MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Ms. Tretina shared with a heavy heart the passing of Alicia A. Monahan, a firefighter/paramedic with Chesterfield Fire & EMS. Ms. Monahan tragically passed away Saturday afternoon while she was teaching a swift water rescue course in Macon County, North Carolina. Alicia was an 11-plus year veteran of Chesterfield Fire & EMS, serving as a member of the CF&EMS Dive Team and the Virginia Helicopter Aquatics Rescue Team. She also served with the Virginia Search and Rescue Dog Association. Alicia was known for her willingness to drop everything to participate in a rescue, and she was even recognized with a bronze Valor Award in 2019 by the Retail Merchants Association. Alicia leaves behind two teenage sons and a fiancé. Ms. Tretina noted our hearts and prayers are with Alicia's family and friends and with our brothers and sisters in Chesterfield as they grieve the loss of a hero. Ms. Tretina announced the Henrico County flags are flying at half-staff through Wednesday as a show of solidarity with our larger, regional public safety family.

Ms. Tretina recognized Barbara Weedman, Director of Henrico County Public Libraries, who announced the Fairfield Area Library and Quinn Evans Architects have won an IIDA (Commercial Design Association) and American Library Association 2022 Library Interior Design Award which "recognizes excellence in library interior design and promotes examples of extraordinary design reflected through innovative concepts." Ms. Weedman stated this award is one of two nationally in the category of public libraries over 30,000 square feet.

Ms. Tretina recognized Deputy Chief for the Division of Fire, Jeff Farmer, who announced the Division is honored to receive the American Heart Association's 2022 Mission: Lifeline – EMS – GOLD PLUS Achievement Award for an EMS Agency. The GOLD PLUS award is the highest possible award recognized by the American Heart Association. The American Heart Association recognizes the Henrico County Division of Fire for demonstrating continued success in using the Mission Lifeline program. In earning this award, the Division of Fire has applied the most up-to-date evidence-based treatment guidelines to improve patient care and outcomes in the community. Specifically, this award measures the Division's ability to quickly recognize heart attacks, acquire electrocardiographs, notify hospital emergency departments, activate the cath-lab, and achieve reperfusion of the patient's body tissue. This success is made possible by the Division of Fire's partnership with the Henrico County Emergency Communications Center, the Henrico Association of Volunteer Rescue Squads, and the regional hospital systems.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' COMMENTS

Mr. Nelson sent thoughts and prayers to our Varina District School Board representative Alicia Atkins who lost her father this past weekend.

Mr. Nelson recognized for the second year that Henrico presented a Juneteenth celebration at Dorey Park to commemorate and celebrate the abolishment of slavery in the United States. Juneteenth, also known as Emancipation Day or Day of Freedom, combines "June" and "nineteenth" for the month and the day that the enslaved in Galveston, Texas, got word that they had been freed under President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation. The County's Juneteenth celebration was held on Saturday, June 18, and featured a day of family fun and entertainment, including live performances, a vendor fair, food, historical and educational exhibits, a kid's zone, and a spectacular fireworks finale. Mr. Nelson thanked Henrico Recreation and Parks, the "Green Machine", for the time, talent, and effort that went into producing the event. He noted the fantastic weather and asked if everyone could join him in thanking the outstanding efforts of Recreation and Parks.

Mr. Schmitt noted six days from today we will host the Red, White, and Lights celebration on Monday, July 4 at Meadow Farm Park which will include the Richmond Symphony with a laser-light show.

Mr. Branin recognized the Henrico Division of Fire and EMS for their recent outstanding efforts responding to a fire at an assisted living facility in the County.

WHEREAS, in 1963, the Comboni Sisters became the first teachers and principal of Our Lady of Lourdes Elementary School in Henrico County; and

WHEREAS, in 1966, the Friends of the Comboni Missionary Sisters were formed to establish an education scholarship fund for the Comboni Sisters to be educated in the United States.

ORDINANCE – To Reduce the Effective Tax Rate for Qualifying Vehicles in 2022 by Returning Surplus Personal Property Tax Revenues for Qualifying Vehicles to Taxpayers

WHEREAS, the County determines the value of certain vehicles for personal property taxes using a nationally recognized pricing guide, as required by Section 58.1-3503(A)(3), (4), (5), and (10) of the Code of Virginia ("qualifying vehicles"); and,

WHEREAS, the value of qualifying vehicles in the County increased on average by more than 35% in 2022, leading to higher personal property tax bills for many taxpayers; and,

WHEREAS, the General Assembly approved legislation in 2022 allowing localities to provide tax relief by reducing the tax rate for qualifying vehicles and returning surplus personal property tax revenues to taxpayers; and,

WHEREAS, the Board wishes to reduce the effective tax rate for qualifying vehicles from \$3.50 to \$2.98 in 2022 by providing a one-time credit equal to \$0.52 per \$100 of assessed value; and,

WHEREAS, the Board wishes to fund the credit from surplus personal property tax revenues; and,

WHEREAS, the director of finance reports, as of June 8, 2022, that the County has a surplus of personal property tax revenues for FY 2021-22 in the amount of \$22,239,884.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. Qualifying vehicles.

For purposes of this Ordinance, a "qualifying vehicle" is any vehicle classified by Section 58.1-3503(A)(3), (4), (5), and (10) of the Code of Virginia and assessed personal property taxes in the County for some or all of 2022. "Qualifying vehicle" does not include any vehicle: (i) assessed in the County for some or all of 2022 at a tax rate of \$1.00 or less per \$100 of assessed value, or (ii) for which no personal property tax was owed as a result of the personal property tax assessment for some or all of 2022, either because the vehicle is totally exempt from taxation or because the vehicle is subject to 100% tax relief pursuant to the Personal Property Tax Relief Act (Code of Virginia Title 58.1, Chapter 35.1).

2. Credit and reduced effective tax rate for Qualifying Vehicles.

For each qualifying vehicle, the director of finance will apply a one-time credit equal to \$0.52 per \$100 of the 2022 assessed value of the qualifying vehicle to reduce the effective tax rate for the qualifying vehicle from \$3.50 to \$2.98 per \$100 of assessed value.

3. **Application of credit.**

(a) The director of finance will begin applying the credits authorized by this ordinance prior to the mailing of bills for the installment of 2022 personal property taxes due and payable on December 5, 2022. No credit will be issued after January 31, 2023, unless the director determines that a credit was incorrectly omitted or misapplied for a qualifying vehicle through no fault of the taxpayer.

- (b) The credit for a qualifying vehicle assessed on a pro-rated basis in 2022 pursuant to Henrico County Code Section 20-109 will be pro-rated in the same proportion as the tax.
- (c) All credits under this ordinance will be paid solely from appropriations made for that purpose from fund balances resulting from surplus personal property tax revenues.
- 4. That this ordinance will be in full force and effect on after its passage as provided by law.

WHEREAS, 408 Dakar Drive is an undeveloped lot in the Woodlawn Terrace subdivision, and the construction of a new home in this mature neighborhood will improve the overall health and vitality of the community; and,

WHEREAS, Richmond Metropolitan Habitat for Humanity is a non-profit corporation with a track record of rehabilitating and building single-family homes and providing homebuyer services and other assistance programs to residents of the County and Central Virginia.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors that the County Manager is authorized to execute an agreement, in a form approved by the County Attorney, with Richmond Metropolitan Habitat for Humanity for the construction and sale of a home at 408 Dakar Drive to a homebuyer with the assistance of County funding totaling \$71,500, which will make construction financially feasible.

COMMUNITY REVITALIZATION AGREEMENT

Between

County of Henrico

and

Richmond Metro Habitat for Humanity

This COMMUNITY REVITALIZATION AGREEMENT ("Agreement") dated ______, 2022, is made by and between the COUNTY OF HENRICO, VIRGINIA, a Virginia political subdivision (the "County"), and RICHMOND METROPOLITAN HABITAT FOR HUMANITY, INC., a Virginia non-stock corporation ("RMHFH"), to state the agreement between the parties regarding the County's support for RMHFH's development and sale of the Home (as defined below) in furtherance of redeveloping mature neighborhoods in Henrico County.

RECITALS

- A. The Board of Supervisors of Henrico County, Virginia has established the "Community Revitalization Fund" to support the redevelopment and improvement of mature neighborhoods.
- B. RMHFH is a Virginia not-for-profit corporation that acquires, rehabilitates, constructs, and sells low to moderate priced homes and lots.
- C. The lot located at 408 Dakar Drive, Henrico, VA 23230 is vacant and in a mature neighborhood of the County, and the construction of a new home on the lot will improve the overall health and vitality of the neighborhood.
- D. RMHFH desires to construct and sell to a homebuyer a single-family home located at 408 Dakar Drive, Henrico, VA 23230 (the "Home"), and the County desires to support the construction and sale of the Home.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the recitals above and the mutual agreements set forth below, the parties agree as follows:

Section 1. Recitals.

The recitals above are true and correct and incorporated into this Agreement by reference.

Section 2. Scope of Services.

RMHFH shall construct and sell the Home pursuant to the terms of this Agreement. The County agrees to provide assistance in an amount not-to-exceed \$71,500 ("Funds") as shown in the Project Budget and Pro-forma attached as <u>Exhibit A</u>, which is incorporated into and made a part of this Agreement by reference.

Section 3. Use of County Funds.

- 3.1 RMHFH shall use the Funds solely for the construction and sale of the Home, homebuyer assistance, and related costs.
- 3.2 The Funds may come from County or other government sources. Acceptance or use of the Funds may require RMHFH to comply with additional regulatory requirements. Any additional regulatory requirements will be set forth in writing in an appropriate addendum to this Agreement.
- 3.3 Upon sale of the Home pursuant to this Agreement, RMHFH shall pay to the County excess sales proceeds (if any), within 30 days of sale to the homebuyer. Excess sales proceeds are defined as the net sales price plus the total development subsidy minus the total development costs as estimated in the attached Project Budget and Pro forma and any actual expenses not identified in the attached Project Budget and Pro forma. All expenses not identified in the attached Project Budget and Pro forma must be documented by cancelled checks and invoices marked paid by the vendor.

Section 4. Purchase of Home.

- 4.1 The contract sales price for the Home must be supported by an appraisal by a licensed appraiser. RMHFH may require an affordability restriction by Deed of Trust and Note (or other form of affordability restriction upon prior approval by the County in writing) provided that any affordability restriction terminates upon foreclosure or transfer in lieu of foreclosure.
- 4.2 If RMHFH requires an affordability restriction, RMHFH shall include an assignment clause in the Deed of Trust and Note securing the County's investment that ensures the County, or its agent, will have the right to enforce the Deed of Trust and Note in the event RMHFH ceases to exist or fails to satisfy the requirements of this Agreement. The County will provide to RMHFH a suitable form Deed of Trust and Note to be executed for this project.

Section 5. Schedule of Activities.

- 5.1 RMHFH shall complete the activities under this Agreement within 12 months of the date this Agreement is signed by the last party to sign it (as indicated by the date stated below that party's signature). The parties agree to prepare jointly a Project Schedule for work to be performed pursuant to this Agreement. All activities shall be completed in accordance with the Project Schedule, which may be extended only by written agreement signed by the parties.
- 5.2 The timely completion of activities under this Agreement is an integral and essential part of performance. By accepting and executing this Agreement, RMHFH agrees that activities will be completed as expeditiously as possible and that RMHFH will make every effort to ensure that the project will proceed as scheduled and will not be delayed. If RMHFH fails to meet the Project Schedule without the County's prior written approval, the County may, at its discretion, declare RMHFH to be in default and terminate the Agreement under Section 12.

Section 6. Payment.

6.1 Payments to RMHFH will be made in compliance with County cash management

requirements. The County will remit payment within 30 calendar days after approving a request for funds submitted by RMHFH to the County's Housing Specialist. RMHFH shall return erroneously drawn funds to the County within ten business days.

6.2 RMHFH shall include accurate information in the request for funds, and RMHFH may request funds for this project no sooner than 10 business days after the execution of this Agreement. Requests for payment must be submitted by RMHFH in a form acceptable to the County. Within 30 days of the sale of the Home to the homebuyer, RMHFH shall provide adequate documentation of all costs incurred for this project. All such expenses shall conform with the project budget. The County shall have the right to inspect records and project sites to determine reimbursement requests are reasonable and accurate. The County shall also have the right to hold payment until adequate documentation has been provided, reviewed, and approved by the County.

Section 7. Lead Based Paint.

RMHFH shall comply with the provisions of the Lead Based Paint Poisoning Prevention Act (42 U.S.C. § 4821 *et seq.*), the Residential Lead-Based Paint Hazard Reduction Act of 1992 (42 USC 485-4956), and implementing regulations at 24 CFR Part 35, subparts A, B, J, K, M, and R of this title.

Section 8. Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity.

- 8.1 RMHFH shall comply with the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 2000d *et seq.*), 24 CFR Part 1, The Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C. § 3601-3620), 24 CFR Part 100-115, Equal Opportunity in Housing, Executive Order 11063, as amended by Executive Order 12259, 24 CFR Part 107, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 6101), and 24 CFR Part 146 and Executive Order 11246 as applicable, and the applicable provisions of 24 CFR § 92.351 Affirmative Marketing; Minority Outreach Program.
- 8.2 RMHFH shall also comply with all federal, state and local laws, ordinances, codes, rules and regulations and amendments thereto, including but not limited to Title 8 of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 PL.90-284; Executive Order 11063 on Equal Opportunity; and Section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968.

Section 9. Records and Reports

- 9.1 RMHFH shall retain all records pertaining to this Agreement and activities performed pursuant to it for no less than ten years. Notwithstanding the previous sentence, RMHFH shall comply with any applicable federal, state, or local legal requirements that impose a longer retention schedule. The County shall have unrestricted access to all records pertaining to this Agreement and activities performed pursuant to it for the entire duration of the retention period. Records include:
 - (a) A full description of the project, including the location, forms of assistance, and project budget.
 - (b) The sources and application of funds and supporting documentation.

- (c) Records demonstrating that the property meets the property standards of 24 CFR § 92.251 and the lead-based paint requirements of 24 CFR § 92.355 and any other documentation necessary to maintain compliance with contractual requirements, and federal, state, or local codes.
- (d) Income eligibility documentation, if the County requires that the Home be sold to a low- or moderate-income buyer.
- (e) Records demonstrating adequate financing has been secured to ensure project completion.
- (f) Records demonstrating that there is adequate need for the project based on neighborhood market conditions.
- 9.2 RMHFH shall submit to the County a monthly report setting forth the progress made to date relative to the Scope of Services and Project Schedule.

Section 10. Procurement Requirements.

RMHFH shall comply with the following County procurement requirements when purchasing goods or contracting for services or construction performed by third-parties under this Agreement:

- (a) For all types of bid requests a **written** description of the solicited good or service, including any requirements, shall be prepared.
- (b) For any purchase less than or equal to \$7,500, a minimum of one proposal shall be solicited. Additional competition, if available, should be solicited to include a supplier from the Small, Women and Minority (SWAM) Vendor list made available by the Virginia Department of Minority Business Enterprise (DMBE). The SWAM Vendor Directory can be located at the following link: http://www.dmbe.virginia.gov
- (c) For purchases of professional services (architects, engineers, etc.) less than or equal to \$7,500, a minimum of one proposal shall be solicited. Soliciting proposals from business on the DMBE SWAM list is encouraged.
- (d) For purchases of professional services greater than \$7,500 but less than or equal to \$60,000, a minimum of four proposals shall be solicited from qualified firms. A minimum of one proposal shall be solicited from a DMBE SWAM business; soliciting more than one proposal from DMBE SWAM businesses is encouraged.
- (e) For purchases of professional services greater than \$60,000, a minimum of six proposals shall be solicited from qualified firms. A minimum of two proposals shall be solicited from a DMBE SWAM business; soliciting more than two proposals from DMBE SWAM businesses is encouraged.
- (f) For purchases of goods, non-professional services, and construction greater than \$7,500 but less than or equal to \$50,000, a minimum of four written quotes shall be solicited from qualified firms. A minimum of one quote shall be solicited from a DMBE SWAM

- business; soliciting more than one quote from DMBE SWAM businesses is encouraged.
- (g) For purchases of goods, non-professional services, and construction greater than \$50,000 but less than or equal to \$100,000, a minimum of four written quotes shall be solicited from qualified firms. A minimum of one quote shall be solicited from a DMBE SWAM business; soliciting more than one quote from DMBE SWAM businesses is encouraged. A copy of the published notice for invitations to bid shall be provided to the Department of Community Revitalization.
- (h) For purchases of goods, non-professional services, and construction greater than \$100,000, a minimum of six written quotes shall be solicited from qualified firms. A minimum of two quotes shall be solicited from a DMBE SWAM business; soliciting more than two quotes from DMBE SWAM businesses is encouraged. A copy of the published notice for invitations to bid shall be provided to the Department of Community Revitalization.

Section 11. Audit Requirements.

- 11.1 RMHFH shall retain the services of an independent certified public accountant to perform an annual organization wide audit in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards as defined by Standards for Audit of Government Organizations, Activities, and Functions, in compliance in all respects with the generally accepted auditing standards of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, and in accordance with the Single Audit Act of 1984, if applicable. In the alternative, it shall provide an organization wide audit report, including an audit report for program activities funded under this Agreement, in compliance with accepted auditing standards of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, by a certified public accountant. RMHFH shall provide copies of the audit reports to the County's Housing Specialist and the County's Department of Finance within 120 days of the close of each RMHFH fiscal year covered by this Agreement.
- 11.2 RMHFH shall pay the cost of the audit from its own funds. RMHFH shall <u>not</u> use any portion of the Funds for this purpose.

Section 12. <u>Termination for Cause or Convenience</u>.

- 12.1 The County may suspend or terminate this Agreement if RMHFH materially fails to comply with any of its terms. In the event the County determines RMHFH is in default under this Agreement, the County may take one or more of the following actions:
 - (a) Withhold cash payments pending correction of the deficiency by RMHFH or any contractor or subcontractor of RMHFH.
 - (b) Disallow all or part of the cost of the non-compliant activity or action.
 - (c) Suspend or terminate, in whole or in part, this Agreement. If the County terminates this Agreement due to RMHFH's default, RMHFH shall repay within ten days of receiving the County's notice of termination all Funds advanced to RMHFH.

- (d) Withhold further funds from RMHFH.
- (e) Pursue other remedies that may be legally available.
- 12.2 Either party may terminate this Agreement for convenience at any time by notifying the other party in writing at least 30 days prior to the date of termination. If RMHFH terminates this Agreement prior to project completion, RMHFH shall repay to the County within ten days of providing its notice all Funds advanced to RMHFH.
- 12.3 In the event of any termination of this Agreement, all property and finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, and reports purchased or prepared by RMHFH under this Agreement shall, at the option of the County, become the County's property or assigned to the County's agent at the County's sole discretion.

Section 13. Conflict of Interest.

No employee, agent, consultant, officer or appointed official of RMHFH who is in a position to participate in a decision-making process or gain inside information with regard to any activity under this Agreement may obtain a personal or financial interest in any contract, subcontract or agreement with respect thereto, or in any proceeds hereunder, for himself, or for his family or business associates, during his tenure or for one year thereafter.

Section 14. Availability of Funds.

This Agreement is subject to annual appropriations by the Board of Supervisors of Henrico County, Virginia, and the County shall be bound only to the extent that there are funds available to perform its obligations under this Agreement. In addition, all funding under this Agreement is contingent on the County's determination to proceed with, modify, or cancel the project based on the result of any title examination.

Section 15. Indemnification.

RMHFH shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, agents and employees against and from all liability, claims, damages and costs, including reasonable attorneys' fees, of every kind and nature, and attributable to bodily injury, sickness, disease or death, or to damage or destruction of property resulting from or in any manner arising out of or in conjunction with the performance of work under this Agreement. In addition, RMHFH shall provide to the County a Certificate of Insurance evidencing coverage under the Workers' Compensation Act and liability protection against claims for bodily injury, death, or property damage in the amounts set forth in Section 16 of this Agreement. In addition, RMHFH's insurer shall give the County 30 days' prior written notice of its decision to amend, cancel or terminate any insurance coverage. The County, its officials, employees, volunteers, and agents shall be named as an additional insured on all insurance policies held by RMHFH.

Section 16. Insurance.

RMHFH will obtain liability insurance from a company licensed to do business in the Commonwealth of Virginia, countersigned by an authorized agent in Virginia, to cover injury to

or death of one or more persons in RMHFH's performance of this Agreement. Premiums chargeable for the insurance shall be paid by RMHFH and all liability insurance policies shall be kept in force during the term of this Agreement. Required liability insurance policies and their limits of coverage are as follows:

- Auto Liability, including Owned, Non-Owned and Hired Car Coverage: One Million (\$1,000,000) per occurrence combined single limit
- Comprehensive General Liability (CGL) One Million (\$1,000,000) per occurrence Combined single limit, Two million (\$2,000,000) in the aggregate
- Workers' Compensation coverage according to statutory limits of the Code of Virginia, Title 65.2

The required insurance shall apply as primary insurance with respect to any other insurance or self-insurance programs of the County. All policies shall be endorsed to be primary with respect to the additional insured.

Section 17. <u>Miscellaneous</u>.

- 17.1 Governing law; Venue; Attorneys' Fees. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Any disputes concerning interpretation or performance under this Agreement shall be litigated only in the Circuit Court of Henrico County. Attorneys' fees will not be recoverable by the prevailing party in the event this Agreement is subject to litigation.
- 17.2 <u>Entire Agreement: Amendments.</u> This Agreement constitutes the entire contract between the parties and may not be changed except in writing signed by the parties.
- 17.3 <u>Severability</u>. If any court of competent jurisdiction holds any provision of this Agreement invalid, then (a) such holding will not invalidate any other provision of this Agreement, unless such provision is contingent on the invalidated provision, and (b) the remaining terms will constitute the parties' entire agreement.
- 17.4 <u>Communications</u>. Any communication under this Agreement will be sufficiently given when delivered by hand or by first-class certified mail, postage prepaid, as follows:


