Rabies shots cost \$6 each and include a certificate of inoculation and a rabies tag. Dog owners may also purchase a license at the clinic for \$10, but must show proof of rabies inoculation. All dogs and cats ages 4 months and older are required to have a rabies shot.

Henrico County received 18 Achievement Awards recognizing 13 agencies in the 2001 National Association of Counties (NACo) awards competition. Additionally, NACo designated Keep Henrico Beautiful's Litter Really "Bugs" Me program as a Best of Category for Children and Youth. This special award is limited to exemplary model programs throughout the nation; only 15 Best of Category awards were conferred this year. Keep Henrico Beautiful Executive Coordinator Nancy W. Drumheller with the Department of Public Utilities, worked with Libraries and Recreation and Parks to create an environmental education program for preschool and elementary school children demonstrating how to keep the county and the environment looking beautiful.

Due to increased recreational and commercial traffic within a narrow waterway, there are 28 miles of shoreline along the James River in eastern Henrico that produce a variety of challenges and hazards. Local High School Students Make a Difference One Paint Stroke at a Time

Henrico County's public health clinic on Dixon Powers Drive is sporting a bright new look thanks to five talented art students at Hermitage High School. A mural illustrating the clinic's diverse patient population now greets visitors in the public waiting area.

The concept was formed when Debbie Kammeter, a public health nurse at the clinic, decided she wanted a mural in the waiting room that would portray the growing number of refugees who use the clinic and to make it more inviting. Kammeter planted the seed for the mural when she ran into Janet Masterson, head of the art department at Hermitage High.

Masterson, recently named Henrico's Art Teacher of the Year by her peers, relayed the idea to her Advanced Art students, divided them into four competing teams and challenged them to develop proposals. The students met with Kammeter and visited the clinic to learn more about its services and patients.

Virginia Paint Company donated the paint and the winning design went to Brett Hinson, Allison Boyd, Adam Triplett, and Jackie Lohmann, all rising seniors and members of the National Art Honor Society.

The students spent several days after school painting the mural. Stephanie Hoffman, another art student and rising senior at Hermitage, pitched in to complete the mural before the summer recess began.

The mural depicts real people who have used the clinic: a Mexican mother and her child, a Vietnamese girl and her father, a Bosnian mother and her baby, a Cambodian girl, a couple from Sierra Leone, and a Russian girl, along with the Statue of Liberty. The students worked from photographs of the patients.

The mural has had a positive effect on many levels. Students not only learned about the clinic, but also were enlightened about Henrico's diverse multi-cultural population and the struggle of refugees. They also learned how to work together to provide a work of art for a real client.

The daily reminder of the people they help and the lives they have touched inspires the clinic's staff, says Kammeter. While the clinic serves the refugee population, its services are available to all Henrico residents.

The clinic provides pediatric, family planning, maternity, immunization and dental services, as well as services to the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program.
