MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Mr. Vithoulkas and Mrs. O'Bannon presented a Proclamation proclaiming Mac R. Beaton a Distinguished Community Service Medal Recipient. He recognized Dr. Amy Cashwell, Superintendent of Schools, and Kristi Kinsell, Vice Chair and Brookland District Representative for the School Board, who were present for the surprise recognition. Mr. Vithoulkas stated Mac Beaton began his career with Henrico County Public Schools (HCPS) in 1986 serving as a teacher in the Industrial Arts in Vocational Education program. He subsequently became the director of Career and Technical Education (CTE) for HCPS in

2000 and created the High-Tech Academy dual-enrollment program with Virginia Commonwealth University, which provides students an opportunity to earn up to 28 college credits. Mr. Vithoulkas noted Mr. Beaton has created a nationally recognized and replicated program known as the CTE Letter of Intent Signing Day, where senior CTE students are publicly recognized for their earned industry credentials and career selections. Dr. Cashwell stated there is no one like Mr. Beaton who has brought world class education to Henrico. Mrs. O'Bannon presented the Proclamation to Mr. Beaton and the Henrico County Board of Supervisors' Distinguished Community Service Medal.

Mr. Beaton thanked the Board and his family and friends who were present for the presentation.

Mr. Vithoulkas next recognized Michael Y. Feinmel, who has been appointed as the new Deputy County Manager for Public Safety. Mr. Feinmel has served as a Deputy Commonwealth's Attorney for Henrico since 2005. He joined the Commonwealth's Attorney's Office in 2001 as an Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney and previously was a public defender for the City of Richmond. As Deputy County Manager for Public Safety, Mr. Feinmel will succeed Anthony E. McDowell, who had served in the position since 2018 and was recently named executive director of the new Opioid Abatement Authority. Mr. Feinmel has represented the Commonwealth's Attorney's Office on various County committees and task forces, including the Addiction Task Force and Recovery Roundtable. He holds a Juris Doctor degree from T. C. Williams School of Law at the University of Richmond and a Bachelor of Science in political science from James Madison University. Mr. Feinmel thanked the Manager and the Board for the opportunity and looks forward to his new role.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' COMMENTS

Mr. Schmitt noted that early voting will begin on September 23 and thanked County staff who have worked on getting information out regarding the bond referendum. Mr. Schmitt encouraged all County residents to take advantage of early voting and review the bond referendum.

Mr. Branin announced that the Church Road Safety and Mobility Improvements Project was selected for another award. The Virginia Transportation Construction Alliance (VTCA) selected the project for one of the VTCA Engineering Awards in the "Less than \$10 million category". He stated the Project opened in the Fall of last year and, in addition to improving motorist safety, it has also added an extra 1.5 miles of bike lanes and safer pedestrian crossings. Mr. Branin thanked the Department of Public Works for the unbelievable job they are doing for the County and its residents.

Mr. Nelson thanked the staff and the entire Board for the outpouring support he and his family received for the loss of his father.

174-22 REZ2022-00017 Fairfield Archibald Hunt, Jr.: Request to conditionally rezone from A-1 Agricultural District to R-3AC One-Family Residence District (Conditional) Parcel 809-731-5615 containing .562 acres located at the northeast intersection of Harvie Road and Harvest Crest Court.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Branin, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. **Density.** There shall be no more than two dwelling units on the property.
- 2. <u>Home Size.</u> The minimum finished floor area of any new dwellings shall be eleven hundred (1,100) square feet for a one-story home and fourteen hundred (1,400) square feet for a two-story home.
- 3. <u>Elevation.</u> Any new dwelling constructed shall be generally consistent with the exterior elevation submitted as Exhibit A (see case file).
- 4. <u>Foundations</u>. All new homes shall be on crawl space foundations, except for garages and basements. Visible exterior portions of all foundations below the first floor level (including front porch piers) shall be finished with brick on all four sides.
- 5. <u>Chimneys.</u> All new exterior fireplace chimneys shall be built on brick foundations and shall be enclosed by brick or a siding similar to the exterior of the dwelling.
- 6. <u>Cantilevering.</u> No home shall have cantilevered treatments except for bay windows.
- 7. <u>Building Type.</u> No modular or factory-built homes shall be placed on the site.
- 8. <u>Driveways.</u> All new driveways shall be paved with asphalt, concrete, pre-cast pavers or other similar materials approved by the Director of Planning.
- 9. <u>Utilities.</u> All dwellings shall be served by public water and sewer
- 10. **Landscaping.** A twenty (20) foot landscaping strip shall be provided on any rear or side lot lines abutting Harvie Road.
- 11. Hours of Construction. During the construction of the development on the property, the hours of exterior construction shall be limited to 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays, except in emergencies or where unusual circumstances require extending the specific hours in order to complete such work as concrete pours or utility connections. Exceptions shall require the approval of the Director of Planning.
- 12. <u>Severance.</u> The unenforceability, elimination, revision or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall

not affect the validity or enforceability of the other proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.

221-22 REZ2022-00021 Fairfield HHHunt River Mill, LLC: Request to conditionally rezone from R-5AC General Residence District (Conditional) to C-1C Conservation District (Conditional) part of Parcel 779-774-3651 containing 5.11 acres located approximately 500' northwest of the terminus of Winfrey Road extending approximately 1,700' north along the floodplain of the Chickahominy River.

1. Conservation Areas.

The portion(s) of the Property which lie within a one hundred (100) year flood plain as determined by definitive engineering studies approved by the Department of Public Works, and/or such portion(s) of the Property which may be inundated by waters impounded to a maximum elevation determined in a controlled, regulated manner by a structure or structures approved by the Department of Public Works, may only be used for the following purposes:

- a. Storm water management and/or retention areas.
- b. Ponds, lakes and similar areas intended as aesthetic and/or recreational amenities and/or wildlife habitats.
- c. Access drives, utility easements, signage, walkways and recreational facilities installed in a manner to minimize their impacts; and
- d. Such additional uses to the uses identified in (a), (b) and (c) above as may be deemed compatible and of the same general character by the Planning Administrator (Director of Planning) pursuant to Chapters 19 and 24 of the County Code (the "Zoning Ordinance").

222-22 REZ2022-00023 Fairfield Doswell Ventures, LLC: Request to conditionally rezone from R-4 One-Family Residence District and B-3C Business District (Conditional) to B-3C Business District (Conditional) Parcels 781-761-6051 and -4638 containing 2.03 acres located on the west line of Mountain Road approximately 45' south of its intersection with New York Avenue.

Jean Moore, Assistant Director of Planning, explained the meaning of the Comprehensive Plan at the request of Mr. Thornton.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Schmitt, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. <u>Permitted Uses:</u> Use of this site shall be limited to office and contractor services uses as permitted by B-3 zoning and any other use permitted in B-1 District.
- 2. Architecture: Any buildings on the site shall be generally similar in architectural treatment and materials. The proposed office will be brick and contractor services portion of the building shall be at least 75% brick. All rooftop equipment shall be shielded so that it is screened from public view.
- 4. **Building Height:** No building shall exceed 30' in height.
- 5. <u>Lighting:</u> Lights illuminating off-street parking or loading areas shall be arranged and installed so that no material glare or direct light will exceed 1/2 foot candle encroachment onto adjacent parcels. Within one hundred (100) feet of a residential district any new lights shall not exceed fifteen (15) feet in height.
- 6. Noise: No outside loudspeakers will be permitted on property.
- 7. Outside Storage: There shall not be any outside storage of materials, supplies, unlicensed vehicles, or equipment, except that a trash receptacle area may be permitted if it is enclosed within an area screened from view at property lines.
- 8. Operating Hours: Between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., customer hours shall not commence, the facility shall not be open to the public, and activity at the facility shall not be conducted outside of an enclosed building.
- 9. <u>Hazardous Material</u>: No hazardous material shall be stored in the building except in safety containers deemed proper by local governmental officials.

- 10. Overhead Doors: Overhead doors will not be installed in any location other than shown on architectural Exhibit B, "Tribble Building Left Side Elevations South" page C-7 and C-8 08 (see case file).
- 11. Access: Egress and ingress to the site must be from Mountain Road.
- 12. <u>Setback:</u> Any building must be setback at least 50' from Mountain Road.
- 13. <u>Buffers:</u> Buffer areas will be provided as shown on the site plans marked Exhibit A (see case file).
 - a. Overall: Any buffer within the Property required herein shall be natural, with vegetation preserved to satisfy the Transitional Buffer requirements below. Additional plantings shall be required as necessary, determined by the Director of Planning, to supplement areas if damaged or diseased vegetation must be removed. Minimum buffer depths shall be exclusive of any fences or walls.
 - b. Western Buffer. The area shown on the concept plan as "50' Buffer" shall be maintained as a minimum fifty (50) foot wide natural buffer with vegetation meeting the Transitional Buffer 50 requirements.
 - c. <u>Northern Buffer</u>. The area shown on the concept plan as "38' Buffer" shall be maintained as a minimum thirty-eight (38) foot wide natural buffer with a combination of vegetation and fencing meeting the Transitional Buffer 50 requirements.
 - d. Southern Buffer. The area shown on the concept plan as "25' Buffer" shall be maintained as a minimum twenty-five (25) foot wide natural buffer with a combination of vegetation and fencing meeting the Transitional Buffer 25 requirements.
- 14. Road Improvements: The applicant shall dedicate adequate right-of-way for and shall improve Mountain Road to a width of twenty-six (26) feet from the centerline along the front of the site. Curb, gutter, and sidewalk shall also be installed along the entire frontage, matching the curb line of the adjacent property to the north, as approved at the time of POD. Should the dedicated property not be utilized for the stated purpose within fifteen (15) years of the date of the dedication, title to the dedicated property will revert to the landowner or its successors in interest.

240-22 REZ2022-00004 Fairfield Fleettree, LLC: Request to conditionally rezone from A-1 Agricultural District to R-5AC General Residence District (Conditional) Parcels 807-733-2587, 807-733-4786, 807-733-8078, and 807-734-7750 containing 26.8 acres located at the northeast intersection of Goodell and Harvie Roads.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. Conceptual Master Plan. Development of the Property shall be in general conformance with the Conceptual Master Plan entitled "Goodell Road Rezoning Exhibit, Figure 1" prepared by Parker Design Group dated April 28, 2022, revised July 15, 2022 attached hereto as EXHIBIT A (the "Concept Plan")(see case file) which Conceptual Plan is conceptual in nature and may vary in detail (including, as available, excess right-of-way along Harvie Road and Goodell Road), and the Goodell Road Conceptual Master Plan dated April 28, 2022 attached hereto as Exhibit B (see case file) unless otherwise requested and specifically approved at the time of Plan of Development and/or subdivision review.
- 2. Entrance Features. The entrances to the Property from Goodell Road shall be designed and complemented with landscaping and a monument entrance feature consistent with the requirements of the Zoning Ordinance and the features shown on the Goodell Road Entrance Features Concept Plan dated April 28, 2022 attached hereto as Exhibit C (see case file).

3. Buffer Requirements.

- a. Overall. Any buffer within the Property required herein shall be natural and landscaped, including supplemental plantings, signage, berms and other purposes as approved at the time of landscape plan review. Roads, sidewalks. utility easements (including drainage), common owned fencing/walls adjacent to any roads or drives, and signage shall be permitted within such buffer; provided, any such road or utility easements shall be extended generally perpendicular through such buffer unless otherwise approved at the time of subdivision or plan of development review. All buffers, whether in common area or a lot, shall be maintained by the Association.
- b. Forty Foot Buffer. The area shown on the Concept Plan as "40' BUFFER" adjacent to GPIN 807-734-3854 and GPIN 807-734-4685 shall be a minimum forty (40) foot natural and landscaped buffer and planted at a minimum to the level of a transitional

buffer 25.

- c. A six (6) foot tall vinyl fence shall be installed on the common Property line adjacent to GPIN 808-733-0796. Additionally, along that same common property line, a row of Green Giant Arborvitaes or other evergreen species permitted at the time of Plan Development with a minimum of 8' height be planted 10 feet apart.
- d. The area shown as open space adjacent to Harvie Road shall be natural and landscaped buffer and planted at a minimum to the level of transitional buffer 25.
- 4. <u>Density.</u> There shall be no more than 92 Single Family dwelling units. All lots shall be a minimum width of sixty (60) feet.
- 5. Amenities. Recreational amenities for use by dwelling unit owners and guests shall include at least one gathering area (with a gazebo or pavilion and amenities such as grill and tables, meeting area, play areas and as otherwise approved at the time of subdivision or plan of development review), and to be located in an open park area. Trails and walkways shall be provided on the Property for common use of dwelling unit owners and their guests and when possible will tie into sidewalks adjoining the Property.
- 6. Architectural Treatment. Dwelling units constructed on the Property shall be generally in conformance with EXHIBIT D attached hereto (see case file), unless otherwise requested by the owner and specifically approved by the Director of Planning. Side by side dwelling units shall not have the identical architectural treatment. All dwelling units shall have a minimum of two (2) side windows. Both windows can be on one side or one (1) window can be on each side.
- 7. <u>Minimum Dwelling Size.</u> All dwelling units constructed on the Property shall have a minimum of 1,750 square feet of finished floor area.
- 8. Garages. Each dwelling unit on the Property shall be constructed with a minimum of a one (1) car attached garage. Garage doors on all dwellings shall have at a minimum 2 of the following detailed boxes, windows, straps and/or hinges or other architectural design features or a combination of these features. Garage doors shall not have flat panels.
- 9. <u>Lighting.</u> Pedestrian scale residential lighting within the Property shall be provided on each lot. Such lighting shall be non-glare. decorative in style, residential in character and shall be provided at least in the front yard of each lot.
- 10. **Landscaping.** A minimum of one (1) tree measuring a minimum

of 2.5" caliper shall be retained or planted in the front yard of all lots in the Property. An additional minimum of one (1) tree measuring a minimum of 2.5" caliper shall be retained or planted in side yards of corner lots in the Property. In no case shall any such tree be planted more than ten (10) feet from the right-of-way unless otherwise approved at the time the landscape plan approval. The front and side yards of any lot within the Property shall be irrigated and planted with sod. Each dwelling unit on the Property shall have prototypical plantings (shrubs and ornamental ground cover) along the entire front foundation.

- 11. <u>Foundations</u>. All dwelling units on the Property shall be constructed with crawl space foundations except for basements, garages and as may otherwise be approved at the time of Plan of Development or subdivision review. The exterior portions of the foundations below the first-floor level which is visible above grade shall be finished with full standard brick or stone or other similar materials unless otherwise approved by the Director of Planning.
- 12. <u>Building Materials.</u> Dwelling units, including any garage accessory to such dwelling upon the same lot shall have exposed exterior walls (above finished grade) of full standard brick, cementitious siding, stone, or a combination of the foregoing or other similar materials, unless otherwise approved by the Director of Planning.
- 13. **Roof Material.** All dwelling units on the Property shall be constructed with a roof that has a minimum certified twenty-five (25) year warranty,
- 14. <u>Driveways.</u> All driveways, drive lanes and parking areas on the Property shall be constructed of cobblestone, brick, asphalt, concrete, or a combination of the foregoing or other similar materials approved at the time of subdivision review.
- 15. <u>Fireplace Chimneys.</u> The exposed portions of all fireplace chimneys shall be of full standard brick, stone, or cementitious siding. The exposed bases of all chimneys shall be of the same material as the building foundations. The exposed portion of a flue for direct-vent gas fireplaces shall be constructed of the same material used on the adjacent siding and shall be built on a foundation that is constructed of the same material as the adjacent foundation.
- 16. <u>Cantilevering.</u> No cantilevered features will be allowed, except for direct gas vents and second story bay windows with decorative corbels.
- 17. <u>Protective Covenants.</u> Prior to or concurrent with the recordation of the initial subdivision plat approved for the Property, a document setting forth covenants (the "Covenants") shall be recorded

in the Clerk's Office of the Circuit Court of Henrico County, Virginia (the "County"), setting forth the controls on the development and maintenance of the Property and establishing one or more owners' associations (the "Association"). All common amenities and common areas shall be maintained by the Association for the benefit of the owners, residents, tenants and their guests.

- 18. <u>Underground Utilities.</u> Except for junction boxes, meters, pedestals, transformers, transmission mains and existing overhead utility lines, and for technical and environmental reasons, all utility lines shall be underground.
- 19. Best Management Practices. Best Management Practice structures shall be located outside of any landscaped buffer within the Property, except as a landscaping amenity or water related feature, or unless approved at the time of Plan of Development review. Any wet pond best management practice structure shall include an aeration feature to move water within such structure.
- 20. Hours of Construction. The hours of exterior construction shall be between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Saturdays, except in emergencies or where unusual circumstances require extending specific hours in order to complete work such as concrete pours and utility connections. For purpose of this proffer, site work is defined as any construction work shown on approved construction plans for the initial construction of roads, utilities, infrastructure and the respective exteriors of structures.
- 21. <u>Sidewalks and Fencing.</u> Sidewalks a minimum width of four (4) feet shall be provided and constructed along one side of each roadway inside the Property. No chain link fencing shall be permitted on the Property.
- 22. **Road Improvements.** The following road improvements and dedications shall be made by the applicant as required by the County at the time of any subdivision or plan of development review, unless otherwise approved by the Director of Public Works to address unanticipated engineering or construction constraints:
 - a. Goodell Road shall be widened to the width of eighteen (18) feet from the centerline of that part of Goodell Road immediately adjoining the Property.
 - b. Bump outs shall be provided off Goodell Road at each entrance into the development.
 - c. Subject to obtaining all required governmental approval and permits, a sidewalk shall be constructed along Goodell Road immediately adjoining the Property pursuant to current County

road standards and specifications for sidewalks.

23. Severance. The unenforceability, elimination, revision, or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall not affect the validity or enforcement of the other proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.

Ordinance - To Amend and Reordain Section 10-67 Titled "Penalty and enforcement" and Section 10-68 Titled "Prohibited noises enumerated" of the Code of the County of Henrico to Limit Daytime Noise in Residential Areas from Stereos, Televisions, Musical Instruments, and Similar Devices.

Andrew Newby, County Attorney, responded to questions from Mr. Schmitt and Mr. Nelson confirming that this updated ordinance would not affect noise from commercial businesses, only residences.

The following individuals spoke regarding the ordinance:

- Joanne Simmons Holmes spoke in opposition stating this ordinance is unrealistic. She believes the County should not be monitoring families' enjoyment in their homes and that the resources of the Police Division could be better utilized.
- Leroy Gordon, a resident of the Fairfield District, expressed concern about loud vehicles in his neighborhood. Mrs. O'Bannon requested Andrew Newby address the new ordinance that was approved at the August 9 Board meeting regulating excessive noise from cars. Mr. Newby confirmed that ordinance should address Mr. Gordon's concerns about loud vehicles.
- Sydney Newby, a resident of the Three Chopt District, voiced concerns about noise from cars and wanted to know what the decimal is regarding the car engines.
- Dennis Wall voiced concerns about noises from students practicing their instruments, graduation parties, etc. He is concerned about someone complaining and believes the fee is excessive. He feels the County needs to crack down on other issues and not focus on noises from families enjoying time outside.

- A citizen who did not give her name agreed with the noise ordinance stating there are a lot of senior citizens in her neighborhood and stated this ordinance will get the attention of many young adults.
- Tyrone Mitchell, a resident of Hanover Estate, opposed the ordinance and feels residents should be able to entertain on their property and enjoy their families.
- Andrew D'Amore, a resident of the Tuckahoe District, voiced concerns about the noise ordinance. As a local musician, he practices in his garage and hosts cookouts. He fears he will now be penalized for this.
- Ronald Jackson spoke in support of the noise ordinance stating residents should keep their noise on their own properties and respect that of their surrounding neighbors.

At the request of Mr. Branin, Lt. Col. Palkovics explained that the Division of Police does not ride around looking for noise violations; they only respond when a complaint has been made and at that time. He explained in 2021 the County received 3,200 noise complaint calls and only one individual was actually charged with a violation after failing to address the noise. He continued explaining the goal of the Police Division is always to work with the individuals so that everyone can live peacefully. He also stated they will not be immediately charging fines; their main goal is to work through the issues.

Mrs. O'Bannon requested Lt. Col. Palkovics speak with Mr. Gordon regarding his additional concerns.

On motion of Mr. Schmitt, seconded by Mr. Nelson, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached ordinance.

The intersection was recently reconstructed by the Virginia Department of Transportation. Mr. Hubbell made several recommendations to address these issues.

Gilbert Doustout, a resident of the Varina District, voiced concerns about large truck traffic on Charles City Road.

Zainab Kamarah, a resident of the Brookland District, asked about support for small businesses in the County.

Resolution – To Create the Sports and Entertainment Authority of Henrico County, Virginia, Pursuant to the Public Recreational Facilities Authorities Act and Setting Forth the Articles of Incorporation of the Authority

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Henrico County, Virginia, has determined it will serve the interests of its citizens to create an authority pursuant to the Public Recreational Facilities Authorities Act, Chapter 56, Title 15.2 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended (the "Act") to acquire, expand, lease, operate, and maintain recreational facilities in the County, develop and foster sports and entertainment tourism at recreational facilities in the County, and engage in other activities authorized by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. Creation of Authority.

The Board hereby creates an authority pursuant to the Act to be known as the "Sports and Entertainment Authority of Henrico County, Virginia."

2. Articles of Incorporation.

The Articles of Incorporation of the Authority are as follows:

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION SPORTS AND ENTERTAINMENT AUTHORITY OF HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA

The Board of Supervisors of Henrico County, Virginia, by resolution, created an authority pursuant to the Public Recreational Facilities Authorities Act, Chapter 56, Title 15.2 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended (the "Act"), which authority is a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia. In accordance with the Act, the Board certifies the following:

ARTICLE I Creation and Name of Authority

The Authority is created pursuant to the provisions of the Act. The name of the Authority is the "Sports and Entertainment Authority of Henrico County, Virginia." The address of the Authority's principal office is 4300 East Parham Road, Henrico, Virginia 23228.

ARTICLE II Participating Locality

The County of Henrico is the sole participating locality in the Authority.

ARTICLE III Purposes and Powers

The Authority is created to acquire, expand, lease, operate, and maintain recreational facilities in the County, develop and foster sports and entertainment tourism at recreational facilities in the County, and engage in other activities authorized by the Act. The Authority has all powers

granted by the Act and is subject to all obligations and responsibilities provided in the Act or otherwise by law. The Authority may adopt bylaws. The Authority may carry out its purposes itself or may do so through other public or private individuals or entities. The Authority may engage in any other activities not prohibited by law.

ARTICLE IV Voting

A majority of a quorum present and voting is sufficient for the board of the Authority to adopt any motion.

ARTICLE V Board Members and Terms

5.1. The powers of the Authority will be exercised by a board that will consist of seven members appointed by the Board of Supervisors of Henrico County, Virginia. The seven initial members are as follows, and their addresses are Post Office Box 90775, Henrico, Virginia 23273-0775:

Kayla Coleman Vaughan G. Crawley Yvette D. George J. Oscar Knott Marielle McFarland Sheila S. Minor Steven J. Yob

- 5.2. The terms of each initial member begin on September 13, 2022, and terminate on January 31, 2024, or thereafter when their successors have been appointed and qualified.
- 5.3. The Board of Supervisors of Henrico County, Virginia, may fill any vacancy or expiring term on the board of the Authority by resolution appointing members to serve terms of one or two years. Any member whose term expires may continue to serve until his or her successor has been appointed and qualified. Members may serve any number of consecutive terms.
- 5.4. Members appointed to the board of the Authority must possess significant experience or knowledge in sports tourism, entertainment, finance, business, real estate, hospitality, or business management.

ARTICLE VI Officers

The members of the board will elect one member as chairperson and one member as vice-chairperson. The members will also elect a secretary and treasurer, though those officers need not be members and may be the same person. The officers will be elected at the annual meeting of the board.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

The initial meeting of the board of the Authority will be September 21, 2022, at 10:00 a.m. at the Sports and Entertainment Authority principal office at 4300 East Parham Road, Henrico, Virginia 23228. The board of the Authority will hold its annual meeting and such other meetings as specified in the bylaws of the Authority.

ARTICLE VIII Annual Audits

The Authority will cause its funds and financial records to be audited annually by an independent certified public accounting firm and furnish a copy of each such audit report to the director of finance of Henrico County, Virginia. The cost of the audit will be paid by the County.

ORDINANCE — To Amend and Reordain Section 10-67 Titled "Penalty and enforcement" and Section 10-68 Titled "Prohibited noises enumerated" of the Code of the County of Henrico to Limit Daytime Noise in Residential Areas from Stereos, Televisions, Musical Instruments, and Similar Devices

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. That Section 10-67 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 10-67. Penalty and enforcement.

- (a) No person shall <u>may</u> be charged with a violation of the provisions of section 10-68 unless:
 - (1) A complainant appears before a magistrate and requests a summons to be issued; or
 - (2) A violation is committed in the presence of a police officer.

(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), no person may be charged with a violation of subparagraph (2) of section 10-68 occurring between 7:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m. unless the violation is committed in the presence of a police officer.

- (bc) Any person convicted of violating any of the provisions of section 10-68 shall will be punished by a fine not to exceed \$500.00. Any person convicted of a second offense within less than five years after a first offense under this article shall will be punished by a fine not to exceed \$1,000.00. Any person convicted of a third offense within less than ten years after a first offense under this article shall will be punished by a fine not to exceed \$2,500.00.
- (ed) Each day a violation continues unabated shall constitutes a separate offense.
- (de) Criminal enforcement against a person violating this article shall is not be a bar against, or a prerequisite for, taking any other action permitted by this Code or the Code of Virginia to abate the violation.
- 2. That Section 10-68 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 10-68. Prohibited noises enumerated.

It shall-be is unlawful for any person to cause or permit to be caused any of the

following prohibited sounds or noises:

. . . .

- (2) Sound-producing and sound-reproducing devices. Except for commercial establishments located-in-areas zoned for urban mixed use, tThe use, operation, or playing of any radio, phonograph, television, projector, record, compact disc, tape, digital music, MP3 or DVD player, musical instrument, microphone, loudspeaker, sound amplifier, or other similar machine or device capable of designed or used for producing or reproducing sound, regardless of whether such sound-producing or sound-reproducing machine or device is located inside of a structure or outside of or on a structure, in such a manner or with such volume or duration that it is plainly audible between 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.:
 - a. Inside the confines of the dwelling unit, house, or apartment of another person; or
 - b. In residential areas, at 50 or more feet from the device <u>between 11:00 p.m.</u> and 7:00 a.m.

The prohibition in this subparagraph (2) does not apply (i) when the source of the sound is in a commercial establishment located in areas zoned for urban mixed use or (ii) between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m. when the source of the sound is a recreational or athletic facility or commercial, industrial, or other non-residential property.
