#### **MANAGER'S COMMENTS**

Mr. Vithoulkas recognized Ty Parr, Director of Social Services, who has been appointed to the additional role of Special Advisor to Human Services. The Manager noted that Ty will work with each agency to understand how we can effectively and efficiently transition the most vulnerable county residents to permanent and stable housing, employment, transportation, and other life necessities. Mr. Parr thanked the Manager and the Board for this tremendous opportunity and looks forward to serving in his new role.

Mr. Vithoulkas recognized Officer Heidi Rojas who serves as the County's Intercultural Liaison Community Officer. Heidi is a proud descendent of Chile, and she understands the importance of diverse representation in law enforcement and in serving diverse communities. Officer Rojas thanked the Manager and members of the Board and noted since 1968 Americans have celebrated Hispanic heritage, first as a weeklong celebration, and then in 1988 it was enacted into law to be a monthlong observation from September 15 to October 15.

The 2022 theme for Hispanic Heritage Month is "Unidos: Inclusivity for a Stronger Nation," which is certainly fitting for Henrico's work with the Hispanic community. For example, Libraries provides a sizeable collection of materials written by Hispanic authors and about Hispanic culture, and Recreation and Parks has incorporated culture programming, such as Fridays at Sunsets which often showcase Hispanic and Latino films. In addition, Public Relations translates printed and web resources into the Spanish language. The County also has an invaluable partnership with Radio Poder that allows us to communicate directly with the Latino community in the region.

Officer Rojas thanked the Board of Supervisors and the County Manager for their leadership and support to ensure that Henrico is strategic in their service to recruitment of, and overall engagement with, the Hispanic community.

Mr. Vithoulkas recognized Bentley Chan, Director of Public Utilities, noted the Board spent the afternoon at the Water Reclamation Facility, and explained he wanted to recognize the Solid Waste Division who had been selected as the recipient of the Solid Waste Association of North America's (SWANA) 2022 Safety Award for its "demonstrated resiliency in the development and implementation of its COVID-19 Continuity of Operations (COOP), which identified potential scenarios involving worker shortages and provided detailed solutions to maintain essential functions." Throughout the pandemic, DPU's Solid Waste Division provided the essential community services of collecting refuse and operating Public Use Areas and Recycling Centers without closures or major delays. Next, the Department of Public Utilities Water Reclamation Facility was presented the 2021 George W. This award "recognizes a municipal or industrial wastewater facility for establishing and maintaining an active and effective safety program." The Water Reclamation Facility currently has tracked over 630 days without an accident-related time loss. The Water Reclamation Facility staff accepted the award at the VWEA and VA AWWA

Mrs. O'Bannon announced Freeman High School sophomore and NOVA of Virginia Aquatics swimmer Nathan Szobota won a gold medal at his first international competition representing team USA during an event in Seychelles, off the East Coast of Africa. Competing in the FINA (Federation internationale de natation) World Junior Open Water Championships, Szobota won the 5k event by 0.10 seconds over an Italian swimmer and by 0.60 seconds over a German swimmer.

Mrs. O'Bannon also noted the passing of Donald Michael Brennan, who was the former President of the Tuckahoe Volunteer Rescue Squad.

Mrs. O'Bannon next noted the passing of James Campbell on August 17. He was a graduate of Freeman High School and Virginia Tech, where he earned a B.S. in Business Management. He later earned a M. A. in Urban and Regional Planning from the University of Northern Colorado. Mr. Campbell started his career in Henrico and later was named as the executive director of VACo in 1990. She noted he will be deeply missed.

WHEREAS, Jeffrey C. Johnson and Karlyn E. Gambke-Johnson have requested that the County abandon the portion of Winfrey Road in its former alignment between Greenwood Road and Old Greenwood Road, which is labeled "Parcel A" on the plat attached as Exhibit A; and,

WHEREAS, Jeffrey C. Johnson and Karlyn E. Gambke-Johnson are the only persons who reside along this portion of Winfrey Road; and,

WHEREAS, Jeffrey C. Johnson and Karlyn E. Gambke-Johnson have further requested that the County convey such portion of Winfrey Road to them; and,







Except as altered by this subsection, all other subsections of this section apply to exemptions for the demolition and replacement of exterior-corridor hotels and motels, including all other qualification requirements and restrictions of this section.
- (k) Enclosed shopping malls. For purposes of this section, an "enclosed shopping mall" is a shopping mall structure, other than a strip mall, with large and small retail units, including anchor department store spaces, where the majority of the retail units are accessed from interior corridors within the structure. The demolition and replacement of an enclosed shopping mall, or portion thereof, may qualify under this section for an exemption of 15 years instead of seven years. To qualify for the extended exemption, the enclosed shopping mall, or portion thereof, must be demolished and replaced with a structure used for any purpose, other than an exterior-corridor hotel or motel or enclosed shopping mall, that is allowed by the building code and the applicable zoning regulations for the property, including mixed use or dwellings. Notwithstanding the requirements of subsection (b), the square footage of the new structure may not be more than 250 percent greater than the square footage of the demolished enclosed shopping mall or portion thereof. Except as altered by this subsection, all other subsections of this section apply to exemptions for the demolition and replacement of enclosed shopping malls, including all other

4. That Section 20-82 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:
