Henrico Extension accepting applications for two community gardens

The Henrico County Extension Office is accepting applications for Gardens Growing Families, the community garden program for qualifying county residents. For a nominal fee, families can grow their own vegetables in a plot maintained at the Lakeside Garden, located at the intersection of Vale Street and Michael Avenue, near Lakeside Avenue; and at the Alma Avenue Island Garden, located near the intersection of Alma and Laburnum avenues.

Gardens Growing Families is designed to help families reduce their grocery bills by learning to grow, prepare and store fresh vegetables. The program offers free classes on topics such as the importance of fruit and vegetables for a healthy diet, organic insect and disease control, and freezing and canning. Henrico Master Gardeners are on site regularly to offer advice; tools and water are provided. Participants follow organic practices, contribute time to community garden projects and meet other requirements.

Residents must apply to participate in Gardens Growing Families. Fees are based on a sliding scale, ranging from \$5 to \$65 annually, depending on household income and garden plot size. Fees will be refunded for cancellations before June 30. Residents living in neighborhoods near the gardens will receive priority consideration for plots.

Participants of all ages are encouraged to dress and run in the costumes of their favorite superhero characters, said Barbara Herzog, executive director of Henrico CASA.

"Henrico and Chesterfield CASA are excited again to hold the Superhero Run and help increase awareness of the special needs of abused and neglected children in our community," Herzog said. "We are grateful for The Martin Agency's support of this special event."

Inspired by The Superhero Foundation, an Austin, Texas-based organization working to prevent child abuse, the CASA event is one of several Superhero runs nationwide. The race is being held in conjunction with national Child Abuse Prevention Month.

Activities begin at 8:30 a.m. with the kids' mile; the 5K race will follow at 9 a.m. Cost before April 9 is \$25 for adults and \$15 for children ages 5 and older; fees

Henrico names Douglas A. Middleton as Chief of Police

Henrico County Manager Virgil R. Hazelett, P.E. announces the appointment of Lt. Col. Douglas A. Middleton as Chief of Police, effective April 9.

Middleton, a 38-year veteran of Henrico Police who has been serving as deputy chief since 1998, will succeed retiring Chief Col. Henry W. Stanley, Jr. He will assume command of a nationally acclaimed force with some 800 personnel, including more than 600 sworn officers, and a total annual budget of more than \$65 million.

Middleton was chosen from a field of 37 candidates from 18 states who applied for the position.

"Dep. Chief Middleton has had a long and impressive career in Henrico," Hazelett said. "He is a strong leader and communicator and readily accepts challenges. I look forward to him continuing his dedication and service to Henrico County as our chief of police."

Middleton joined Henrico Police as a patrol officer in November 1972, rising steadily through the ranks to become captain in 1994 and major in 1995 before being appointed deputy chief. His service includes stints in the Special Action Force, Police Personnel, Inspectional Services, Police Planning, Communications and Records and as a pilot in the Aviation Unit.

A graduate of Henrico's Hermitage High School, Middleton earned a bachelor's degree from St. Paul's College. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy, the Senior Management Institute for Police at Harvard University, the Police Executive Leadership School at the University of Richmond and the Administrative Officers Course of the Southern Police Institute at the University of Louisville.

A native of Tocoma Park, Md., Middleton is a veteran of the U.S. Army. He received numerous combat decorations for his service in the Vietnam War, including the permanent award of Flight Wings, two Bronze Stars and 14 awards of the Air Medal for Combat Missions.

Virginia Indian Cultural Program to feature tribal art, dance March 19

The history as well as the contemporary culture of the region's earliest inhabitants will be presented through art, dance and exhibits at the Virginia Indian Cultural Program, 3-8 p.m. Saturday, March 19 at The Cultural Arts Center at Glen Allen, 2880 Mountain Road.

The Virginia Indian Cultural Program, a free event, is part of the county's yearlong 400th anniversary commemoration. Whereas Henrico traces its beginnings to 1611 and the founding of the Citie of Henricus, Indian artifacts discovered in the county date to 6,500 B.C., indicating a native presence in the area more than 8,000 years before the first English settlers.

The program will include the exhibit "By Our Hands: Virginia Indian Cultural Arts," featuring pottery, beadwork, leatherwork, painting and sculpture by contemporary Indian artists and artists and artists will demonstrate their creative processes and discuss their work with the public.

Beginning at 6 p.m., the Virginia Indian Intertribal Dance Group and Drum will tell the story of native history and culture through a performance of traditional and contemporary tribal dances. Dancers will explain the regalia they wear and the meaning of each dance. The program also will feature the photographic exhibit "Family Portraits: Virginia Indians at the Turn of the 20th Century" (this exhibit continues through May 8).

In addition, the event will offer a variety of children's activities, including workshops on making pinch pots and corn husk dolls.

Henrico schedules public meetings March 15 and 17 to discuss redistricting

Henrico County will hold public meetings on the county's 2011 magisterial district reapportionment process on Tuesday, March 15, at 6 p.m. in the Government Center Board Room, 4301 E. Parham Road; and on Thursday, March 17, at 6 p.m. in the Eastern Government Center multipurpose room, 3820 Nine Mile Road.

Representatives from Henrico's Planning Department, County Attorney's Office and Voter Registration and Elections Office will be on hand to provide information, answer questions and receive public input as the county prepares to redraw its magisterial district lines. Residents are encouraged to participate in the process and submit their own redistricting plans and comments; staff will use input received at the meetings to help draft the county's plan. Maps and additional information are available at www.henricoredistricting.com; comments and questions also may be submitted by email to redistricting@co.henrico.va.us or by calling 501-4427.

Federal and state law requires localities to reapportion the representation in the governing body among the magisterial districts every 10 years. The 2010 U.S. Census counted 306,935 residents in Henrico, with Three Chopt District comprising the largest population at 72,035. The ideal population per district would be 61,387

Henrico's Board of Supervisors will hold public hearings later this spring to present a draft redistricting plan and adopt ordinances approving a final plan. The new districts will be submitted to the U.S. Department of Justice for preclearance under Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Henrico mental health agency earns accreditation from international organization

The Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) has awarded three-year accreditation — the organization's highest measure of quality assurance — to eight programs and services provided by Henrico Area Mental Health and Developmental Services (MH/DS).

An international, nonprofit body, CARF offers accreditation of human-service providers in the fields of rehabilitation, employment, child and family and aging services. MH/DS first earned CARF accreditation in 2001; it has now received four consecutive accreditations from the organization.

To earn accreditation, MH/DS underwent a rigorous peer-review process and an on-site examination that applied more than 1,800 standards. The survey noted the strong fiscal management of the agency, the stability and effectiveness of its programs and the high level of satisfaction of recipients of the agency's services. The survey also reported a "pattern of practiced excellence" in MH/DS programs.

"CARF surveyors praised the commitment of our staff to improving the quality of life of the people we serve," said MH/DS Director Michael O'Connor.

Programs receiving accreditation were Assertive Community Treatment; Case Management/Services Coordination; Community Housing; Community Integration: Psychosocial Rehabilitation and Community Services; Supported Living; Prevention/Diversion; Community Employment Services; and Organizational Employment Services.

Henrico County Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) is seeking volunteers to serve as advocates for abused and neglected children in the court system.

Henrico CASA will conduct a free, four-week training program for volunteers from 6-9 p.m. each Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday beginning Monday, April 4 at its office in the Hungary Spring Office Park, 3001 Hungary Spring Road, suite A. Potential volunteers must apply for the program; applicants will undergo interviews, background and reference checks as well as fingerprinting and local criminal checks.

CASA volunteers serve as the voice of abused and neglected children in the court system. Legal experience is not required. Participants receive training to conduct interviews, research and investigate cases, provide written reports for Juvenile Court judges and assist child welfare professionals and case attorneys.

Last year, volunteers served as advocates for 277 children, donating nearly 10,650 hours to their cases.
