**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Schedule of Compensation attached hereto effective at the beginning of FY 2024-25 is approved.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the approved Operating Annual Fiscal Plan for FY 2024-25 includes an increase in the personnel complement of 56 positions for general government and 69 positions for schools and funding for a 4.8% wage adjustment for all eligible general government and school employees, to be effective on June 15, 2024.

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RESOLUTION - Approval of Operating and Capital Annual Fiscal Plans for FY 2024-25 and Allocation of Car Tax Relief for Tax Year 2024

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that in order to implement changes to the Personal Property Tax Relief Act of 1998 (the "PPTRA") made by legislation adopted by the Virginia General Assembly:

- 1. Any qualifying vehicle, as defined in the PPTRA, sitused within the County commencing January 1, 2024, shall receive personal property tax relief in the following manner:
  - a. Qualifying vehicles valued at \$1,000 or less shall receive 100% tax relief;
  - b. Qualifying vehicles valued at between \$1,001 to \$20,000 shall receive 46% tax relief;
  - c. Qualifying vehicles valued at \$20,001 or more shall receive 46% tax relief on the first \$20,000 of value only; and
  - d. All other vehicles which do not meet the definition of "qualifying vehicles" will not receive any form of tax relief under the PPTRA.
- 2. The amount of tax relief shall be a specific dollar amount offset against the total personal property taxes that would otherwise be due on a qualifying vehicle but for the PPTRA. The specific dollar amount of relief shall be shown on the tax bill for each qualifying vehicle, together with a general description of the criteria upon which relief has been allocated.

**COMMENTS:** The Director of Finance recommends approval of the Board paper, and the County Manager concurs.

# COUNTY OF HENRICO, VIRGINIA BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING March 26, 2024

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a regular meeting on Tuesday, March 26, 2024, at 5:00 p.m. in the Board Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico County, Virginia.

#### PUBLIC HEARING

96-24 Resolution - Approval of Operating and Capital Annual Fiscal Plans for Fiscal Year 2024-25 and Allocation of Car Tax Relief for Tax Year 2024.

Justin Crawford, Budget Division Director, highlighted the FY 2024-25 budget. He explained the budget was built with four pillars in mind: the people who serve, the people we serve, the businesses we serve, and the fiscal discipline required to provide the best service at the lowest tax burden to our residents and community. Mr. Crawford continued by noting the real estate tax remains the same, and the budget will continue to allocate the lion's share of resources to our highest priorities: education and public safety, with nearly \$75 million of the general fund budget growth dedicated to these two areas. Noting employees are essential to every service provided by the County, the budget includes a 4.8% salary increase for all employees and a nearly \$17 million for adjustments where the County is experiencing critical employee shortages.

Mr. Crawford continued explaining the budget will begin implementation of the Henrico CARES initiative through a partnership with Schools, Mental Health, and private providers and will continue the six-year plan for our bond projects approved by the voters in 2022.

Mr. Crawford reviewed the adjustments the Board discussed during legislative reviews the previous week, including funding of an additional health worker; removing funding for the Henricus Foundation and RAMPS; and increasing funding for Neighborhood Resource Center, Coal Pit Learning Center, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, CASA, and ChildSavers.

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Mr. Vithoulkas noted the Board had conversations with the School Board and the Superintendent regarding planning periods. The Board of Supervisors instructed the Manager to find funding to expand the elementary school planning period to help enrich fine motor skill development and social/emotional learning. He noted those funds will be put in a reserve fund and made available July 1. He thanked Brandon Hinton, Mr. Crawford, and the entire Budget staff for the efforts they put into the budget.

The following persons addressed the Board during the public hearing:

- Ms. Mowdy, with Parents for Community Based Services, and her daughter, Beth Mowdy, who is 37 years old and has benefited from services provided by the County, thanked the Board for supporting individuals like Beth.
- Max Maizels, a resident of the Tuckahoe District, asked the County to discontinue funding the Virginia Association of Counties.
- Graham Montrose, a resident of the Varina District, encouraged the County to practice good planning for the next hundred years and urged the Board to protect green spaces and small businesses.
- Frank Callahan, a resident of the Three Chopt District and Education Chair of the Henrico NAACP, thanked the Board for its work with public schools education and stated he was very happy to hear there will be additional funding for elementary school planning periods.
- Monica Hutchinson, President of the Henrico NAACP, echoed the words of Mr. Callahan and thanked the Board for its support of the HCPS. She also thanked Mr. Nelson for raising the awareness of the disparity in the test scores between schools in the community and the work that needs to be done to address that. Lastly, she thanked the Board for the work in implementing the Marcus Alert and the work on mental health.

Mr. Schmitt thanked the individuals who spoke this evening and

explained the Board spent an entire week reviewing the budget. He highlighted a few items in the budget, including major new investments in education, public safety, sidewalks, road improvements, and pedestrian safety initiatives. Mr. Schmitt also noted the low tax rate and the County's continued commitment to fiscal discipline and prudent fiscal planning.

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Ms. Whitehead explained what she saw and heard during the budget review were the voices and faces of the people of the County who work behind the scenes. She enjoyed seeing the passion and dedication of the individuals who work and love what they do. She noted one of her favorite parts of the budget was the non-departmental review, where the Board gets to support the community and individuals who do not work for the County but are non-profit groups who are working hard in the community. She stated she is honored and humbled to work with such a great group of people.

Mr. Cooper echoed the sentiment of his colleagues and stated he is excited about the increase in the support for education and the efforts of the County Manager to identify funding for the reserve to expand planning periods. He also applauded the support and commitment to public safety. He stated he is excited that Henrico is the place where if you want to live, work, and play, you can do so. He thanked the Chair for the opportunity and staff for all their hard work.

Mr. Rogish thanked the Manager, the Chair, and his colleagues. He stated he ran on three things: school, education, and public safety, and this budget addresses all three of those items. He enjoyed the last week and the opportunity to review the budget. He thanked the staff for all their hard work and efforts put forward and looks forward to continued work.

In conclusion, Mr. Nelson stated the Board of Supervisors only has one employee and that is the County Manager. All the employees work for the County Manager, and they do an incredible job. He thanked the employees for all their hard work, and they put together this incredible budget and, regardless of what area those people work in, they do a great job. He said he would put the County's employees up against any employees in the Commonwealth. He echoed the statement of Ms. Whitehead that County staff does the work and the Board gets the credit. He reiterated we have an incredible group of people who get the job done. He stated it was a refreshing budget season to review it with a new Board. Mr. Nelson stated he was excited about the budget and was excited to continue to do the work.

Mr. Vithoulkas thanked the Board for all the work they continue to do.

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

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. That Section 10-1 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

### Sec. 10-1. Purpose and applicability

This article shall applyies to privately and publicly owned lands within areas designated as a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) and areas adjacent to SFHAs, as outlined in this article. 2. That Section 10-3 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Floodplain Maps: The current Flood Insurance Rate Maps and Flood Insurance Study for Henrico County prepared by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, Federal Insurance Administration, effective December 18, 2007 April 25, 2024, and the current County Comprehensive Drainage Map, effective December 18, 2007, and subsequent revisions or amendments thereto.

. . . .

Lowest Floor: The lowest floor of the lowest enclosed area (including basement). An unfinished or flood resistant enclosure, usable solely for parking of vehicles, building access, or storage in an area other than a basement area is not considered a building's lowest floor if such enclosure does not violate the applicable enclosure requirements in Sec. 10-10(eb) of this article.

• • • •

New Construction: For the purposes of determining insurance rates, structures for which the "start of construction" commenced on or after the effective date of an initial FIRM or after December 31, 1974, whichever is later, and includes any subsequent improvements to such structures. For floodplain management purposes, new construction means estructures for which the start of construction commenced on or after the effective date of a floodplain management regulation adopted by a community and includes any subsequent improvements to such structures.

. . . .

3. That Section 10-9 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

## Sec. 10-9. Development standards – general

The following provisions shall apply to all permitted development:

• • • •

(h) An owner or developer must obtain a permit from the U. S. Corps of Engineers, the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality, and the Virginia Marine Resources Commission (as applicable) prior to any proposed alteration or relocation of any channel or watercourse within the county. Furthermore, the applicant shall notify all affected adjacent jurisdictions, the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation (Division of Dam Safety and Floodplain Management), and FEMA when altering or relocating any channel or watercourse mapped in a FEMA SFHA.

4. That Section 10-10 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

#### Sec. 10-10. Elevation and construction standards

. . . .

- (c) Accessory Structures: Detached accessory structures used only for parking of vehicles and/or storage may be permitted with the lowest floor below the BFE if the following conditions are met:
  - (1) the structure is not larger than 600 square feet approximately the size of a one-story two-car garage and walls.
  - the structure has flood openings in compliance with the requirements of Sec. 10-10(eb)(4) to protect the structure from hydrostatic pressure.

(k) Temporary Structures: Before issuance of a Floodplain Development Permit by the Floodplain Administrator for a temporary structure, all applicants must submit a plan for removal of the structure in the event of a flood-related severe weather notification (hurricane, tropical storm, flood, flash flood, etc.) which includes the following information:

(2) a specified time period for the temporary use. The time period may not exceed three months and is renewable for up to one **additional** year;

- (I) Temporary Encroachments: Temporary encroachments into the SFHA may be exempt from the requirements of Sec. 10-9(a) and Sec. 10-9(b) if a Floodplain Development permit is issued. Temporary encroachments include sediment control devices, temporary stream crossings, haul roads and construction entrances, storage of equipment, and soil stockpiling. The following conditions must be met to qualify for the exemption:
  - (1) The proposed temporary encroachment shall not be in place more than three months and is renewable for up to one <u>additional</u> year with written approval from the Floodplain Administrator. Temporary sediment control devices may be kept in place longer than one year if required by the appropriate regulatory agency; and,

5. That Section 10-17 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

#### Sec. 10-17. Administrative variance

The Floodplain Administrator may grant administrative variances for the following uses, development, or redevelopment:

(a) minor filling in the SFHA necessary to protect or restore natural floodplain functions or to stabilize stream banks to protect public roads and or utilities. The requirements of Sec. 10-9 must be met.

6. That Section 10-28 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

#### Sec. 10-28. Definitions

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:
