over 30,000 kits on hand and has already given out more than 50,000. Ms. Smith-Callahan confirmed for Mr. Branin that

care kits are still being distributed at the western and eastern government centers. Mr. Nelson asked that staff provide the Board with copies of videos produced by the Department of Public Relations profiling the care kits and "Know Your Rights" website.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' COMMENTS

Mrs. O'Bannon pointed out she will be hosting an interactive, virtual town meeting on July 27 at 1:00 p.m. that will be video streamed on YouTube. Questions can be asked live or emailed in advance. Mental health issues and services will be discussed.

Mr. Nelson offered a reminder that the County is currently receiving comments relating to a potential civilian review board for the Police Division. Citizens can submit comments to <u>civilianreviewboard@henrico.us</u> by July 31. The County has received hundreds of comments since July 1.

Mr. Nelson announced he will be hosting a community meeting on August 3 at 6:30 p.m. at the Chickahominy YMCA in Sandston. The meeting will be held outside under a tent, and citizens can physically attend the meeting subject to social-distancing protocols or watch it online. A full array of information will be provided on programs and projects associated with the Department of Community Revitalization, Department of Planning, Division of Recreation and Parks, Police Division, Department of Public Works, and HCPS. In addition, Mr. Vithoulkas will update residents on the County's revised budget. There will be an opportunity for community feedback following the presentations.

Mr. Schmitt joined Mr. Nelson in inviting residents to send the County comments concerning the proposed civilian review board. He noted the comments received to date have been informative and assured residents that the comments matter to the Board, whether positive or negative.

Mr. Schmitt updated County citizens and the Board on the progress of the Belmont Golf Course project. He noted he is presently a member of the First Tee Board of Directors and he and Mr. Thornton previously participated in yearlong community meetings on the golf course's future. Construction began May 4 on the rejuvenated and renovated golf course. The 12-hole course is approximately 50 percent complete, and all 12 greens have been constructed and are ready to be seeded this fall with bentgrass. The greenside bunkers have been shaped and the drainage is nearly complete. A new \$130,000 pump station has been delivered and installation of a \$1 million irrigation system is underway. The course is being reconstructed with millions of dollars of private investment through the County's partnership with First Tee. Permitting for Parcel 3 was officially completed earlier in the day and includes a wedge range, driving range, 35,000-square-foot putting course, and short-game practice area. None of those amenities previously existed at Belmont. Residents can view a video of the construction project on the County's You Tube page or on Belmont's new website at http://www.playbelmontrva.org. Mr. Schmitt thanked the following residents who have been appointed to the Belmont Advisory Board and who have worked tirelessly on this project on behalf of the community: Pat Kibler, Chris Shumaker, Ron Stilwell, and Rai Beasley. He remarked that he has been inspired by the meetings of the advisory board he has attended.

He also pointed out that information posted on social media contending there have been more than 200 positive cases of COVID-19 in Henrico's jails is not true.

Maria Stylianou, a resident of the Three Chopt District, asked the Board to change the name of Jeb Stuart Parkway.

Joseph Bahen, a resident of the Brookland District, spoke in support of Henrico's police officers and asked the Board not to defund the Police Division.

Annie Walker, a resident of the Fairfield District, addressed the Board regarding Agenda Item No. 165-20 (PUP2020-0009) and expressed concerns relating to how the proposed communication tower will affect her neighborhood's safety.

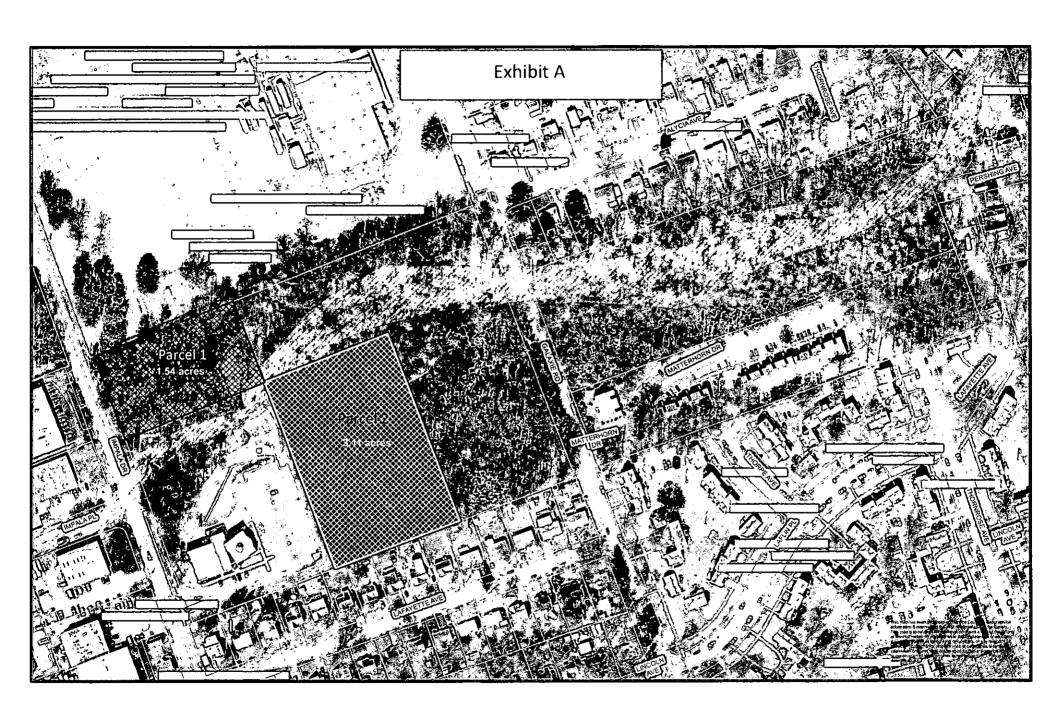

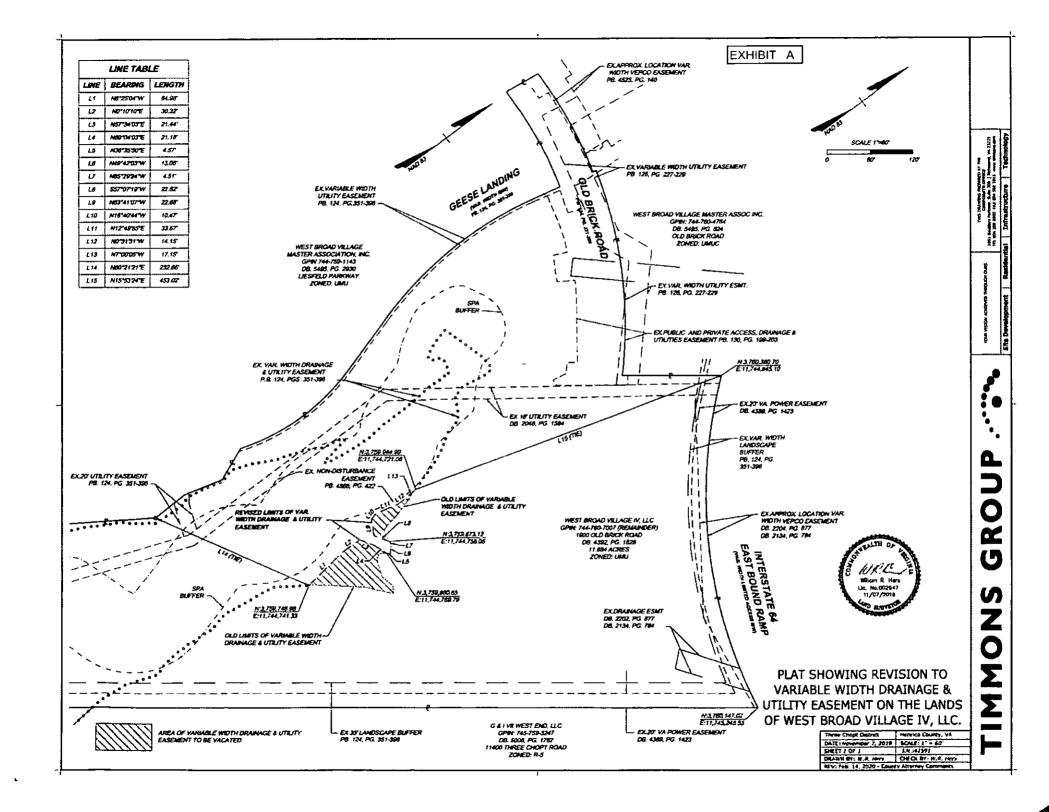

WHEREAS, the Board's Chairman wishes to designate Frank J. Thornton as his designee for membership on the Authority, and Mr. Thornton wishes to designate Patricia S. O'Bannon as his designee if he is unable to attend a meeting of the Authority.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors concurs in these designations for the Authority until a new Chairman is selected.

1. That Section 20-843 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 20-843. Exemptions.

The following transactions shall not be subject to the tax under this article:

- (19) Food and beverages sold by sellers at local farmers markets and roadside stands, when such sellers' annual income from such sales does not exceed \$2,500.00. For purposes of this exemption, the sellers' annual income includes income from sales at all local farmers markets and roadside stands, not just those sales occurring in the County.
- 2. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after its passage as provided by law.
